Courthouse to get annex to meet ADA requirements

No action, but museum building expected to be closed

After hearing a detailed report of the modifications needed to bring the county courthouse into compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), the Garza County Commissioners' Court agreed Monday morning to Judge Giles Dalby's suggestion that an annex be constructed adjacent to the courthouse.

The new two story structure, which would join the south wall of the courthouse, will include an elevator with access to the second floor of the courthouse building.

"The cost of remodeling this building is just way too expensive," Dalby emphasized.

The report concerning meeting ADA requirements was prepared by Oller Engineering and Adling Associates.

The court authorized the engineering firm to begin plans and estimates for the new building.

The federal law requires the county to have a written plan in effect to meet the minimum standards by January 1, 1993 and work to be completed by January 1995.

Suggestions for upgrading the old sanitarium which houses the Garza County Museum were also outlined, which would include closing the upstairs to the public, completely remodeling the restrooms, providing ramps at the front and back and a paved parking area.

Dalby recommended the court consider closing the building. "We just can't afford to make all those changes," he said. Commissioners nodded approval at the suggestion, but no formal action was taken.

The museum is listed as a historical preservation building, and all changes or modifications would have to be approved by the Texas Historical Society.

Recommended changes at the Appraisal District's office downtown were approved.

In other action commissioners approved the election returns from Justice of the Peace precinct four concerning the recent alcohol sale local option. A total of 24 voters cast ballots in favor and 11 opposed. Most voters in the election live in the Justiceburg area.

Commissioners authorized clerk Sonny Gossett to hire additional help during the early voting and accepted the resignation of county veterans' service officer Don Harwood.

Judge Dalby was authorized to sign a letter confirming the county's intention to use Dickens County for jail overflow. Dickens County is in the process of adding 250 beds to its jail, which has recently been at capacity with overflow from Harris County.

The court approved a revision in the self-insured health coverage for a limit of \$10,000 to the county on any single claim, with the additional if needed to be covered by reinsurance.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Sammy Ellis, Albert Stone, John Valdez, Judge Dalby, treasurer Young and clerk Gossett.



"We first took part in Founder's Day as a tribute to C.W. "Counting the Votes"

A historic picnic at the OS Ranch in 1906 set the stage for what was to become Garza County when area ranchers, settlers and cowboys gathered to plan for a petition to the state legislature.

A total of 65 signatures were needed to secure the county charter, "so folks got to work and soon had 75 names," according to "Wagon Wheels," a Garza County history.

The first election was held July 5, 1907 at the OS Ranch, marking the date that Garza County officially was recognized as a county, having been attached to Borden County for judicial purposes for many years.

Two of the OS cowboys who had attended the chinaberry picnic of the previous year were among the group of first officials elected. They were J.M. Boren, county judge and O.B. (Oscar) Kelly, sheriff. Other county officials elected were H.B. Murray, county and district clerk; B.F. Wilks, county treasurer; M.L. Harkey, county attorney; H.C. Callis, hide and animal inspector; S.C. Wilks, R.E. King, Tom Stovall and W.V. Roy, county commissioners; A.L. Dunn, justice of the peace and Marion McGinty, constable.

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

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Sundown provides opportunity for first Bold Gold Win

Idalou overpowers Antelopes 27-0 to claim the District lead

The Post Bold Gold have a realist shot at their first win of the season when they travel to Sundown to take on the Roughnecks. Both clubs are without a win in the district race. Sundown has had two weeks to recover from a 62-6 loss to the Idalou Wildcats.

Quarterback Tatum Lynn scored on the next play going 30 yards as he kept the ball on the option. Eddie Martinez added the extra point and the Wildcats led 7-0.

Post unveiled a new offensive attack on their first possession. Bodie Simpson lined up in the tight end position on the line. Simpson then took the handoff from brother Jim Riley Simpson on what appeared to be a reverse. Instead of

running around the right end, Simpson faded back into the pocket and found tail back Ricky Jefferson for a 35 yard bomb to the Idalou 30. It was the last pass Bodie Simpson threw for the evening.

Post then ran two running plays and an incomplete pass to set up a fourth and 2 from the Idalou 22.

Jim Riley Simpson faded back into the pocket and spotted his receiver down field. But Eddie Martinez, The 'Cat safety, stepped in front of the receiver to intercept the pass. Idalou was back in business at their own 42.

The Post offense never really got untracked after that.

The two teams traded possession throughout the rest of the first quarter. The Post defense played even with the bigger, stronger Idalou team until midway through the second quarter.

Idalou ran the option to perfection to score on a five play drive. Quarterback Lynn had gains of 28 and 34 in the drive, the last resulting in the touchdown. Martinez was again true on the extra point and Idalou led 14-0 at halftime.

Post had one long drive at the end of the first half. The 'Lopes started from their own two yard line after an Idalou fumble. Post then controlled the ball for the next 21

plays before turning it over to the Wildcats on downs. Post had driven to the Idalou 25.

The second half was almost a carbon copy of the first. Post moved the ball well on occasion but was unable to get near the Idalou end zone.


The Post defense held the high powered Idalou offense in check with the exception of two drives.



OPEN LETTER TO CITIZENS OF GARZA COUNTY

I regretfully announced that I will be unable to assume the office of County Attorney of Garza County, Texas on January 1, 1993, and that my family and I are leaving Post for another small town in the San Angelo area. This decision has not come easily, and has come only after much thought and prayer. I am publishing this letter to you because I wanted you to know why I am having to leave Post.

