Each team must also provide the fajitas for sale to the public and a table for cutting the meat for the judges.



The Garza County Commissioners Court formally accepted former Sheriff Freddy Cockrell's resignation, effective April 30 and then unanimously appointed former deputy Kenny Ratke to serve as sheriff beginning at 12:01 a.m. May 1. Ratke had won the Democratic Party primary election for sheriff and will be unopposed on the November ballot.

Shortly after the appointment, Garza County Judge Giles Dalby read a letter of resignation from chief deputy Wes Cockrell, who also will leave the sheriff's department April 30.

Among the new sheriff's first duties will be to analyze the recent jail standards inspection and to submit recommendations to the commissioners at the next regular meeting in May. Ratke was also requested by the court to provide details on what needs to be done to keep the backup generator ready for emergency use.

Dalby informed the court that the Texas Association of Counties has announced a 15 percent increase in insurance premiums for public officials and a five percent increase for law enforcement coverage, effective June 15.

Commissioners authorized an emergency management plan and approved the purchase of non-toxic insecticide treatment from Certified Laboratories for the courthouse building. The treatment plan includes a free seminar for employees on chemical safety by William Wilbanks.

The court approved the renewal of an agreement with the Big Spring hospital and authorized Daughtery and Associates of Amarillo to conduct a seminar on the impact of the Americans with Disabilities Act for public officials.

A discussion concerning the joint agreement with the City of Post for operation of the Post Community Center led to a suggestion that the City Council and the Commissioners' Court hold a joint working session to outline specifics about the agreement.

A request by the extension office to use a copying machine that is currently on rent to the county was approved at the rate of \$61 per month, including repairs, maintenance and supplies excluding paper.

Commissioner Herb Walls agreed to provide labor for mowing areas around the runways at the airport following a request by Post city manager Bob Turner. A tractor, which had been purchased by the airport board, will be available for use in the project.

The meeting included a detailed explanation of the South Plains Association of Government proposed Regional Solid Waste Management Plan by Shawn Raborn.

Important decisions concerning the future of solid waste disposal must be made in the next few months, as the City of Post is facing a 14 month deadline to close the remainder of the landfill.

The public hearing will feature Terrell County Judge Charles Stavley who will explain the various options open to the city and the county. Stavley is Small/Rural Communities Liaison with the Solid Waste Management Division of the Texas Water Commission.

Judge Stavley also serves on the Sparsely Populated Entities Coalition (SPEC).

Representatives of South Plains Association of Governments will also be at the meeting to answer questions.

"We are at a critical point," Garza County Judge Giles Dalby emphasizes. "and we must work together to find the best possible solution to our future solid waste system. We can't make these decisions in a vacuum, we must have input from our citizens... the costs are going to be heavy and our people must know in advance what the alternatives are.'







Charles L. Pickett remembers early days in Post...

Editor: Thought you might be interested in a little 1900s Post history.

My dad, Charles L. Pickett III, wrote this in 1985. He died in 1990.

He would tell us about the Post to Lubbock cattle drives in 1919 to 1927(?). He and the sheriff's son who were the same age, would stay in the saddle all summer long, day and night.

My dad was a "real" cowboy, but didn't think of horseback riding as fun. He said horses were for work.

Every day at dawn and at dusk during the school year he would ride out of Post to the "ranch" to check on the family's 2,500 head of cattle.

His mother lost many thousands of acres of ranch land during the depression, often just for \$50 taxes on 2,500 acres; but no one had \$50!

Luckily, a relative lent him the money to go to A&M 1927-31. Then he financed his brother Arnold's college.

I have not been to Post since I was six months old, but I have heard about Post all my life. I feel like a native, yet I feel like I have really missed something good.

Round about trip to Post

Charles Lewis Pickett, II, was born in Brooklyn, N.Y. in 1871, ad came to Texas around 1895.

He made the trip by steamboat to Galveston, from there he went to Crockett County, Texas and went to work as a cook's helper on the 7D Ranch, at that time one of the largest in Texas.

The ranch headquarters was about 18 miles west of Ozona and one of his main jobs was to drive the supply wagon into Del Rio events, they were married October 14, 1909.

During 1910, the partnership began to have business reverses and by the end of that year went broke. Everything they had was lost.

At that time, C.W. Post was busy developing Post City as a model town at a site he had selected about 40 miles southeast of Lubbock.

He was also subdividing a large part of his ranch into model farms which were sold on very favorable terms.

Post City did not have an abstract firm. The railroad was coming and with all the activity in land and real estate, an abstractor was needed.

