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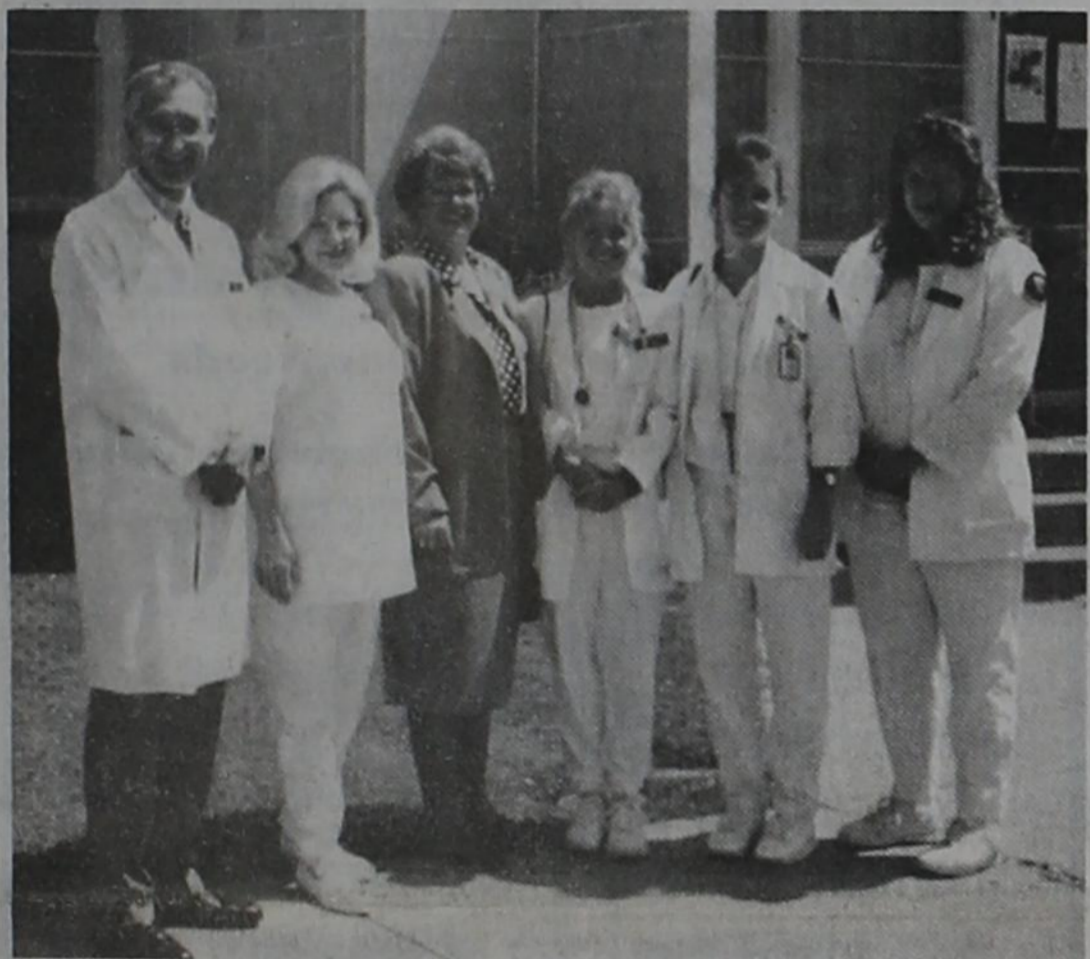
## Texas Tech Health Sciences Center and Garza Memorial share in special nursing project

The Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center (TTUHSC) School of Nursing and Garza Memorial Hospital (GMH) have agreed to a joint venture that promotes a greater understanding of the rural healthcare system and its needs, according to an announcement by GMH administrator Maritta Reed.

In early summer, the TTUHSC nursing school and GMH met to discuss a mutual program providing undergraduate students in the TTUHSC nursing program to perform six week clinical rotation duty through GMH and affiliated clinics.