As you know, you elected me as the Democratic Party's representative in the County Attorney race this last spring. Since there are no independent or republican candidates for this office, I would have won the election for Garza County Attorney on November 3rd. As in all counties of this size, the County Attorney position in this county is not a full time position. I cannot make a living from the pay I would receive as your county attorney, nor could the present county attorney or any county attorney in other small counties. However, I knew this going in. A county attorney makes his or her living primarily from their private law practice. I had hoped that my law practice in Post would grow to a point that, together with the County Attorney position, my family and I could make a living here. For a while it appeared that would be the case. Unfortunately, this has not happened. To compound this problem for me, if I had taken over the Garza County Attorney position, I would have been required to totally give up my criminal law practice, which over the last year has paid me roughly an amount equal to the present Garza County Attorney salary. Therefore, the addition of the Garza County Attorney salary to my income would in reality mean no net increase in income to me.

My family and I love this community and this county. We didn't move here to get rich, but rather to raise our kids. This town really didn't need another lawyer when we came, but I was determined to make a place for myself here because I wanted to live in Post. However, in the past few months I have had to face economic reality. My business is not growing here, this country is in a recession, and there is no sign things will get better in the immediate future. I have my wife and five children to think of, and two of my sons, ages 15 and 13, will be entering college in a few years. I can no longer risk my family's future on my attempt to build a law practice here in Post.

As far as the County Attorney position here in Garza County, the present county attorney's term will expire at the end of the year. I am the only one who can be legally elected on November 3rd. It will be up to your elected officials, the Garza County Commissioners, to appoint a new county attorney. No one, including the current county attorney, should have an inside track for receiving this appointment. If you supported me for county attorney because you wanted a change in the current county attorney's office, then I strongly urge you to contact your county commissioner and voice your desire for a change in the county attorney office.

I think this county is blessed with some talented and caring people in the county government with whom I would have worked closely as your county attorney, particularly the Clerk's office, Sheriff's office, Probation office and Judge's office, and I very much regret that I will be unable to work with them as county attorney. My family and I wish all of you the very best for the future. There are a lot of good people in this county. We especially appreciate Nancy's parents, Marshall and Ruth Reno, without whom we could not have made it this last year, the members of the Post Church of Christ and our friends who have made our life here so enjoyable. All of you will always remain special to us.

Mid-school sweeps Idalou

Seventh Grade claims first win 8-2.

The eighth grade version of the Post Antelopes continued to roll as they downed the Idalou Wildcats 30-12 this past Thursday at Antelope Stadium. The night was made complete when the seventh grade boys earned their first victory of the year 8-2.

Post scored again in the third on a 28 yard run by Patrick Soto. The run capped off a 75 yard march by the offense. Post extended it's lead 24-6 on the two point conversion by Leonard Rodela.
Idalou scored their second touchdown on the very next play. The Wildcats ran the kickoff back for a touchdown making the score 24-12. Idalou did not convert the extra point.
Post finished the scoring in the fourth quarter by going 53 yards in just five plays. Robbie Wilborn had the big play in the drive finding a big hole in the line and rambling for 47 yards to the 'Cat 6 yard line. He scored four plays later on a two yard run. Post secured the victory 30-12.

Coach Darrell Radle had positive comments for both offense and defense. "The offensive line did a good job adjusting their blocking assignments to the changing defensive alignments", commented Radle.
"We had a good defensive game from Sam Zubia, Adam Gutierrez, Jeremy Josey, Jerry Crawford, Todd Terry, and Ismael Diaz." Post held the Wildcats to 148 yards total offense.
"Josh Grisham played well at quarterback", added Radle.
The mid school teams take on Sundown next Thursday in Sundown.







Greater benefit on CRP lands

Some landowners enrolled in the CRP program are not realizing the full wildlife or future livestock grazing benefits.

The program objectives are to protect fragile soils, enhance water quality and wildlife.

Soil Conservation Service, District Conservationist, Obie Kelley, says some of this land in the Garza Soil and Water Conservation District is not achieving its full potential.

Occasional disturbance for wildlife is beneficial and increases diversity of habitat. The disturbance could be discing up a strip of land and planting a food plot between the open CRP land and the brush.

This would especially benefit quail. "Bobwhites and other ground-nesting animals thrive where various cover exists, says Kelley."

"Large, grass-smothered pastures may meet the needs of the quail for nesting. Quail also need open ground, weed areas or annual planted areas and thick low growing brush cover.

"Land with several cover types in small areas is much better than large open grass-smothered pastures.

Some farmers/ranchers do not realize that CRP regulations are flexible. In fact, county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) committees have considerable latitude to authorize wildlife oriented management practices.

Obie Kelley, District Conservationist, reminds CRP producers that prior approval is needed from ASCS.

"Prescribed burning, light discing, interplanting of legumes like clovers or vetch and establishing food plots in and around established thick grasses may be permissible under CRP guidelines," says Obie.

"How you go about these practices makes a big difference in whether they qualify and how much they benefit quail and the future grazing values after the CRP contract expires."

Landowners can contact the local Garza Soil and Water Conservation District office at 495-2056, for more information about land management practices under CRP rules.

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
