# Council accepts committee report on redistricting

## Takes no action on proposed plans

by Wes Burnett

The Post City Council took no action on the proposed "Plan A-1" single member district plan presented by the redistricting committee at the regular session Monday evening. Council members, along with city attorney Harvey Morton, expressed praise to the committee for its work and thanked chairman Marion Cruse, who presented the proposals.

The issue is to be decided in the September meeting. Morton said that in order to proceed in time for next May's municipal elections a decision would have to be made before December.

The committee also offered "Plan C" as an alternative. (see last week's issue of The Post Dispatch for maps showing the two plans).

In other action, the council voted to continue catching dogs through the use of city employees on a contract basis, being paid only for dogs that are caught. The question about violating the Fair Labors Standard Act and potential liability with the Texas Employment Commission was side-stepped by council members in favor of the current practice, "which seems to be working well," council member Larry Mills reported.

The council also authorized city manager Bob Turner to initiate legal proceedings against at least five dog owners whose pets are frequently found loose, but are difficult to catch. The animals are considered dangerous.

Following an executive session, which was held after Mayor Jim Jackson had adjourned the regular session, the council voted to approve merit pay raises for

six employees. No across the board raises were considered. Next month's meeting was set for September 14, with an August 17 budget

application is due by August 30.

work session scheduled at 7 p.m. After a lengthy discussion, the council voted to authorize submitting an application to the South Plains Association of Governments for a grant to improve housing for qualified low income and elderly homeowners. The grant

Jackson reported that as a result of a meeting with the SPAG board last week, the rating for "local effort" was lowered from 100 points to 25 points, which should help Post in the competition for grants. Turner explained that the board was receptive to his explanation of the reasons for Post's low tax and water

An attempt to enter a job description for the city attorney and open the position up for competitive proposals was tabled following a brief discussion of

Turner recommended that council members attend a public hearing August 13 on the proposed Interstate Highway 27 extension to IH 20. Jackson and Turner will attend the public hearings. "We sure do need to find out what the impact on Post will be," Mills added.

Jackson informed the council that the cemetery board is expected to recommend the repossession of cemetery lots which haven't been paid for. Attending the meeting were council members Maxine Conoly, Jimmy Holleman, Dan Lamb, Jim Schooler and Mills, mayor Jackson, city manager Turner, city secretary Wanda Wilkerson and city attorney Morton.

In 1984 he accepted a position in Fargo, North Dakota at The Forum, where Newton specialized in agriculture related marketing.


In 1987 he accepted the position of advertising director and vice president of sales with Morgan Publishing Company in Grafton, North Dakota.





A \$3.6 million feasibility study for a highway link between Lub- Routes through Andrews, Borden, Dawson, Ector, Gaines, Garza, Hockley, Howard, Lubbock, Lynn, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry and Terry counties are potential connections between Lubbock and I-20.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) was directed by the commission to study the feasibility of alternate routes, prepare environmental reports, complete the public involvement process and begin preliminary engineering for the selected alternate.

The federal Intermodal Surface Transportation Efficiency Act of 1991 (ISTEA) contains provisions for such studies. ISTEA will provide \$2.9 million, which will be matched by \$725,000 in state funds.

KTXT to air 'West Tejano Lifestyles'

KTXT-TV Channel 5, Texas Tech University's educational station and the Public Broadcasting Service affiliate for the South Plains, will present a series of 13 locally produced programs titled "West Tejano Lifestyles" Saturday evenings from Aug. 1 through Oct. 24.

According to producer and director Armando Rodriguez, who has been at KTXT for 12 years, the series will look at preserving the past, present and future of the Hispanic culture and traditions in West Texas.

Local history books do not contain adequate information about the important role played by early Hispanic citizens in the development of Lubbock and communities throughout West Texas, he says. The series will help citizens of Lubbock to better understand the customs of the Hispanic culture, which also may help to foster a healthy respect for cultural differences.

"I produced the series because I wanted to help educate the community about the traditions of the Hispanic culture and to remind people about the important role it has played in the development of Lubbock and West Texas communities," he said.

The first two programs of the series will explore the history of the early Hispanic settlers from their struggles and obstacles to their present lifestyle as well as looking at the future.

