Post ISD superintendent Bill Shiver announces retirement plans

Trustees accept Jan. 1, 1993 transition date

After almost 30 years of guiding the Post Independent School District, superintendent Bill Shiver announced at last week's board of trustee meeting his plans to retire. He offered the board a June 30, 1992 or January 1, 1993 retirement date. Board members expressed their intention to accept the 1993 date to provide adequate time for seeking a replacement.

The announcement came at the end of a fairly active session, when Shiver informed the board of his intentions.

"I feel that this is the right time," he said.
Since the item was not on the agenda, the board is expected to take up the issue at its next scheduled meeting.

Shiver first came to Post ISD in 1963 and accepted the superintendent's position at a time when the district was in a serious financial crisis, unable to meet its payroll and facing a large deficit.

One of Shiver's greatest achievements has been the strong financial planning and position he has managed to provide for Post ISD taxpayers. With careful financial controls, he brought the district from financial disaster to one of solid and consistent stability.

For the past several months Shiver has made references to his retirement, but no firm date had been announced in earlier meetings.

In other action, trustees heard a report from attorney Don Dennis concerning redistricting plans. He presented a second plan providing for two majority minority voting districts, one with 54 percent minority population and one with 61.75 percent.

The board voted to hold a public hearing on the matter April 30 at 7 p.m. in the high school library.

Attorney Joe Boerner also gave a briefing to the board concerning contractual requirements and discussed the broad issue of termination of contracts with teachers and staff.

School counselor Pat Thompson reported to the board about a recent conference on HIV and AIDS, emphasizing the seriousness of the problem and outlining specific plans and programs that the ISD will be implementing to educate its staff and students.

Trustees discussed the appointment of a community guidance committee to assist the district in its efforts to prevent the spread of the disease.

Board members approved Saturday, April 25 as the Saturday set aside for early voting.

Certificates of deposit of \$597,546; \$1,422,262; \$1,694,516; \$783,604 and \$684,174 were approved for renewal for 30 to 31 days at rates of 3.56 to 3.689 percent.

Alarming number of children are victims of child abuse

No one really knows how many children are abused physically, sexually or emotionally each year because most abuse occurs in the privacy of homes and many victims do not report abuse because they fear breaking up the family, suffering punishment or not being believed if they do tell.

But it is known that an alarming number of child abuse cases are reported to the Texas Department of Human Services each year. In fiscal year 1991 (September 1990 - August 1991) 91,094 cases of child abuse were reported, and 34,875 cases were confirmed. Of those 34,875 cases, there were 55,392 victims of which 103 died.

In Garza County 81 investigations were conducted involving 207 children. There are currently three children in protective custody.

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month, and Texas PTA reminds parents and teachers that the line between discipline and abuse is a fine one.

"While having children is one of the most natural things in the world, being a good parent may not be," Shirley Igo, Texas PTA president said.
"Most people have not been taught how to handle the frustrations that accompany the joys of parenting. They often respond to their own anger and frustration by lashing out at their children."

The Texas PTA, in affiliation with National PTA, opposes corporal punishment. True discipline is corrective, and when given by either parent or teacher, in wisdom and a spirit of love, tends to strengthen the will of the child towards appropriate behavior. Good discipline leads and directs, rather than threatens and coerces through fear.

According to the National Committee for Prevention of Child Abuse, "discipline is not punishment; discipline is not shame; discipline is not guilt; discipline helps the child to think; discipline helps the child to learn so that present and future behavior is changed; discipline helps the child to grow intellectually and emotionally -- it enhances his self-confidence and self-image; discipline is best taught by example."

Abuse satisfies the need of the parent. It only helps children think in terms of pain, hatred, revenge and hostility.

Discipline should help a child develop a sense of self-worth -- the most important ingredient necessary for a child's positive behavior in the future.

