## Commissioners to abandon White Road due to tunnel

Dangerous passage way under railroad tracks

A rarely used roadway in Precinct Four known as White Road is planned for closure by the Garza County Commissioners' Court following discussions at the regular meeting Tuesday, November 12.

County attorney Preston Poole advised the court that the Santa Fe Railroad is not interested in assisting with the repairs, which would be expensive. Precinct Four commissioner Herb Walls said that he had talked to Petro Fina officials, who had no objection to the closing of the road.

Poole was authorized by the court to prepare the necessary petition documents for closing of the roadway. The item will be included on the November 25 meeting agenda.

Commissioners reviewed applications for the County Agent position and recommended to Texas Agriculture Extension Service's Dr. John Robinson that John Senter be considered. The item is to be included on the November 25 meeting agenda.

The court heard a report from Motorola Communications and Electronics concerning the monthly increase for the repeater from \$10 per unit to \$12.

Commissioners approved the canvass of votes from the November 5 state constitutional amendments election.

Donald Windham explained to the court that repairs to the gas line at the Meals on Wheels building (Lorenzo Alexander Community Center) were \$445.45 for parts and \$765 for labor. Windham also reported on the sewage line problem at the courthouse. The line which was under repair, created a pedestrian problem near the north door of the courthouse last week, when a pregnant woman visiting the building slipped on the cardboard which was covering the repair work, fell and was slightly injured.

Commissioners agreed that any medical expenses from the fall should be paid by the county.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Walls, John Valdez, Albert Stone, Sam E. Ellis, Judge Giles Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

If you want to pledge toward an adopted smoker, call Chris, he'll keep tabs for you.

The Garza Chapter of the American Cancer Society will present certificates to all those who participate in the campaign, a certificate of completion for those smokers who finish the 24 hours without smoking and an award to the adopted smoker and the non-smoking volunteer who raised the most in pledges during the campaign.

## Post ISD trustees approve low bid for workout facility

Tusha Buildings of Lubbock was the low bidder for construction of the workout facility for the Post Independent School District with a bid of \$239,000.

Trustees approved the bid at the regular meeting Tuesday, November 12.

Others bidding on the project were Hunter Construction at \$269,317, Knox-Gailey-Meador at \$289,419, All Texas Builders Inc. at \$282,622 and Wardroup & Associates with a bid of \$265,890.

The facility is expected to be completed in the spring and will provide 8,000 square feet of space, including a full size basketball court.

In other action, trustees approved the renewal of certificates of deposit of \$904,377 and \$533,846 at 4.54 percent for 30 days.

Board members enthusiastically approved a resolution recognizing the achievements of the Post High School band in its recent U.I.L. Marching Contest and Area Competition. Earning a Division I rating for two consecutive years is a first for PHS.

The resolution expressed appreciation to band director Crispin Bradsher and assistant band director Aaron Rathbun for their superior teaching and professional example.

"Observing them work without students is truly a delightful experience," superintendent Bill Shiver said in his recommendation of the resolution.

Attending the meeting were trustees Dan Hodges, Barbara Hardin, Gary Workman, Pru Basquez, Rex Cash, Mark Kirkpatrick and Ronnie Gradine.

## City redistricting proposals outlined at public hearing

Approximately 30 citizens attended a meeting of the City of Post redistricting committee Monday night, when three proposals for single member voting districts were presented.

City attorney Harvey Morton explained the three proposals, pointing out that only one of the three meets U.S. Justice Department guidelines for ensuring a "safe" minority voting district.

Dr. W.C. Wilson, representing the committee, explained the committee's preference for Proposal 3, which provides for a balance of approximately 44 percent minority population in all three of the proposed voting districts.

Morton explained that the Justice Department requires that a "safe" minority voting district be composed of at least 65 percent minority population to meet the mandate of the courts.

"Any less than 65 percent will be rejected," Morton added. City Council member Larry Mills requested the committee to prepare three proposals which would meet the Justice Department guidelines.

"It seems to me that we should be able to choose from three proposals, which would satisfy the requirements," Mills said. "Otherwise, we really don't have any choices, if only one of the proposals meets the requirements."

Members of the committee at the meeting were Dr. Wilson, Marion Cruse, Sofia Martinez and Paula Valdez. Other committee members are chair person Linda Hernandez and Don Payne.

Citizens at the meeting were requested to complete a survey form, indicating their feelings about the proposals.

The committee plans future meetings to study various boundaries for the voting districts.

