Commissioners authorize purchase of new radio system

Garza County commissioners authorized the city-county law enforcement committee to choose one of two bids opened at the regular meeting Monday morning for a new radio system.

The law enforcement committee, composed of commissioners Herb Walls and Albert Stone and city council members Larry Waldrip and Jim Schooler, met later in the day, approving Parkinson Electronics' bid of \$11,918.21 for the transmitter, repeater, antenna, coaxial cable, labor and five mobile units.

Although Motorola's bid was lower at \$10,395, questions about specifics of the bid could not be answered because the company representative was not at the committee meeting.

In other action, commissioners delayed action on purchasing a new police package vehicle. A lone bid of \$16,335.90, less \$1,555 for a trade-in, was

submitted by McGinnis Chevrolet. The court approved a resolution to participate with the Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC) and to investigate the possibility of purchasing equipment through that government agency. Judge Giles Dalby explained that the HGAC provides equipment at manufacturer's cost, plus a reasonable preparation fee to the nearest dealer.

Commissioners also approved a continuing agreement with the Big Spring State Hospital for specialized services.

Following a discussion about the cost and problems of maintaining payroll deductions, the court approved a policy restricting payroll deductions to no less than one-third of the total of employees.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Walls, Stone, John Valdez and Sammy Ellis, Judge Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

Trustees approve implementing baseball program

In a three-two vote, the Post Independent School District board of trustees Monday night approved the implementation of a high school baseball program beginning in the spring of 1992.

After a motion was approved to bring the item from its tabled status, trustee Gary Workman moved the program be implemented, Ronnie Gradine seconded the motion and president Dan Hodges asked for comments or discussion.

Trustee Pru Basquez questioned the cost of the program and expressed concern about the future uncertainty of state funding.

Trustee Jerry Hays also questioned the cost aspect and emphasized that with the uncertainty of state funding "I'd hate to see us start this new program, then have to cut salaries, we're just not sure what will happen to our budget."

"No one really knows, let's give it a try," Workman responded.

City, school candidates complete ballot picture for May 4 election

Incumbents Dan Hodges (Place 1) and Gary Workman (Place 2) added their names last week to the list of candidates for the May 4 Post ISD trustees election, along with Rex Cash (Place 3) and David Stelzer (Place 6). The ballot also includes incumbent Place 6 trustee Barbara Hardin who filed earlier and Mark Kirkpatrick, filing for Place 7.

In the City of Post election, Jim Jackson filed as a mayoral candidate, adding his name to the ballot along with Mayor Giles McCrary, council members Larry Mills and Dan Lamb, and challenger Marion Cruise.

Garza Memorial Hospital board of directors incumbents Jack Alexander, Zoe Kirkpatrick and David Nichols have filed for reelection on the May 4 ballot. The deadline for GMH board candidates is April 8.

Todd Taylor, Monroe Buxkemper Jr and V.C. Wheeler have filed in the Southland ISD board of trustees election. Taylor is seeking fill a two year unexpired term, Buxkemper, who is serving an unexpired term by appointment seeks to be elected to the same three year position and incumbent Wheeler has filed for a three year term. Southland ISD has four positions on the ballot with only three candidates. If no qualified write-in candidate is declared, then the newly elected trustees will appoint a citizen to fill the vacancy.

Guest speaker for the banquet will be Tom Bowman of Alvin, Texas, an entrepreneur dealing with environmental issues and local governments. Bowman is vice president of the Texas Arts Councils and is actively involved with the Arts in Education projects and the Texas Attorney General's office of child support enforcement division.

He has frequently expressed his enthusiasm for the "can-do" spirit of Post, Bowman says he believes the example set by the people here helps remove the "ho-hum attitude" of small towns across the state.

Tickets for the banquet, which includes entertainment and roast beef dinner with trimmings, are \$10 per person and may be reserved by calling the CCA office at 495-4148.