The goals of the program are to provide a location of training and proctorship for Texas Tech undergraduate nursing students, introduce the nursing student to the rural health care setting and attract and recruit more nurses to practice in a rural setting.

"Almost immediately a pilot study was initiated," Reed says. "Four undergraduate nursing students came to Post for a six week training rotation. The study proved very successful and the bond between Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center School of Nursing and Garza Memorial Hospital was set."

## Congressman Stenholm bids farewell to Post

United States Congressman Charles Stenholm visited Post for perhaps the final time. Due to the congressional re-districting, Stenholm will no longer represent Garza County as he has for the past twelve years. The change takes place January 1, 1993.

Stenholm thanked the partizan supporters at the dinner given in his honor for their support through the last twelve years.

"This area of Texas is home for us," Congressman Stenholm said, "growing up in Dimmitt and attending college in Lubbock helps me to understand the concerns of West Texas."

The congressman did not make a formal speech, but rather listened to the questions of those attending. The congressman made an effort to tell his constituency about the changes coming in the next term. "We will have one of the biggest turn overs in congressional history," said Stenholm. "The anti-incumbent attitude will have a great effect on the structure of the House (of Representatives)."

Stenholm said that one of the greatest tasks facing the nation will be the balancing of the budget.

"How can we attack the deficit if we can't even balance the current year budget? We have proposed a balanced budget act which would require Congress to not increase the deficit," Stenholm reported.

Because the proposed act cuts the budget across the board, Stenholm doubts that it will pass. "Some people will say that we don't care about the Senior Citizens because this bill cuts the Social Security increase. But you have to understand the bill."

According to Stenholm, the bill would only take effect should Congress be unable to balance the budget through their own measures. Should Congress go over budget, then the cuts will take effect across the board. "The problem with Graham-Rudman," said Stenholm, "is that half the budget is excluded from cuts. That means that the other half of the budget must take double cuts and that makes those programs ineffective."

Regarding Social Security, Stenholm reported that the cuts would not effect money already being received by recipients. The cuts only effect proposed yearly increase.

Stenholm is hopeful that the bill will pass in the next few sessions even if it is initially voted down.

The dinner was held in the Congressman's honor by Judge Giles Dalby and other concerned citizens.

## Guadalupe Economic Services announces low income home improvement programs

Guadalupe Economic Services Corp. (GES) has announced that it is the recipient of the home improvements loan program available through the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs.

A total of \$1 million is available statewide for home improvement loans. Eligible Garza County low income homeowners may borrow up to \$15,000 and pay no interest.

The purpose of the program is to assist homeowners in making permanent structural improvements to their homes.

Eligible improvements must enhance the liveability of a home or correct a health or safety problem.

"The home improvement loan program will help Texans who have always wanted to improve their home, but have never had the opportunity," Paul R. Rodriguez, chairman of the board of the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs says.

"The monthly payment on a home improvement loan is very affordable because the borrower has a greater period of time to pay back the loan and is not charged interest," he added.

Loans between \$1,500 and \$5,000 have a maximum term of 10 years; loans more than \$5,000 and less than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 15 years and loans more than \$10,000 have a maximum term of 20 years.

## Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero begins campaign swing in Post

Texas Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero made a campaign stop in the city this past Thursday as part of a three day tour throughout West Texas.

Guerrero is campaigning to keep her position appointed by Governor Ann Richards.

Guerrero gave an inspired speech to the crowd gathered at the Post Community Center for the reception. She touched on her sense of work values that she earned in the Panhandle working in the fields as a teenager. Guerrero continued by explaining some of the proposed changes in the Railroad Commission under her direction.

"On one of my visits to a local office," Guerrero related, "I observed a field representative taking information from their office computer and transferring it by hand to the required form. That form then went to Austin and through the government process where it was viewed by several employees, one of whom took the information from the form and put it into a computer."

Guerrero continued her assault on the out-dated system. "The Railroad Commission is 101 years old this year and sometimes we act it," the Commissioner stated. "We put all our eggs in one basket (oil production) in the eighties. Now we should investigate other resources, especially natural gas."

