Post ISD gets top audit rating, studies health insurance costs

Post ISD trustees heard a good report from auditor Ken Robison of Robison, Green & Company of Lubbock at the regular meeting Tuesday, October 8.

"We find that your internal controls are done so well," Robison told trustees, "and there are very few schools who operate as yours does."

He also said that "no school system that I know of prepares a separate set of records on expenses and revenue for athletic departments as you do." Robison said that most schools do not want to know how much is being spent on athletics, but "I think you are doing the right thing by knowing exactly what each program costs."

He praised superintendent Bill Shiver's management of the school's budget. Following the extensive audit briefing, Shiver informed the board that health insurance premiums would increase by 70 percent. He then outlined ideas for reducing the increase by 30 to 40 percent.

Shiver also requested the board to consider joining the state health insurance program in 1992. Board members announced by resolution their intent to join the state system.

Shiver also presented a plan to the board to begin transferring all computer services to the ISD from a contracted service in Lubbock. He explained that the transfer would pay for itself in approximately five years.

The board reappointed Jack Lott and Royce Hart to serve on the Central Appraisal District.

Helping kids succeed in school workshop Monday

Parents of children aged first grade through high school will learn how to identify their own child's learning style and to use that knowledge to promote good study habits for the child.

Parents will also learn how to provide a home environment which enhances their child's study efforts. Mrs Hand will give tips on how to study smarter, take better notes, write better papers and take tests better.

Garza County Sheriff's deputies arrested a 19 year old female October 3, charging her with possession of a controlled substance. She was being held in county jail pending the posting of a \$25,000 bond.

A 22 year old female was arrested by Texas DPS officers October 4, charged with first offense D.W.I. She was released on a \$1,500 bond in county court.

Texas Farm Bureau to hold 58th annual meeting November 30

The heart of the South Plains will be home to Texas Farm Bureau's 58th annual meeting November 30 - December 4.

Some 1,300 delegates from 213 county Farm Bureaus will meet at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center to adopt state policies for 1992. The delegates will approve resolutions on national issues to be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration at the 73rd AFBF annual meeting in January in Kansas City.

Sister Thomas More Bertels of Silver Lake College, Manitowoc, Wisc., will be the keynote speaker the morning of December 2. Sister Bertels is an ardent supporter of agriculture and free enterprise. She is one of the founders of the American Agri-Women movement.

TFB President S.M. True will deliver his annual address to delegates also on December 2.

TFB Executive Director Vernie R. Glasson will present his annual administrative report on the morning of December 3. Secretary-Treasurer Billie Ray Huddleston of Celina will give his annual report that same morning.

The business session will begin on December 3 and conclude with the election of state directors and a president the afternoon of December 4.

Slay returned to the states from "Desert Storm" duty September 27,


after serving 10 months and four days in the war torn area.

He is stationed at Tacoma, Washington.


Mrs Steel and Mrs Bell expressed their appreciation to all who have offered prayers and the recognition received at ceremonies July 4.

NOTICE OF CHANGE IN ELECTION PRECINCTS IN GARZA COUNTY

Pursuant to authority vested in the Garza County Commissioners Court, under Section 42.001 of the Texas Election Code, the Court has made certain changes in the boundaries of Commissioners Election Precincts in order to properly perfect a new redistricting plan for the County. All changes have been kept to the necessary minimum.

The new redistricting plan and the changes in the Election Precinct Boundaries were adopted at a Special Meeting of the Commissioners Court on the 30th day of September, 1991.

Therefore, pursuant to the mandatory duty imposed upon the Commissioners Court, pursuant to the Texas Election Code, Section 42.035, notice is hereby given to the public of these necessary changes in the Election Precinct Boundaries, to-wit:

(1) In future elections, there will be nine (9) Election Precincts. Plus the early voting polling place.

