## Fiestas Patrias celebrates Mexican independence from Spain in 1810

Saturday at 10 a.m. a parade from the courthouse on West Main through downtown Post on East Main will open up a full day of activities here in observance of Mexico's September 16, 1810 independence victory from Spain.

Sponsors and organizers of the local celebration are members of Los Mexicanos Unidos, which was founded in 1970 by Mike Cisneros, Martin Garza, A.G. Guajardo and Mencha Gonzales. Irene Ammons currently serves as president of the board of directors, with Janie Gomez as secretary. Other board members are Sandra Cisneros, Ricky Pequeño, Armando Duran, Hope Garza, Josefina Serrano and Emilie Cervantes.

The organization's primary goals through the past 10 years have been to provide funds for academic scholarships, assisting elder citizens and with funerals.

This year's celebration includes the selection of a queen, who will serve in a wide variety of duties during the next year. Candidates for Fiesta Patrias Queen are Amanda Alaniz, Janie Chapa and Irma Garza. "This is not a beauty contest," Ammons emphasizes, "the queen will be expected to represent our organization throughout the year in public meetings as well as assisting in fund raising efforts to help our elders and youth."

Each of the contestants has been busy during the past few weeks raising money for their campaigns, the queen will be chosen on the total amount of money each is able to raise for the organization.

The queen will be crowned Saturday at 6 p.m. in front of the Holy Cross Catholic Church.

## Commissioners approve budget, set tax rate hearing

The Garza County Commissioners' Court approved a budget and set a tax rate hearing for September 24 during the regular meeting Monday morning.

The proposed tax rate is \$.20 and is estimated to yield a total of \$2,186,442.75 in revenues, with expenditures of \$1,888,245.03.

Small pay raises based on length of service were also approved for all employees and elected officials. Commissioner John Valdez opposed the tax rate increase.

A major new expense item in the budget is a \$74,000 allocation for potential landfill requirements. Judge Giles Dalby explained to commissioners that with the closing of the Post landfill, the county will be required to provide garbage service of some kind to county residents, which could include setting up portable containers.

The budget also was amended to take into account newly established regulations from the state concerning the allocation of costs for housing Texas and federal prisoners. The county is expecting to be reimbursed for those expenses following legislative action last month.

Justice of the Peace Dee C. Justice reported that state mandated increases in court costs will have a big impact on operations, especially with the additional workload placed on records maintenance. Justice told commissioners that there are 14 different areas for court costs with 11 different costs in each area, ranging from \$8 to \$110. Court costs for a speeding ticket are now averaging from \$50 to \$55 per case, with \$28 of that being transferred to Austin.

Commissioners set October 26 for the date of a surplus equipment sale.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Valdez, Albert Stone, Sammy Ellis and Herb Walls, Judge Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett, treasurer Ruth Ann Young, tax assessor Chita Hataway and Justice.

Polly has had a life long interest in art and her choice of media is as varied as her technique and subject matter. Her work is represented in numerous private collections and galleries throughout the Southwest.

An Artisan Walk will be held Friday and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., featuring displays and art for sale in downtown shops. The Artisan Walk is sponsored by the Designers All Artists Co-Op.

Another popular event from last year will also be staged Friday and Saturday at the Caprock Cultural Association presents "A Rendezvous of the Arts" at the Post Community Center. Doors will open 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Distinguished artists and artisans of the Southwest convene to present an art experience through a variety of subjects, styles and media. Among the art will be West and American Cowboy in bronze, oils, watercolors, custom made saddles, boots, bits and spurs, collectors' knives, jewelry pottery, wood carvings, tapestries and Southwest folk art furniture.

Tex West and Friends will also be featured this year with cowboy poetry, song, music and storytelling, including Alvin G. Davis, cowboy poet and executive vice president and general manager of the Ranching Heritage Association in Lubbock. The special entertainment will be at the Garza Theatre for four shows Saturday, October 12 at 10:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m.

An autograph party with the cowboy poets, musicians and storytellers will be held Saturday from 10:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at 127 E. Main.

For sheer entertainment, food and night of dancing, the famous "Black Tie

Lubbock radio station KTLK will be broadcasting live from Post from 10 a.m. to noon Saturday in support of the local event.

Saturday's events will also include an afternoon Jamaica, packed with food and fun in and around the Holy Cross Catholic Church downtown.

A dance at the Paloma Saturday evening will feature music by Los Palmados from San Carlos, Republic of Mexico.

"The most important thing we don't want to forget," Ammons adds, "is to thank all the good people and the merchants who have helped, we could not have made it without the help of everyone in the community."

"We are proud of Post and Garza County and we thank you from the bottom of our hearts," Ammons said.

## Council approves budget, drug abuse policy

A three to two vote by the Post City Council Monday night capped a brief public hearing and discussion on the 1991-92 budget, which includes a four percent cost of living increase for all employees.

Voting for the budget were council members Larry Waldrip, Jim Schooler and Larry Mills, with Irene Fry and Dan Lamb opposed.

The budget includes total general fund revenues of \$1,115,910 with total expenditures of \$1,069,808.

The tax rate was set at \$.3335, which was accepted unanimously by the council.

Following the budget hearing, the council began its regular meeting, approving the use of office space at city hall for the Post Chamber of Commerce. Charles Hardin and Linda Waldrip presented the proposal to the council, requesting space for the Chamber of Commerce secretary and consideration of consolidating Main Street Project activities in the office.

The new budget includes \$7,500 from the bingo tax and motel occupancy tax, which is authorized by state law to be used for tourism promotion, designated for the Chamber of Commerce.

