Commissioners keep community center budget at current levels

A request from the Post Community Center board for additional funding this year was denied by the Garza County Commissioners Court, which voted to maintain the funding at current levels.

Commissioner Herb Walls said that the issue could be discussed when next year's budget planning begins.

The letter from Community Center board president Larry Mills outlined expenses for maintaining the center and the need for additional funding to cover

Walls' position reflects a continuing unresolved question about county funding for the facility, which has been jointly funded by the city and county, but without a firm written agreement.

In other action commissioners approved amending the budget to reflect actual expenditures and expected costs in eight categories. No additional revenues were granted, the money is being shifted from budgeted items that are currently under budget. Clerk Sonny Gossett was requested to oversee the inventory of old records

and research what kinds of changes to the old jail could be made without violating the historical significance of the building. A decision on a request by a Garza County man for emergency financial

assistance was postponed as the court plans to investigate its legal obligations to provide emergency funding to citizens.

Judge Giles Dalby informed the court that a grant for modernizing equipment

alcohol abuse and probation office. He also explained that a new large screen television and video tape player has been added to the conference room in the Postex Building for us by organizations.

The summer youth programs of free meals and recreation were outlined to the court and Dalby emphasized that funding for the recreational program is provided by a grant from the Texas Criminal Justice Department Performance Reward program. Approximately 100 of Texas' 254 counties were selected for the grant. Garza County received just over \$60,000. Commissioners were encouraged to attend a South Plains Association of Governments sponsored regional meeting concerning the Texas Water Commission regulations for landfill and solid waste management. Commissioners and City Council members are expected to attend the hearing in Midland June 24 or in Abilene June 25. The proposed new regulations appear to provide exceptions for landfills in cities the size of Post.

As we discussed last week, this year's cotton crop is for the most part nonexistent. This leads to another decision that has caused more producers to lose sleep than the Tonight Show. "To replant or not replant, that is the question!"

Information from Texas A&M might possibly help with this difficult decision. Keep in mind that the decision of replanting a cotton crop is based on several factors, including remaining stand uniformity, condition of the surviving plants, replanting costs, calendar date and availability of alternate crops which

might show a profit. Producers are cautioned to visit the local ASCS office and insurance agent before taking action. Don't jeopardize any farm program or insurance benefits. According to Dr James Supak, cotton specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, correct decisions depend on the circumstances in each situation. It may vary from field to field or even among areas in the same field.

Research has shown that the optimum planting density both for production and harvesting efficiency, ranges from 25,000 to 50,000 plants per acre. That equates to two to four plants per foot of row in conventional row spacings. Supak recommends to evaluate the stand losses. If two or more plants

per foot of row survive, and there are not too many long skips, the stand is still adequate for lint production. It will be beneficial to producers to delay decisions until after the crop is

exposed to two or three continuous days of good growing conditions, which we still have not seen. Crop condition is perhaps the toughest aspect of evaluation to get a handle on.

The degree and rate of crop recovery depends on the type and extent of damage and conditions following the injury. Types of damage can be broadly classified as acute or chronic.

Damage from hail, wind and sand can be acute. Although severe, it usually is of short duration and growing conditions are apt to return to normal in a short time, this has not been the case for us.

Damage from prolonged or recurring periods of wet, cool weather can be considered as chronic because it intensifies over a long period of time. Diseased plants may or may not recover, depending on the duration of

adverse growing conditions. Plants cut off below the cotyledonary node won't

Those with deep stem bruises may eventually die or only partially recover. Plants that lost terminals may survive if viable buds remain on the plant and the

stem below these buds is intact. Plants that are essentially defoliated can survive if the stem damage is minimal.

Any remaining or whole leaves will increase the chance of survival and help with recovery

Plants suffering from chronic damage are often afflicted with seedling diseases that attack roots, the vascular system and leaves.

During periods of cool, wet weather, the crop may appear normal, but will

deteriorate rapidly when the weather turns hot and sunny. To get a handle on your seedlings, dig up some plants and inspect the condition of the tap root. If the tap root has black, water soaked appearance, the seedling disease is still active and you can rest assured more damage may occur.

However, if the tap root is still intact and the outer covering, although discolored, has hardened, recovery chances are improved. Cut the root length wise and check for discoloration in the vascular tissue,

especially if foliar disease damage is evident. Blight and disease organisms can invade and plug the water and photosynthate vessels.

All in all, the business of deciding to replant or not is far from simple. Continued on Page 8)

CRP signup set for June 15–26

Garza County producers are eligible to submit bids to place their highly erodible cropland into the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) during the 12th CRP signup to be held June 15–26 at the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office.

The CRP is intended to convert highly erodible cropland from annual crop production to a permanent grass cover for a 10 year period.

During the life of the contract, a producer will receive an annual rental payment in return for taking land out of annual production. The CRP benefits the public by reducing wind and water erosion off highly erodible farms and reducing government price supports for annual program crops such as wheat, grain sorghum and cotton.

Bids submitted during the 12th CRP signup will be for the 1993 crop year. Accepted contracts will become effective October 1, 1992, with the first rental payment to be made in October 1993. Crops planted for harvest in 1992 on land accepted for 1993 CRP may be harvested once. No grazing of 1993 CRP acres may occur after October 1, 1992.

Bids may be submitted on land that has had an annual crop planted at least two of the years 1986–1990. The land to be bid must have been owned or operated by the same person for at least three years prior to July 26, 1992. The Soil Conservation Service will determine if the land meets the highly erodible

Bids will be submitted into a national pool of which only 1.1 million acres (Continued on Page 9)


Support group for teens with cancer to begin