Following are suggestions for parents and teachers to follow when creating loving relationships with children while still setting and enforcing the limits they need:

- * When children misbehave, let them know that it is their action that is disliked and not who they are.
- * Rewarding good behavior is more effective than punishing misbehavior.
- * Try to "catch" children being good. Be generous with praise.
- * Discuss report cards with children. Find at least one good thing for which to praise the child, even if it is for attendance -- no tardies.
- * Punishment should be used to help children about the consequences of their behavior ... never punish in anger.
- * Setting a good example is the best way to teach children how to behave.
- * Physical punishment teaches a child that hitting is okay.
- * Words hurt. Telling a child that he is stupid or lazy will lower his self-esteem.

Shiver pointed out that the state educational funding plans will eventually force Post ISD and other districts in this area to cut per student spending to the state average of \$3,221.04. Post ISD per student cost averages \$5,408.29 and the average in this region is \$3,988.68.

"If the governor's plan to remove commercial and industrial taxes from local districts," Shiver pointed out, "then Post ISD will be left with only 14.6 percent of our total tax base for local enrichment."

That means that to maintain current levels of spending, Post ISD taxpayers would see a tax rate of \$3.50 per hundred on residential property.

"I don't believe the taxpayers here would stand for that kind of rate," Shiver emphasized.

Trustees approved budget change requests to reflect the earlier decision to provide summer classes for failing elementary students. The eight week summer school program will begin June 8 and end July 31. Mrs. Edna Owen, Mrs. Kathy Fluit, Mrs. Carol McDonald and Mrs. Martha Baker will each teach four weeks. There will be 10 to 12 children in both kindergarten and first grade targeted for the program, those who failed and those considered at risk.

Attending the meeting were trustees Pru Basquez, Ronnie Gradine, Mark Kirkpatrick, Rex Cash and Barbara Hardin.

Southland and Post students to experience Mexican heritage program

On April 27 - May 1, Post and Southland elementary and middle schools will get a chance to let a little piece of Mexico into their schools. The Texas Arts Council and the Texas Humanities Resource Center have created a multicultural program for elementary students to help promote cultural understanding, pride in heritage, and a positive self-image. The program is called Hispanic Heritage: Mexican Influences. It features three hour-and-a-half long performance a day by visual artists, Miguel Martinez of San Antonio and theatre artist Lupe Casas of Houston.

Before each performance, the students are greeted by a friendly "Buenos dias!" and circled around the room so that they can view nine large panels with historic customs, clothing, artifacts, musical instruments, folklore, and dances. The two artists present a lively program which helps students to realize Mexican and American cultures have many similarities.

ASCS needs small grains acreage reports

Garza County Agricultural producers are reminded to report all acreages of small grains regardless of intended use to the local ASCS office by May 1. Any small grain acreage not plowed under must be certified by May 1. Intended uses include harvesting the crop for

grain, hay, and grazing or using the cover for Acreage Conservation Reserve, conserving uses, and windstrips.

Small grains used for cover must be grazed out or disposed by May 1. Any small grain that reaches the hard dough stage and is left standing after May 1 is considered the grain crop, unless a request to leave the crop standing for reseeding is made and a \$10 inspection fee is paid.

Producers with a small grain crop acreage base (CAB) and no small grain planted must also come in to report zero plantings. Late filled reports may be accepted, but only after a late file fee is paid.

Producers with small grains need to contact the ASCS office at 208 West Main by May 1. Eligibility for participation in all programs administered by ASCS is established under law without regard to race, color, religion, age, sex, handicap, national origin, or marital status.

"Drugs, dropouts and do nots..."

