Commissioners join city in sharing costs of landfill operation

County to share 25 percent

In a meeting with Mayor Jim Jackson, city council members Jimmy Holleman and Maxine Conoly, the Garza County Commissioners' Court Monday morning approved a resolution supporting the City of Post in providing funding guarantees for a new landfill permit.

The resolution did not specify limits on funding, but the court and city will enter into an "interlock agreement" limiting the county's financial share to 25 percent of the new landfill operation.

Although the permitting process is still being prepared by the city's engineering firm of Parkhill, Smith and Cooper, the resolution demonstrating financial guarantees is an important step toward gaining approval for the landfill permit from the Texas Water Commission.

"This is a concession on the water commission's part," city manager Bob Turner explained, "and what they need is a guarantee that if there is ever a need for a cleanup at the site, we are prepared to pay for it."

Commissioner Herb Walls pointed out that if the city doesn't "clean up its act at the landfill site we may not be able to get a permit." Walls pointed out that a recent inspection found that city landfill crews had opened an old portion of the landfill and garbage was piled up and open. "That just isn't going to cut it," he emphasized.

Walls also asked Jackson how long the current landfill could be open. Jackson suggested at least until October 1993.

Parkhill, Smith and Cooper representative Butch Davis gave a report on the recent pre-application conference in Austin, explaining that the city has now collected all the data requested by the Texas Water Commission. "We think we are in good shape and when we get everything submitted, we'll just be waiting for the final approval," Davis said that might come within the next year.

Currently the Texas Water Commission is not authorized to grant landfill permits because the state of Texas does not have a plan to present to the federal Environmental Protection Agency. If the TWC plan is not approved or the state doesn't get its approval by October 1993, the permit process will be assumed by the EPA.

"All bets are then off as to what we'll be able to do," Jackson said.

The current application process includes a request for the "West Texas Exemption," which the TWC has said should be approved. That exemption eliminates the need for liners and long-term monitoring for smaller populated cities with less than 25 inches of average annual rainfall and no ground water to be contaminated.

Commissioner Sammy Ellis raised the question of what will happen when October arrives and no decision has been made in Austin or Washington. "We'll just have to see," Jackson replied.

Garza County citizens may find their garbage being transported to Lubbock if the October deadline passes without a landfill permit.

10 year old boy suffers head injuries in accident

A 10 year old boy darted out in front of a parked ice cream vending truck last Thursday evening and was struck by an oncoming vehicle in the 200 block of West 12th Street.

"Miraculously," Sheriff Kenny Ratke reports, "the injuries were not serious and he is out of the hospital after an overnight stay."

Ratke praised the quick response of the Post EMTs and "the extra care they showed, it was just great to see how they perform," the sheriff adds.