(2) Commissioner Precinct 1 contains 101, 102, and 103; Commissioner Precinct 2 contains 201 and 202; Commissioner Precinct 3 contains 301 and 302; Commissioner Precinct 4 contains 401 and 402.

(3) These Election Precincts and the polling places in each precinct will be defined as follows:

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 1

POLLING PLACE 101

Polling Place 101 was previously known as Polling Place Number 1 and has been designated Polling Place Number 101 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 1, Polling Place Number 1. This polling place remains at the Presbyterian Church, Ave. S and West 10th, Post, Texas.

POLLING PLACE 102

Polling Place 102 was previously known as Polling Place Number 5 and has been designated Polling Place Number 102 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 1, Polling Place Number 2. This polling place remains at the Close City School, Close City, Texas.

POLLING PLACE 103

Polling Place 103 was previously known as Polling Place Number 2 and has been designated Polling Place Number 103 to coincide with Commissioner Precinct 1, Polling Place Number 3. This polling place remains at the Southland School, Southland, Texas.

COMMISSIONER PRECINCT 2

POLLING PLACE 201





Building capable youth

Adolescence, that period when the child is poised on the threshold of adulthood, is important not only to the child, but to society as a whole. The choices and decisions made during adolescence often have long term effects and are sometimes irreversible. To make positive choices, youth not only need knowledge, skills and abilities, but they also need an environment which will allow and encourage them to make positive decisions and choices.

Much of the recent concern about young people has focused on specific negative outcomes, such as alcohol and substance use, pregnancy or dropping out of school. Although intervention programs can be effective, they sometimes focus too narrowly on specific problems and situations while overlooking the underlying causes of the problems facing young people. All too often programs focused on intervening or dealing with the consequences, rather than concentrating on prevention.

Prevention requires a policy agenda that goes beyond solving individual problems. To treat the "cause" rather than the "symptoms," a comprehensive agenda to promote the development of healthy, capable young people is needed.

Programs which have been successful in preventing teen pregnancy, alcohol and substance use, or school dropout have several common characteristics. First, they focus on the importance of the early childhood through early adolescent years. Second, they show that the problems are interconnected or related. And finally, they concentrate on strengthening coping skills, promoting self-esteem and providing social support.


Effective programs for young people are aimed at long-term rather than short-term change. Their goal is to set children on a new course by providing opportunities, changing life circumstances and providing support. Successful programs are designed to change the life trajectory of the child.

Parents would do well to encourage their children to participate in programs which provide these opportunities for growth. The 4-H program has been recognized as one which does build capable youth, and directs many toward success in adult life.



News from the Railroad Commission

RRC assesses \$21,000 in well plugging penalties

The Railroad Commission assessed a total of \$21,000 in administrative penalties this week to six oil and gas operators for violations under Commission well plugging rules, according to RRC Chairman Lean Guerrero.

Schomberg Oil Company of San Antonio was ordered to pay \$3,000 for two inactive and unplugged wells on the Trinidad Solis lease in Bexar County; Buscar Oil Company of San Antonio was assessed \$3,000 for one well on the Robert Monroe lease in Bander County; Rainbow Ventures of Houston was penalized \$3,000 for one well on the Walker lease in Burleson County; Pace Hydrocarbon Production Co., Inc of Shreveport, La was ordered to pay \$5,000 for one well on the Lou-Tex lease in Harrison County; Herbst Resources, Inc of Mandeville, La was assessed \$4,000 for one well on the Turner lease in Harrison County; and, Burrow Land and Royalty of Abilene was penalized \$3,000 for one well on the Carl P. Williams lease in Fisher County.

To date in 1991, the Commission has levied more than \$619,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed more than \$836,000 in such penalties.

RRC issues 56 permits for horizontal wells in September

The Railroad Commission granted a total of 56 new permits for horizontal wells in September, as applications to drill the advanced technology wells declined from the previous month, according to RRC Chairman Lena Guerrero.