## Sales tax rebate to Post decreases for September

November's city sales tax rebate check from the State Comptroller's office to the City of Post was \$17,169.61, compared to \$19,247.99 for the same period of 1990.

The year to date total of \$165,972.38 is an increase of 10.84 percent from the 1990's total of \$149,738.57.

The most recent payment is a one month decrease of 10.80 percent.

The state wide average increase for this year is 10.6 percent above last year.

This month's payment included taxes collected on September sales and reported in October by businesses filing monthly returns. November's rebate also includes taxes reported by businesses filing quarterly returns for sales made in July, August and September.

## Importance of emergency info form explained 911 implementation scheduled to begin at end of December

If you've tried to make a local call recently by using the shortcut of dialing a nine and then the last four digits you've probably been frustrated to hear the message, "due to the implementation of the 911..." and if you responded as I did, you hung up before the message was completed and dialed the full 495 prefix.

Changing dialing habits is the least of the problems facing the folks working on getting 911 ready to respond to emergencies.

The single most important factor right now is input from citizens, specifically the need to complete the 911 Record Inventory Form, which will be used to provide computerized data for the system.

As a public service, The Post Dispatch published a copy of the form last month, and we will continue to publish the form in future editions.

The information on the form will provide emergency response as to location of your residence or business and could mean the difference between life and death in response time.

This week the form is on page 9.

### This ANN That

Saturday I attended a workshop conducted by Dr. H. Stephen Glenn, an internationally acclaimed family psychologist who speaks to over 200,000 people each year. Glenn's program for helping families is called "Developing Capable People."

Citing changes in society since World War II as reasons that parenting techniques need to change too, Glenn says that we need to consciously provide things for kids now that once happened as a result of the agrarian society. Instead of being an integral part of the family's economic survival as workers on the farm alongside both parents as they once were, children now often do not even know what mom and dad do at their jobs. Children today do not automatically realize their importance in the family as did children who were able to help out financially as farm workers.

Glenn says that parents now must make conscious efforts to help children learn that they CAN do jobs that are important, that they are important in the family, and that they can be responsible for themselves. Parents must see that their children acquire skills of self-control, self-discipline, communication, negotiation, responsibility, adaptability and judgment. Kids must learn to analyze things they do, judge the outcome, and learning from every day activities. Glenn tells parents that they must help their children see "failures" not as failures but as opportunities for learning.

4-H works to develop capable people also. As a youth development organization, 4-H strives to help youth develop healthy self-esteem through hands-on learning

4-H members who participate in the food show have been members of Food and Nutrition project groups which provide six lessons in food and nutrition with hands-on experience for the youth.

Emphasis of competition is on nutrition knowledge of the 4-H'ers, who must communicate to judges the daily nutrition needs of people their own age and the nutrition provided by the dish they prepared.

Following judging awards were presented to 4-H members, project leaders, and judges. Judy Bush, Oneita Gunn and Cindy Mitchell of Post, Michelle Werner, Dietitian at V.A. Hospital, Big Spring, and Angela Bohannon, Lubbock County Agent served as judges.

activities. Learning to care for animals, prepare food, practice comparative shopping skills, communicate through speaking with judges in various competitions, preside at and/or speak up at club meetings helps kids realize that they do have valuable skills, that they are important, and that they can have control of their lives.

4-H is a family organization. Parents, younger brothers and sisters are welcomed and encouraged to attend all meetings and projects. 4-H supports the family; it does not try to replace it. 4-H makes available to those who will participate a network of friends who support the learning and progress of all members. 4-H supports the idea that although in a competition there must be a winner, there are no losers in the competition -- that to compete, to LEARN is to WIN.

Dr Glenn closed his day-long presentation with these ideas: There is no nobility in being superior to anyone else. The only true nobility is in being superior to the person YOU were yesterday. 4-H endeavors to teach this concept to members.

4-H is available to all youth ages 9 to 19 at no cost for membership. Leaders who are willing to share their skills with youth are always needed. If you have skills that you are willing to share, volunteer to be a 4-H project leader. If you know a young person who would like to be a member, encourage her/him to join. 4-H clubs are always eager to welcome new members.

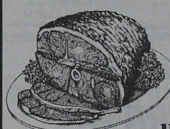

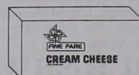

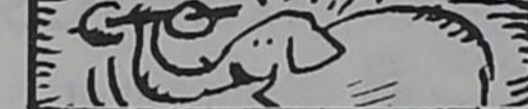