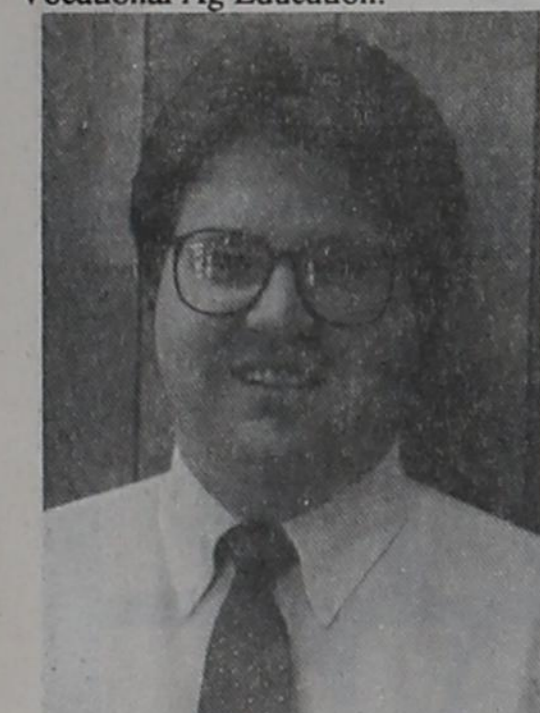
On drugs... "My 'Drugs and the Law' program has proven to be widely accepted and effective throughout Texas schools.

Coordination of transport for critically ill newborns urged

Coordination and regionalization of transportation services for critically ill newborns is needed to ensure adequate neonatal intensive care throughout the state, according to an article published in the April issue of Texas Medicine.

Neonatal intensive care units exist in Galveston, Corpus Christi, Harlingen, Amarillo, Lubbock, El Paso, Odessa, Temple, Fort Worth, Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Austin. Getting critically ill newborns to those facilities, however, can be a problem, state the authors of the Texas Medicine article. Texas Medicine is the official news magazine of the Texas Medical Association.

"Neonatal transport systems employing properly trained personnel and specialized equipment have been shown to improve neonatal mortality," the authors write.

Despite the existence of many neonatal transport teams, the authors say little or nothing has been done to coordinate similar efforts at different programs or to organize programs into sharing the responsibility of transport among the less served areas of Texas.

The article was written by Dr. Joseph B. Zwischenberger, associate professor; Dr. Susan Keeney, assistant professor; Glen Raymond and Melissa Hanson, medical students; and Dr. Charles S. Cox, Jr.,

surgical research fellow, at The University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

The authors surveyed medical directors at the state's neonatal intensive care units and found 65 percent believe neonatal transport systems in Texas are inadequate, particularly in western and southwestern parts of the state. The medical directors said a state-organized system would help eliminate overlap and improve services to underserved areas. They also said steps need to be taken to assure reimbursement for transport of indigent patients.

"We urge further efforts toward coordination and regionalization among these (transport) teams," the authors conclude, "and we have identified a strong need for reimbursement policies to allow the teams to share equally in the responsibility of the transport of neonates in the state of Texas."

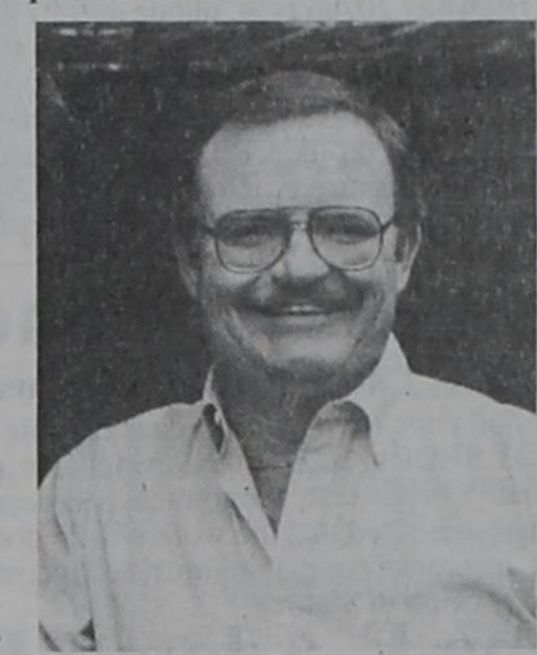

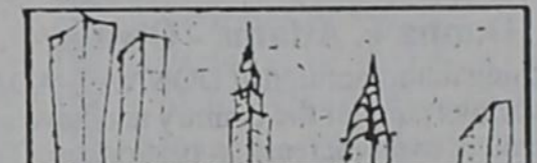
His specific plans include "promoting trade and industry in Post, improving city services to residents and finding viable solutions to the landfill problem, redistricting and growth of Post."