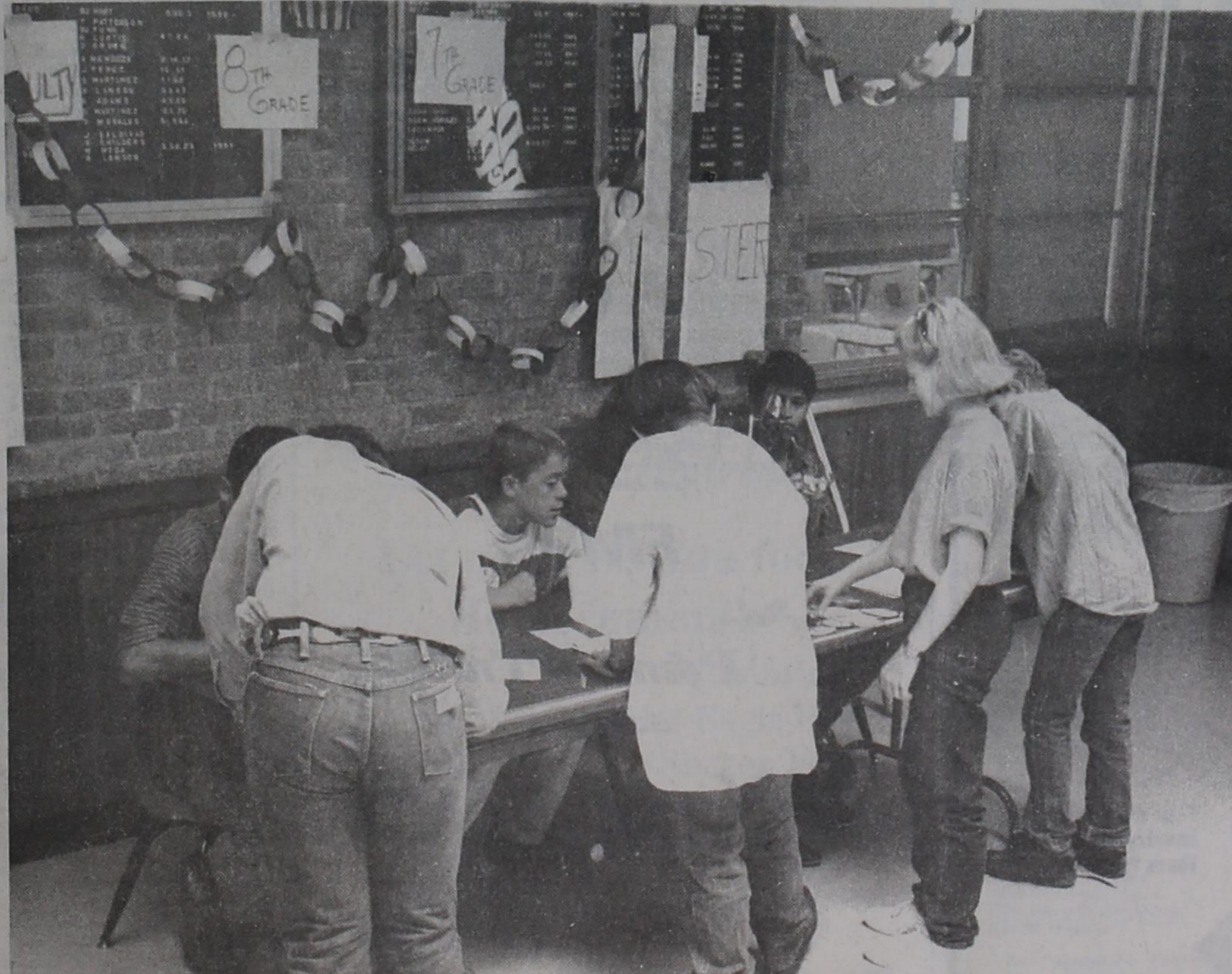
The child was struck by an east bound 1982 Pontiac and suffered facial lacerations and bruises and possible fracture just below the eye. He was transported by a Post EMT crew to Garza Memorial Hospital and then to Methodist Children's Hospital in Lubbock, where he underwent tests to determine the condition of the fracture. After spending the night, the child returned home.

The driver of the vehicle was cited for a defective brake and invalid inspection sticker. Ratke said that speed evaluations conducted by Texas DPS officers and the sheriff's department determined the vehicle was travelling at 19.72 mph.

"The slower rate of speed of the vehicle was a major factor in limited injuries to the child," Ratke added.

He said the woman driving the car "was really in a state of shock as a result of the accident."

Ratke said that the child had just purchased a product from the ice cream vender, whose truck was parked on the north side of the street headed west. The child darted out in front of the truck into the path of the car, which was headed east.

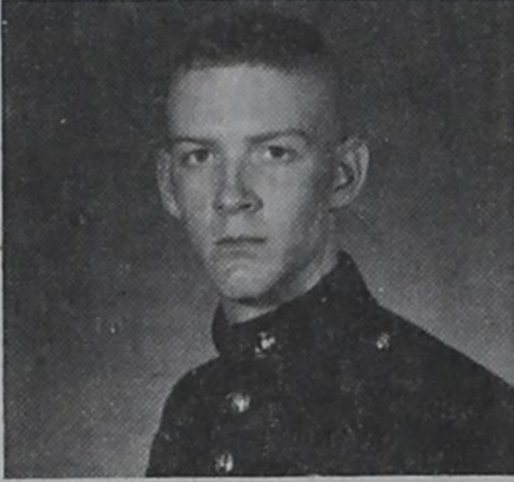

The most recent sales tax rebate check to the City of Post shows an increase over the same period last year of 12.65 percent.

The total for the year is \$151,212.86 for a 1.62 percent increase over the same period last year of \$148,802.77.

This ANN That

Those of you who want to limit the fat in their diets may be interested in this information concerning ground beef, a favorite of many of us.

