## Commissioners begin work on budget, attempt to hold line on taxes

Landfill question creates uncertainty on expenses

The Garza County Commissioners' Court began its budget preparation work
at the regular meeting Monday morning walking through estimated expenses at the regular meeting Monday morning, walking through estimated expenses
and revenues in an attempt to get a "ball park, rough idea of how next year's budget will look," "Judge GilesDalby said.
Preliminary estimates peg revenues and expenses fairly close, with no
provision for salary increases, at $\$ 1.4$ million. "We can't really move much further until we get the final word on the tax rate esumates and get some 1 deas ot where we stand. Among te expense items to be considered is the county's plan to provide
sanitation landfill services, based on the predicted closing of the City of Post
landfill in landfill in the next few months. The county has been assisting in financial
support of the city landfill for the convenience of county residents. support of the city landfill for the convenience of county residents.
Dalby suggested that the county could contract with a disposal service that would place large trailer size county could contract with a disposal service that
Commissioners were unable to determine how much to set asities in the cut agreenty. share the cost among the precincts.
The current tax rate of 17.5 would yield an additional $\$ 42,000$ in revenue according to preliminary figures provided by tax assessor Laura (Chita)
Hataway. She elso prepared a revenue estimate on the basis of 18.4 tax rate, which would provide approximately $\$ 62,255$ more than last year
The court made no decisions on the budget. The courr made nodecisions on he budge Commissioners voted not to implement an optional $\$ 5$ charge for vehicle
registration, which was allowed by the last legislature. The money would be used to pay for road guards at school crossings. Currently the services are
provided by the school districts. Election judges for the August 10 constitutional election were named by the