By comparison, the Commission issued 61 permits for horizontal wells in August, 71 in July, 67 in June, 87 in May, 76 in April, 83 in March, 92 in February, and 95 during January, 1991.

So far, operators have applied for 688 permits to drill horizontal wells in Texas during the first nine months of 1991.

In all, the Railroad Commission has issued a grand total of 1,986 permits for horizontal wells, some 1,786 of which have been granted since January 1, 1990.

While the Pearsall Field southwest of San Antonio remains the nation's premier hub for horizontal drilling, new permit activity remained sluggish in September. Fourteen permits were granted for horizontal projects in that portion of the Austin Chalk geologic formation last month, compared to 17 in August and 18 in July.

Despite the downturn, the vast majority of all horizontal projects planned or underway in Texas are located in Frio County. A total of 587 permits for horizontal wells have now been issued there, while 446 of those wells have been completed.

Meantime, Zavala County ranks second in the Pearsall Field with 164 horizontal permits issued through September 30, followed by Dimmit County with 161 and LaSalle County with 143.

In all, 1,055 of the 1,986 permits for horizontal wells issued in Texas since 1984 have been granted to operators in the Pearsall Field. Some 781 of those wells have now been completed.

Meanwhile, the Commission has issued 446 permits for horizontal wells in the Giddings (Austin Chalk) Field through September 30. Burleson County leads the horizontal race there with 268, followed by Fayette County with 121, Lee County with 48, and Washington County with nine. As of September 30, 263 horizontal wells had been completed in the Giddings Field.

A total of 80 horizontal wells were completed in Texas during September, raising the statewide total of 1,279. Over 64 percent of all horizontal wells permitted in Texas have now been completed.

Overall, operators in 69 Texas counties have now received Railroad Commission permits to drill horizontal wells. Besides the counties previously noted, 174 permits for horizontal wells have been granted to operators in Gonzales County, 61 have been issued for horizontal projects in Brazos County, while another 54 permits have been granted to operators drilling horizontal holes in Wilson County.

Horizontal drilling is a technique used to tap oil reserves that can't be recovered profitably using standard methods.

September Texas oil and gas completions up compared to 1990

Texas oil and gas operators reported 174 gas, 432 oil, and 47 service completions in September, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Lean Guerrero. In August the total was 211 gas, 472 oil, and 75 service completions. September 1990's total was 149 gas, 336 oil, and 26 service completions.

Gas completions in September included ten in the San Antonio area (District 1), 30 in the Refugio

area (District 2), 17 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 40 in deep South Texas (District 4), four in East Central Texas (District 5), 18 in East Texas (District 6), nine in West Central Texas (District 7B), 11 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 17 in North Texas (District 9), and eight in the Panhandle (District 10), according to Guerrero.

Oil completions included 62 in the San Antonio area (District 1), ten in the Refugio area (District 2), 44 in Southeast Texas (District 3), 15 in deep South Texas (District 4), nine in East Central Texas (District 5), 14 in East Texas (District 6), 48 in West Central Texas (District 7B), 36 in the San Angelo area (District 7C), 91 in the Midland area (District 8), 47 in the Lubbock area (District 8A), 46 in North Texas (District 9), and ten in the Panhandle (District 10).

In the first nine months of 1991 the Commission has recorded a total of 7,464 well completions, a 13 percent increase from the 6,849 well completions recorded during the same period of 1990.

Guerrero said operators reported 1,252 holes plugged in September, compared to 754 in August. A total of 79 dry holes were reported in September, compared to 107 in August.

September oil and gas drilling permits issued down compared to 1990

A total of 951 drilling permits were issued by the Railroad Commission in September, according to RRC Chairman Lean Guerrero. In August, the total was 1,114. September 1990's total was 1,339.

The September total included 568 permits to drill new oil and

gas tests, 32 to re-enter existing well bores, 25 to deepen existing holes, 132 to plugback existing holes, and 81 for other wells. Operators were also issued 113 amended drilling permits.