Dr. Lynn White, Extension Family Economics Specialist, says that leaner beef patties are more expensive per pound in the raw state and after you cook them.

Logic would tell us that we are paying for fat that is cooked away. We might conclude that because you pay for fat that you will throw away, the leaner but more expensive ground beef is a better buy. Logic is not always right, she cautions.

Dr. White also shows that when you put a pencil to the math question, you will find that in most cases, leaner ground meat costs more in the long run.

If raw patties cost \$2.49 a pound and are 85 percent fat free, you are paying \$2.93 per pound for the lean portion (\$2.49 divided by .85).

If raw patties cost \$1.69 a pound and are 75 percent fat free (10 percent more fat), you are paying \$2.25 per pound for the lean portion (\$1.95 divided by .75).

Researchers at Texas A & M University have shown that you may not need to buy lean or extra lean ground beef unless you are on a severely restricted fat diet or are preparing a recipe where fat cannot be removed.

The Texas A & M studies show similar fat levels for regular ground beef (25-30 percent fat) and lean ground beef (18-20 percent fat) cooked until well done.

The amount of fat left in the cooked meat varies by the cooking method, however.

More fat and calories are lost from cooking regular ground beef than from lean or extra lean ground beef, but regular contains more fat before it is cooked and costs less.

After cooking it to the "well done stage," the amount of fat left is similar to what is in the cooked lean ground beef.

In most cases, it is more economical to buy regular ground beef and prepare it by a low fat cooking method that to buy more expensive lean beef.

The cooking method which produces the fewest calories is boiling, then chilling and skimming off the fat.

But most of us would not like to eat our ground beef boiled nor do we want to chill it and skim the fat unless we are cooking a stew. Then this would be an excellent

technique for reducing calories and fat.

Microwaving is the next choice for cooking 25% fat ground beef. Roasting, broiling and pan frying follow in close order.

Of course we would not want to pan fry ground beef, adding more fat. If you want to use the meat juices after cooking, save the liquid, let the fat harden to lift off the fat, or add ice cubes to harden the fat for quicker removal.

If you are pan frying or cooking meat without a rack, pour or drain off the fat as soon as the meat is cooked by placing it in a colander lined with a paper towel to keep the small pieces from falling through the holes in the colander. A paper

towel can be placed under a meat patty to absorb the fat if you cook the meat in a microwave oven.

Enjoy great ground beef. If you would like new recipes for beef, come by my office and pick some up. I have lots.

TDH urges women to schedule cancer detection checkups...

Texas Department of Health (TDH) officials urge Texas women to schedule cancer detection checkups, either with their own physician or with public health care providers, during October, Breast Cancer Awareness Month.

Women who can not afford preventive or early detection health care services can take advantage of TDH's new no-cost program to screen for breast and cervical cancer.

An estimated 10,000 women sought the free clinical breast exams, mammograms (X-rays of the breast) and Pap tests (tests for abnormal cells in the cervix) between January and June this year.

Of these, at least 21 were diagnosed with cancer. They have undergone, or are undergoing treatment.

Because many diagnostic results are still pending, the number of women found to have cancer probably will increase.

"Many of the women we see, even those in their 50's and 60's never had a mammogram because they can't afford preventive health care or health care designed for early detection of disease," said Charlene Laramey, Director of the TDH Chronic Disease Prevention Division.

"The response we've seen clearly demonstrates the pent-up demand for

these lifesaving health care services which many of us take for granted," Laramey said.

"Women and their families express relief, whether they've had cancer detected early so that it can be treated, or they've had a cancer-free report that gives them peace of mind," she added.

The program's services result from a cooperative agreement between TDH and the national Centers for Disease Control. TDH will receive \$5 million for the second year of the program, compared with \$3 million last year.

The program also is supported by the Texas Cancer Council, the American Cancer Society's Texas Division, and the M.D. Anderson Cancer Center.

Officials expect to serve 25,000 women during the current fiscal year, which began September 1.

Based on the forms processed to date, about one-third of the women checked during the first year were 50 or older. This is a targeted population group, because older women have the greatest likelihood of having cancer.

To qualify for the free cancer services, a woman must meet age and

eligibility requirements. A woman who lives below 200 percent of the federal poverty level (less than \$1,135 a month for an individual, and less than \$1,532 a month for a family of two), and is age 40 or older will qualify for free breast cancer screening services.

