Air conditioning approved for schools

Post ISD trustees include project for summer

Meeting in an emergency called meeting Wednesday, June 17, the Post Independent School District board of trustees approved the air conditioning of the Middle School and High School as part of a series of projects that have been on the "drawing board."

An amendment to the motion by Royce Hart was approved to include the wording, "the board presumes that the old bids are still in effect."

In other action, the board approved painting and repairs to the old field house, the athletic facility and the vocational building.

A motion to paint the floor of the new workout facility failed with three members opposed and three in favor. Following a discussion about the cost of placing more expensive materials on the floor, the board accepted a motion by Jeff Lott, seconded by Rex Cash, to paint the existing floor of the facility. Voting for the motion were Lott, Cash, Hart and S. Rafe Foreman. Barbara Hardin opposed the motion.

Resurfacing of the track was also approved, with Foreman voting in opposition. Tennis court resurfacing was also approved, again with Foreman voting against the project.

All trustees voted in favor of a motion to redraw the plans for a new gymnasium, eliminating earlier plans for a racquetball court and band hall. Plans are expected to be ready for board review at the July 2 meeting.

A discussion about updating the science lab at the high school was tabled until the July 14 meeting.

Attending the meeting were trustees Hardin, Hart, Lott, Cash, Mark Kirkpatrick and Foreman.

Corrections to jail standards inspection less costly than expected

Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke informed the Commissioners' Court at its regular meeting Monday morning that recent discussions with the jail standards inspector provided "fairly inexpensive" ways to correct problems cited on a previous inspection.

Ratke said that the inspector, who visited last week, explained how the old generator could be used with minor modifications and that an industrial sized exhaust fan could be used in emergencies instead of remodeling the jail. The court authorized the sheriff to begin making the corrections.

Commissioners approved the lone bid of \$6.25 per acre on leasing of 185.47 acres of county owned land in Bailey County. The bid from Tim Cannon for three years amounts to \$1,160.62 per year.

The court approved a one time emergency rent and utility assistance to a family, for a total of \$175.

No decisions were made on repairs to the old jail, but the court authorized clerk Sonny Gossett to continue investigation into the best methods for making the building useable for storage of documents.

City council member and community center board chairman Larry Mills presented a report to the court concerning funding of the center. He explained briefly the history of the joint funding and outlined details of the budget. The report included various cost-cutting efforts.

Mills said that the center board is reluctant to hire a new director without knowing how much could be allocated for salary and benefits. "In the past the

director has been included in the county payroll with county benefits," he said, "and we really don't know now how we stand on that, it will change the entire compensation package."

No action was taken on the report, but Judge Giles Dalby said the court will carefully consider the issue during budget preparations.

Judge Dalby also reminded commissioners of the important Texas Water Commission hearings in Midland Wednesday, June 24 concerning the solid waste management regulations. The hearings will include ideas from West Texas cities and counties on the proposed rules. Dalby said that he had been requested by Mayor Jim Jackson to speak for the City of Post and Garza County at the hearing.

Dalby emphasized the value of the summer food and recreation program now being conducted for youth here. "We fed as many as 200 at lunch and more than 100 are involved in the recreation program."

Dalby and the commissioners signed a letter of protest the Texas Health Department concerning the department's plan to include all counties in the Occupational Safety and Health Administration Federal Registry. "This will cost us approximately \$75,000 the first year and as much as \$30,000 annually," Dalby said. An example of the regulations is the cost of measuring noise generated by heavy equipment and its effect on operators.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Sammy Ellis, Albert Stone, John Valdez and Herb Walls, Judge Dalby, clerk Gossett and treasurer Ruth Ann Young.

'The Wrong Husband' has the right stuff...

If you like to laugh, and who doesn't, the current Garza Theater production of "The Wrong Husband" is a must see.

The Neil and Caroline Schaffner written and Jane Prince-Jones directed play is a fast paced comedy with lots of sight gags, intriguing comic situations, and numerous one liners.

The play is set in the Florida beach house of bachelor Ted Merriweather. Merriweather has inherited a vast fortune which has been set in trust for him.

As the play progresses, the audience finds out the unending lengths Merriweather will go in order to increase his allowance from the trust being administered by his penny pinching Aunt, Martha Jones.

Merriweather, although single, has told his Aunt that he is married to get more allowance from his trust fund. From this lie, Merriweather continues to get deeper in to trouble, especially when his eccentric Aunt shows up unexpectedly to meet her new niece.