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


'Lopes surprise Lions in district battle

Most everyone expected the New Deal Lions to walk all over the Post Antelopes last Friday night here in the District 4AA contest... but the home team had different ideas, putting together the best overall game of the 1991 season.

The 'Lopes fell short in the 30-26 battle in the waning minutes of the contest, but Post fans had a full evening of great football from their players to cheer about.

New Deal finally came out on top with less than a minute left in the game, having trailed throughout most of the contest.

Sophomore quarterback Jim Riley Simpson, who had just returned to practice last week from an injury earlier in the season, was forced into action in the third quarter when Damon Curtis suffered a bruised ankle.

Senior tailback Brandon Bird turned in his best performance of the season, running with power, speed and deftness behind great blocking on the offensive line.

Defensively, Antelope fans saw the kind of effort that has been expected all year, but rarely seen. From the beginning the 'Lope defense, with a few exceptions, stifled the Lions.

First Half Action

New Deal's first possession was stopped cold by the Antelopes, forcing a punt on fourth down. Leading the defensive charge were Michael Self, Shane Horton, Anthony Cruse and Adrian Castillo.

The 'Lope offense took the ball at the five yard line following the punt and let Bird do the running as he pounded three times over his right side to the 20 for a first down. New Deal was drawn offside twice, setting another first down. Three plays later the 'Lopes were unable to muster a first down, setting up a punting situation. Curtis took the snap on the fake punt, dropped the ball to the ground and New Deal took over at the 28.

The Lions got to the 12, then Aaron Davis, Castillo, Jaime Ayala and Hiram Gutierrez stopped the Lions for a loss to the 14. A third down pass went too high, with pressure on the quarterback by Horton and the Lions set up for a field goal. With 5:23 left in the first quarter, Chris Villegas kicked the three pointer through the uprights and the Lions led 3-0.

On second down following the kickoff, disaster struck as Bird lost control of the pitchout and New Deal recovered at the Post 24.

Five plays later quarterback Matt Williams lofted a pass to Travis Hale in the end zone and the Lions led 9-0. The game began to look like so many others this season to Post fans.

What the fans didn't know at the time was that the Post Antelopes came of age Friday night.

Bird took the ensuing kickoff near the end zone and raced up the middle through great blocking, broke through two tacklers and outran the defenders to the New Deal 28 yard line.

The electrifying kickoff return brought a new life to the team and fans. On first down Self showed his quickness and determination as he blasted over left guard, dragging defenders to the seven.

Curtis pulled the keeper, losing ground to the 12. New Deal was penalized for being offside and the ball was set at the three and one half yard line. Curtis rolled to his right and zipped a pass into the waiting hands of Michael Harper in the end zone. With 1:39 left in the first quarter the 'Lopes trailed 9-6. Horton's extra point kick was short and to the left.

The defense held New Deal, giving up a first down before finding the key and forcing a fourth down punt from the Lion 29 yard line early in the second quarter. Great defensive effort by Michael McClellan, Castillo, Junior Nava, Davis and Horton set up the punting situation.

Self took the punt from the Antelope 42 to the New Deal 48, a clipping call on Post set the first down marker at the Post 37.

It took eight plays for the 'Lopes to go out front, with Self and Bird sharing the running chores. Curtis picked up a first down on the keeper around left end at the New Deal 46. Bird gained five to the 41 and a spearing penalty set up first down at the 26.

Post was offside back to the 31 and then Bird rammed on three consecutive carries over the right side to the 12 yard line.

Self went to the nine, Bird broke tacklers to the seven and on third down he hit the left tackle spot, broke off from two tacklers and raced to the end zone for the go ahead 12-9 lead. A quarterback keeper around right end failed and with 7:19 left in the first half, the 'Lopes had made their first successful come from behind effort this season.

Both defenses held and with 2:18 left in the half the 'Lopes got the ball at their own 45 yard line.

