The oral discussions of safety topics the group saw illustrations in safety and relating work, done by registration.

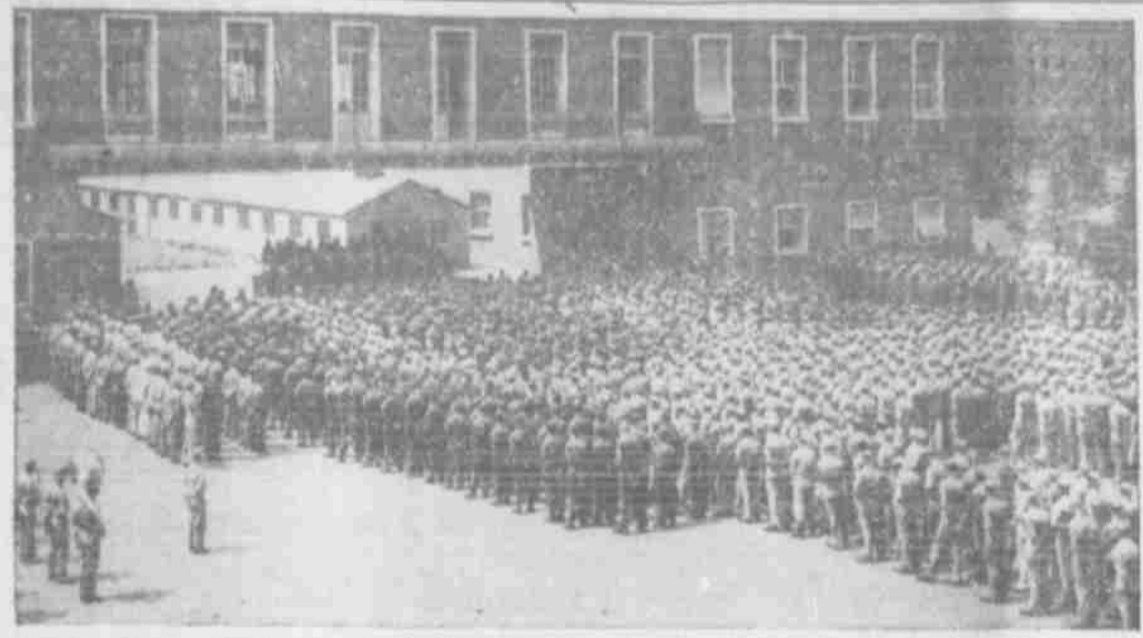
**FLOYD BUYS SERVICE STATION**

Reports reaching members of the family here revealed that Jackie and a friend were hunting and that the gun carried by the other youth accidentally discharged. The bullet struck Jackie in the back of the head killing him instantly.

**Hundley's Men's Store To Have New Modern Building**

Construction of a 20x70-foot business building to house the Hundley haberdashery was begun Monday morning by the Elbert Davies Construction Company on the lot west of Hundley's cleaning plant.

The new building will be modern in every respect, declares Jim Hundley, owner. The structure proper is to be of tile with the front finished in black and white, using black structural glass for trim and size paneling. Two large display windows, 4 feet wide by 10 feet deep, above which will be glass-brick, will add to the front design. The door is also to be of glass.

Furnishings will include modern display fixtures designed by Alpha Fixture Company of Dallas; fluorescent lighting; a central heating unit and an air-conditioning unit.

**Legion Memorial Campaign Begins**

A campaign to raise from \$15,000 to \$20,000 for an American Legion Memorial hall to pay tribute to the County's war dead, and to meet the needs of a fast growing Legion of returning servicemen, was launched the first of the week.

The local legion is receiving new members daily and has already enrolled about 40 more than the quota set by the state organization. Garza county has more than seven hundred War II veterans who will be eligible for membership when they all return from the armed forces.

**Influenza On Spread Over Garza County**

Influenza, which usually makes its appearance about this time every winter, is on the rampage this week and has put many families in bed. Most local business concerns report employees away from their work due to illness.

While the spread of influenza is extending to many families in Post and Garza county, it has not yet reached the epidemic stage, report local physicians.