City manager Bob Turner informed the council that Trinity Insurance Company, which has announced its intention not to renew the city's liability policy, has extended the policy for 60 days at no charge to the city. Post Insurance is searching for another insurance carrier for the replacement policy.

The council voted three to two to approve a payment to Wilson Survey Co. for a city survey conducted last May at the request of the city to determine if Mayor Jim Jackson's residence was inside the city limits. Schooler and Lamb opposed the payment with Fry, Waldrip and Mills approving the expenditure.

A request by William Dennis, an employee of Granite Construction, to install a 150 gallon propane tank for his comfort trailer was postponed until city attorney Harvey Morton could research Texas Railroad Commission regulations on the matter. Dennis' trailer is located behind Wallace Lumber Co.

Morton briefed the council on plans for redistricting to establish three voting wards in time for next May's municipal elections. Using the 1990 census data, the plan creates one ward with 75 percent minority voters and two other wards with fairly equal populations.

One ward is bounded by North Avenue M to West 11th Street, to North Broadway south to the city limits, taking in most of the east part of the city.

The other two wards are split by Main Street east and west, with Broadway and West 10th street dividing the north and south wards.

The council approved the issuance of a title policy to Earl Chapman in regards to the purchase of the land on top of the caprock recently sold by sealed

## Council approves budget, drug abuse policy

The sale is based on a per acre amount. A survey of the land disclosed that portions of the property inside the city owned fence were not on the deed. An abstract for the title policy will determine the exact boundary lines and the total acreage.

The council approved the first reading of a drug abuse policy, which places responsibility for implementation on the city manager and city supervisors.

A financing plan with the First National Bank of Post was approved for the purchase of a new fire truck, with interest set at one percent less than the national prime, renewable in 13 months. The total amount of the loan is \$100,000.

Mayor Jackson informed the council that he had scheduled an October 8 joint meeting with Garza County commissioners to discuss jointly funded projects, and specifically the situation at the landfill.

"It looks like we will have about 18 months before we have to close it," Jackson said, "which means we have about six or seven months to make the announcement and decide what we're going to do."

Another 18 inches of dirt will have to be placed on top of the landfill as required by the Texas Health Department.

Morton informed the council that the condemnation case on the Hulen Hoyle property is on the district court docket for September 30, the third on the list.

Attending the meeting were council members Fry, Waldrip, Lamb, Schooler and Mills, Mayor Jackson, city manager Turner, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Morton.

## Letters to the editor...

Dear Editor:

The Caprock Cultural Association, (CCA), is an organization of people who are concerned with many facets of our community. Our concern, at the time of our beginning, was primarily the belief that we who live in Post need to make it an attractive and desirable place to live and, by doing so, attract other people to come here.

Knowledgeable people told us several years ago that no industry would bring it's employees into a town that had nothing to offer. Therefore the CCA set to work toward the aforementioned goal.

This was at a time when the Postex plant was closing and people were moving out. While the PEDC strove to bring in some kind of industry, the CCA began by promoting the arts; theater, visual arts, etc. This has been quite successful.

The CCA seeks funding from many sources for the Theater and the Art Center. Being concerned at that time that the arts might be eliminated from the school programs by state mandate, the CCA brought several worthy projects there, ("The Nutcracker", "The Chicago Chamber Brass", "Sam Houston Standing In His Blood"), for example. With the aid of the Post and Southland Schools, CCA brought an artist to work with both schools for one month.

As is everyone, CCA is concerned about the discouraging number of school children who do not learn because they do not seem able to relate to the subject matter. It is felt that use of the arts in math, spelling, reading, science, history, etc., will bring life to these subjects and will create interest and excitement in the classroom. Working with the Texas Arts Council, a non profit organization, we were able to send several Post and Southland teachers to summer workshops to learn how to teach the basic subjects with the use of the various arts. (And there are many).

"Think and Learn" is a pilot program put together by the Texas Arts Council, using these methods. It will be used in 18 regions around the state. Post, Lubbock, and Levelland are in one region. It is a high priority with the CCA. There is much to learn and it can be an exciting and wonderful experience for the student.

CCA membership is open to all groups, regardless of race, creed, color, or political persuasion. CCA endorses no political candidate, or party. We operate with a board of directors that meets monthly. Members serve on a rotating basis. Our work is responsible and we keep accurate accounting of all money that comes into our hands. Join us.

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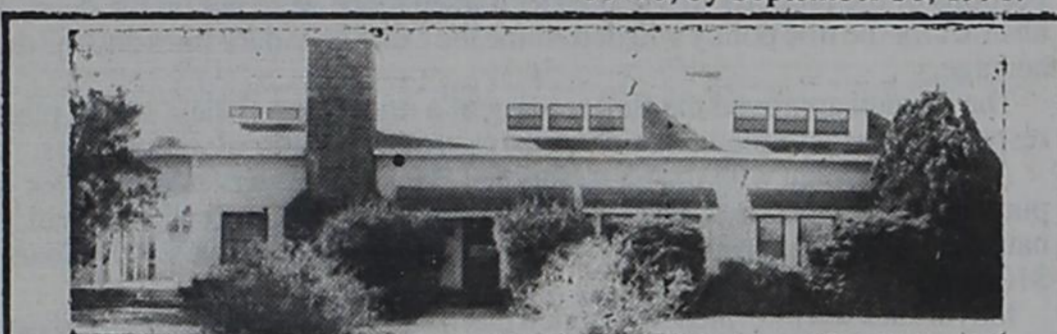

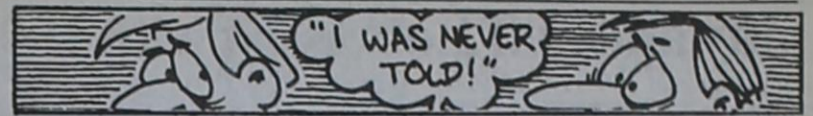
Marie's works of art is a part of numerous private and corporate collections and is represented in galleries in New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Donated livestock is collected at designated points in various communities and transported to scheduled auction events where proceeds are converted into "treatment dollars" for WTRC.