Viewers will learn more about the preparation of Mexican cuisine during the fifth program along with methods of preparation of the area's most popular dishes. The sixth program will address the role of education in the Hispanic culture by looking at the educational role models for youth as well as why the dropout rate of Hispanic students has been particularly high.

Folklorico dance groups will be featured during the seventh program to demonstrate the rich heritage of traditional Mexican dances. The program also will explore the significance of the dances and why they are performed in this area of

the Southwest. The eighth program will present several Hispanic artists and their unique forms of visual self-expression. They will present some of their works as well as discuss individual talents and accomplishments. In particular, the work of Romeo Reyna will be featured. Reyna's tapestry work is displayed in the Lubbock Memorial Civic

Additional programming will focus on traditional Hispanic ceremonies like Quinceaneras and weddings, Cinco de Mayo and the 16th of September independence celebrations. Literature, poetry, drama and Hispanic youth will also be topics of interest.

Rodriguez received a Lubbock City Council grant in 1991 to produce the series. Rodriguez is a graduate of Texas Tech and previously produced programming at KTXT such as Expression, Take Five, Pee Wee's Paints and Pallets, Childcare Professionals and Down the Road Anchor Brothers.

## This ANN That

Home Economics In a few weeks school will be starting again. Where has the time gone? It seems such a short time ago we were thinking about what we would do during the summer holiday from school! As we think about going back to school, we also think about all of the things we intended to do during the summer. Did your family accomplish what you had hoped? If you did not, you might want to take time to talk about what happened to your time and take time together to learn to be a more resourceful time manager.

Time is the only resource everyone in the family has in the same amount. Family members may say, "I don't have time," but they do -in the same amount as everyone else in the family. The catch is that no two people use their time the same way. How each person spends his or her time shows what that person thinks is important. Learning the value of time and how to use their time for what they really want is a real asset to youth.

To help your kids begin to manage their time wisely try this. At a set time in the evening, when you can talk with your kids, ask them to guess how many of the next 24 hours they will spend:

\*Eating \*Sleeping

\*Watching TV \*Listening to music

\*Reading

\*Playing or visiting with friends \*Working on a project they have \*Doing things to help around the

\*Doing things with another family member

\*Playing with a pet \*Other activities they typically

Encourage them to write down their guesses. At the same time the next evening, go back to the list and discuss how much time they actually spent compared to what they guessed.

How do they feel about how they used their time? What did they spend more time on than expected and why? Avoid being judgmental. Encourage them to begin thinking about what is important to them and begin the habit of planning to use their time for things that are most important to them.

Another topic for discussion can be "Killing Time." Each person can share how he used time during the day and how he would use it differently. Family members can give each other clues about ways to use time more resourcefully. Youth need "free" time to think and relax. Your goal, as a parent, is to help them be aware of how their choices about how they use their time resource make the difference in what they do and how they feel about each day.

Time management experts stress that time management is self-management. Resourceful youth learn to manage themselves to use their time for things that help them and their family reach their personal and family goals. They learn to get the greatest value for their time.

Earlier in the spring she demonstrated the use of the potter's wheel for the High School art classes at Junction, Texas.





# State agency offers interest-free home improvement loans

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) announced today that \$1 million is available statewide for home improvement loans.

Eligible low income homeowners may borrow up to \$15,000 and pay The purpose of the program is to assist homeowners in making per-

manent structural improvements to their home. Eligible improvements must enhance the livability of a home or correct


a health or safety problem. "The Home Improvement Loan Program will help Texans who have always wanted to improve their home, but have never had the opportunity. The monthly payment on a home improvement loan is very affordable because the borrower has a greater period of time to pay back the loan and is not charged interest," said Paul R. Rodriguez, chairman of the board,

Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. The term of the loans varies and depends on the amount of money borrowed. Loans between \$1,500 and \$5,000 have a maximum term of 10 years; loans more than \$5,000 and less than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 15 years; and loans more than \$10,000 have a maximum term of

20 years. The minimum monthly payment for a loan is \$25. In order to be eligible, the borrower must meet qualifying guidelines, have a sufficient income to afford monthly payments and make no more than 80 percent of the area median income.

The 72nd Legislature created TDHCA by merging the former Texas Housing Agency and the former Texas Department of Community Affairs. The Community Development Block Grant was also transferred from the Texas Department of Commerce to TDHCA.