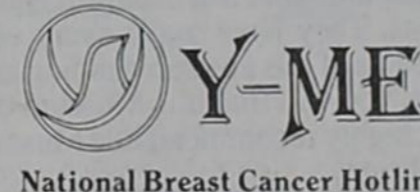

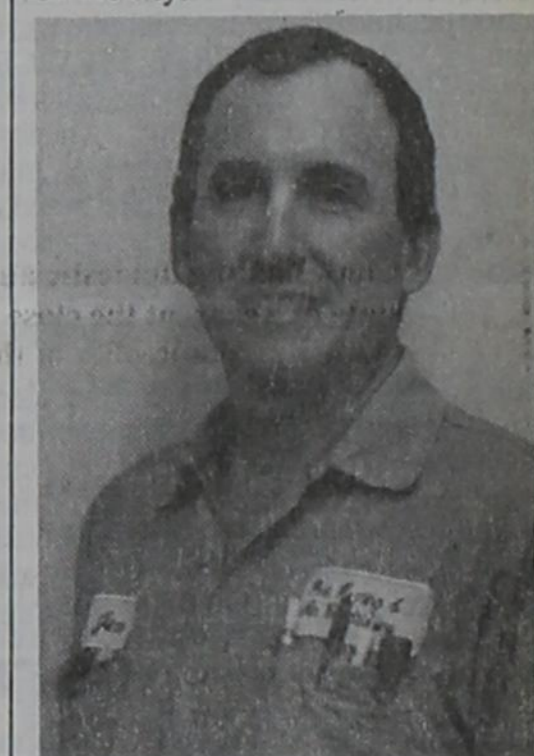

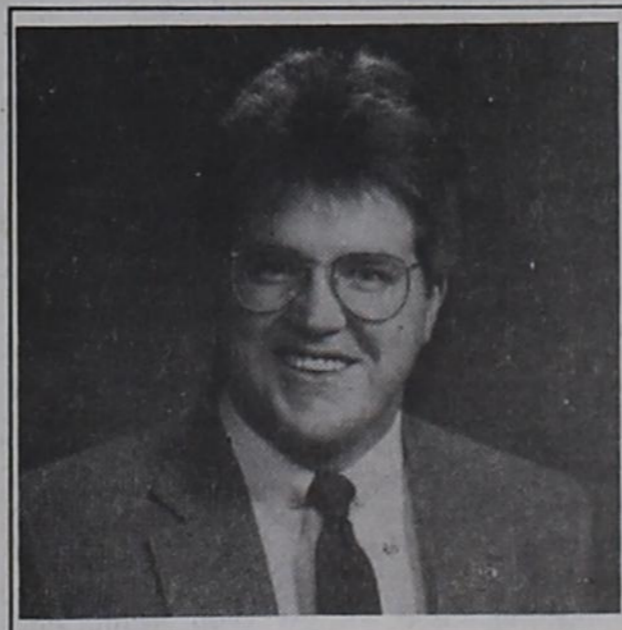

Cancer programs encourage detection, prevention

Cutting abnormally high rates of cervical cancer in the Rio Grande Valley is the goal of one of two cancer detection and prevention programs being launched by the Texas Medical Association and two other organizations, according to an article in the March issue of Texas Medicine.

The two cancer prevention programs are cooperative efforts between TMA, the Texas Academy of Family Physicians and The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Cancer Center in Houston, states the official news magazine of the Texas Medical Association.

The Rio Grande Valley Cancer Prevention and Detection Program has enlisted more than 100 family physicians to help reduce cervical cancer rates in the Valley, which are significantly higher than in the rest of the state. The program focuses on the need for doctors to educate patients about the importance of Pap tests. If a patient cannot afford a Pap test, the physician is encouraged to donate his or her services and send the test to M.D. Anderson for interpretation.