Mr Post persuaded Mr Pickett to come to Post and open an abstract business. At the same time, he employed Pickett in the Double U Company as manager of farm loan, a job he held until his death in 1928.

The Double U Company was the name of the holding company Post formed to manage the development and sale of all this farm and town property.

Mr Pickett moved his wife and five month old son from Lubbock on January 8, 1911. They established themselves in a two story house on West 11th Street, where they lived the rest of their lives.

Five of their six children were born there. This home is directly across the street from the home of Dr and Mrs A.C. Surman. Agnes Surman came to Post in 1914 at the request of Mrs Pickett, her cousin, to teach school near Justiceburg.

Julia Pickett also invited her brother, Edward L. Robertson, to come on a visit and he took up residence in Post.

Ed Robertson bought a home next door to the Picketts. With six children in the Pickett family, two in the Surman family and two in the Robertson family, much mingling took place, and life's joys and sorrows were shared among these families. Festive days were celebrated at one home or the other. All 10 children were musically inclined and a variety of instruments could be heard through open windows as practicing took place. Charlie Pickett was a man of honor and integrity -- courteous, kind and gentle. Julia Pickett waws a stately handsome woman. She was a dynamo of ambition, determinatin and ability, tempered with modesty, charm and intelli-

ies. The two story home of the Picketts on West 11th burned to the ground in 1946.

Julia Pickett's determination that all her children should have a college education was largely realized. All six attended college, four of them earning degrees to the bachelor or masters level.

Charles Lewis, Jr. (III) lived in Lafayette, La., had two sons and one daughter. Elizabeth is now Mrs Foster Davis and lives in Crowell, Texas. She has a son and a daughter. Lyall is married to Robert S. Davis. They live in Austin and are parents of one son and one daughter. Of the twins, Agnes and Arnold (who were named for Dr and Mrs A.C. Surman), Agnes is living in Houston and is Mrs Agnes Muller. She had three daughters, the oldest of who died in January 1985.


Arnold lived in Houston most of his adult life and had three daughters and a son.

In March of 1984 he moved to Wimberly, Texas, there on December 23, 1984, he died suddenly.

Lois, now Mrs S.J. Puddicombe, lives in Spring, Texas, and has a son and four daughters.

Charles Lewis Pickett died March 23, 1900 in Lafayette, Louisiana. He subscribed to the "Post Dispatch" for many decades after he left Post, and kept his bank account in Post until the 1980's. He was a pioneer of offshore drilling and conceived the unitization concept for maximizing production from oil formations. He was superintendent of production for Chevron from 1945 until 1975.

Charles Lewis Pickett IV and V live in Lafayette, Louisiana as does "Charles's" widow, Mamie B. Pickett.



In the beginning, he was a real tenderfoot knowing nothing about ranch work.

About 1900 he moved to San Antonio where he worked as a bookkeeper for a wholesale grocer.

Around 1903 he moved to Coleman, where he worked for an abstractor learning the abstract business and also the real estate business.

He moved to Lubbock about 1906.

There he formed a partnership with two other men to become Penny, Pickett and Penny. They had a real estate business, an abstract business, and a drug store.

Julia Florence Robertson was born on a farm near Independence in Washington County, Texas, on February 10, 1888.

Her father moved his family to a farm near Ganado in Jackson County, Texas where she grew up. She came to Lubbock in 1908 because of her cousin, Mrs Joseph Penny, who wrote Julia that one of her husband's partners, C.L. Pickett, needed a secretary.

Julia, who had just finished business school at Beaumont, Texas, went to Lubbock where she was employed by Mr Pickett. Through the usual course of



gence. In 1908 there were very few automobiles in Lubbock. Mrs Pickett had the distinction of being the first woman in Lubbock to drive a car -- a dubious distinction since it was considered to be unladylike.

Modern in her taste, she was one of the first women in Post to cut her hair and wear it short.

She always helped her husband run their abstract business which they established as a sideline to the work Mr Pickett did for the Double U Company.

Mr Pickett died December 22, 1928, and Mrs Pickett continued to run the abstract company and rear and educate the six children. In 1932, she married Walter W. Hyde, an engineer who was building the highway between Post and Lubbock.

He remained in Post and later became mayor of the town. Mrs Pickett-Hyde died October 18, 1933.

She had played an important part in the development of cultural and social life in Post, organizing study clubs, bringing music teach-ers to the town and giving the young people a place to gather.

Many a teenage dance was held in the Pickett living room, furniture pushed back, rugs rolled up and carried out, and always hot chocolate or lemonade and cook-

A family code assault was filed April 27 against a 23 year old. He remains in custody.



