Council accepts committee report on redistricting

Takes no action on proposed plans

The Post City Council took no action on the proposed "Plan A-1" single member district plan presented by the redistricting committee at the regular session Monday evening. Council members, along with city attorney Harvey Morton, expressed praise to the committee for its work and thanked chairman Marion Cruse, who presented the proposals.

The issue is to be decided in the September meeting. Morton said that in order to proceed in time for next May's municipal elections a decision would have to be made before December.

The committee also offered "Plan C" as an alternative. (see last week's issue of The Post Dispatch for maps showing the two plans).

In other action, the council voted to continue catching dogs through the use of city employees on a contract basis, being paid only for dogs that are caught. The question about violating the Fair Labor Standards Act and potential liability with the Texas Employment Commission was side-stepped by council members in favor of the current practice, "which seems to be working well," council member Larry Mills reported.

The council also authorized city manager Bob Turner to initiate legal proceedings against at least five dog owners whose pets are frequently found loose, but are difficult to catch. The animals are considered dangerous.

Following an executive session, which was held after Mayor Jim Jackson had adjourned the regular session, the council voted to approve merit pay raises for

six employees. No across the board raises were considered.

Next month's meeting was set for September 14, with an August 17 budget work session scheduled at 7 p.m.

After a lengthy discussion, the council voted to authorize submitting an application to the South Plains Association of Governments for a grant to improve housing for qualified low income and elderly homeowners. The grant application is due by August 30.

Jackson reported that as a result of a meeting with the SPAG board last week, the rating for "local effort" was lowered from 100 points to 25 points, which should help Post in the competition for grants. Turner explained that the board was receptive to his explanation of the reasons for Post's low tax and water rates.

An attempt to enter a job description for the city attorney and open the position up for competitive proposals was tabled following a brief discussion of the issue.

Turner recommended that council members attend a public hearing August 13 on the proposed Interstate Highway 27 extension to IH 20. Jackson and Turner will attend the public hearings. "We sure do need to find out what the impact on Post will be," Mills added.

Jackson informed the council that the cemetery board is expected to recommend the repossession of cemetery lots which haven't been paid for.

Attending the meeting were council members Maxine Conoly, Jimmy Holleman, Dan Lamb, Jim Schooler and Mills, mayor Jackson, city manager Turner, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Morton.

The ownership change was effective August 1, 1992.

Newton announced that Wesley Burnett will continue to serve as publisher of the newspaper for an interim period.

"Todd brings to Post a wide range of newspaper experience," Burnett says, "and has innovative ideas for improvements for the Dispatch."

Wes plans to enroll in the post graduate teacher certification program at Texas Tech in preparation for a teaching career.

"Pat and I wish to express our sincere appreciation to the people of Garza County, our valued subscribers and loyal advertisers for the almost 10 years we have served as stewards of the Dispatch," Burnett continues. "We are confident that under Todd's leadership, our readers and advertisers will be well served for years to come."

"I am excited about the future of Post and the Dispatch," Newton says, "this community is blessed with a sense of pride and positive attitudes that are seldom found these days."

"I believe the print media has a bright future for those businesses that will adapt to a changing readership without sacrificing the foundation of established publishing principles," he adds.

Newton began his newspaper career in 1982 following graduation from North Dakota State School of Science where he earned an Associate of Science Degree in Business Management.

His newspaper experiences began with the Sage Publishing Newspapers' Greybull Standard Tribune in Greybull, Wyoming, where Newton was involved in building a staff which produced a 40 percent increase in sales in one year. He also worked in production during that time.

He was later transferred to another Sage Publishing newspaper, the Gillette News Record in Gillette, Wyoming, where he was responsible for advertising sales.

In 1984 he accepted a position in Fargo, North Dakota at The Forum, where Newton specialized in agriculture related marketing.

In 1987 he accepted the position of advertising director and vice president of sales with Morgan Publishing Company in Grafton, North Dakota.