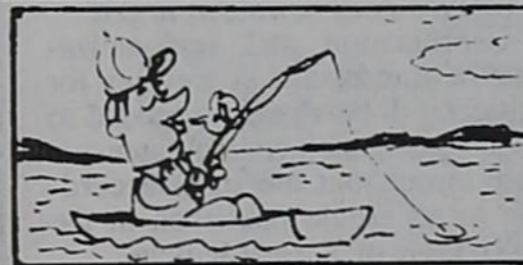
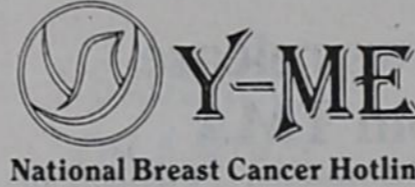

Economic injury disaster loans available from SBA

Walter Fronstin, district director of the U.S. Small Business Administration in Lubbock announced today that SBA is accepting applications for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) from eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives without credit available elsewhere.

Applicants must have sustained substantial economic injury because of their dependence upon farmers and ranchers who suffered the agricultural damages. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for these SBA loans, Fronstin said.

Fronstin said that businesses seeking loan information and loan applications may call SBA's Area 3 District Office in Fort Worth since all disaster loans are processed through that office. The toll-free number is, 1-800-473-0477.

Businesses located in the following counties serviced by the Lubbock District Office of the SBA and which were affected by an early freeze, high winds, very cool weather and excessive rainfall between June 1 and November 6, 1991 have until November 2, 1992 to fill an EIDL application: Childress, Cottle, Dickens, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, King, Knox and Motley.

Businesses located in the following counties affected by hail, high winds and an early freeze October 25-31, 1991, also have until November 2, 1992 to file an EIDL application: Borden, Dawson, Fisher, Garza, Glasscock, Howard, Kent, Martin, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Sterling.

The EIDL loan program is intended to assist agriculture-dependent businesses and small agricultural cooperatives who sustained a substantial decrease in sales (or other forms of economic injury) directly due to losses incurred by the farmers and ranchers the business usually sells.

In some cases, this may include non-agriculture-related businesses which sustain a substantial economic loss directly due to the inability of the farmers affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels. Small businesses claiming to have been physically injured by the specified adverse weather are not eligible for the EIDL loans. Fronstin said the program is available only to those businesses that are considered small by SBA's size standards and do not have credit available from other sources.

The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is four percent. The loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to \$500,000. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.

Antelopes win District 4AA track championship, set two new school records

The Post Antelope varsity and junior varsity track teams won the District 4AA championships last Thursday at Sundown as the varsity captured the trophy with 117 points. This is the first time since 1986 that the varsity boys have won the district meet.

Henry Reed and Ricky Jefferson broke school records during the meet as Reed shattered the 100 meter record with a 10.56 in the preliminaries. Larry Scrivner held the 100 yard dash record from 1970 at 9.6, which converted to 100 meters is just slightly slower.

Jefferson set a new triple jump record at 41' 9 1/4". The previous record was set last year by Michael Harper at 40' 3". Tension mounted during the afternoon as Post led Seagraves by four points going into the mile run. It was evident in the final lap that Ty Hill, coming from sixth to fourth place on the first curve, had to stay ahead of the Seagraves runner if the Antelopes were to maintain their slim edge. The two ran side-by-side on the first turn with Hill hugging the outside of the first lane... as the two runners rounded the corner Hill pulled ahead slowly to take the third place slot... and finished out the race to give the 'Lopes a continued advantage.

Then the 1600 meter relay team ripped off a 3:31.42, with Brad Lawson and Reed taking the last two legs sprinting out ahead of the competitors to win the championship.