"As a donor-supported institution, the Rehab Center is dependent on such events to help provide funding for facilities and personnel to serve handicapped children and adults," said WTRC President Bill Snowden. "Also, the Round-Up is a symbolic, independent effort initiated by livestock producers who consistently have shown their support despite problems of their own."

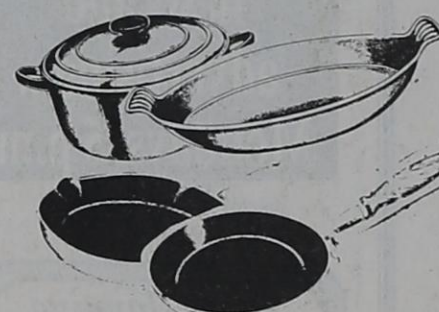

## NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (S.B. 1) the tax rate for last year provides for \$5,186 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (S.B. 351) that same rate now provides \$4,596 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.7543 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Post School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of .4150 that will provide \$5,621.40 per student in state and local revenues.

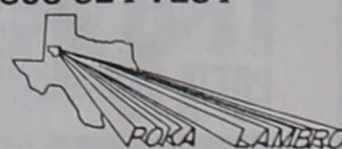
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# Stone family holds reunion August 1

## PUBLIC NOTICE BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 5, 1991

### PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 114 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize home rule cities having a population of 5,000 or fewer inhabitants to amend their city charters by a majority vote of a city's qualified voters at an election held for that purpose. The amendment makes clear that home rule cities that have declined in population below the population required to initially adopt a charter may nevertheless continue to amend their charters.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing home-rule cities with a population of 5,000 or less to amend their charters by popular vote."

### PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the Texas Department of Transportation to expend money, from any source available, for the costs of the turnpikes, toll roads, or toll bridges of the Texas Turnpike Authority, provided that any monies expended from the state highway fund shall be repaid to the fund from tolls or other turnpike revenue.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment mandating the repayment to the Department of Transportation of monies expended to assist the Texas Turnpike Authority in the construction, maintenance, and operation of turnpikes, toll roads and toll bridges."

### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 26 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Land Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board, the purchase of lands, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such moneys would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment would also authorize the Veterans' Land Board to invest, as authorized by law, moneys of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on general obligation bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board for the benefit of the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund, the making of home mortgage loans, or the payment of expenses. Investment of such moneys would no longer be restricted to investments in bonds or obligations of the United States. The proposed amendment gives the legislature power to implement the amendment and to delegate such duties and authority to the Veterans' Land Board as it deems necessary.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to further implement and enhance the administration of the veterans' housing assistance and land programs and to expand the investment authority of the Veterans' Land Board."

### PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to authorize the issuance of a maximum of \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds. The proceeds of the bonds are to be used to acquire, construct, or equip new prisons and substance abuse felony punishment facilities, mental health and mental retardation

institutions, and youth corrections institutions, to repair and renovate existing facilities of those institutions and to acquire, repair, or renovate other facilities for use as state prisons or substance abuse felony punishment facilities. The \$1.1 billion is in addition to the \$900 million currently authorized by the constitution to be expended on bond issues for facilities of correctional and mental health and mental retardation institutions. The bonds would constitute a general obligation of the state. The bonds and interest on the bonds would be paid from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in a sinking fund at the end of the preceding fiscal year that is pledged to payment of the bonds or interest.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1.1 billion in general obligation bonds for acquiring, constructing, or equipping new prisons or other punishment facilities to confine criminals, mental health and mental retardation institutions, for youth corrections institutions, for major repair or renovation of existing facilities of those institutions, and for the acquisition of, major repair to, or renovation of other facilities for use as state prisons or other punishment facilities."

### PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow a county, junior college district, or municipality to exempt tangible personal property from ad valorem taxation if: (1) the property is acquired or brought into the state in an enterprise zone to be forwarded outside the state, (2) the property is assembled, stored, repaired, maintained, manufactured, processed, or fabricated in the enterprise zone, (3) the property is transported outside the state not later than 175 days after being acquired or brought into an enterprise zone, and (4) the person who acquired or brought the property into an enterprise zone is a qualified business. A county, junior college district, or municipality may exempt such property by entering into a written agreement with a qualified business that states the duration of the exemption and the terms on which the exemption is granted. Any action to exempt property must be taken before April 1 of the first year in which the property would otherwise be taxed. The term "enterprise zone" means an area that (1) has been designated as such by a state agency responsible for economic development, and (2) has pervasive poverty, unemployment, and economic distress. The term "qualified business" means a business that meets the qualification established by general law, and requires that the qualified business is actively engaged in a new business in the enterprise zone or is expanding a business that is already active in the enterprise zone. An enterprise zone is created to foster economic development in an area of pervasive poverty and unemployment.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the exemption for ad valorem taxes of certain property in an enterprise zone."

### PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would establish a Texas Ethics Commission with the powers and duties provided by law. The commission would consist of eight appointed members selected as follows: two members of different political parties appointed by the governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house of representatives from each major political party; two

members of different political parties appointed by the governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the senate from each major political party; two members of different political parties appointed by the speaker of the house of representatives from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the house from each major political party; and two members of different political parties appointed by the lieutenant governor from a list of at least ten names submitted by the members of the senate from each major political party. A major political party is a political party required by law to hold a primary. With the exception of the initial appointees, commission members would serve for four-year terms. A member who has served for one term and any part of a second term would not be eligible for reappointment. The commission would be authorized to recommend the salary of the members of the legislature and may recommend that the salary of the speaker of the house of representatives and the lieutenant governor be set at an amount higher than that of other members. If the commission recommends a change in salary, the voters would be authorized to accept or reject the salary change at the next general election for state and county officers. If the voters approve the recommended salary, that salary would take effect January 1 of the next odd-numbered year; if the voters reject the recommended salary, no change in salary would occur. The commission would set the per diem of the members of the legislature and of the lieutenant governor. The per diem could be raised or lowered biennially as necessary to pay members' costs, but could not exceed the amount allowed as of January 1 that year as a federal income tax deduction for living expenses incurred in a legislative day in connection with a member's business as a legislator, disregarding any federal income tax exception for legislators residing near the Capitol. The commission would have other powers and duties provided by the commission's enabling act (Senate Bill 1, 72nd Legislature, Regular Session). The amendment would also provide that an increase in the emoluments of the office of Lieutenant Governor would not make a legislator ineligible to serve in the office of Lieutenant Governor.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas Ethics Commission and authorizing the commission to recommend the salary for members of the legislature and the lieutenant governor, subject to voter approval, and to set the per diem for those officials, subject to a limit."

### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land for which there is not a valid transfer of title from either the State or the Republic of Texas to a private party. A patent is a document of title issued by the state. On application to the School Land Board, a person is entitled to receive a patent if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school fund land, (2) the land was not patentable under the law before the adoption of this proposed amendment, (3) the person acquired the land without knowledge of the title defect out of the State of Texas or the Republic of Texas and held the land under color of title, the chain of which dates from at least January 1, 1941, (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, has claimed the land for at least fifty years as of January 1, 1991, and (5) the person, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, for at least 50 years has paid taxes on the land together with all interest and penalties associated with any delinquency. If the applicant is denied a patent, the applicant may file suit against the School Land Board in a district court in the county where the land is located within 60 days from the date of denial. The proposed amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands, and may not be used to resolve a boundary dispute. The proposed amendment also does not apply to land found by a court to be state-owned or to land on which the state has given a mineral lease that is in effect when a patent is sought. A patent under this proposed amendment for land within five miles of mineral production shall reserve minerals to the state in the manner provided by law for reservations of minerals in sales to claimants of unsurveyed school land within five miles of production. An application for a patent under this proposed amendment must be filed with the School Land Board before January 1, 1993.

This proposed constitutional amendment is similar to the version of article VII, section 4A, that was in effect between 1981 and 1990. The main difference is that under the earlier version the applicant for a patent to land had to have a chain of title that dated back to at least as early as January 1, 1932.

### PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the board of trustees of each statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in such manner as the board considers prudent. The board would no longer be limited to investing the funds of the system in securities.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow the board of trustees of a statewide public retirement system to invest the funds of the system in a manner that the board considers prudent."

### PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to create debt by or on behalf of the state if the legislature submitted the debt question to the voters of the state in the form of a proposition and a majority of those voting approved the proposition. The legislature may call the election, by joint resolution approved by at least two-thirds of the members of each house, during any regular session or during any special session if the subject of the proposition is included in the Governor's proclamation for that special session. A proposition must clearly describe the amount and purpose for which debt is to be created and must describe the source of payment for the debt. The amount of debt stated in the proposition may

not be exceeded and may not be renewed beyond the right to exceed or renew is stated in the proposition. The legislature may enact laws necessary to implement the authority granted by a proposition. A law enacted in anticipation of the election on a proposition is valid if, by its terms, it is enacted subject to approval of the related proposition. State debt that is created following voter approval of a proposition and that is approved by the Attorney General is incontestable for any reason.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the voters of this state to consider state debt questions in the form of ballot propositions that must clearly describe the amounts, purposes, and sources of payment of the debt only after approval of the propositions by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature."

### PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 11 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land for which there is not a valid transfer of title from either the State or the Republic of Texas to a private party. A patent is a document of title issued by the state. On application to the School Land Board, a person is entitled to receive a patent if: (1) the land is surveyed public free school fund land, (2) the land was not patentable under the law before the adoption of this proposed amendment, (3) the person acquired the land without knowledge of the title defect out of the State of Texas or the Republic of Texas and held the land under color of title, the chain of which dates from at least January 1, 1941, (4) the person has a recorded deed on file in the county courthouse and, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, has claimed the land for at least fifty years as of January 1, 1991, and (5) the person, in conjunction with his predecessor in interest, for at least 50 years has paid taxes on the land together with all interest and penalties associated with any delinquency. If the applicant is denied a patent, the applicant may file suit against the School Land Board in a district court in the county where the land is located within 60 days from the date of denial. The proposed amendment does not apply to beach land, submerged land, or islands, and may not be used to resolve a boundary dispute. The proposed amendment also does not apply to land found by a court to be state-owned or to land on which the state has given a mineral lease that is in effect when a patent is sought. A patent under this proposed amendment for land within five miles of mineral production shall reserve minerals to the state in the manner provided by law for reservations of minerals in sales to claimants of unsurveyed school land within five miles of production. An application for a patent under this proposed amendment must be filed with the School Land Board before January 1, 1993.