Guerrero concluded her remarks by emphasizing the need for the Railroad Commission to be responsible for bolstering the economy through the creation of energy related jobs.

Post was the first stop in the three day campaign swing which will take Commissioner through the Panhandle and West Texas.

## Scurry County kidnapping suspect arrested here

A 52 year old man was arrested here August 25 following kidnapping charges filed by Scurry County. The man admitted to Garza County Sheriff Kenny Ratke that earlier he had solicited a ride in Snyder and was dropped off at the Allsup's store on Broadway in Post.

The arrest was made following a request from the Scurry County Sheriff's Department. The complaint charged that the man kidnapped the vehicle's driver at knife-point, forcing a ride in the vehicle to Post. The accused was released to Scurry County law enforcement officers.

A 23 year old man was arrested August 25 on charges of public intoxication. The man was spotted by Garza County deputies approximately nine miles north of Post on U.S. Hwy 84, sitting in the driver's side of the parked vehicle. The accused was asleep and after being awakened by the officers, was charged with intoxication and brought to the jail. An opened container of beer was on the front seat.

A 26 year old man was charged August 28 with assault under the family code following an incident at a residence in Post. The man was accused of striking a 25 year old female to the ground then kicking her with steel-toed work boots.

On August 30 law enforcement officers began investigation of the theft of 188 feet of angle iron from a location in Garza County three miles south of White River. No suspects have been arrested.

A 15 year old female and a 15 year old male juvenile were arrested and charged with criminal mischief following a complaint August 30 at a local residence. The two youth are accused of spreading obscenities on two vehicles parked at the residence, using black shoe polish and eggs. The complainants said that the two accused youth were at a party the night before across the street and had expressed anger a number of times before and had made harassing telephone calls.

Charges of theft of bicycles was filed against two juveniles August 30. The bicycles were recovered.

Vandalism of a plate glass window and burglary was reported to the sheriff's department August 31 concerning Caprock Liquor Store at 208 N. Avenue F. A concrete rock was found approximately 60 feet from the store. No suspects have been arrested.

Law enforcement officers also investigated the burglary of a residence on August 31. A color television set and a 22 calibre semi automatic rifle with scope.

A 28 year old man was arrested September 1, charged with criminal mischief in an incident involving the throwing of rocks through the front windshield of a vehicle.

# Stenholm urges Congressional reform

A quick look at history shows that the periodic call for Congressional reform is nothing new, and all evidence indicates the time for reform has come again.

It couldn't come too soon. It is clear to me that folks of the 17th District are fed up with Congress, the President and with government in general.

The perception of a pampered, unresponsive Congress is especially difficult to swallow under our current economic circumstances.

I, for one, share the public's frustration.

I find much of the "business as usual" operations of Congress extremely disturbing.

Our forebears were wise in their creation of our special form of government; I would like to restore a sense of pride to participating in their "grand experiment in democracy."

In my opinion, the very first reform in which Congress should engage is getting its fiscal house, as well as the fiscal state of the Nation, in order.

Balancing the budget should be the highest priority of the Congress and the White House.

Since coming to office in 1979, I have introduced, co-sponsored, and supported measures to reduce appropriations, including those for the legislative branch of government.

Most recently, the House once again came close to passing legislation I introduced to add a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget.

I will continue to work toward a balanced budget.

I have been recognized with awards for my fiscal responsibility from the National Taxpayers Union, the National Federation of Independent Businesses, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, and others.

There also needs to be much greater accountability and honesty in the handling of Congressional finances.

Although some reports have exaggerated and sensationalized trivial items (e.g. a \$15 man's haircut or a \$32 woman's hairstyling in the

House salons is no "cut-rate bargain"), there is far too much truth in a great number of the current criticisms.

As a rank-and-file Member, I feel just as disillusioned by some practices of the House of Representatives as my constituents feel.

I am convinced that much of the so-called "gridlock" which the government is experiencing is caused by too many people, too much non-productive bureaucracy and too little good management. The Congress itself is a case in point.