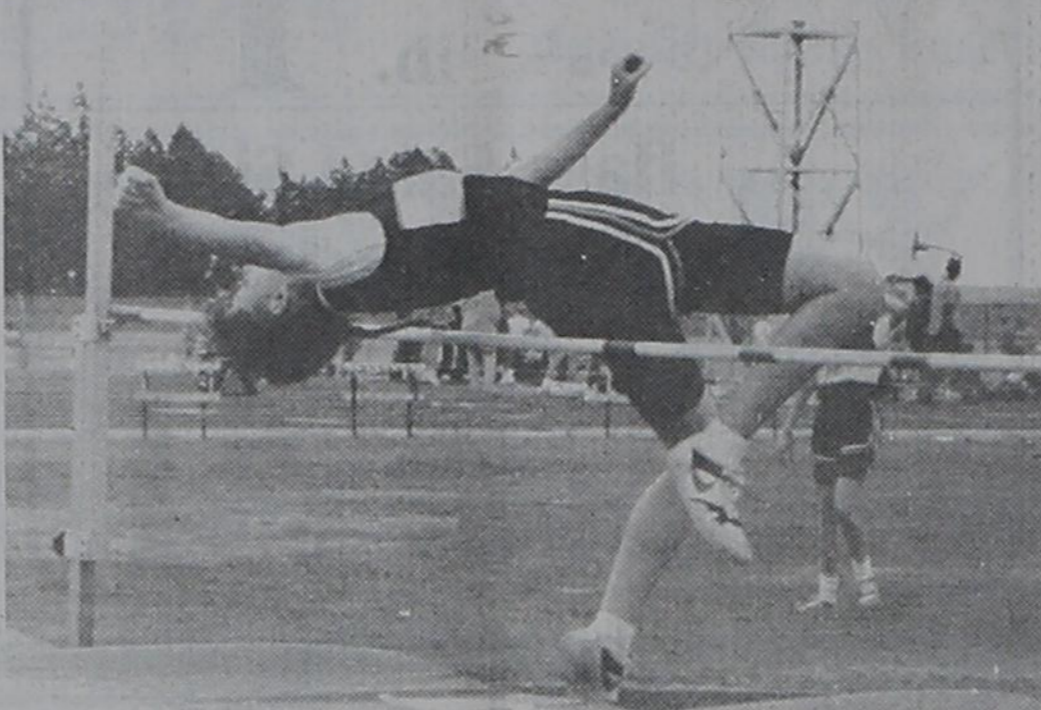

This ANN That

Those who love to read know that reading is fun. However, children need to learn this from significant people in their lives.

Parents, relatives and friends can help children understand the importance of literacy, and help them develop a love for reading by setting a good example.

Here are 15 tips to help your children get ready to read:

* Read, read, read, aloud! Choose from a variety of books, including picture books and simple books for beginning readers.

* Make sure reading times are cozy and relaxed. The calm and intimacy between you and your child will help to connect books with pleasurable feelings.

* Build a library of picture books at home for your child to handle and pour over. Opportunities to turn pages and examine pictures lead to curiosity about text and print.

* Share rhyming books with your children. Invite them to fill in the "missing" rhyming word as you read.

* Look for predictable books that have recurrent lines or phrases. "Chime in" together when you come to the familiar part.

* Listen to your children "re-tell" a storybook in their own words as the pages are turned. These approximations are a step forward in the reading process.

* Take your child to the library and allow time for browsing in the children's section. Let your child apply for a library card.

* Keep paper, crayons and pencils readily available. Encourage all efforts your young writer makes, from squiggly lines to "inventively" spelled words. Early efforts at writing are closely related to beginning reading.

* If your child is beginning to write, ignore that backward "s" and inverted "b" and "d". The child is still in a practicing phase on the road to reading through writing.

* Purchase some inexpensive magnetic letters for your refrigerator door. Allow your child to handle and play with them freely. Rather than instruct, respond to questions such as "Mommy, what letters say 'Daddy'?"

* Ask your child to tell you a story. Write the story down as it's told, then read it back and share with others.

* Make a book with your child. Staple some blank pieces of paper together and ask the child to illustrate the cover and inside pages. Write down whatever your child wants to say about the pictures at the bottom of each page. Enjoy reading and sharing the results.

* Make shopping lists with your child. Say the names of the grocery items aloud as you write them down. Search for and check off the items together as you shop.

* Make a batch of pretzel dough together and use it to form different letters of the alphabet -- shape, bake, eat.