Scholarship to honor L.E. "Sonny" Nance

The Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show has established an endowment scholarship fund at Texas Tech University in Lubbock to honor L.E. 'Sonny' Nance of Haslet, long-time Livestock Show Secretary.

The Show Executive Committee directed that a contribution in the amount of \$50,000 to be placed in the L.E. 'Sonny' Nance Endowment Scholarship Fund, and further that the earnings be used as scholarships to deserving young people pursuing a career in animal science and/or agriculture economics.

Nance, who has been a member of the Stock Show Board of Directors since 1962, was graduated from Texas Tech in 1941, receiving a degree in animal husbandry. At Tech, he excelled as a member of the school's livestock and meats judging teams. Following service in the Army during World War II, Nance entered the

commercial Hereford business and in 1955 began his registered Hereford operation. He is a general partner of Hall-Nance Ranches, Ltd.

"We are extremely pleased to honor Sonny Nance with this scholarship program," said W.R. Watt, Jr., Stock Show president/manager. "His long involvement with our Show and his trusted counsel attest to his dedication to the advancement of the livestock industry through education."

Nance still has ranching interests in Garza County. He is the son of the late Elton and Lillian Nance, Garza County pioneers, and the brother of Bonnie Stewart of Post.

Congressman Edwards predicted passage of a balanced budget

U.S. Congressman Chet Edwards. representative of the 11th Congressional District, today predicted the passage of a balanced Constitutional budget amendment within the year. At a press conference held at the Texas Farm Bureau state headquarters here, Edwards reaffirmed his commitment, and that of like-minded Democratic colleagues, to make the balanced budget amendment a reality in 1992.

"We will do whatever is necessary to see that the House can vote this year," he vowed, indicating that he would draft a discharge petition forcing the issue to the Floor is necessary.

Edwards insists a unique "window of opportunity" for the passage of H.J. Res. 290, sponsored by Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford), now exists. Three pressures, he said, are coming to bear on Capitol Hill-which lead him to believe "the time has come" for its success.

"First, the American people are demanding reform throughout this country ... second, the hot check writers in the House can't afford not to support it ... and third, it is not morally correct or morally fair to mortgage the opportunities of our children by continuing to spend their future earnings," he told members of the press.

Stenholm also expressed optimism. "With the new enthusiasm from some of our younger members, along with the continuing work of others, I believe we are closer that we have ever been to passing this amendment," he predicted. "The people of the United States have been telling Congress for years that they want this amendment and I believe this may well be the year Congress finally listens."

* Though it is pefectly natural to identify with your children, and want them to be successful, be careful not to live out your own dreams through them. play. * During games and practices, leave the coaching to the coach. It confuses players when they get instructions from more than one source.

Years from now, it won't matter whether an athlete could field a line drive or make a left-handed lay-up at age twelve. Waste Management & Water Quality Concerns Addressed

The newest "buzz words" of late seem to deal with water quality and waste management. Don't think for a minute that we have been spared the burden in Garza County - we haven't! All across the state of Texas the major item of concern is water quality and conservation as well as waste management. Our local land fill is apparently living on borrowed time and it has got to be a concern to all citizens about the future of our waste sites and disposal.

Water is certainly in the news and HOW! We are all familiar with the Edwards Aquifer and the city of San Antonio. Who knows what the future holds for irrigation and home water use. As you can well see, these issues are sure to touch the lives of most every Texan and we must all be concerned about the future and possible management plans.

To help the citizens of Garza County plan and utilize possible management techniques, a series of meetings has been planned for the first week of May.

On Monday, May 4 a Town Hall meeting will be held to discuss the future of the county landfill. The meeting is a joint effort of the County Commissioners Court, the City of Post and the Texas Water

Commission. The meeting will kick off at 7:30 p.m. in the Community Center and will promise to hold some important topics for everyone.

In addition, The Texas Agricultural Extension Service will hold a special meeting on Thursday, May 7 at 7 p.m. in the Community Center. In conjunction with National Safe Drinking Water Week, our office will sponsor the "Water Smart / Don't Bag It Campaign.

Topics in the program will in-clude: Home Water Conservation, Home Water Safety and the Texas Don't Bag It program, aimed at decreasing home landscape wastes in local landfills. All of these topics have major implications for folks right here at home and the program will be aimed at not only preserving our water supplies but management and home wate quality as well. The Texas Don't Bag It program has received recognition across the United States for waste management effectiveness. These same techniques can be applied to our Garza County issues very well.

Make plans to be in attendance at two of the most informative meetings in 1992 and mark your calendar for these two dates. Most of all feel free to call our office if we can answer questions and watch for more program details in next week's issue.
