Post Head Start Registration

The South Plains Head Start will be taking phone calls from those interested in enrolling their three or four year old child in the Post Home Base Program. Calls can be made to the Post Home Base Center at 495-4037. In a home base program the teacher comes to the home one day a week to work with the parent and child. The Post program includes Justiceburg, Southland and Two Draw. This preschool program is offered to eligible families of children who will be three years old or older on or before September 1, 1992. Eligibility is based upon income and/or handicapping condition. For eligible children there will be no cost for the services. If your child is three or four years old and has a handicapping condition and or special needs, she/he can receive services through the South Plains Head Start Program. The services include educational diagnosis, visual treatments and aids, speech and dental treatment, referrals, on-sight teaching, and travel to and from service sights. No child seeking admission to this program will be discriminated against because of his/her race, creed, color, sex, national origin, or handicapping condition. Applications will be taken in June. If you are interested and leave your name, address and phone number at the Center we will be able to contact you in June to take the applications.

Pre-School Round-Up

Summer program expected to help youth Commissioners support Meal Program

A summer program of two free meals daily for any aged child 18 or younger, augmented by special youth activities funded by a state grant, received the support of the Garza County Commissioners' Court at its regular meeting last Monday morning.

County agents Ann Nobles and John Senter explained the meal program and Judge Giles Dalby informed commissioners that funding for activities and youth counselors would be provided through the state grant for prevention of juvenile crime.

Nobles said that the meal program, which is open to all youth regardless of economic situation, is funded through a Texas Department of Human Services and U.S. Department of Agriculture program. The breakfast and noon meals will be served to youth through June and July at the Post ISD cafeteria.

"We see this as a great opportunity to help our young people during the summer months and to offer special programs designed just for them," Nobles said.

In other action, commissioners approved funding at \$200 per precinct for the Soil Conservation District trust fund for technical assistance.

A request for an additional phone line to the tax assessor's office was approved following an explanation by Assessor Collector Chita Hataway. "The volume of telephone calls keeps our one line busy most of the day," she explained, "this will improve our service to the taxpayers."

A request for assistance in remodeling the service center building was postponed until a study of the costs could be determined.

Constable Mike Harper's request to use a county vehicle for his office was approved. Dalby explained that constables will be serving most of the process papers for the sheriff, which will free up the deputies for law enforcement duties.

Sheriff Kenny Ratke informed the court that the recent jail inspection will be reviewed in the near future with a return visit by the inspector. Ratke recommended the court withhold immediate action on repairs until the return visit was completed.

The court set Wednesday, May 27 as the next scheduled meeting to accommodate the Memorial Day holiday, the regular date.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Herb Walls, John Valdez, Albert Stone, Sammy Ellis, Judge Dalby, clerk Sonny Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

HIV, AIDS education gets attention from school staff

Health officials indicate that the serious communicable diseases, AIDS and HIV, are having a major impact on society and the seriousness of the diseases are affecting everyone, whether by exposure to the media stereo-typing or by the actual contraction of the disease.

Education is taking on a primary role in the attempt to stop the spread of HIV and AIDS and public educators have determined that awareness of the serious nature of the disease is the best way to fight the epidemic.

Pat Thompson, Post Independent School District (ISD) counselor, has recently attended workshops on the subject of HIV and AIDS education. From these workshops she was able to present alarming facts and information to school board members at the regular meeting in April.

During her presentation, Thompson summarized the positions of the Texas Education Agency (TEA), the Center for Disease Control, the National School Board Association and the American Association of School Administrators concerning AIDS and the education of the subject for school aged children.

The 11 points Thompson presented to the board were:

1. The World Health Organization reports that one in every 75 males and one in every 450 females in the United States is infected with HIV. Texas Department of Health (TDH) has cited 214 known cases of AIDS in children and adolescents. Best estimates indicate that the number of HIV positive individuals is at least 10 times the number of diagnosed cases.
2. HIV/AIDS education is mandated in Texas as evidenced in the Essential Elements grades pre kindergarten to 12.
3. HIV/AIDS education should be one component of developmentally appropriate, skills-based, comprehensive school health curriculum.
4. Individual districts should decide how to implement the curriculum within the framework of local philosophy and policy (a unified approach involving all levels of school and community is suggested).
5. TEA will release a supplemental HIV curriculum in July 1992.
6. Three TEA communications have addressed the HIV/AIDS issue and more will be released this spring.
7. By law, the school district must provide inservice training on HIV/AIDS.
8. The school district should have a policy which addresses HIV education, HIV positive students and HIV positive personnel.
9. A trained contact person, or "special needs coordinator" should be designated within each district.
10. Confidentiality guidelines must be strictly followed. An individual's school records may not contain any reference to HIV.
11. HIV positive individuals pose no threat to other individuals in the normal school setting.

