Youth to be cited for violation of impeding vehicle traffic


Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke has announced that beginning this week law enforcement officers will issue citations for Class C Misdemeanor in cases where vehicle traffic is impeded by pedestrians in the streets.

"The past week I have had at least 30 telephone calls about juveniles roaming down the middle of the streets and refusing to allow traffic to pass through," the sheriff says.

"I want all parents and young people to understand how dangerous that is, and that we are going to issue citations whenever these cases are reported." 'I have personally approached several of our youth about this problem, and given plenty of warnings," the sheriff continued.

No charges filed management evening shooting incident

A Garza County grand jury will investigate charges against Floyd B. Whitehead on August 20 concerning a shooting incident last Friday evening in the 900 block of Pine St.

Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke reports that at 6:44 p.m. August 7 deputies responded to a 911 call, and at 6:49 arrested Whitehead at the scene of the shooting, finding Charles Gibson suffering from a shotgun blast to his hip.

Gibson was taken to Garza Memorial Hospital before being transferred to Lubbock's University Medical Center by a Post EMT ambulance crew. Gibson is reported in good condition as of Monday morning.

The shotgun, according to the sheriff's report, was loaded with birdshot.

The grand jury will hear evidence on the charge of aggravated assault by Whitehead.

Deputies cited Freddy Perez Saturday evening with permitting an unlicensed minor to operate a motor vehicle following a one vehicle accident at the corner of West 13th and N. Avenue M.

According to investigators, the 11 year old female was driving Perez' 1980 Cadillac when she lost control of the vehicle turning from West 13th to Avenue M. The car struck a utility pole, a chain link fence and then struck the house at 313 W. 13th. The vehicle was headed west on 13th street at the time of the incident.

Perez was slightly injured and was taken to Garza Memorial Hospital by a friend.

Commissioners staring at unknown costs to comply with ADA

Solid waste management, OSHA rules pose question

Garza County Judge Giles Dalby lamented the unknown costs of three federally mandated programs that the commissioners' court faces this year during its budget considerations.

Topping the list with a January deadline for a plan is the modification of the courthouse to meet the strict guidelines of the Americans for Disabilities Act. Clerk Sonny Gossett, chairman of the county committee studying the change, presented results of a recent review by the committee, pointing out 11 items that will need attention.

Leading the list is the installation of an elevator and remodeling the restrooms. Other items on the list include painting the handicapped parking space, installing rails on both sides of the stairs, updating the water fountain to code standards, making the courthouse accessible to all the public, replace the ramp at the east door to meet the minimum requirements, install automatic or special assist door openers on the east doors, bring all counter tops to a standard and provide 911 service for the hearing and sight impaired.

Members of the committee are Gossett, Larry Dodson, Charlene Nelson, Bobby Smith, Chris Wyatt, Raymond Dodson and Jesse Soto.

Dalby suggested the court contract with a consultant familiar with the engineering details of meeting the requirements of the law to advise on the most economical and best way to bring the courthouse into compliance. The suggestion was approved.

Sheriff Kenny Ratke reported to the court on the options available to provide emergency electrical generating power at the law enforcement complex. He explained that the World War II surplus generator that has been in use for the past several years is not equipped for automatic switching and estimates to modify the unit range up to \$17,000. 

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

If you have a bank account, the U. S. Postal Service will contact your bank, and you will be made to pay the difference.

For example, if you cash a onedollar money order, which has been altered to \$700.00, you will end up money.

Remember this, if you see a pen pal ad from a prison inmate and are thinking of writing.



Eligible improvements must enhance the livability of a home or correct a health or safety problem.

"The Home Improvement Loan Program will help Texans who have always wanted to improve their home, but have never had the opportunity. The monthly payment on a home improvement loan is very affordable because the borrower has a greater period of time to pay back the loan and is not charged interest," said Paul R. Rodriguez, chairman of the board, Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

The term of the loans varies and depends on the amount of money borrowed. Loans between \$1,500 and \$5,000 have a maximum term of 10 years; loans more than \$5,000 and less than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 15 years; and loans more than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 20 years. 



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