I have actively endorsed cuts in funding for both the legislative and the executive branches and, in the fiscal year 1993 Budget Resolution, I was successful in achieving five percent cuts in funding for both branches.

I will continue working for those cuts until we have reached the 20 percent reductions which are my goal.

How have I personally performed in terms of staff and operating costs? When I began serving in the House in 1979 there were 466,432 residents living in the 17th District and I had 18 permanent staff.

Today, I have 16 permanent and 2 part-time staff, however, the 17th District now includes 569,686 people.

I should add that there is no such thing as a 40-hour work week or overtime pay for my staff.

What is the cost of operating a congressional office?

In 1991, the House authorized \$1,040,591 per office to pay operating expenses, salaries, postage, etc.

This would cost each resident of the 17th District \$1.83 for the year. I say "would" because I used only 74 percent of my allotment in 1991, or \$775,034.

Of my mail allowance, I used only nine percent.

Put another way, my total ex-

penses cost each constituent \$1.36 in 1991.

More can be done to hold down costs, and I am dedicated to that task.

Over the past 20 years, there have been significant increases in the costs and the number of employees within the legislative and executive branches.

If these increases had made for a more efficient government, perhaps they could be justified but they have largely just added to the overhead.

In fact, we have so much overhead, it's getting underfoot.

Frustration with Congress has led to calls for term limitations.

I believe this "cure" could be worse than the disease.

In fact, by throwing out the good with the bad, term limits may even exacerbate the existing problems.

Despite my misgivings about term limits, I agree that the proponents have raised an important issue.

That notwithstanding, it would be far more effective to work within the current political process--which many are, as indicated by the fact that there will be 120-180 new House Members next year-- and to enact meaningful changes in the way things operate in Congress.

We should not randomly change who is here without changing the system.

We must overhaul Congressional operations.

I was an early supporter of the proposal to create a Joint Committee on the Organization of Congress.

The creation of this Committee reflects a strong commitment to make real, meaningful reforms.

I am working with my colleagues

in the Conservative Democratic Forum to form a consensus behind common sense ideas on reform.

What types of reforms am I talking about? Limiting the terms of committee chairman is a favorite of mine.

A few committee chairman have amassed tremendous power as a result of chairing an important committee for a long time.

This power is often used to perpetuate the status quo at the expense of new and creative ideas.

Another reform that must be made is streamlining the committee system.

By eliminating unnecessary committees and reorganizing others, Congress will be in a better position to develop coherent policies instead of wasting time on jurisdictional disputes or the self-justifying work of committees.

I also support reforms of the budget process such as truth-in-legislating, which would require the disclosure in plain English of who benefits from narrowly drawn provisions in tax and spending bills, and enhanced rescission, which would require that Congress vote up-or-down on individual spending programs that the President proposes to eliminate.

The U.S. Constitution is one of the finest works of the human imagination.

Our government is at its best when it puts into action the sovereignty of the people which the Constitution guarantees.

As I think about the politics of the day, the nation's malaise, and our great democracy, I recall the words of Winston Churchill who said, "Democracy is the worst form of government, save (except) for all the others."

## Bold Gold open at Abernathy Friday

The Post Bold Gold kick off their 1992 football campaign with a tough visit to Abernathy. The 'Lopes will be ready thanks to a couple of scrimmages against powerhouse teams.

The Bold Gold pre-season ended this past Friday with the team's scrimmage in New Deal. The Lions are picked by many to repeat their outstanding season last year in which they went 9-1-1 but missed the playoffs in the highly competitive district 4-2A. The Lions have re-tooled their offense and showed a lot of team speed in the scrimmage against Post.

Halfback Jimmy Jackson had two long runs against the Post defense but the potent New Deal attack only scored twice against the stingy Post stop troops.

Head Coach DeWayne Osborne was pleased with the performance by the Antelopes during the scrimmage. "We were much

improved over last weeks scrimmage and we're going to continue to be better and better as a football team", Osborne said in surveying the team's performance.

