Former Teacher Dies in Georgia

Mrs. Stella Young Parrish, 82, of Oakland, Miss., died on Oct. 31, at the home of her daughter in Decatur, Ga. Burial was in the Oakland Cemetery Nov. 2nd.

The deceased was the only daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. A. T. Young, pioneer citizens of the Belle Plain Community. She was married to J. H. Parrish in Oakland, Miss., in 1910. Mr. Parrish died in 1961.

Mrs. Parrish received part of her education at Baird College, under the late Dr. John Collier. Later, she taught in the Clyde Public School for a number of years. She was a member of the Presbyterian Church.

Surviving are two daughters, Mrs. C. P. Shephard of Alexandria, Va., and Mrs. R. N. Patrick of Decatur, Ga.; one brother, D. W. Young of Newcastle, and four grandchildren. Six brothers preceded her in death.

Burleson Has Concern of Aged

ABILENE — Congressman Omar Burleson has expressed a concern that people over 65 years of age may not be aware of certain advantages to them under the new Medicare legislation.

For instance, Burleson says that the Abilene Social Security Office advises him that out of some 32,000 persons over the age of 65 in the 14-county area covered by that office, there are at least 6,000 persons who will not be automatically notified of their eligibility under the Program. Only those receiving Social Security benefits, railroad retirement or old age assistance will be notified. This has caused Congressman Burleson and the Social Security officials to feel that attention should be called to the provisions of the new law.

Burleson says that all those over 65 years of age should be reminded that they are eligible for certain benefits under the Medicare program. Choices in this matter must be made prior to March 31, 1966 by all who wish to enroll in the Health Insurance Program, commonly known as Medicare under Social Security.

The hospitalization portion is automatic for those receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits. Others must apply for it. All persons over 65, who wish to enroll in the Supplementary Medical Insurance part must make that decision known to the Social Security Administration by March 31, 1966, for they can not enroll after that date until October-December, 1967.

That part of Medicare will cost \$3.00 per month. All Social Security offices have leaflets explaining the provisions and the people in those offices will be glad to answer your particular questions so that you may make an informed decision. It would be most unfortunate if, by inadvertence or otherwise, there were those who did not exercise their right of choice, in order to benefit in the best possible way in accordance with their needs.

The majority of counties in the 17th Congressional District are served through the Social Security office in Room 2321 of the Federal building in Abilene, with the exception of the following counties:

- Palo Pinto and Parker County, 815 Pennsylvania Ave., Fort Worth.

AUSTIN — Both ultra-liberals and ultra-conservatives have indicated they want a place on the 1966 general election ballot.

Texas liberal spokesmen hint they will run a candidate for governor and perhaps one for the U. S. Senate if Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr is the Democratic senatorial nominee.

Conservative party already has adopted a resolution of intent to nominate state candidates next year.

CANDIDATES ANNOUNCE — Two new candidates have announced for statewide office.

They are State Sen. Galloway Calhoun of Tyler for attorney general; and State Rep. Paul B. Haring of Goliad for railroad commissioner.

Haring will take on Commissioner Byron Tunnell of Tyler. Tunnell was appointed by Gov. John Connally last January to fill the unexpired term of Ernest O. Thompson, who resigned because of ill health.

Secretary of State Crawford Martin of Hillsboro and State Sen. Franklin Spears of San Antonio announced earlier for attorney general.

NEW WEAPON FOUND — A significant new weapon has been acquired by the State of Texas against a federal lawsuit to abolish the poll tax as a voting requirement in this state reports Attorney General Carr.

U. S. Senate Judiciary Committee has made available to Carr testimony of federal Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach purporting to acknowledge the Texas poll tax is not used for racial discrimination.

Carr maintains that, in view of testimony, Congress could not have had Texas in mind when it authorized suits against the levy as a voting requirement under the new voting rights act.

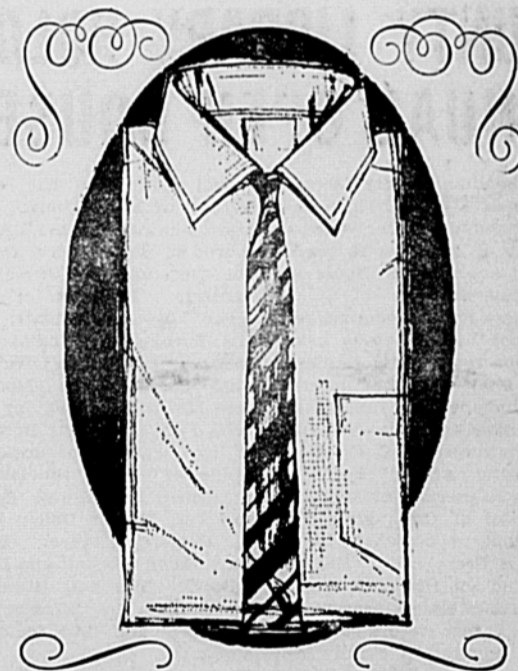

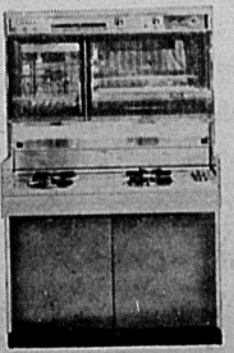

OPLIN OBSERVATIONS

DAPHENE FLOYD

Rain started to fall in the early morning hours Monday and continued falling slowly until noon, and the rain gauge showed 1.3 inches. Boy, that is what farmers and ranchers love to see on the young grain and pastures.

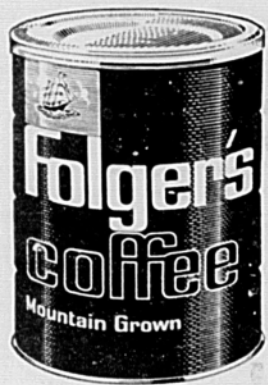