TEA and health officials have concluded that HIV positive students will be in the school systems, if they are not already present, so school officials must be prepared.

"AIDS is an educational issue that is affecting our nation and our children," Thompson said. "Our kids deserve to understand the basics of the (AIDS) disease."

TEA maintains that this is a delicate situation that should be seriously addressed in a comprehensive health education program and not as an isolated issue. HIV/AIDS should only be one component in the vast program of health education.

This type of action is easier said than actually implemented into a school system.

"When you bring a controversial issue into a conservative community, you begin to deal with moral issues," Thompson said.

During the school board meeting, board members suggested that a committee consisting of a cross-section interest group within the community's population be formed in order to determine the overall feelings of the citizens and what the

most beneficial way would be to deal with the HIV/AIDS education in the Post ISD

The goal of the committee will be to determine the best solution for Post ISD by analyzing the situation and surveying the overall need for assessment and consensus of the community.

By using the TEA curriculum available this summer the committee will be able to tailor a program to fit the needs here.

Because of the quick action taken and the concern expressed by the board members, serious plans can be made and possibly implemented into the district as early as the 1992 fall semester.

Thompson emphasized that it is vitally important that the community support the efforts of the school board and its committee for the sake of the students attending public schools.

"If we (the community) are not behind the school, we are spelling disaster," Thompson added.

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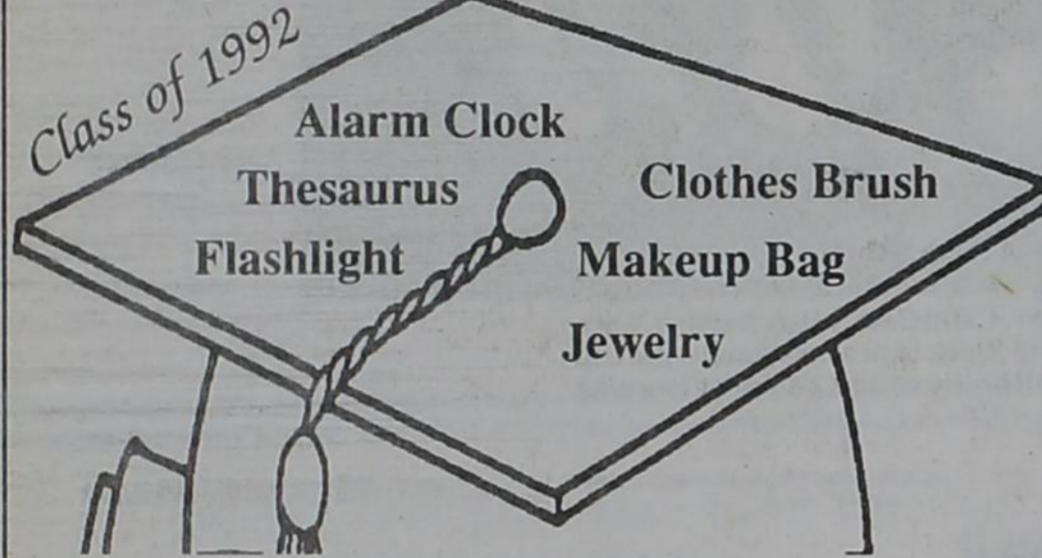

"Today's beef -- it's not what you think!"

A few years ago when researchers discovered that the American diet was too high in cholesterol, beef was one of the culprits identified as contributing to the problem.

Since that time the beef industry has made much progress toward reducing the total fat on the carcass consequently reducing cholesterol also. In the 1950s the animals produced for meat were short, squatty and fat. Today's beef producer takes to market a lean animal with much more muscle much less fat.

Supermarkets have done their parts by increasing the amount of fat which they trim from the beef before it goes into the meat case. In the 1950s the trim was 1/2" of fat. Today's trim is 1/8" fat left on the outside of the meat. As a result beef purchased in the supermarket today is 27% leaner than it was in 1986 when standard trim was 1/4".

Consumers must do their part, too. American Dietetics Association/USDA in their Dietary Guidelines recommends that adults eat 6-7 ounces of lean meat, fish or poultry per day in three ounce servings at two meals. People frequently servings larger than three ounce of all protein foods. Serving size is very important. When eaten in the recommended three ounce serving beef compares

favorably with poultry and other protein foods.

