Commissioners approve budget, set tax rate hearing by Wes Burnett
The Garza County Commissioners' Court approved a budget and set a tax
rate hearing for September 24 during the regular meeting Monday morning. The proposed tax rate is $\$ .20$ and isestimater to yield a total of $\$ 2,186,442.7$ inrevenues, withexpenditures of $\$ 1,888,245.03$.