Post Mayor Giles McCrary will issue a proclamation designating the day as "Arts Appreciation Day" in Post.

Those attending the banquet will be eligible to win "A Night on the Town", scheduled for May 2, 1991. Winners will enjoy a meal at Rosie's Restaurant, a special invitation to the Post Art Guild Patron Party, tickets to the Garza Theatre for "Born Yesterday" and pie and coffee at P.D.Q. following the show.

Main Street manager presents briefing to state legislators in Austin

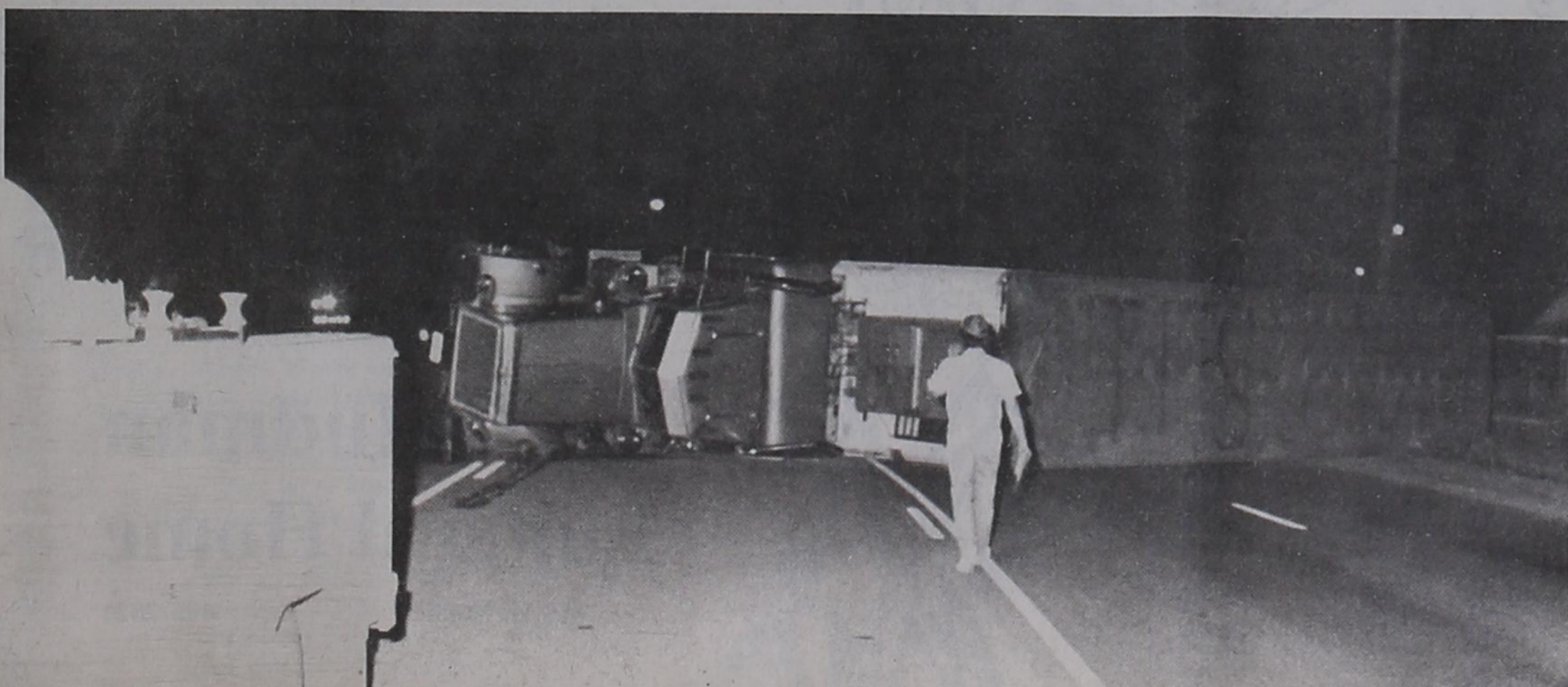
Post Main Street manager Wanda Mitchell narrated a special color slide presentation for members of the state legislature and other elected officials at a luncheon last Wednesday in Austin.