This sends Merriweather and his friends, Donna and Claude Light foot into a frenzy to cover Ted's story.

The events which proceed from this cover-up provide the audience with some great comic moments including a particularly funny bed hopping scene in which it is hard to tell whom is sleeping with whom.

All of the action is well staged and contains no adult innuendo, making the show an excellent outing for the whole family.

Jon Steele is excellent in his portrayal of the excitable bachelor, Ted Merriweather. Jon's facial expressions as he is trying to come up with stories to cover the flaws in his previous story let the audience see the panic of the young man about to be disinherited.

Jon's delivery of the one liners is quick and witty, yet given in such a way that the audience feels Ted's confusion and uncertainty.

The best performance of the show is turned in by the graceful Cassie Coker, who plays Donna Lightfoot.

Donna gets caught up in this lie unintentionally and finds herself pretending to be Ted's husband, all under the scrutiny of her husband, Claude.

Coker's performance is very true to life as she is torn between trying to get her real husband to pay some attention to her and keep her unreal husband (Ted certainly is unreal) out of trouble with his aunt.

Cassie's stage presence lets the audience feel the frustration of Donna with her husband, her compassion for their friend, and her calming effect on the rest of the characters while effortlessly delivering her lines.

Dr. Charles Sommerville plays Donna's husband, Claude Lightfoot, a bumbling author who takes his wife for granted. Charles turns in an excellent performance, particularly in delivering some intentionally transposed lines.

This is difficult for any actor at any level of performance and Charles carries the lines with great ease of delivery. Charles is also very convincing as Claude gets his revenge on Ted and Donna late in the play and makes the two feel the jealousy which he has felt throughout all three acts.

Ethel Lewis has some glowing moments as Ted's man hating housekeeper, Myra Tackleberry. Ethel plays this minor role convincingly as the audience finds out just exactly how much a man hater she is at the end of act two.

Alison Hoefler, who plays Ted's fiancée Cindy Bland, is wonderful in the play also. Alison only has a small part in this production but her talent is on par with the entire cast of this production. We hope to see more of this fine actress in other Garza theater productions.

Bern Case plays the drunken Hubert Lashwell. His stumbling around the set provides a majority of the sight gags in the play and Bern performs these physical stunts with finesse and ease.

The set design by Charles Wallace is unique. The main room

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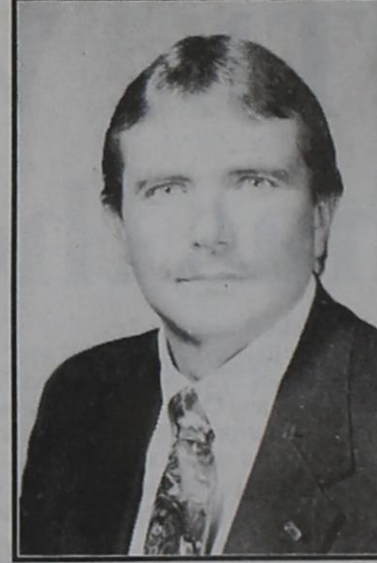
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Keitha White honored at shower