Beef is a very nutrient dense food. If you are on a 2000 calorie diet and you eat three ounces of beef you are well within the limits at 185 calories or 10% of calories. For that you get 45% or your Recommended Daily Allowances of protein, good amounts of iron, zinc, thiamin, vitamin B2, niacin, and 79% of allowance of vitamin B12. Be sure when eating beef to remove any visible fat with your knife. Trimming the fat will always cut down on fat content, but don't add more back by chicken frying your beef.

When shopping be sure to buy the leanest cuts available. A good rule of thumb -- anything that has round or loin in the name will be a leaner cut. Choose top round, top loin, round tip, eye of round, sirloin, and tenderloin.

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Property Tax Protest and Appeal Procedures

The law gives property owners the right to protest actions concerning their property tax appraisals. You may follow these appeal procedures if you have a concern about:

- the value placed on your property.
- any exemptions that may apply to you
- the cancellation of an agricultural appraisal
- the taxable status of your property
- the local governments which should be taxing your property
- any action taken by the appraisal district that adversely affected you.

Informal Review

Property owners are urged to contact the appraisal district and use the informal review process if they have questions about, or disagreements with the value placed on their property. Phone (806) 495-3518.

Review by the Appraisal Review Board

If you can't resolve your problem informally with the appraisal district staff, you may have your case heard by the appraisal review board (ARB).

The ARB is an independent board of citizens that reviews problems with appraisals or other concerns listed above. It has the power to order the appraisal district to make the necessary changes to solve problems. If you file a written request for an ARB hearing (called a notice of protest) before the deadline, the ARB will set your case for a hearing. You'll receive written notice of the time, date and place of the hearing. The hearing will be informal. You and the appraisal district representative will be asked to present evidence about your case. The ARB will make its decision based on the evidence presented. You can get a copy of a protest form from the appraisal district office at 124 E. Main, Post, Texas.

Note: You shouldn't try to contact ARB members outside of the hearing. The law requires ARB members to sign an affidavit saying that they haven't talked about your case before the ARB hears it.

Review by the District Court

After it decides your case, the ARB must send you a copy of its order by certified mail. If you're not satisfied with the decision, you have the right to appeal to district court. If you choose to go to court, you must start the process by filing a petition within 45 days of the date you receive the ARB's order. If the appraisal district has appraised your property at \$1,000,000 or more, you must file a notice of appeal with the chief appraiser within 15 days of the date you receive the ARB's order.

Deadline for Filing Protests with the ARB*

Usual Deadline

On or before May 31 (or 30 days after a notice of appraised value was mailed to you, whichever is later).

Late protests are allowed if you miss the usual deadline for good cause. Good cause is some reason beyond your control, like a medical emergency. The ARB decides whether you have good cause.

Late protests are due the day before the appraisal review board approves records for the year. Contact your appraisal district for more information.

Special Deadlines

For change of use (the appraisal district informed you that you are losing agricultural appraisal because you changed the use of your land), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

For ARB changes (the ARB has informed you of a change that increases your tax liability and the change didn't result from a protest you filed), the deadline is before the 30th day after the notice of the determination was mailed to you.

If you believe the appraisal district or ARB should have sent you a notice and did not, you may file a protest until the day before taxes become delinquent (usually February 1). The ARB decides whether it will hear your case based on evidence about whether a required notice was mailed to you.

* The deadline is postponed to the next business day if it falls on a weekend or a holiday.

Misty Bartlett comes from a golf family, so the win at Regionals was particularly important for her. "My brother (Mike) and my father (Jimmie) just missed going to Austin by three

strokes. When we won (the playoff) and everyone was crying, I said to my brother, 'I'm going to state. I'm going to get to do what you came so close to doing.' When asked what it was like to go to State as a Freshman, Tonya Hart looks forward to establishing a tradition. "From here on out this is a tradition for us to go to state. We have a tradition in track and football, now we will have one in golf." With the younger players coming up to join the two freshman and one sophomore on this year's team, Tonya might just be on to something.

Tradition. This year the Lady 'Lopes' have established a tradition of winning on the golf course. But even more than that, they have established a way of supporting each other and developing into a true team. The girls encourage one another as they play and keep each other focused on the task at hand. It is a tradition from which we all could learn. The girl's goal this week is to take home a medal, but more importantly to do their best. For a group of spirited golfers from Post, this tradition could be one that turns to gold.

400 meter relay, 100 meter dash at state

When the State track meet gets underway this weekend in Austin, the title of fastest man in the state could just belong to Post High's Henry Reed.

Reed will be competing in the tightly contested 100 meter run. Reed's qualifying time is only 5/100 of a second off of the fastest qualifier, Chad Hicks of Beckville.

Henry is fresh off a photo finish in the Regional meet in which he was edged out by Myron Cook of Stamford. Cook was clocked in the 100 meters at 10.85 seconds. Reed finished second with an official time of 10.86.