A woman who meets the same income and insurance requirements and who is sexually active or age 18 or older will qualify for cervical cancer screening services.

"When a woman first gets cancer, she can't tell that she is sick," Laramey said. "That's why regular check-ups are so important."

Free breast and cervical cancer screenings are offered at more than 230 clinics throughout Texas.

A variety of health care providers, including primary care centers, family planning clinics and regional hospitals, offer these services. For the nearest location, call 512/458-7644.

Citizens cautioned on bogus cancer fund drives

A Cancer organization known to solicit funds from Plainview residents via direct mail campaigns is one of four national charities being sued by Pennsylvania and Connecticut for allegedly misrepresenting how they spent millions of dollars in donations.

Cancer Fund of America Inc., of Knoxville was one of the fund-raising agencies who Attorney General Ernie Preate Jr. said "preyed upon the wonderful compassion and giving nature of Pennsylvania citizens" in what has been dubbed "seed-scam".

Preate filed suit against Cancer Fund of America in Commonwealth Court on Monday.

Suits also were filed against United Citizens Against Drugs, Inc., Irvine, Calif., National Children's Cancer Society, Inc., Edwardsville, Ill., and the Child Protection Program Foundation, Inc., Dallas.

The state of Connecticut sued the same four charities on Monday, citing the same alleged abuses.

Alice Sawyer, president of the Hale County Unit of the American Cancer Society, praised the action taken against Cancer Fund of America in Pennsylvania and Connecticut. "We are pleased with this action," Mrs. Sawyer said.

"For several years we have questioned the fund-raising tactics of Cancer Fund of America. Many of our volunteers have reported receiving look-alike packets from Cancer Fund of America asking them to either walk their block or send donations".

The packets have often confused volunteers, she said. Some have collected donations and sent the money to Cancer Fund of America thinking they were participating in the American Cancer Society's annual residential drive.

Preate alleges Cancer Fund of America and the other groups used much of their donations trying to raise more money and exaggerated their charitable programs, including donating useless seeds to needy groups to grow fruits and vegetables.

Officials at three of the charities disputed Preate's claims and expressed confidence they would be vindicated in court.

The suits claimed the charities manipulated financial records to hide that most of their donations were used to raise more money.

Governor honors former Post woman with Award for Victim's Assistance

Loretta Adams, victim's assistance coordinator for Johnson and Somervell counties, received the Governor's Award for Victim's Assistance at a ceremony held in Austin on Friday. Adams was recognized for outstanding work done in assisting individuals who are victims of violent crimes.

In June of 1986, District Attorney Dan Boulware established the position of victim's assistance coordinator, immediately assigning Adams to the position because of her dedication and concern for crime victims.

Since that time, Adams has provided assistance to hundreds of victims, offering advice, emotional support and time.

Passed by the Texas Legislature in 1979, the Texas Crime Victims Compensation Act established a fund to provide certain benefits to crime victims.

Adams assists these victims in completing the necessary paperwork enabling them to become eligible for compensation. Without her guidance, many victims would be unaware of this program and would, therefore, be unable to take advantage of its benefits.

Nominated by County Judge Joe Durham, Adams was chosen from victim's assistance coordinators throughout the state of Texas.

Her outstanding work and undying dedication to crime victims in Johnson and Somervell counties make her well-deserving of this prestigious award.

Seeds distributed by three of the charities had been discarded as worthless by the manufacturer, Preate said. But one group claimed they were worth at least \$2.5 million, he added.

