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City and county working toward expanding landfill

A meeting last week in Midland brought a ray of hope to city and county officials, who discovered that the Texas Water Commission is likely to implement special exemptions for cities the size and location of Post for operating landfills.

Although the proposed exemptions are not now considered official, they are being discussed seriously by state officials in preparation for implementation in January 1993.

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby, who spoke on behalf of the City of Post and Garza County at the hearing, reports that the state has not filed the application with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency to maintain jurisdiction on landfills in Texas.

"They are expected to complete that application in January," Dalby said, "and then issue the rules."

The reason Dalby and Mayor Jim Jackson, who also attended the meeting, are cautiously optimistic is the airing in Midland of the so-called "West Texas Plan" for landfills. Others attending the meeting in Midland were city manager Bob Turner and commissioners Herb Walls and Albert Stone.

The exemptions being discussed would allow for landfill operations to be exempt from the more stringent EPA recommended rules where the landfill is operated by a city with less than 25 inches of rainfall per year... which fits Post.

Another category is that the city must haul less than 20 tons of solid waste per day and have a population less than 8,000.

The site could have no underground water contamination and there must not be any practical alternative.

Garza County and Post would qualify for all of these restrictions. The only alternative is to transport solid waste to a regional landfill, probably Lubbock, approximately 45 miles. This daily transportation expense is deemed unreasonable, according to studies performed by the South Plains Association of Governments.

Dalby said that he expects the city council to begin the process to apply for extension of the current landfill to use the existing 33 additional acres adjacent to the landfill.

The issue is expected to be on the agenda for the city council regular meeting Monday evening.

No decisions have been made, but it looks like a done deal. The estimated expense of submitting an application has not been announced, but the first step of drilling test borings will cost approximately \$85,000.

The only problem with the plan is the possibility that the federal government might not approve the so-called "West Texas Plan," even if the Texas Water Commission issues these exemptions.

It's a gamble the city council must weigh in its decision about spending taxpayers' money.

The alternative would be to wait until January, then decide... but by then the

current landfill will be nearing capacity and would be closed before an extension might be approved. It's a tough call.

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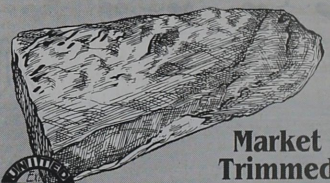


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Melisa Tatum, Steven Roberts exchange wedding vows June 27
