that from 1923 to 1942, there were 72 floods on the Turkey Soil Conservation Districts gath- Creek watershed covered by the flood control plan, 29 of the floods were major ones, he said. Only those who have seen the destruction and erosion caused by floods can fully appreciate the flood control work being done, he told the audience.

Hughes emphasized the local level work of the soil conservation program.

Senator David Ratliff of the 24th Senatorial District of Texas, added his words of praise for the people engaged in the soil conservation work and the great need for it. "It is a very, very necessary program," he said "and should be continued and expanded." He pointed out that it will become more important in the years ahead. One thing man has not discovered how to make is land, Ratliff said. And with the population explosion, the need to conserve the land we have is of prime importance.

Mrs. Omar Burleson was introduced and spoke briefly, thanking the women of Cross Plains for their hospitality and for the coffee hosted by Mrs. Mike Richardson at Odom's Cafe in Cross Plains that morning.

Omar Burleson, Congressman from the 17th District, principal speaker of the day, said, "Thank God for the land." He also emphasized the earth's population explosion and the coming need for more sources of food. The day of the surplus food supply will be gone by 1972, he said. The United States will be seeking more food sources

right along with other nations. He said that once fertile lands that now lay in waste were the result of people not concerned with what they had. They failed, he said, but believes that with projects like the one celebrated today in Cross Plains, we in America will not fail.

Burleson said that it was easier today to find sympathy for water projects in Congress than in previous years because water is becoming a problem in all areas, pollution, scarcity and control. He pointed out that it is hard to tell the agriculture story to those who do not know what it is. More money for soil conservation projects is needed
