is accidentally purchased, do no cat it.
Refrigerate purchased eggs as
soon as possible. Store them in the caraoons in which they were pur-
chased, on a shelf in the refrigertor. The egg slots on a refrigerastore cggs because the temperature
fluctuates in this area as the door opens and closes. Eggs need to be temperature to maintain safety.
For hard cooked egss, place them in water in a pan and cover.
Bring to a boil. Do not stack eggs. Bring to a boil. Do not stack eggs
This will prevent uneven cooking
When water comes to a boil, take the pan off the heat and let sit for 20 minutes. Pour off hot water and
cool the eggs under cold running water.
Hard cooked eggs are still perishable, so store the cooked eggs

then place eggs back in the refrig.
