## 'Freedom Parade' kicks off Emancipation Day activities Saturday

Celebration of Emancipation Day will begin here Saturday with a "Freedom Day" parade at 10:30 a.m. on Main Street, when Garza County men and women serving in the U.S. Armed Services will be honored.

Sponsored by the Caprock Cultural Association, the day-long event and parade is designed to recognize military service people and show appreciation for their sacrifices for the nation.

A ceremony following the parade at the courthouse will feature presentations of appreciation by Mayor Jim Jackson to the service people or their family members. The ceremony will feature patriotic songs.

Organizations or individuals interested in participating in the parade are urged to call JoAnn Mock at 495-4148. "We invite decorated automobiles, trucks, bicycles, wagons or horses," she says. "Please meet on the west side of the courthouse at 10 a.m. and everyone be sure to display your flags and yellow ribbons."

The Emancipation Day celebration at the park will include the crowning of the 1991 queen, presented by 1990's queen, Faye Harper. Activities at the park include music, food and family fun.

The popular "Spiritual Soul Seekers" will begin their rousing Gospel music performance at 6 p.m.

The Lubbock singing group recently performed at the Arizona State Prison in Tucson. They were the first group to appear in the prison following the recent prison riot.

Because of the turmoil surrounding the riot, the Soul Seekers were met with a group of apprehensive guards.

"We were completely searched every 100 yards along the three miles between the gate and the auditorium," Joe Roy Roberts explained.

"The riot had been caused by an outburst of emotion fueled by racial strife," Roberts added.

He told the assembled prisoners at the beginning of the performance, "God

## Commissioners study future action on Post Reservoir following water quality findings

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby informed commissioners at the regular meeting Monday morning that recent independent testing of water quality from the Brazos River near his ranch house shows no signs of pollutants and that the water is perfectly safe.

Dalby had taken samples from the river for testing following a meeting in early May with members of the White River Municipal Water District. At that meeting officials at WRMWD told Dalby, commissioners and city council members from Post that the river had major polluting problems with dangerous levels of pollutants.

As a result of the recent testing, Garza County commissioners are arranging a meeting with the law firm of Lloyd, Gosselink, Blevins and Mathews PC to discuss construction of the Post Reservoir. No date has been set for the meeting. Dalby also said he has requested copies of a water quality study from WRMWD.

WRMWD has held a permit to construct a dam for the Post Reservoir since 1970. The lake would be located approximately three miles east of Post just north of U.S. Hwy 380 on the North Fork.

In other action commissioners appointed Irene Ammons, Larry Mills, Wayne Carpenter, Brent Mason, Ruben Lopez, Alice Cruse, Joe Sanchez and John Boren to serve on a citizens advisory committee for the redistricting plan. The group will meet June 13 at 7 p.m. in the courtroom at the courthouse.

Commissioners approved vehicle personal liability insurance continuation through Texas Association of Counties and accepted Tri-State Communications for long distance service.

Ambulance secretarial service will continue with Justice of the Peace Precinct 2 and 4 Dee C. Justice, with the item placed on the August agenda for review.

A decision about air conditioning of the probation office was tabled until the June 24 meeting.

On a split vote, commissioners approved the purchase of a used computer and printer for the county extension office at a cost of \$1,200. Voting for the motion were commissioners Sammy Ellis and Albert Stone, voting against were commissioners Herb Walls and John Valdez with Judge Dalby voting for to break the tie.

The court approved a resolution setting safety policies and appointed one employee from each precinct and two from the courthouse to serve on a safety policy committee.

Janitorial and grounds keeping contracts were delayed until budget hearing meetings later in the summer.

No action was taken on a discussion concerning accepting proposals for auditing services for the county.

No action was taken on a motion to purchase a computer for the judge's office, failing for lack of a second.

The court took under advisement but no action on a request from Precinct 2 constable Mike Harper for assistance with a vehicle and paying of two bills.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers and approximately 155,000 business customers.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION

AUGUST 10, 1991

#### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

#### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."

