action on Post Reservoir following water quality findings

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby informed commissioners at the regular meeting Monday morning that recent independent testing of water quality from the Brazos River near his ranch house shows no signs of pollutants and that the water is perfectly safe.

Dalby had taken samples from the river for testing following a meeting in early May with members of the White River Municipal Water District. At that meeting officials at WRMWD told Dalby, commissioners and city council members from Post that the river had major polluting problems with dangerous levels of pollutants.

As a result of the recent testing, Garza County commissioners are arranging a meeting with the law firm of Lloyd, Gosselink, Blevins and Mathews PC to discuss construction of the Post Reservoir. No date has been set for the meeting. Dalby also said he has requested copies of a water quality study from WRMWD.

WRMWD has held a permit to construct a dam for the Post Reservoir since 1970. The lake would be located approximately three miles east of Post just north of U.S. Hwy 380 on the North Fork

In other action commissioners appointed Irene Ammons, Larry Mills, Wayne Carpenter, Brent Mason, Ruben Lopez, Alice Cruse, Joe Sanchez and John Boren to serve on a citizens advisory committee for the redistricting plan. The group will meet June 13 at 7 p.m. in the courtroom at the courthouse.

PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION AUGUST 10, 1991

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 42 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the newly created county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation a percentage of the market value of the residence homestead of a married or unmarried adult. The percentage exempted could not exceed 20% of such market value, and the amount exempted could not be less than \$5,000. The amendment would also authorize county education districts to hold elections to exempt from ad valorem taxation not less than \$3,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of a disabled person or a person sixty-five years of age or older. Finally, the amendment would authorize elections in county education districts for the taxation of certain tangible personal property exempted from ad valorem taxation by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from the district's ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interest.



The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students."





Best return on your money is paying off credit card debt

The Tax Reform Act of 1986 changed the rules on consumer interest deductibility, but it's unclear whether consumers have altered their credit habits accordingly.

In 1990, just 10 percent of the interest paid on consumer loans was deductible and in 1991, none of the finance charges will be deductible. That means with the national average interest rate of 18.66 percent on credit cards, every \$100 of debt costs \$18.66 a year in interest.

Investors would have to have spectacular returns on their investments in order to match the return on repaying debt. A person in the 28 percent tax bracket would have to earn \$25.92 before taxes from a \$100 investment in order to match it. Those in the 33 percent tax bracket would have to earn \$27.85 per \$100 before taxes to pay the interest on \$100 of credit-card debt.

Paying off credit-card debt and other consumer loans makes mathematical sense, so much so that some financial advisers are urging people to pay cash or forego purchasing items.

When interest paid on credit cards was a deductible expense, some consumer debt could possibly be justified. That is no longer true.

The best use of money today is to pay off credit card balances and then use credit cards only for purchases which can be paid for at the next billing period.

drowning. Accidents involving tractors were the second leading cause, with 19 deaths or 24 percent of the five-year total. Nine deaths, or just over 11 percent, involved animalrelated accidents, the third major cause.

Nationally, an average of 300 farm children under age 16 die every year from accidents, and at least 5,000 other children are injured while operating or playing near farm equipment or water.

The Wisconsin Center for Health Statistics reported that 100 fatalities occur per 100,000 farm children aged four and under, while only 13 occur per 100,000 urban children. All of these fatality statistics do not count farm children killed in traffic accidents, unless the site of the accident was on a farm.

Farms, with their stock ponds, inviting streams and farm equipment, are inherently dangerous.

Modern farm lifestyles make accidents more likely. As more wives work off the farm, husbands often have a dual job of farming and child care, a deadly combination since farm work schedules are very demanding. So, a father may take the children on his tractor to give them personal care, a fact noted in many tractor accidents.

Drowning often is a silent killer. Within seconds, a toddler may drown in a few inches of water. The parent may not hear a cry for help or even a splash. Death comes s pervisio water s drownin



made us all, we all have the same kind of blood, muscle and brains, although we may have different colors of skin, we have the same emotions, feelings, fears, hopes and frustrations. "Why should we fight? We need to love and understand each other, no matter the skin color."

That message and the singing that followed created a reaction among both prisoners and guards that eased the situation and the Soul Seekers left in an atmosphere of love and appreciation, according to Roberts, the leader and organizer of the popular singing group.

As a result of this emotional experience, the singing group set out to produce a cassette tape entitled, "Time To Get It Right." The tape will be available at the CCA office in the Algerita Arts Center and at the Emancipation Day celebration.

Beginning the 1940s, Roberts has devoted his adult life to spreading the message of freedom to audiences in Las Vegas, New Mexico and West Texas.

Other Emancipation Day activities include the "Afro-American of Texas Exhibit," a product of the University of Texas Cultural Institute, which will be displayed at Manna Square compliments of Vivian Cooke, executive director of Lubbock's Black Cultural and Heritage Center.



Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones. If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones. 