Post is a great place and getting better

You probably think this is going to be a propaganda ploy for our town.

You're right.

But, following the past few weeks of activity here, I just had to write something about our town.

First, surely you know by now, that the past two weekends we have hosted more than 1,600 visitors to Post who came here to see the very popular production, "Steel Magnolias," at the Garza Theatre. And the two extra performances Friday and Saturday are sold out, with a waiting list for theatre patrons hoping for "no-shows."

And it is absolutely exhilarating to hear the comments from the out-of-town visitors. As you may know, I spend a lot of my evenings at the theatre as house manager, and that gives me the opportunity to visit with our guests.

And it's not just the theatre they brag about...by the hundreds they praise our beautifully landscaped Main Street, our shops and our "can-do" attitude.

The Main Street program has been the inspiration for many of us, and its continued development is a reminder of what people can do when they work together for a common goal.

The goal is to make sure that our town experiences growth and prosperity, giving people a good place to live and raise families.

I believe it is working.

I quote from the March 1991 City of San Marcos annual performance report: "There is a quiet revolution taking place in more than 600 of America's small towns and cities — included San Marcos. These town and cities are part of the Main Street Program."

"Main Street is one of the nation's most successful development programs and the only revitalization approach based on historic preservation. Coordinated by the National Trust for Historic Preservation's National Main Street Center, this common-sense approach for downtown revitalization is based on local initiative."

Truck accident blocks highway more than eight hours

Travelers through Post last Wednesday evening, March 20, were slowed to a crawl for more than eight hours following a truck accident on the curve of U.S. Highway 84 near the intersection of 15th Street.

The refrigerated tractor-trailer rig was hauling 40,000 pounds of hanging beef from Texico, New Mexico when it overturned, blocking all but one of the southbound lanes. The driver for Joe Spears Trucking was taken to Garza Memorial Hospital, where he was treated and released. He was cited for unsafe speed by Garza County Sheriff's deputies.

Deputies, assisted by Post Volunteer Firemen and other citizens, directed traffic at the scene from 8:33 p.m. until 5 a.m. Thursday.

Southbound traffic was detoured at Avenue M to 14th Street and then back to Broadway.

An inspector from the U.S. Department of Agriculture had to be called to the scene from Lubbock before two large wreckers could begin the process of moving the truck and trailer. Shortly after the accident, a northbound tractor-trailer owned by the same trucking firm arrived on the scene, and the cargo was transferred to that truck before the wrecked trailer was moved.

No other vehicles were involved in the accident.

Tuesday, March 19 Garza County deputies arrested and charged a woman with driving while intoxicated and her male companion for public intoxication. The woman was sentenced in county court to 90 days, probated for two years and fined \$500 plus court costs. The man was released after paying \$218 in fines to the municipal court.

Wednesday, March 20 deputies arrested another woman who was charged with driving while intoxicated, she was released after being sentenced to 90 days, probated for two years and fined \$400 plus court costs.

Deputies arrested a man last Friday on a felony warrant from Comanche County. The man was released after posting a \$5,000 bond.

A woman arrested for disorderly conduct last Saturday was released after posting a \$400 bond in municipal court.

You see, the whole program works because we are the "doers", we are the ones who make it work, with the support of our mayor, city council, county judge and county commissioners and other governmental officials.

Naturally, no one program will save a town from decline, but this program, along with the increased interest in our theatre and the development of arts by the Post Art Guild and the Caprock Cultural Association, Post is being recognized all across the southwest as "where the action is," including last Friday's annual Taba'na Yuan'e ceremony, which thanks to the Post Chamber of Commerce, always brings people to Post and gets us great publicity on television and even front page coverage in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal.