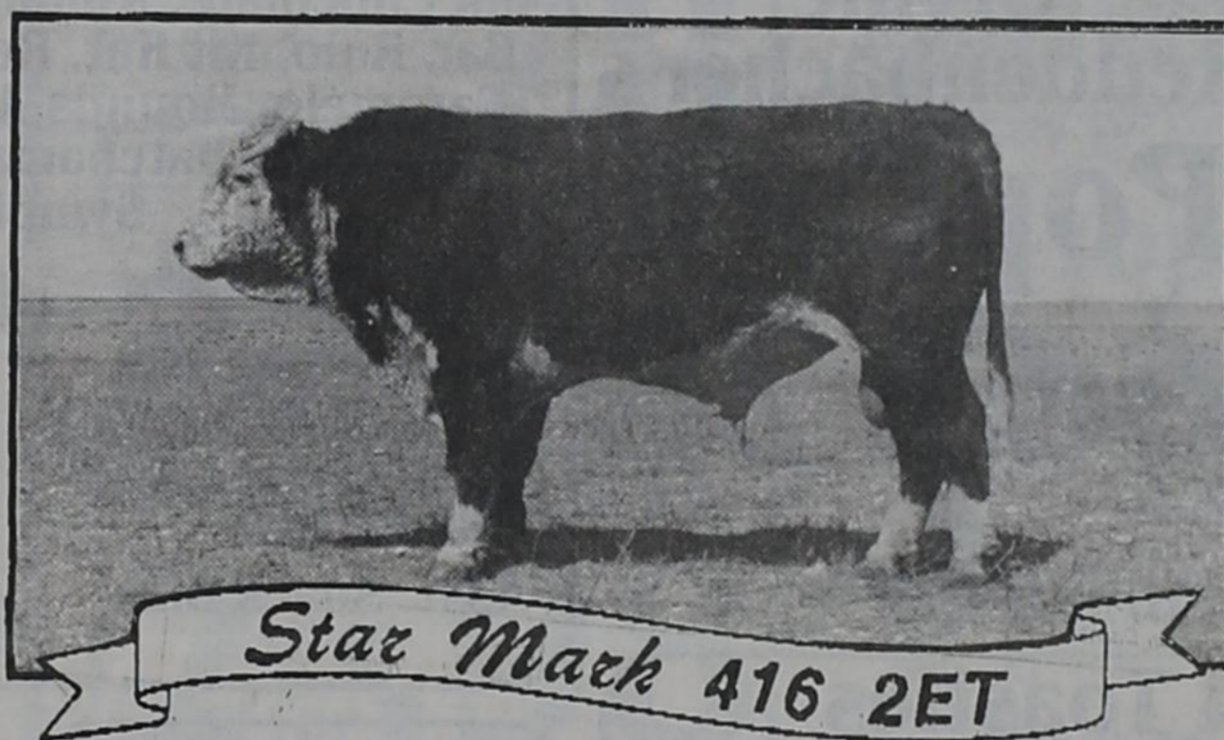

Saul Martinez took the hand off on a third and six play from his own 22 and broke several tackles on the way to a 78 yard touchdown run.

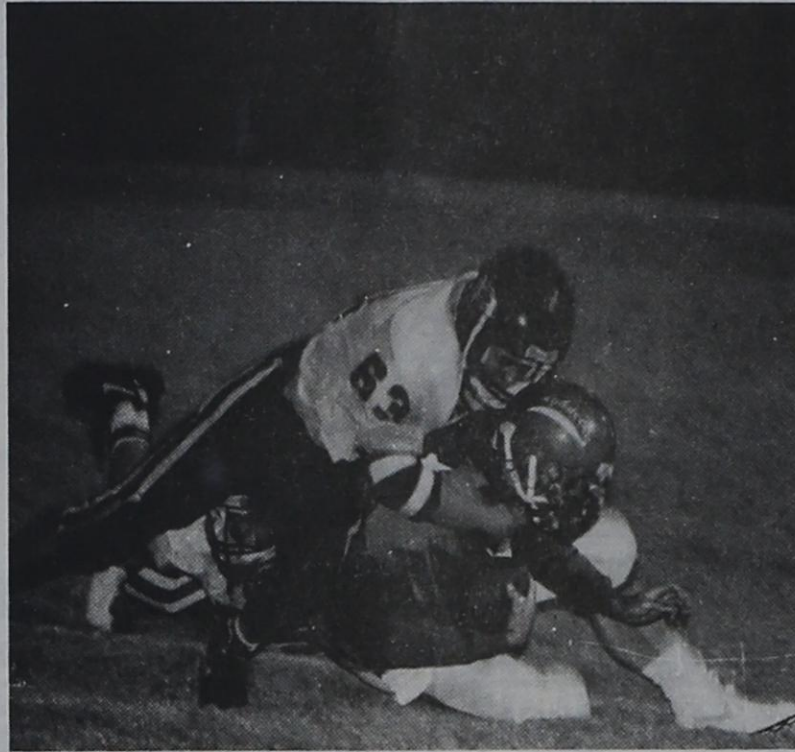
Post missed the extra point but led at the end of the third quarter 20-8.