Reed placed fifth in the qualifying. Cook was fourth behind Hick's time of 10.81.

The field for the race is tightly bunched as the qualifying times show. Toby Noe of Van Alstyne qualifies second with a time of 10.83. Curtis Wilson of Welmar clocked a time 10.84 to earn the fourth position in the field of eight. With a field that is only separated by 14/100 of a second, look for this year's 100 meter State Championship to be one of the best ever.

The Lady 'Lopes also send their speedsters into State competition. Sara Alexander anchors the 400 meter relay team that won easily at Regionals. Ranetta Cruse, who broke a school record in the high jump but did not qualify for State, now pins her hopes for State gold on a fast start for the 400 meter team. The Lady Lopes posted the third fastest qualifying time in Regional competition by running a 50.31 in

Only 8/100 of a second separate the rest of the field for the event. The girls hope to follow on the success of Lady 'Lope relay teams of the past few years as they race for the gold in Austin.

The 400 meter relay team will run at noon on Saturday. Reed races in the 100 Meter Dash at 1:15 pm on Saturday. All of the Track and Field events take place at Memorial Stadium in Austin.

Living on the Edge of the Caprock

Black spot affecting rose bushes
Local rose enthusiasts may have noticed problems with rose bushes of late. The premature leaf shedding, yellowing and poor appearance of many bushes is caused by a fungus known as Black Spot. Close examination of suspected plants should show black spots on the leaves, stems and canes. The spots may range in size from one-eighth to one-half inch or greater in diameter. Spots can appear on the leaf surface, twigs and or canes. Infected leaves will turn yellow and soon drop off the plant.

This, in turn, can result in an unattractive, weakened plant. Few blossoms are produced and advanced cases can endanger the infected bushes' life. The organism that causes Black Spot is one of many fungi that normally attack ornamentals. As with most fungus type diseases, the disease develops under wet conditions and temperatures ranging from 75-80 degrees.

Control on Black spot can be achieved by regular applications of approved fungicides. Some formulations and chemical names which can be used are: Captan, Benlate, Dithane or Manzate. These are only a few of the many fungicides that have clearance for use on roses and control of Black Spot. Any chemicals that specifically list roses and Black Spot control on the package label will also work well.

Keep in mind that, as with any fungicide, control can only be gained by keeping a film of the chemical on the infected plant. A religious spray schedule of 7-10 days must be followed if results are to be acceptable. Say for instance, spray is applied today and we receive a summer time shower in a day or two. In order to reactivate control, you must apply another application of your chosen fungicide as soon as the bush dries. All fungicides which control Black Spot are contact fungicides so, keep a film on your plants and reapply a new film at the recommended intervals.

Any applications made now will not cure the infected leaves, it will only serve to protect the uninfected parts of the plant. As with any chemical, make certain that you read and follow all label directions. You are responsible for knowing the proper ways to use any products.

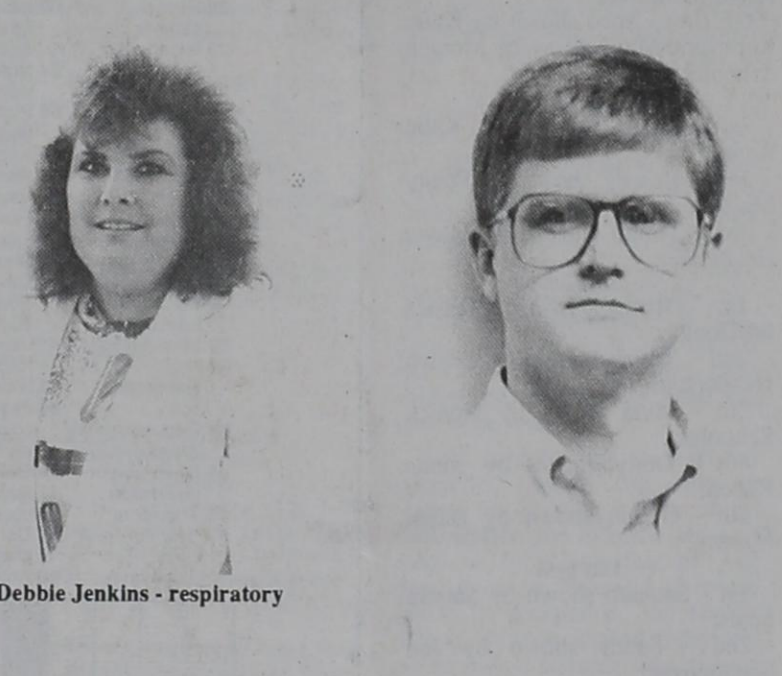