Newton accepted a position with DAK Publishing Co. in Park River, North Dakota in 1988, working with publications owned by the company to determine areas of management that needed restructuring. He also managed five new

acquisitions made by the company during his first year of employment.

He was offered the position of publisher in 1989 of the Tri-State Livestock News in Sturgis, South Dakota and in 1990 was named general manager of DAK Publishing, with responsibilities for the company's 13 publications.

Deadline nears for SBA disaster loan

An Economic Injury Disaster Loan (EIDL) declaration was made in February 1992 affecting agriculture-dependent businesses in several West Texas counties including Garza County as a result of agricultural losses due to drought, hailstorms and excessive rainfall between January 1 and July 19, 1991 and continuing.

Walter Fronstin, district director for the Lubbock office of the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA), said today that the deadline for filing applications under that EIDL declaration is August 31, 1992.

Eligible businesses seeking loan information or applications may call 1-800-366-6303, or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

These loans are intended to assist businesses in offsetting working capital losses which they suffered as a result of the adverse weather reducing the crop income of the area farmers and ranchers.

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Emergency nutrition, temporary funds available

The South Plains Community Action Association, Inc. has announced its receipt of Enterp Oil Overcharge Funds to assist the truly needy in Garza County.
The purpose of this program is to provide assistance to eligible persons experiencing an energy related crisis or energy related emergency. The help is not a utility assistance program.
Priority will be given to eligible households with persons 60 years or older and/or with handicapped persons. This priority does not exclude other income eligible households.
Those interested in the emergency assistance should make application at the Community Action Center from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Applicants should also bring a copy of their utility bill and evidence of income for the past 30 days.
Proof of income may consist of checks, check stubs, award letters, employer statements or other similar documents.

Study funds OK'd for Interstate 20 link

A \$3.6 million feasibility study for a highway link between Lubbock and Interstate 20 was approved today by the Texas Transportation Commission.
Routes through Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Garza, Hockley, Howard, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Terry counties are potential connections between Lubbock and I-20.
The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) was directed by the commission to study the feasibility of alternate routes, prepare environmental reports, complete the public involvement process and begin preliminary engineering for the selected alternate.
The federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA) contains provisions for such studies. ISTEA will provide \$2.9 million, which will be matched by \$725,000 in state funds.

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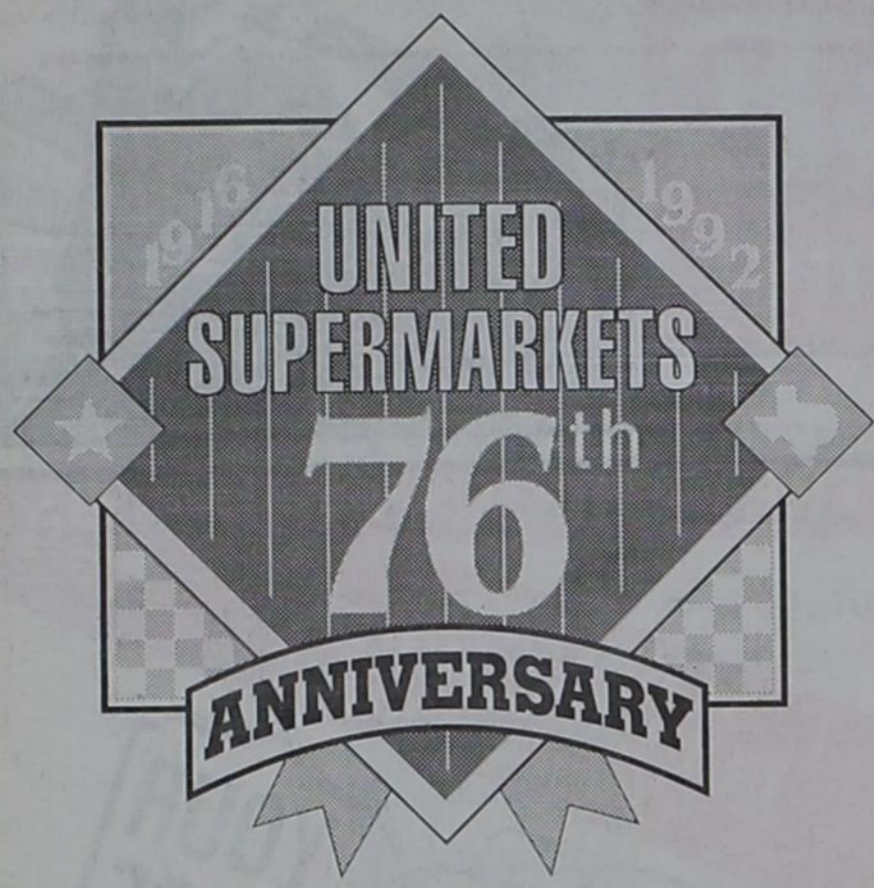

