## Divided council calls for hiring local attorney

Mills calls action "a joke"

Calling the vote on a motion to hire a local attorney "a joke," Post city counci
member Larry Mills told fellow council members Monday night member Larry Mills told fellow council members Monday night that they wer
voting "without knowing what you're voting for," and "this is a railroad job if ever saw one."
The motion, submitted by council member Jimmy Holleman, called for
"hiring a local attomey", but did not explain why 20 year veteran city attomey Harvey Moran wastobe relieved of duties.
Council member Jim Schooler tried to clear the air on the motion by pointing out "that the way this sounds, if we vote for this, we are immediately firing

"Mr Holleman," Morton calmly explained, "you were elected to serve on the city council with a form of government that does not give you the authority to
talk directly on city business to the attomey, that responsibility rests with the city manager..." "If