In addition, the company proposes to obsolete the optional Custom Calling Service feature Speed Calling 30 for residence customers except for existing customers at their existing locations. Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. **Best return on your money is paying off credit card debt**  
The Tax Reform Act of 1986 changed the rules on consumer interest deductibility, but it's unclear whether consumers have altered their credit habits accordingly.

In 1990, just 10 percent of the interest paid on consumer loans was deductible and in 1991, none of the finance charges will be deductible. That means with the national average interest rate of 18.66 percent on credit cards, every \$100 of debt costs \$18.66 a year in interest.

Investors would have to have spectacular returns on their investments in order to match the return on repaying debt. A person in the 28 percent tax bracket would have to earn \$25.92 before taxes from a \$100 investment in order to match it. Those in the 33 percent tax bracket would have to earn \$27.85 per \$100 before taxes to pay the interest on \$100 of credit-card debt.

Paying off credit-card debt and other consumer loans makes mathematical sense, so much so that some financial advisers are urging people to pay cash or forego purchasing items.

When interest paid on credit cards was a deductible expense, some consumer debt could possibly be justified. That is no longer true.

The best use of money today is to pay off credit card balances and then use credit cards only for purchases which can be paid for at the next billing period.

That message and the singing that followed created a reaction among both prisoners and guards that eased the situation and the Soul Seekers left in an atmosphere of love and appreciation, according to Roberts, the leader and organizer of the popular singing group.

As a result of this emotional experience, the singing group set out to produce a cassette tape entitled, "Time To Get It Right." The tape will be available at the CCA office in the Algeria Arts Center and at the Emancipation Day celebration.

Beginning the 1940s, Roberts has devoted his adult life to spreading the message of freedom to audiences in Las Vegas, New Mexico and West Texas.

## Living on the Edge of the Cap

**Drowning is major killer of children on Texas farms**

Drowning has been the No. 1 killer of children on Texas farms and ranches for the past five years. Twenty-three deaths, or 30 percent of all child fatalities on farms during this period, were from drowning.

Accidents involving tractors were the second leading cause, with 19 deaths or 24 percent of the five-year total. Nine deaths, or just over 11 percent, involved animal-related accidents, the third major cause.

Nationally, an average of 300 farm children under age 16 die every year from accidents, and at least 5,000 other children are injured while operating or playing near farm equipment or water.

The Wisconsin Center for Health Statistics reported that 100 fatalities occur per 100,000 farm children aged four and under, while only 13 occur per 100,000 urban children. All of these fatality statistics do not count farm children killed in traffic accidents, unless the site of the accident was on a farm.

Farms, with their stock ponds, inviting streams and farm equipment, are inherently dangerous.

Modern farm lifestyles make accidents more likely. As more wives work off the farm, husbands often have a dual job of farming and child care, a deadly combination since farm work schedules are very demanding. So, a father may take the children on his tractor to give them personal care, a fact noted in many tractor accidents.

Drowning often is a silent killer. Within seconds, a toddler may drown in a few inches of water. The parent may not hear a cry for help or even a splash. Death comes so quickly. Closer adult supervision and early teaching of water safety could prevent many drowning deaths.

Four of the 1990 deaths occurred when toddlers fell or stepped into deep water. Often, young children play near the water's edge and lose their balance. Others wade in what they think is shallow water, only to fall into swift currents or drop into deep holes. Usually, no skilled swimmer is near to help.

Too often, a parent underestimates a child's curiosity and overestimates his or her judgement. A child may acknowledge a warning of caution, but this does not mean that the risk or hazard is understood. The child's short attention span plus the association of water as a play area generally make most warnings ineffective.

To prevent drowning, all ponds and tanks should be fenced and posted to keep young swimmers

out. In addition, parents should:  
\* Never allow children to play near water without constant supervision. Within seconds, a child can run to the water's edge and be in trouble.

\* Teach children as early as possible how to swim or at least stay afloat until rescued. But even if a child has had swimming lessons, don't consider the youngster to be "water safe."

\* Caretakers should learn how to perform CPR (cardio-pulmonary resuscitation) on infants and young children. Contact the local chapter of the American Red Cross or American Heart Association for class schedules and registration details.

\* Know and post by the telephone all numbers to call for emergency medical service.