Post girls capture year end rodeo titles

The High Plains Junior Rodeo Association held its Finals this past weekend in Lovington, New Mexico. The three day event, held at the Jake McClure Arena, drew 250 contestants vying for championships in 19 different categories.

Several Garza County residents did well at the event earning year end awards. The youngsters compete in various rodeos throughout West Texas and Eastern New Mexico accumulating points and prize money for the year end totals.

During the final competition, prizes are awarded for the top three finishers in each event and for the top six places in each event for the year.

Emily Smith placed in two events in the eight and under age bracket helping her to place in the year end totals. Emily had the fastest time in goat tying placing her in a second place tie with Post teammate Casey Short. Smith finished third in barrels giving her just enough

points to qualify for the year end award in barrels. She finished sixth in total points for the year.

Cassie Short had an excellent rodeo at the year end event.

Cassie Short used her first place finish in the girl's breakaway roping to propel her into second place for the year. Cassie finished second in the Barrel racing event to secure her first place finish for the year. In addition to cash prizes, Cassie received a buckle for her year round championship in barrels.

Cassie also won year end honors in two other events. She placed second overall in poles and third in goat tying.

Cassie's brother, Casey also had a good rodeo in Lovington placing third in the goat tying. The third place finish allowed him to hold on to second place tie with Emily Smith in the year round standings for the eight and under goat tying. He also finished second in the year round in eight and under breakaway roping.

Cody Cox of Fluvanna won the chute dogging competition in Lovington placing him sixth in the year end standings.

Russ Bird placed third in boy's breakaway roping to finish third in the year round totals for the boy's thirteen to fifteen age group.

One of the most remarkable stories on the High Plains circuit this year has been the performance of Lori Hudman. Lori was seriously injured last year when her horse fell backwards on her in a practice event. Many expected that she would not be competing this year because of the seriousness of her injuries.

But Lori was not to be denied. She finished first in the barrel racing for the year. Barrel Racing is an event which requires control of the animal under all out speed. Lori handled her horse with ease and grace despite her accident last year. She has made a truly miraculous comeback.

Lori also placed fifth in the year round totals for poles. Her only trophy for the Lovington rodeo was earned in barrels as she finished second to solidify her first place year round victory.

Wacey Moore brought home two third place finishes from the Lovington Rodeo. He earned the marks in boy's breakaway roping

and boy's steer stopping for the nine to twelve age bracket.

The performance of the rodeo was turned in by Talina Bird. Talina gathered two first place finishes and one second on her way to capturing numerous year end awards.

Talina competes in the girl's age bracket of thirteen to fifteen. During the rodeo season, she has ridden brilliantly placing high in every year round event except poles.

Talina won the girl's ribbon roping and goat tying at Lovington giving her a first place year round

finish in ribbon roping and a second place award in goat tying.

Bird also won the year round breakaway competition and placed fifth in the barrel competition for the year.

Seven trophy saddles were given to the All Around Champion in the different age brackets. Of the seven championships awarded, two were from Post.