Bird went over left tackle, breaking through tacklers to the New Deal 42. Curtis recovered his own fumble and a penalty on Post set the ball back to the 48. On first down Bird took the pitchout around his right end, broke through a tackler at the line of scrimmage, turned on his afterburners, picked up a great block by Harper at about the 20 and then cut left, getting a tremendous clearing block from Cruse at the 10 as the powerful tailback hit the end zone for another six points. With 1:24 left in the half, the 'Lopes led 20-9 after Bird took the ball in for the two point conversion.

The defense let down momentarily and the Lions scored on a pass and lateral play with less than a minute left in the half. Williams threw the ball to David Duran at the Lions' 40 yard line. Duran turned and pitched the ball back to a trailing Jimmy Jackson, who dropped the ball, picked it up and raced by Post defenders to the end zone.

Williams was sacked by Horton on the two point conversion attempt and the scoreboard showed a 20-15 lead for the home team with :21 seconds left in the first half.

A last ditch effort by the 'Lopes was snuffed out as time ran out.

Second Half Action

The Antelopes drove the ball to the five yard line late in the third quarter, when Bird was stripped of the ball, as New Deal recovered.

The 'Lopes got a big break later when Abel Ramirez lost the football at the Lion 31 and Ayala pounced on it for the home team.

With 1:28 left in the third quarter, Simpson guided the 'Lopes toward the end zone. A third down effort by Self set up a fourth down situation about one half yard shy of the first down early in the fourth quarter. Bird got the hand off over right guard, broke a couple of tackles and took off to his left to the end zone. The 'Lopes led 26-15 with 11:31 left in the game.

New Deal countered with a quick burst up the middle on second down at the Post 41 as Jackson simply outran the 'Lope secondary to the end zone. With 10:41 showing on the clock, the score narrowed to 26-23 following the completed pass to Hale for the two point conversion.

The 'Lopes ticked off approximately four minutes on a seven play drive that ended with a fourth down punt with 6:36 left in the game.

The defense had to do its job to win the game.

There was no giving up, but a couple of defensive mistakes gave New Deal the chance to win.

Two major penalties set New Deal in a big hole at their own 21 yard line. Williams found Hedge Martin over the middle on a pass and run to the 44. He rolled left and completed a pass to Hale at the Post 47 and on fourth down Jackson slipped by defenders for a first down at the Post 42.

Nine plays later Martin went over right guard for the final two yards and with 41 seconds left in the game the Lions led 30-26 following extra point kick.

The patented 'Lope delayed wingback reverse did not fool the Lions and desperation pass attempts were intercepted as time ran out.

There were no sobbing fans leaving the stadium, as the 1991 Post Bold Gold Antelopes found themselves on the winning side of a great football game. Their obvious enthusiasm and energy showed what can be.

Fans will be anxious for next week's matchup at Tahoka.

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

Garza and Simpson also were credited with fumble recoveries. Simpson and Riley Feagin also had one interception each.



On July 1, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas that proposes to delete Paragraph 3.4(G) from Section 3 of Southwestern Bell's intrastate Access Service Tariff, which concerns credits where a customer uses Switched Access Service to furnish a service which has been defined to be an exchange service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10463.

Because Southwestern Bell is not aware of any customers who presently use switched access service to furnish an exchange service, Southwestern Bell does not believe its revenues will be affected. However, certain interexchange carrier customers of switched access service have made claims under the aforementioned tariff. Such customers, but only to the extent they provide an exchange service using switched access, would be affected by this application. Based on claims made for credits (assuming such credits were allowable), Southwestern Bell's revenues would be affected by no more than \$1,168,962 annually, which is .037 percent of the Company's adjusted revenue for the 12-month period ending December 31, 1990. It is not possible to know how many interexchange carriers might believe themselves entitled to credits, but 189 carriers have registered with the Commission pursuant to PUC Substantive Rule 23.61.

The tariff, after suspension, is proposed to be effective May 1, 1992.