"We have a young group and right now we are just concentrating on the basics. The thing we need the most right now is to come together as a team."

The Bold Gold offense will take on a different look this year due to new players in the skill positions. One of the objectives of the coaching staff this season is to not have too many players going both ways (playing both offense and defense).

Brad Lawson and Javier Saldivar will take the receiver positions for

the 'Lopes this year. Both have seen limited action as wide outs until this season. Both receivers showed improvement in the scrimmage against the Lions.

The backfield will rely on the experienced arm of Jim Riley Simpson to direct the passing attack. Simpson showed improvement at New Deal and the timing between Simpson and his receivers will improve as the season progresses.

Ricky Jefferson will draw the starting nod at Wing Back. He will be joined in the backfield by Tim Bell at Half Back and Russ Bird at Full Back.

Coach Osborne is looking for a better performance from the defense this year against Abernathy. The Antelopes racked up 42 points and 388 total yards against the 'Lopes in last year's season opener won by Abernathy 42-6.

The 'Lopes have reason for optimism coming into this year's contest. Abernathy lost almost all their players at the skill positions from last years 9-1 team. Abernathy only has 5 returning starters on each side of the ball.

"They're trying to get down their basic offense just like we are", commented Coach Osborne of the Abernathy bunch. "We expect them to keep the ball on the ground and run the option at us. Dennis Haney

played well late in the year and is a big, strong back. Stopping the running attack will be the key for our defense."

The defense for the 'Lopes will have a little more experience than their offensive counterparts. The front line of Ray Perez, Darrin Wood, Steven Espinosa, and Manuel Zubia only range from 155 to 175 pounds but they have shown good speed as a unit.

The linebacking corp is where Post looks to shine. Josh Bush, Adrian Castillo, and Anthony Cruse have proven that they can punish the opposing team's running backs. Mark Espita will also see a lot of action at linebacker for the Bold Gold.

The defensive secondary is very fast and should be able to prevent enemy receivers from getting behind them. Jaime Ayala and Tim Bell will hold down the corners while brothers Bodie and Jim Riley Simpson start at safety. Look for

Oscar Aceveda and Brad Lawson to spend time in the defensive backfield this season for the Antelopes.

"The kids have given us everything we have asked of them", commented Coach Osborn on the team's progress. "Now we'll see how they do in actual game experience."

The early going will be a strong determining factor in the outcome of Friday nights opener for both of these football clubs. Each team is trying to establish it's offense so ball movement early in the contest will be important. The lack of experience on both squads makes confidence and momentum a key factor. Abernathy will run the ball right at the Post defense while Post may try to go to the air early in the game in addition to running the ball.

The 'Lopes travel to Abernathy to take on the Antelopes Friday night. The kick-off is at 8 p.m.

This ID card resembles a license, the number is kept on file and can be accessed by computer through local law enforcement departments within minutes as a license number can.

Using a social security number can take up to a month or longer to trace and return your recovered property.

These topics are of an interest to all citizens. Any of the area law enforcement departments should be contacted by other groups if they wish to have a program over such topics.

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## Living on the Edge of the Caprock

Field day to provide useful  
information

Scientific efforts to assist ag producers will be on display at the upcoming 83rd annual field day of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Lubbock, September 8.

The event alternates each year between the Texas A & M University Ag Research Center just north of the Lubbock airport and its research facility at Halfway, west of Plainview. This year the event will be at the Lubbock Center, just east of Interstate 27 at the Shallowater exit No. 11. From 1 to 4 p.m., wagons will transport visitors to research plots and exhibits.

This year's tour will have five featured stops, exhibits providing timely information for producers and consumers, a look at the latest commercial and research equipment and an open house at the Texas Forest Service greenhouses. The first 100 visitors will receive a free tree seedling.

The featured stops on the tour will focus on concerns critical to area farmers this year as well and long range efforts to help them meet production and environmental demands. The stops will examine progress of cotton breeding efforts, farming systems and integrated pest management in cotton, developments in grain sorghum and chemical storage and safety. Biotype I and insect resistant greenbugs as well as cotton aphid management will be addressed.