Talina Bird won the all around championship for the year in the thirteen to fifteen year old girl's bracket and Cassie Short brought home the saddle for best all around

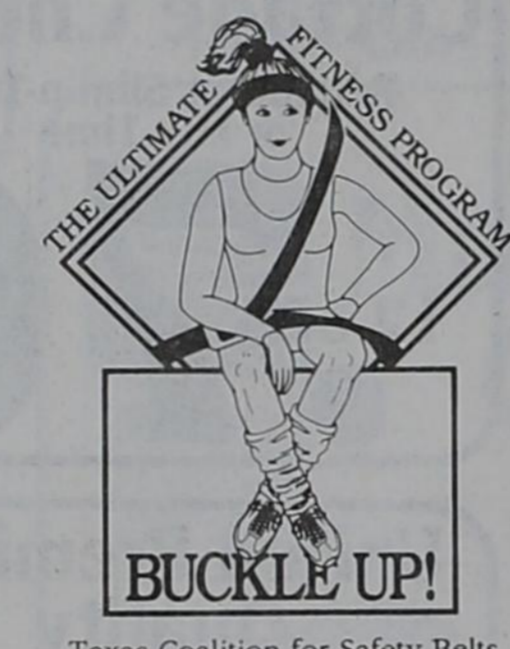
performance in the girl's nine to twelve age bracket.

KTXT to air 'West Tejano Lifestyles'

KTXT-TV Channel 5, Texas Tech University's educational station and the Public Broadcasting Service affiliate for the South Plains, will present a series of 13 locally produced programs titled "West Tejano Lifestyles" Saturday evenings from Aug. 1 through Oct. 24.

According to producer and director Armando Rodriguez, who has been at KTXT for 12 years, the series will look at preserving the past, present and future of the Hispanic culture and traditions in West Texas.

Local history books do not contain adequate information about the important role played by early Hispanic citizens in the development of Lubbock and communities throughout West Texas, he says. The series will help citizens of Lubbock to better understand the customs of the Hispanic culture, which also may help to foster a healthy respect for cultural differences.

"I produced the series because I wanted to help educate the community about the traditions of the Hispanic culture and to remind people about the important role it has played in the development of Lubbock and West Texas communities," he said.

The first two programs of the series will explore the history of the early Hispanic settlers from their struggles and obstacles to their present lifestyle as well as looking at the future.

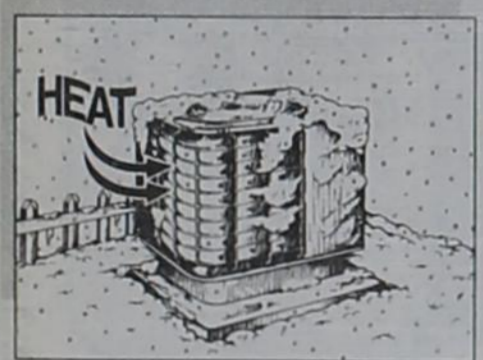

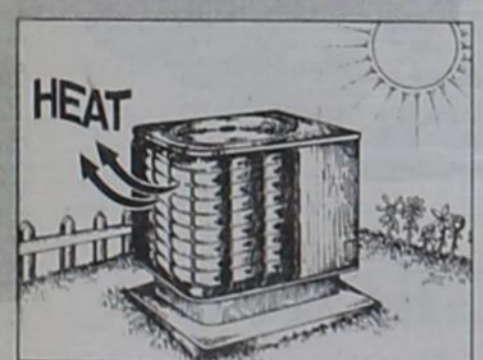

This ANN That

In a few weeks school will be starting again. Where has the time gone? It seems such a short time ago we were thinking about what we would do during the summer holiday from school! As we think about going back to school, we also think about all of the things we intended to do during the summer. Did your family accomplish what you had hoped? If you did not, you might want to take time to talk about what happened to your time and take time together to learn to be a more resourceful time manager.