Study to determine if onions a cancer preventive

Scientists at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) in College Station are in the first phase of a study to determine whether onions can reduce your odds of developing cancer.

If findings are positive, millions of Americans one day will be able to buy anti-cancer insurance for pennies at their local supermarkets. And Texas onion farmers can reap a big reward.

Texas is America's second largest onion producer with farm sales averaging \$57 million a year over the past 10 years. In nearly the same period, U.S. onion consumption rose, from 13 pounds per capita in 1979 to 18 pounds in 1989. Scientific proof that onions inhibit cancer - and a palatable onion bred with large quantities of anti-cancer agents - would serve to boost demand only higher.

Dr. Leonard Pike, a TAES horticulturist, hopes to provide this proof. Pike and his research staff will test more than 1,200 onion varieties this spring, the first step toward discovering whether the inexpensive kitchen staple can, as some studies claim, actually in-

hibit cancer. A \$165,000 grant from the Texas Legislature will finance the initial research. Leonard Pike is something of a hero. He developed the Texas 1015 Super-Sweet, the king of the state's spring onion crop.

Texas 1015s - the number refers to the crop's October 15 planting date - have earned our Rio Grande Valley and South Texas growers a reputation for quality, not only in Texas markets but as far away as Canada. And for good reason. Texas 1015s are big, sometimes as big as softballs, they're incredibly mild and their symmetrical rings make them perfect for onion rings.

Pike, however, has a hunch that the anti-cancer compound may be a sulfur though not the volatile type. He bases his theory on studies that show garlic, a relative of onions, contains sulfur but doesn't

cause tears. What's more, many chemical compounds in onions are odorless and colorless. One of these, quercetin, already shows disease-fighting potential. A sweet, mild onion could be genetically designed to emphasize these compounds.

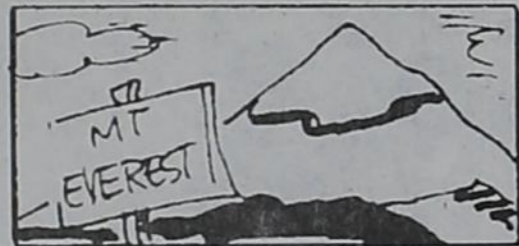
The best news, of course, would be the discovery that onions already on the market contain plentiful amounts of anti-cancer compounds.

In the meantime, spring is a good time for Texans to start adding more onions to menu planning. Onion harvest starts in March in the Rio Grande Valley, and Texas 1015s will begin appearing on the market in mid-April. All onions are low-calorie nutritional bargains. But for taste you can't beat Texas onions or 1015s.

Loans to aid farmers in five counties

by Senator Phil Gramm

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm has announced that farmers in Garza County join Texas counties eligible to apply for low-interest emergency loans to help recover from damages and losses to crops due to extreme freezing weather conditions which occurred between October 1 and December 31, 1991. Eligible for the loan assistance are those in Bailey, Dickens, Haskell, Knox and Yoakum counties.

For those who cannot obtain credit through normal channels, the U.S. Farmers Home Administration will make loans available at below-market interest rates to family farmers.

In addition to the above counties, 19 other Texas counties have been named as contiguous counties and therefore are eligible for

assistance. The counties affected by the extreme freezing weather are Baylor, Cochran, Cottle, Crosby, Floyd, Foard, Gaines, Garza, Hockley, Jones, Kent, King, Lamb, Motley, Parmer, Shackelford, Stonewall, Terry and Throckmorton counties. Gramm said all 24 counties

have eight months to apply for the loans to help cover part of their actual losses.

The FmHA, which will supervise the loan program, is charged with providing aid to the farmers and ranchers in order to assist their economic recovery from natural disasters.

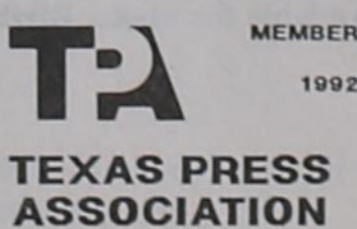

Retailer survey signal beginning of end for food stamps

by John Sharp, State Comptroller

"We have found a way to abolish paper food stamp coupons, improve our services to the needy and save millions of dollars for Texas taxpayers," State Comptroller John Sharp says. "Texas should set the standard nationwide for the delivery of health and human services at minimum cost - while virtually eliminating fraud and theft."