This proposed constitutional amendment is similar to the version of article VII, section 4A, that was in effect between 1981 and 1990. The main difference is that under the earlier version the applicant for a patent to land had to have a chain of title that dated back to at least as early as January 1, 1932.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the commissioner of the General Land Office to issue patents for certain public free school fund land held in good faith under color of title for at least 50 years."

### PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws to exempt property owned by a nonprofit corporation organized to supply water or provide wastewater service from ad valorem taxation. A nonprofit corporation would be eligible for the exemption if its bylaws provide that

on dissolution, the assets remaining after the discharge of the corporation's indebtedness will be transferred to an entity providing water supply or wastewater service, or both, which is exempt from ad valorem taxation. The transferred assets must be property that is reasonably necessary for and used for water supply and wastewater services.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxes certain property of a nonprofit corporation that supplies water or provides wastewater service."

### PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass laws to authorize the State of Texas to operate lotteries and to enter into a contract with one or more legal entities that will operate lotteries on behalf of the State of Texas.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing a state lottery."

### PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 34 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the total amount of bonds that may be issued by the Texas Water Development Board to provide wholesale and retail water and wastewater facilities to economically distressed areas of the state. The proposed amendment increases the maximum principal amount of the bonds from 20 percent to 50 percent of the \$500 million amount authorized by article III, section 49-d-7, of the Texas Constitution. The proposed amendment would increase the maximum aggregate dollar amount of bonds that the Texas Water Development Board could issue from \$100 million to \$250 million.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to increase from 20 percent to 50 percent the percentage of Texas water development bonds previously authorized by Texas voters that may be issued for economically distressed areas."

### PROPOSITION NO. 13 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow the legislature to pass general laws authorizing Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board or its successor to issue and sell up to \$300 million of general obligation bonds to finance education loans to students. The maximum net effective interest rate to be borne by the bonds would be set by law. The amendment would also authorize the legislature to provide for the investment of bond proceeds and to establish an interest and sinking fund to pay the bonds and provide for the investment of such fund. Bonds authorized under this amendment would be paid from the first money coming into the treasury in each fiscal year that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution, less any amount in an interest and sinking fund established at the end of the preceding year that is pledged to the payment of the bonds or interests.

The proposed amendment will be described on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of general obligation bonds not to exceed \$300,000,000 to continue existing programs to provide educational loans to students, with repayments of student loans applied toward retirement of the bonds."

# Abernathy size, speed too much for Post Bold Gold

It was simply a case of size and speed, along with a small measure of breaks that finally put the game out of reach for the Post Antelopes last Friday in their 42-6 loss to the visiting Abernathy Antelopes in the opening game for both teams.

The Bold Gold defense did a great job of containing the state's seventh ranked Class AA powerhouse during the first half, but in the third quarter, following two bad breaks for the home team, Abernathy put the game out of reach for more inexperienced Post Antelopes.

The lone offensive highlight for Post fans came late in the game when junior quarterback Damon Curtis led the team in a 10 play, 92 yard touchdown drive, capped by Curtis going the final nine yards over right tackle.

Trailing only 13-0 at halftime, Post fans were hoping for a second half surge, which almost happened following the kickoff.

Shane Horton's kick was caught by Abernathy's Ken Dunn at the 10 yard line and after a 17 yard scamper he was hit so hard by Clint Melton that the ball popped loose and Post recovered, bringing the Bold Gold fans to their feet.

A yellow flag lay on the ground near the play, and the cheering turned to "boos" as the officials called Post on an offside penalty on the kickoff.

On the first play following the second kickoff, Abernathy's Larry Norris cut through defenders from the Post 43 to the 30, when Ty Hill slammed Norris to the

ground and the ball popped out, giving the 'Lopes what looked like a recovered fumble.

Again, the yellow flag cut short the celebration, as Post was penalized for having 12 players on the field. A substitution prior to the snap caused the miscue.

Abernathy then marched smartly down the field in five plays, behind the power and speed running of Larry Norris, for a 19-0 lead.

Post took the opening kickoff and surprised the visitors with a quick succession of running plays, using tailback Brandon Bird and wingback Michael Self. Bird went around right end on the sweep from the Post 41 to the 49, Self got the first down at the Abernathy 38, then went to the 36 and a pass to Horton went incomplete. Bird got the call on third down around left end to the 35 and on fourth down went over left guard to the 34 and Abernathy took over on downs.

A stiff defense held Abernathy on four downs, forcing a punt. The defense was anchored by Bird with support by Hiram Gutierrez, Aaron Davis and Horton.

Post got the ball back at their own 34 and three plays later turned it back to Abernathy as Bird went over left guard and had the ball stripped at the Post 39.

Six plays later Abernathy scored and led 7-0 with 4:29 on the clock.

Norris and Alex Salazar did the offensive damage for the visitors, with quarterback Cody Forbes leading the team to the end zone.

The next Post series gained three yards on three tries and the 'Lopes punted. Another stiff defensive effort stopped Abernathy with Damon Curtis and Junior Nava leading the tacklers for Post.

The quarter ended with Post in possession at their own 15. A first down run by Willy Barboza lost two yards to the 15 and two more pass attempts went incomplete, setting up a fourth down punt.