Time is the only resource everyone in the family has in the same amount. Family members may say, "I don't have time," but they do -- in the same amount as everyone else in the family. The catch is that no two people use their time the same way. How each person spends his or her time shows what that person thinks is important. Learning the value of time and how to use their time for what they really want is a real asset to youth.

To help your kids begin to manage their time wisely try this. At a set time in the evening, when you can talk with your kids, ask them to guess how many of the next 24 hours they will spend:

- *Eating
- *Sleeping
- *Watching TV
- *Listening to music
- *Reading
- *Playing or visiting with friends
- *Working on a project they have
- *Doing things to help around the house
- *Doing things with another family member
- *Playing with a pet
- *Other activities they typically enjoy

Encourage them to write down their guesses. At the same time the next evening, go back to the list and discuss how much time they actually spent compared to what they guessed.

How do they feel about how they used their time? What did they spend more time on than expected and why? Avoid being judgmental. Encourage them to begin thinking about what is important to them and begin the habit of planning to use their time for things that are most important to them.

Another topic for discussion can be "Killing Time." Each person can share how he used time during the day and how he would use it differently. Family members can give each other clues about ways to use time more resourcefully. Youth need "free" time to think and relax. Your goal, as a parent, is to help them be aware of how their choices about how they use their time resource make the difference in what they do and how they feel about each day.

Time management experts stress that time management is self-management. Resourceful youth learn to manage themselves to use their time for things that help them and their family reach their personal and family goals. They learn to get the greatest value for their time.

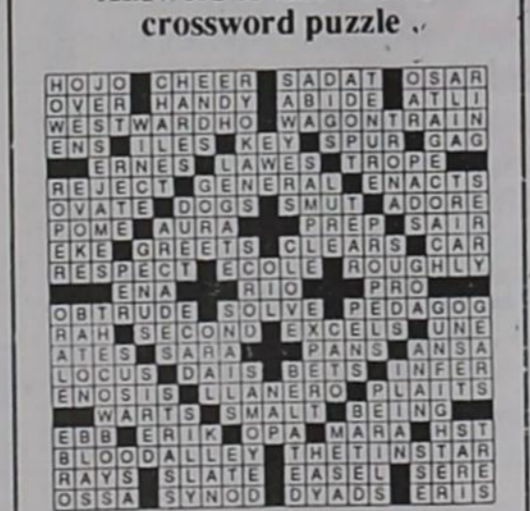

Garza County Extension Agent - Ag County Insect Update and outlook

This past Friday I had the opportunity to spend the day with Tommy Doderlein, Dawson County Extension Entomologist. A report of observations of insects and the outlook for the rest of the summer is in order and hopefully it will help you in your field scouting.

Fleahopper damage was evident in most fields checked. However, very few actual adult insects were found. Blasted squares, indicating the presence of immatures was evident as well. Most of the cotton we looked at is past the stage of serious fleahopper damage. If you have cotton with pin head sized squares you will still need to be on the lookout - be careful in analyzing your spray situation as cotton with very immature squares this late in the game needs to have excellent yield potential in order to justify spraying.

Most cotton in the Graham and Close City gin areas looks fairly good with only a very few fleahoppers and their damage present. Aphids are always on our minds when we start getting into August. Our scouting found only a very few aphids in isolated locations in cotton. Maize fields are not immune to aphids either but, we found no evidence of outbreaks, only a few very small spots held any aphids. Outlook for aphids based on Extension Specialists, still are predicting a possible banner year for aphids. Take time to scout your fields regularly and be ready in case we do get our August batch of aphids. Spraying must be timed accurately. Be careful to save insecticides, such as Bidrin for late season aphids. Any insecticides which worked last year might just be our ace in the hole.

Boll Weevil damage was found in the very northern section of the county, no adult weevils were found. Some worm damage was also found north of town but only a relatively small number of shed bolls were damaged.

All in all, the field reports seem to be pretty good. Insect pressure is fairly light but we're still not out of the woods. Fruit set ranges from very good to moderate and it appears with a little luck, no bugs and a late freeze, we could see a pretty good cotton harvest.