Private pesticide applicators attending the field day will receive two continuing education units toward annual recertification requirement of the TDA. Applicators should have their license with them as they attend the field day.

Home economists with the Extension Service will present food safety exhibits and displays on uses of cotton. Other exhibits will showcase cotton grown locally with naturally colored lint: collaborative efforts of the Experiment Station, Texas Tech and the U.S. Department of Agriculture in cotton production and fabric research; a program to help producers determine irrigation demand based on potential evapotranspiration and new ag products and equipment. The field day is a cooperative effort of the Experiment Station, High Plains Research Foundation, USDA-Agricultural Research Service, Texas Forest Service and Texas Tech.

Hopefully this will fit into your schedule and you will plan to take in the day with your spouse. The program looks good and should prove beneficial to all in attendance.

### Cotton Physiologist joins Extension Service

A scientist and educator well known and respected across the nation's cotton belt will join the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in February as cotton agronomist at Lubbock.

Kater Hake, 39, manager of the cotton physiology education program and production technology for the National Cotton Council, will assume his new duties February 1. He will replace Dr. James R Supak who transferred in July to College

Station. "We are pleased that a professional with the background and experience of Mr. Hake will be providing leadership for the Extension Service cotton education program on the High Plains," said Dr. Zerle Carpenter, director of the agency.

A native of Iowa, Hake holds a B.S. degree in genetics and an M.S. in agronomy, both from the University of California at Davis, Calif. He will complete work in Decem-

ber on a Ph.D in botany and plant physiology at that university.

Before joining the National Cotton Council in Memphis, Tenn., three years ago, Hake served nine years with the University of California Cooperative Extension Service. He was a farm advisor for cotton, soils and water at Bakersfield.

Hake also has been an agricultural biologist with the Merced, Calif., and a crops and soils instructor at Merced Junior College.

### Dispatch assists with Horned Toad Survey

The Horned Lizard Conservation Society vows to save a Texas legend and is asking for help from across the state.

The legend is the Texas horned lizard, better known as the horned toad or horny toad. We are dedicated to keeping the horned toad a part of Texas' natural heritage.

The little spike-backed lizard with two prominent horns on its head was once grabbed up by kids all over the state, but now only south and west Texans see them in abundance.

Populations of them have vanished in east and most of central Texas and are believed to be declining in north Texas as well.

A status survey of populations of the Texas horned lizard is being conducted this summer at 100 sites in Texas where they have been historically found.

The survey's primary goal is to determine where the horned toad still lives and where it has disappeared.

To pinpoint these places better, the Post Dispatch will assist by publishing a sighting survey form.

Any additional information about the areas, from both the past and present, may help us understand why they have disappeared.

Three species of horned lizards are found in Texas, the mountain short-horned, round-tail and Texas horned lizards.

Two of these species, the mountain short-horned and Texas horned lizards, are listed as threatened by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

This means that they are protected from being taken from their habitat or sold without a special permit.

No protection of the land or habitat where they live is provided by state law.

The Texas horned lizard is the most well-known of the three species. Lewis and Clark brought one back from their 1803-1806 expedition of the west.

The earliest recorded museum specimen was collected in Galveston in 1862.

Perhaps the most famous Texas horned lizard is Old Rip. Legend goes that Old Rip was entombed in the cornerstone of the Eastland County Courthouse prior to 1900. \*In 1928, the courthouse was being renovated and the cornerstone opened. Old Rip is said to have crawled out after 30 years of living in the dark sanctuary. The event received national attention, and Old Rip was sent to President Calvin Coolidge who had to wait 15 minutes before he could see the horned toad.

