

ELECTRICITY FOR OUT-OF-WAY PLACES

There is more than a 50-50 chance that isolated farms and ranches, of which there are many thousands especially in the West and Southwest, will be given the same opportunity to secure the advantages of electric current as farmers in more thickly settled communities. To make rural electrification self-liquidating, there should be at least three good paying customers per mile. 