Keep a close eye on your cotton and maize crop, if you have questions or find noteworthy info feel free to call our office or drop by at your earliest convenience.

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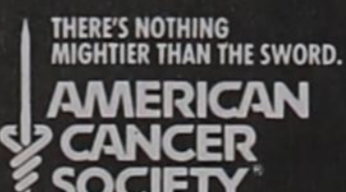
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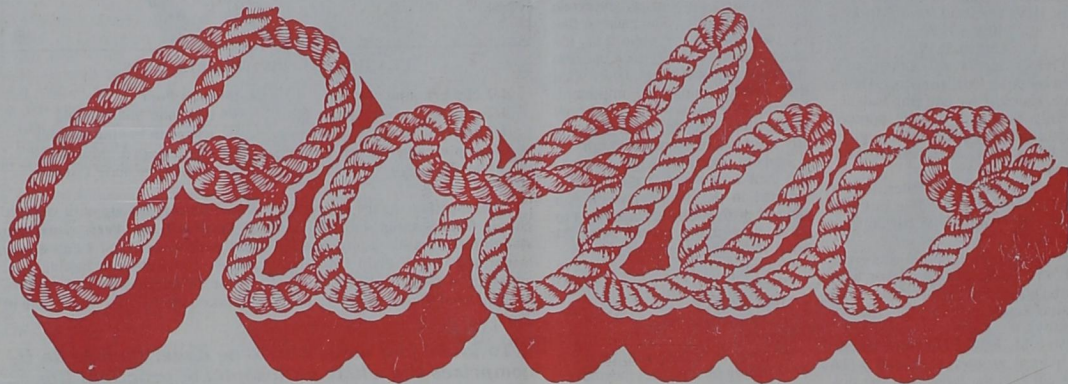

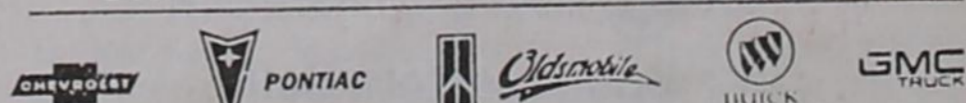

State agency offers interest-free home improvement loans

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) announced today that \$1 million is available statewide for home improvement loans.

Eligible low income homeowners may borrow up to \$15,000 and pay no interest.

The purpose of the program is to assist homeowners in making permanent structural improvements to their home. Eligible improvements must enhance the livability of a home or correct a health or safety problem.

"The Home Improvement Loan Program will help Texans who have always wanted to improve their home, but have never had the opportunity. The monthly payment on a home improvement loan is very affordable because the borrower has a greater period of time to pay back the loan and is not charged interest," said Paul R. Rodriguez, chairman of the board, Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

The term of the loans varies and depends on the amount of money borrowed. Loans between \$1,500 and \$5,000 have a maximum term of 40 years; loans more than \$5,000 and less than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 15 years; and loans more than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 20 years. The minimum monthly payment for a loan is \$25.

In order to be eligible, the borrower must meet qualifying guidelines, have a sufficient income to afford monthly payments and make no more than 80 percent of the area median income.

The 72nd Legislature created TDHCA by merging the former Texas Housing Agency and the former Texas Department of Community Affairs. The Community Development Block Grant was also transferred from the Texas Department of Commerce to TDHCA.

Earlier in the spring she demonstrated the use of the potter's wheel for the High School art classes at Junction, Texas.

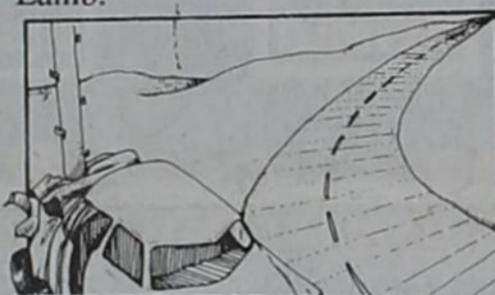