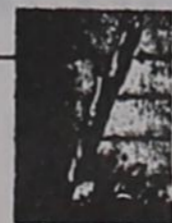
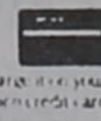

Predator Referendum Approaching

The Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers is sponsoring a referendum for predator control. The balloting will be conducted in 111 West Texas Counties, designated as sheep and goat counties.

The election will be held Thursday, October 29 and voting will be conducted through County Extension Offices in the designated counties.

Any sheep and goat producer whose operation lies in the 111 designated counties is eligible to vote. Garza County is located in District number three for purposes of this referendum.

A producer is defined as anyone, regardless of age, who produces sheep and or goats within the referendum area and who would be required to pay the assessment. In my estimation, this would also apply to 4-H and FFA members.

In essence the referendum is aimed at providing funding for the added control of predators. The work to be done will be over and above any predator control programs which are currently in place.

If passed, the referendum would be funded through a \$0.20 per head fee, at the first point of sale to be paid by the seller, on all sheep and goats sold within the referendum area.

Ballots will indicate: first, whether or not the voting producer is interested in supporting the referendum dedicated to area-wide

The voting will be conducted on Thursday, October 29, in the Courthouse, from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. and will be conducted by the Extension Office. Producers may vote only once and may vote in either the county of their residence (if within the referendum area) or the county in which their ranch headquarters is located.

If the referendum is passed, the \$0.20 per head fee, paid by the seller, will be committed to the referendum fund and the nine member producer board will determine how the funds are spent.

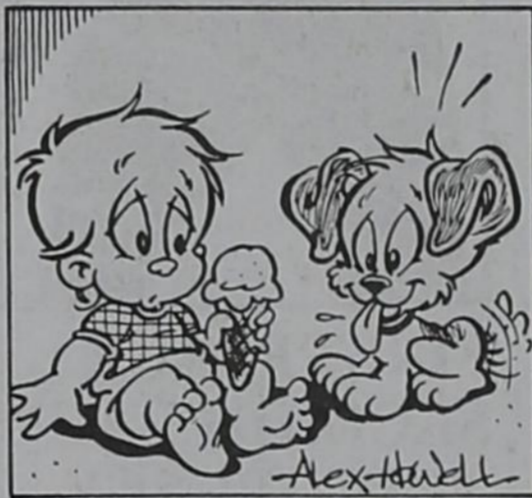

Middle School football squads split at Denver City

The eighth grade Antelopes fell to Denver City 15-12 in a non-district game at Denver City this past week. The seventh grade team picked up their second win of the season by downing the Mustangs 20-8.

Forty of those yards came on the touchdown run in the first quarter to give the Mustangs the lead. After that, Post held Denver City to just 6 yards total offense.

Both teams get ready to face Crosbyton in a district contest at Antelope Stadium this Thursday night.

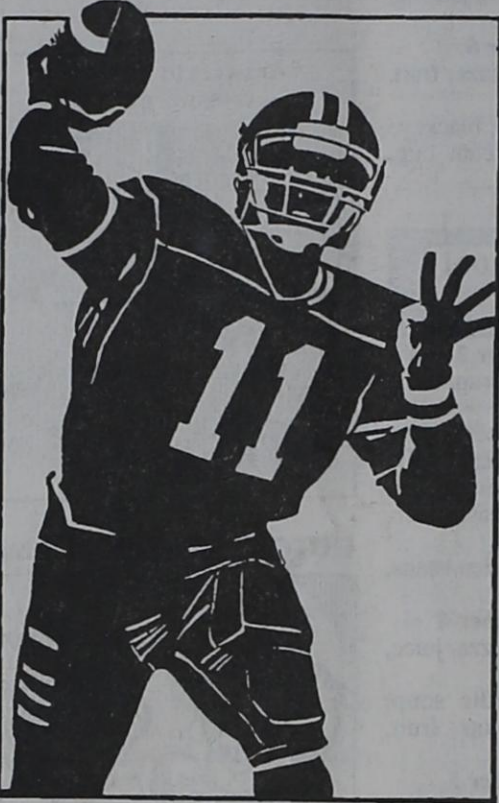