In fact, if you look at a calendar of what's happening, you'll find that just about every weekend something is going on here for people.

Maybe that's part of the reason the dramatic economic declines in the early 1980s did not shut us down.

True, according to the U.S. Census bureau, we lost 193 people from the 1980 census, but even that is a major positive compared to other small towns in our area.

The South Plains Association of Government census report shows only Lubbock, Hockley and Yoakum counties with an increase.

Prescription Drug Studies: Four Phases

There are four steps or phases of testing that all prescription drugs must undergo before they are approved by the United States Food and Drug Administration (FDA) for general use by physicians and other prescribers. Before phase one the drug must be tested in animals. This process determines whether or not the drug is safe and effective in test animals. It may take as much as two to three years to determine drug safety in nonhuman subjects.

Phase one is the first testing of the drug in humans. During this phase, researchers look at how the drug is absorbed, stored, distributed, and eliminated. Side effects are checked for in this phase. Phase two tests for the effectiveness and the safety of the drug in humans. Phases one and two are conducted on groups of up to 300 individuals and may take up to three or four years to complete.

During phase three, the drug is evaluated in as many as 3,000 subjects. This is the last phase required by the FDA. If the drug is approved, it may be promoted and prescribed. Phase four studies occur after the FDA has approved the drug for routine use. According to a recent study at Tufts University, it takes, on average, 12 years and \$231 million to conduct the first three phases of study leading to approval by the FDA.

This ANN That

This week-end many of us will be celebrating Easter with egg hunts. These are great fun for both children and adults. Often at holiday time we get stomach upsets from what we think is overeating or a "bug."

Current research indicates that what we think is a virus caused stomach upset is frequently an illness caused by foodborne bacteria. Eggs are a prime source of these bacteria. Following are some suggestions for selection, preparation, and storage of eggs which will insure safe Easter eggs for your holiday hunt.

When purchasing eggs, check to be sure that eggs are clean and not cracked. Cracks give microorganisms a chance to enter and contaminate the egg. If a cracked egg is accidentally purchased, do not eat it.

Refrigerate purchased eggs as soon as possible. Store them in the cartons in which they were purchased, on a shelf in the refrigerator. The egg slots on a refrigerator door are not the best place to store eggs because the temperature fluctuates in this area as the door opens and closes. Eggs need to be stored at constant refrigerator temperature to maintain safety.

For hard cooked eggs, place them in water in a pan and cover. Bring to a boil. Do not stack eggs. This will prevent uneven cooking. When water comes to a boil, take the pan off the heat and let sit for 20 minutes. Pour off hot water and cool the eggs under cold running water.

Hard cooked eggs are still perishable, so store the cooked eggs in the refrigerator until time to decorate. When you decorate them, do it quickly and cleanly; then place eggs back in the refrigerator until time for the egg hunt. If you plan to eat the eggs, don't leave them unrefrigerated.

If you plan to eat the Easter eggs, plan the hunt so that eggs are hidden, hunted, and gathered in a short period of time. Either follow the two-hour rule or don't eat

them. The two-hour rule says that any perishable foods should not be left at room temperatures for more than two hours. Room temperatures promote the growth of bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. Be wary of consuming any eggs that may have become cracked in the hunt.

Any hard-cooked eggs not used in the hunt can be held in the refrigerator for up to a week.

It is wise to take precautions with any perishable foods including protein foods such as meats, poultry, fish, dairy foods, as well as eggs. Cleanliness is very important in handling these foods in

order to prevent contamination by bacteria that can cause food-borne illness. This is especially important for those people who are highly susceptible, including the very young, the very old, pregnant women, and those with chronic diseases and weekend immune systems.

Raw or under-cooked eggs should not be eaten. Exercise special caution with soft-cooked, scrambled, soft-fried and poached eggs. Do not taste any cookie or cake dough that contains raw eggs and always refrigerate leftover egg dishes.