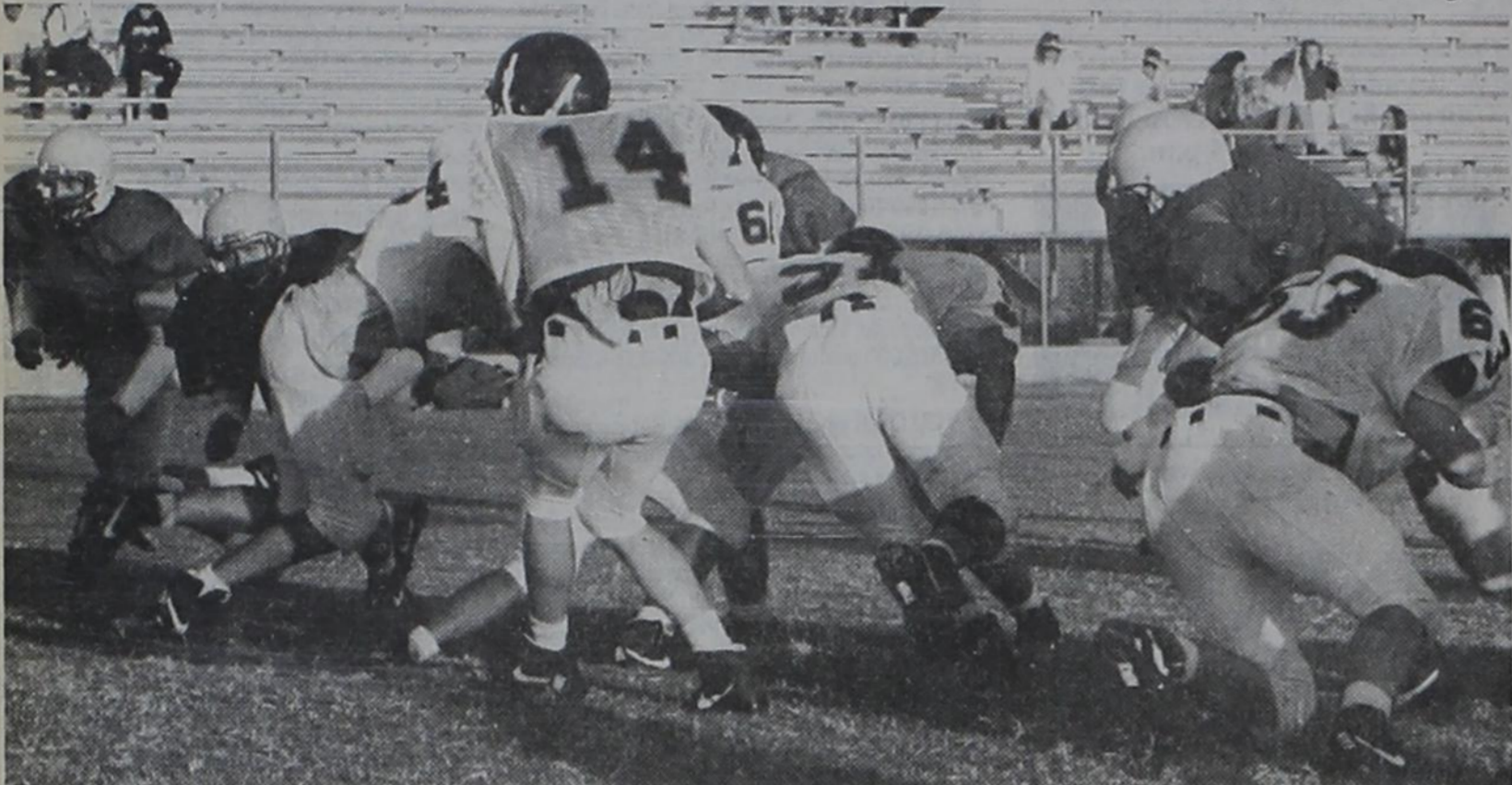
Today, a lot more is known about the Texas horned lizard. It hibernates between the months of Octo-

ber and March. Its favorite food is the harvester ant, the big red ants that make large circular clearings around the opening of their nests.

The lizard is capable of squirting blood from the corner of its eye as a defense against predators.

But, we do not know why this unique lizard is vanishing from the Texas landscape today, and we would like to find out. You can help us by completing our sighting survey today!