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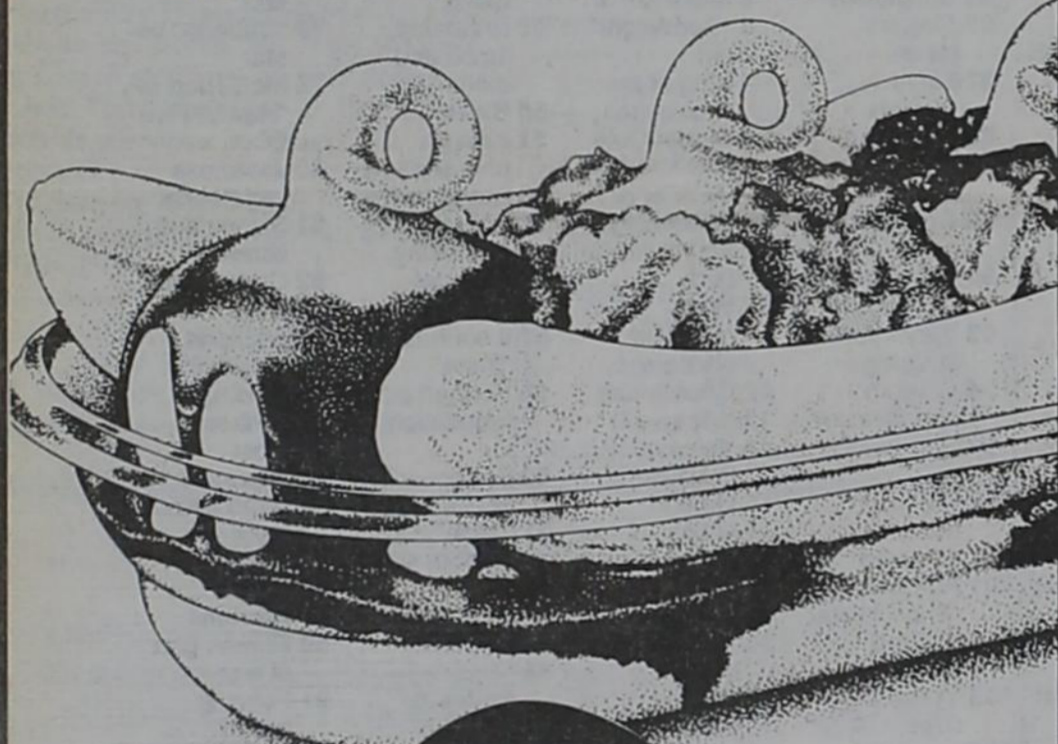
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Third annual kids-n-art contest encourages young artist's work

Young pitchers risk arm injury

Houston - young baseball players aspiring to be the next Nolan Ryan should worry less about arm strength and more about pitching technique, says an orthopaedic surgeon and sports medicine specialist at Methodist Hospital.

"Teenagers think that if they get stronger with weight training, they can throw harder," says Dr. William J. Bryan, who is also a team physician for the Houston Astros. "That's not true at all. Arm Strength has nothing to do with being able to pitch well. If that were true, Arnold Schwarzenegger would be Nolan Ryan."

"Pitching is kind of like golf," Bryan continues. "You don't hit the ball further because you're stronger, you hit it further because your mechanics are better."

Ironically, says Bryan, pitchers usually have the weakest arms and the strongest legs on major league teams.

He says parents of young players should encourage their kids to learn the fundamentals and forget about throwing fast. Trying to throw beyond ones ability is a frequent cause of injury and soreness in pitchers, especially adolescents.

"It's rare for a seven or eight year old to hurt himself by throwing to hard because kids that age can't throw very fast anyway, and Little League regulations prohibit throwing to frequently," says Bryan. "But when a kid turns 13 or 14 and is able to throw faster, there's a good chance of injury."

Bryan encourages parents to use instructional videotapes to teach kids proper pitching techniques. For those who ignore the warnings and injure themselves trying to throw to hard, Bryan says rest is the best therapy.

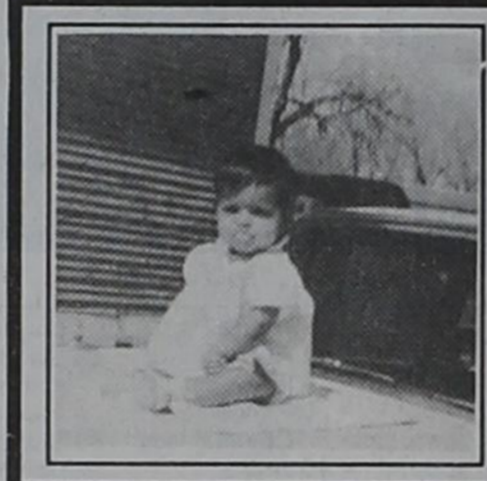
3 on 3 tournament set

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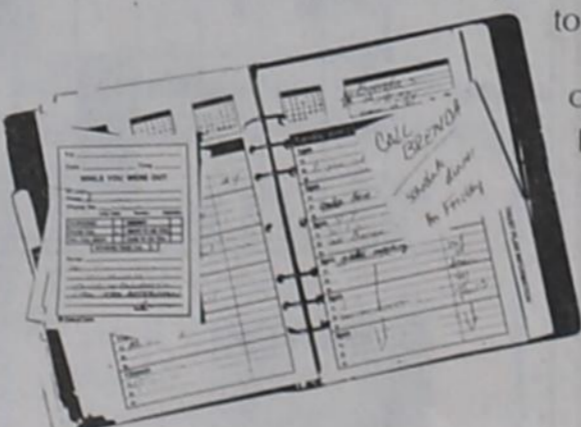
