### In Callahan County. New Fields Are Being Tested. Revival **Of Interest Manifest**

Things are picking up in Callahan County oil circles, and while there is no hectic boom, there is steady and gratifying development \$2 per barrel.

Excitement in the Putnam field is running high. C. R. Dutton has spudded in on Cathey No. 2.

Burleson Oil Co. are drilling an offset to their Isenhower No. 1.

C. R. Dutton has spudded in on his Isenhower No. 1, due east of Putpam.

L. H. McRes et al are drilling on Cathey No. 1, at 400 feet.

Leases in the Isenhower No. 1 have sold at \$15 to \$125 per acre, depending on the distance from the well. A 39-acre tract, being an offset, sold at \$300 per acre.

The Cactus Oil Co. is drilling at 2410 feet on the E. L. Finley ranch.

Ben Turgeon has a 15-barrel well on the Mrs. Lua James ranch. This brings the production about one mile nearer to Baird

The Murphy-Bolanz Co. has brought in a 10-barrel well on the Mrs. R. Williams ranch near the Hart Schoolhouse.

J. B. Moselev has leased a block of land near Admiral, on which he expects to commence a well within the next thirty days.

It is rumored that the Sanger Oil Co. of California has made a loca tion for a deep test about one mile northeast of Elmdale.

Moscow .-- Victor P. Nogin, head of the Russian textile industry, has returned to Moscow after two months' stay in the United State: where he successfully arranged cred its for the purchase of cotton, cotton seed, dyes, textile machiners and supplies.