Sharp announced that the Comptroller's Office has mailed surveys to 22,000 Texas retailers who serve food stamp recipients, asking for their advice on how best to eliminate the current system of paper coupons and mounds of bookkeeping requirements and replace it with an Electronic Benefits Transfer (EBT) program. "The food stamp program was set up in 1972 using 1972 technology," Sharp said. "It's time to update the way we distribute these vital benefits to those who need them most. Texans who receive the help - and Texans who pay for it - deserve no less."

"As always, when revolutionary changes are made, people with the most to lose will rush forward to defend the status quo - people getting paid to chop down trees, stand guard outside warehouses filled with food stamps and operate armored cars around the state to deliver the cumbersome coupons."

Sharp made the comments during a demonstration at the State Capitol of how food stamp benefits can be delivered to a Texas recipient by using a plastic bank-type card instead of the paper coupons. The EBT program is one of the cost-saving recommendations contained in Sharp's Texas Performance Review last year, and will begin as a pilot project in August, 1993, in Harris County - the largest urban area in the nation to be selected as a test site.

Recipients will use the cards in supermarkets, pharmacies and other retail outlets - as well as automated teller machines - to draw

Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and Medicaid, as well as food stamp benefits.

"Retailers play a critical role in this effort, and this survey is their opportunity to tell us what will work for them," Sharp said. "After all, EBT will dramatically change the way thousands of retailers across Texas do business with many of their customers."

"I urge business people to complete the survey and return it to us as soon as possible so that their voices are heard at the front end of that change."

Joining Sharp for the demonstration were Merriman Morton, president of Texas Commerce Bank of Austin, and San Antonio civic leader Mary Alice Cisneros. They chair a Citizens Task Force named by Sharp to help implement the Electronic Benefits Transfer program in Texas.

The Texas Department of Human Services, which administers the food stamp program, estimates a minimum savings of \$10 million a year through EBT. Savings will come from the lowered costs of printing, warehousing and mailing paper coupons, reduced fraud and benefit abuse, and increased program accuracy and efficiency.

The Citizens Task Force chaired by Morton and Cisneros is comprised of 23 leading consumer, business and banking representatives from across Texas to help develop the EBT program. The retailer survey represents a key issue for the Task Force - to take stock of the current retail environment, learn how many businesses are pursuing electronic funds transfer and find out which of them want to have point-of-sale technology in their stores.

"We believe the EBT program is a real winner from the retailer's point of view," Sharp said. "Not only will fraud and theft be virtually done away with, but the mountains of paperwork that now confront grocers will also be whittled down to size."

"This is an exciting new way to deliver benefits to hundreds of thousands of Texans. While saving the state millions of dollars and reducing the burden on retailers who choose to participate, the program also removes the stigma many feel when presenting paper food stamps. It will help restore some measure of dignity to those who find themselves in temporary need of our assistance."

Exemptions provided for farmers and ranchers

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry has reminded Texas ranchers and farmers that they may be exempted from new guidelines for operating commercial vehicles that went into effect April 1.

These guidelines, patterned after federal regulations, include a standardized federal test instead of the state-administered chauffeur's test. This new test must be passed by individuals operating vehicles weighing 26,000 pounds or more, those hauling hazardous materials, and buses designed to transport 16 or more passengers including the driver.

"However, under the new law, farmers and ranchers, members of their families and employees transporting goods, equipment and products within 150 miles of their operation are exempt," Perry said.

Federal law mandating standardized testing of commercial drivers was passed in October 1986 by Congress and adopted by Texas in 1989.

The U.S. Department of Transportation is considering expanding the present exemption to include farm-related businesses, such as feed stores.

If farmers or ranchers are unsure about their exemption, they should contact their local Department of Public Safety office.