Abernathy took the ball at the Post 40 yard line and proceeded to improve their offensive stats with a six play drive to paydirt, using the talents of Dennis Haney, whose 220 pound frame was too much for the Post defenders. Norris got the call on third down from the one for the touchdown. A two point conversion was snuffed by Self and the visitors led 13-0.

Third quarter action was a disaster for the home team as the offense could not get untracked and Abernathy took advantage of their size and speed.

After the 19-0 lead, Abernathy held Post and with 7:22 on the clock began a four play drive to the end zone with Norris doing the damage, leading 25-0 with 6:22 left in the quarter.

Another three play effort by the Bold Gold set up a fourth down punt and the visitors marched 73 yards in seven plays, aided by a fourth down penalty on Post for having too many players on the field.

Norris and Haney blasted through terrific blocking, with Norris getting the final 31 yards over right tackle, breaking arm tackles on the way to the end zone.

Michael Mares' extra point put the score out of reach for Post at 32-0.

Another three plays by the home team with a fumbled snap and two incompleting passes gave the ball back to Abernathy with four seconds left in the third quarter.

Starting at their own 29, the visitors ate up the clock and the yardage on a 13 play drive featuring Haney, Larry Norris and Scott Norris, with one touchdown pass in the end zone called back due to an illegal receiver downfield. With 8:12 left in the game Haney put the another six on the scoreboard when he went the final one yard. The extra point put the visitors on top 39-0.

On the following kickoff a squib kick was covered by Self at the Post eight yard line and that's when Curtis came in to call the signals.

Self got the call over right guard to the 16 and a pass to Michael McClellan was incomplete, but Abernathy was called for a face mask penalty on the play, setting up a first down at the 36.

Self went over left tackle to the 39, Barboza blasted over right tackle to the 44 and then broke two a tackle over the right side to the Abernathy 41 for a first down.

Curtis ran the keeper around right end to the 29 for another first down and on first down Abernathy was penalized for being offside, setting up a first down at the 24.

Barboza went over right guard to the 18 for another first down and Curtis rolled to his left, turned and threw back to the middle of the field, ripping the ball on a line to Ricky Jefferson at the nine.

On first and goal Curtis rolled to this right, as if to pass, then dodged Abernathy defenders as he pounded into the end zone for the score. A two point conversion pass play to Randy Britton was incomplete as the receiver could not hold onto the ball in

the end zone. With 3:52 left in the game, Abernathy took the ball on the kickoff to the Post 31 and on fourth down Mares kicked a field goal for the final three points.

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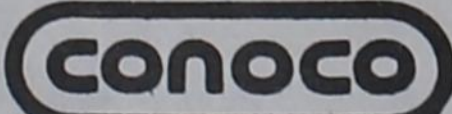
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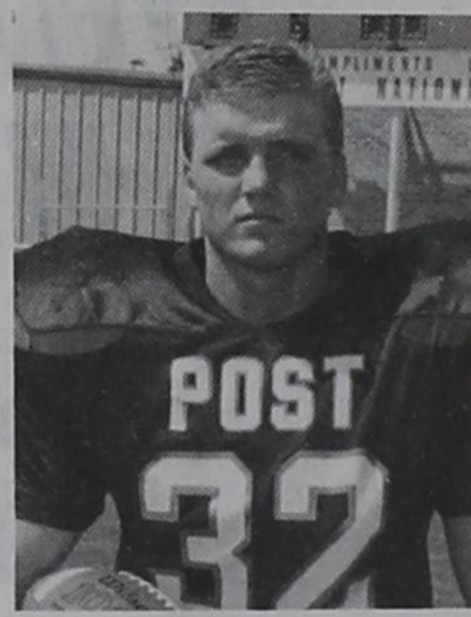

"We were surprised at the score last week," head coach Dewayne Osborne commented, "we just gave up too many big plays. We knew they had the capability, but we had hoped to be able to contain them."  
"Our players learned a lot, and we saw some good things, every player at some point in the game did some great things," the coach added.  
"We need to be more consistent, and do a better job of catching the passes and running our pass routes, and I think each week we'll get better."  
The only injury coming off the Abernathy game was Michael McClellan, who suffered from sore ribs, but is expected to be a starter at Slaton.

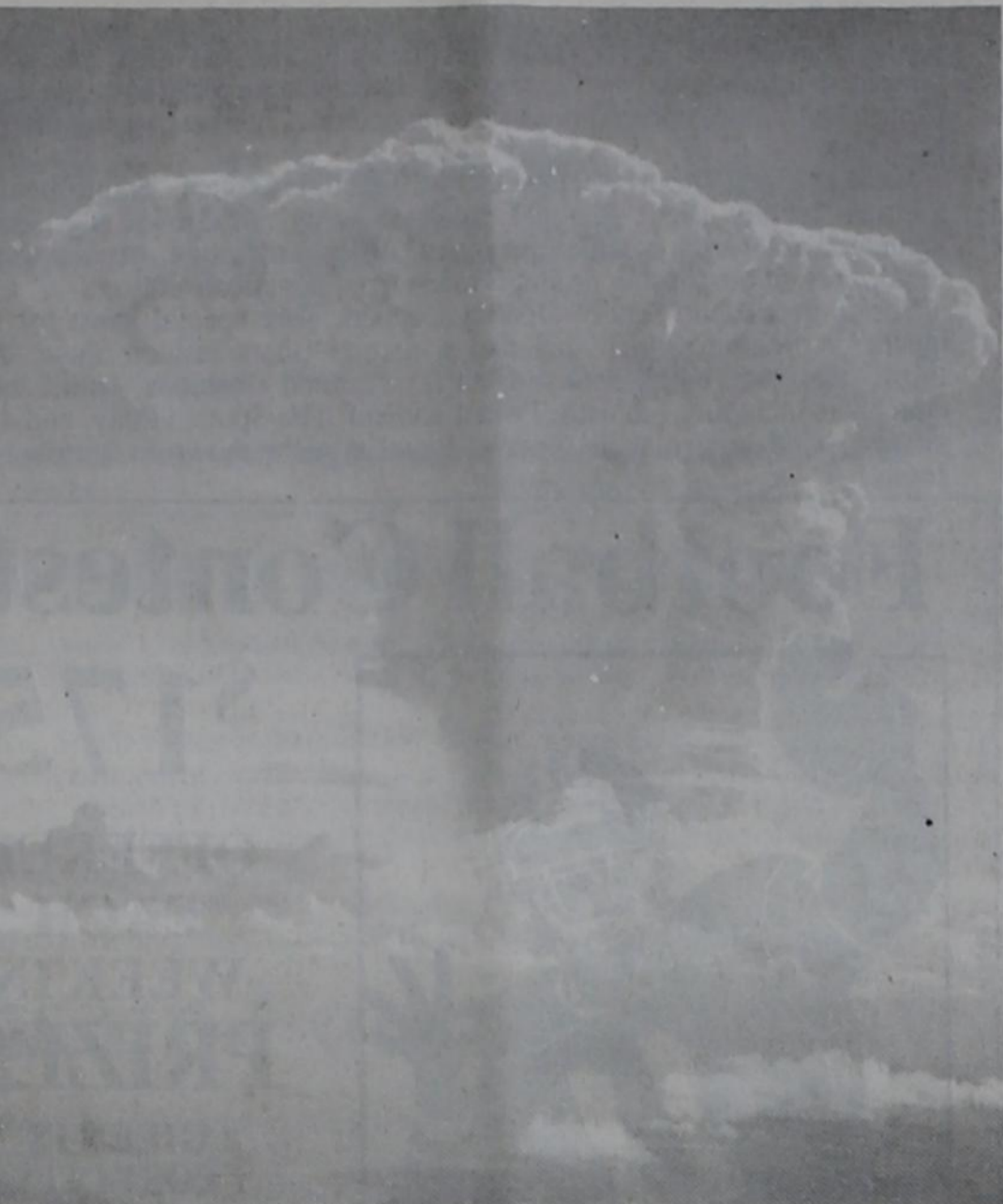

## TDH announces changes in immunization rules

The Texas Department of Health (TDH) reminds all parents and school or day care administrators that immunization rules for Texas children recently have been changed.

In efforts to stop recent resurgences of so-called childhood diseases, the Texas Board of Health, in both 1990 and 1991, modified existing immunization requirements.

TDH urges parents to ensure that their children's immunization records comply with those rules. Physicians and local health departments can supply detailed information about the requirements. Low-cost or free back-to-school immunizations are offered throughout the year in many Texas communities.

One of the newest immunization rule changes eases restrictions against persons other than a child's parents who seek vaccina-

tions for children in their care. Now, parents and legal guardians may formally delegate authority for signing immunization consent forms to other adults, such as a child's grandparent.

Other recent rule changes include a mandatory second dose of measles vaccine for all Texas school children by age 12. Also, children who are younger than five must be vaccinated against Haemophilus influenza type b (Hib disease), a common cause of meningitis in children, and pertussis (whooping cough).

Wes Hodgson, epidemiology coordinator for the TDH Immunization Division, said, "The continuing measles' outbreaks which began in 1988 underscore the tragic results of incomplete vaccinations. In recent years, some parents failed to protect their children against vaccine-preventable diseases, while some school and day care operators failed to keep adequate records so that inadequately immunized children went unnoticed. The result has been a growing number of insufficiently immunized children and young adults -- all of whom are now vulnerable to infection."

Hodgson said that state law requires all children entering Texas schools or day care to show proof of immunizations at certain ages against polio, tetanus, measles, rubella (German or three-day measles), mumps and diphtheria. Younger children must also give proof of immunity to whooping cough and Hib disease.

"The law allows for some exceptions to these requirements," Hodgson added, "but each case must be considered individually."

He stressed that since a child's age and medical history are factors in which vaccines and "boosters" the child needs, parents should consult their family physicians about the required immunizations for each child.

Hodgson said that, beginning in 1992, college students enrolled in health related courses, and medical or dental schools will be required to have certain immunizations against rubella, mumps, measles, tetanus, diphtheria and hepatitis B. Veterinary students will need current vaccinations against rabies.

### Public Notice

On June 28, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) to add a new optional service offering for business Private Branch Exchange (PBX) Trunk customers called Digital Loop Service. The application has been assigned Docket No. 10461.

Digital Loop Service provides digital transmission of circuit switched voice and data communications between the customer's premises and the central office. This service allows the customer to use a 1.544 Mbps facility capable of delivering up to 24 line terminations. Southwestern Bell will provide Digital Loop Service within the customer's serving central office where facilities are available.

If approved by the Commission, the rates for the Digital Loop Service facilities will be \$45 per month for each digital transmission loop arrangement which provides a capacity of up to 24 line terminations, plus \$3 per month for each line termination and \$9 per month for each channel termination. The proposed rate for the unlimited use of the central office varies from \$12.25 up to \$18.90 per month for each line termination depending on the rate group classification, determined by the customer's location. Southwestern Bell estimates revenue of \$2.1 million from this offering during the first year.

As proposed by Southwestern Bell, customers who currently receive digital loop compatibility through facilities installed under a special construction agreement will have the option to receive their current digital loop arrangements pursuant to the Digital Loop Service Tariff or continue to pay their current charges until they make a change of location or account. Any increase in the number of line terminations to a customer's current digital transmission loop arrangement will be provided pursuant to the proposed Digital Loop Service Tariff; however, the customer will continue to have the option of paying current charges for the existing digital transmission loop capacity. Southwestern Bell's proposal to "grandfather" existing digital loop facility arrangements is subject to review and approval by the Commission.

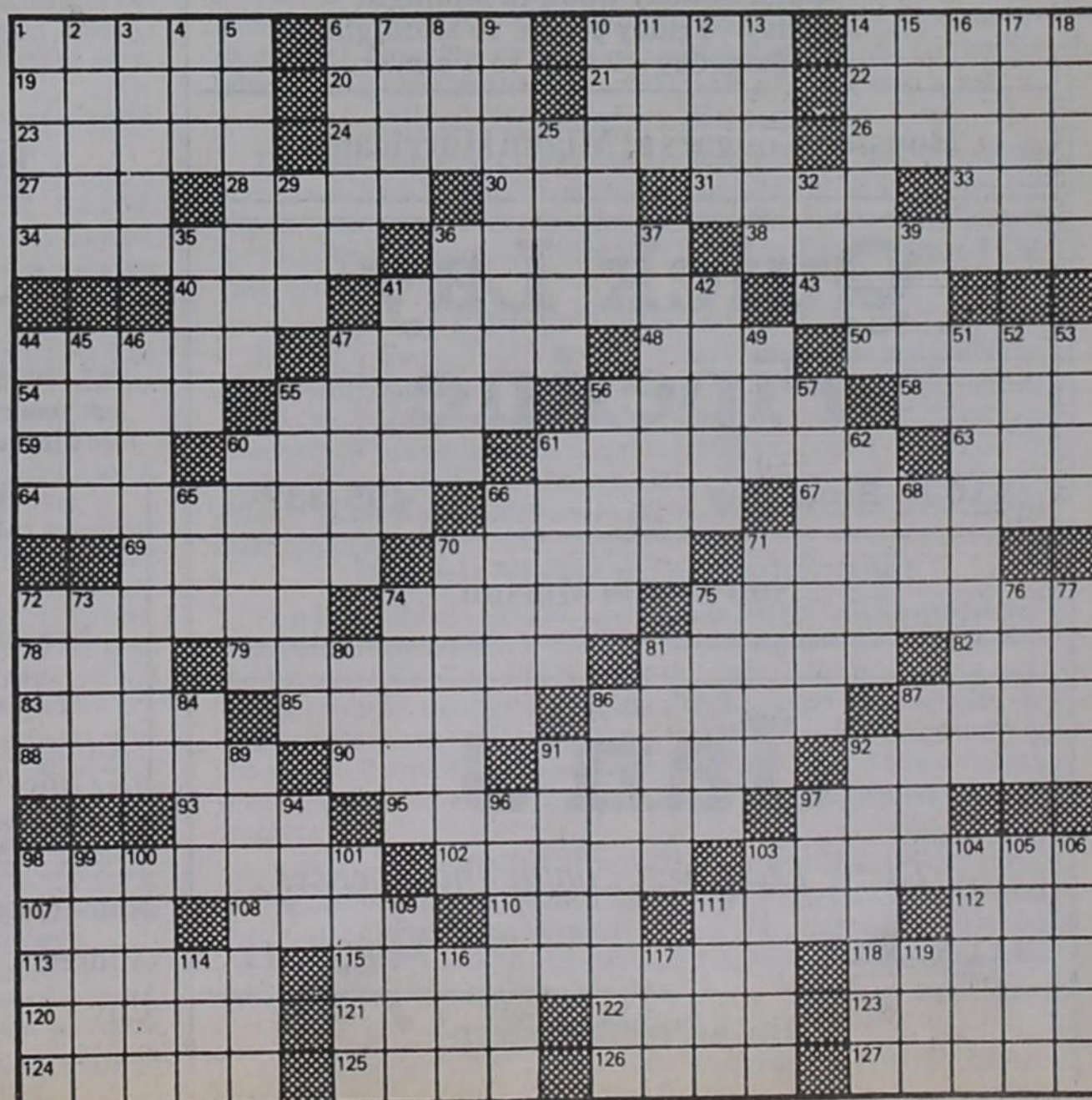
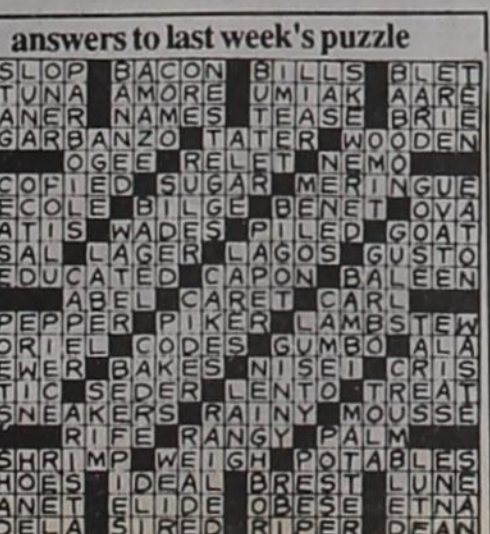