**District Court To Be Convened Monday To Hear Stewart Case**

District Court will be convened here next Monday morning at 10 o'clock by Judge Louis B. Reed of Lamesa for the purpose of hearing an assault with intent to murder case against V. N. Stewart, who was indicted by a Garza county grand jury September 25.

Stewart is charged with assault with intent to murder his former wife, Mrs. Ida Stewart. Mrs. Stewart was critically wounded on the morning of September 1, by a man who entered her apartment in north Post and fired three shots at her. One of the bullets struck her in the chest and left her in a critical condition for many weeks.

Stewart was surrendered to the local sheriff's department by his son, on whose farm he was staying, several days after the shooting. He was arrested and has been held in the county jail since that time.

A petit jury panel of forty-five men has been summoned for jury service.

**Martin Reynolds Reported Improving**

Martin Reynolds who was taken to a specialist in Fort Worth last week is reported "doing nicely."

The Garza county rancher was injured in a mauling at the OS ranch during a round up.

Reynolds suffered a badly fractured and mangled right leg and lip when he was entangled in a lariat rope while roping calves. He was first taken to a Lubbock hospital and placed in a cast, but was removed from the cast and put in a Russell traction sling after being x-rayed at Fort Worth.

Physicians indicate he will have to remain in bed for at least 90 days and then will have to wear special braces.

**Former Post Men Open New Tire Repair Service**

Announcement is being made in this issue of the Post Dispatch of opening of a tire repair shop by two former Post men who have returned to this city. The new business, owned and operated by Thurman Francis and Max Gordon who recently returned to Post from Dallas where they have been in defense work, is located in the building formerly occupied by Bullard's Tire shop, 30 west Main.

The firm is equipped to do truck, tractor and automobile tire and tube repair work. They also solicit recapping work. The very best equipment has been installed.

**TIRE RATIONING MAY END EARLY NEXT YEAR**

The government Tuesday expressed hope that tire rationing can end early next year. The OPA announced that production has increased considerably during the past few weeks.

It was learned also that termination of truck tire rationing had been scheduled to end December 1, but that this plan has been revised in favor of ending all tire rationing at the same time.

**Post Boy Reported Killed In Korea; No Details Are Given**

Word has been received that Pvt. James Carrell Henderson, 19-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Henderson, Sr. of this city was killed in Korea, Japan, on November 9. The War Department notified the soldier's wife by telegram on November 23. No details of his death were received and the family is awaiting further information from Army officials.

Jim, as he was known to his many friends here, entered service on December 21, 1944. He was assigned to the communications branch of the 70th Headquarters Company. After receiving basic training at Camp Roberts, California, and further training at Camp Houze, Gainesville, Texas, he sailed for overseas duty on August 13, 1945.

The former Post High student was living in Stanton, Texas, when he entered service. He owned and operated the Consumers Oil company of that city. He was married to Miss Marcelle Pinkston on February 14, 1943. She has been making her home in Stanton.

Jim was born on August 2, 1926. Besides his wife and parents, he is survived by one brother, Sgt. B. C. Henderson, Jr., who is in Germany with the Army of Occupation. Sgt. Henderson was wounded last December 17. He was at that time assigned to the 99th Division of Hodge's First Army.

**Last Rites For Former Post Man Held In Lubbock**

Funeral services were held at 2:30 o'clock Monday afternoon at Rex Chapel in Lubbock for Joe Swift, 65, former Post business man and a resident of Lubbock the past eleven years, who died Sunday morning about 7 o'clock from a heart ailment.

Mr. Swift, who for a number of years was associated with Warren Brother's drug store of this city as manager, had been in the insurance business during the time he lived in Lubbock. Although he had been in ill health for several years his death came unexpectedly to his family and friends.

The funeral rites were conducted by the Rev. Ben D. Johnson, pastor of the Lubbock Baptist church, assisted by Dr. H. I. Robinson and Elder Luff Sanders. Burial was in Lubbock cemetery.

Survivors are his wife, two daughters, Mrs. Pete Pennell of Post, and Mrs. Do Hard of Lubbock; and four grandchildren.

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**Right-Of-Way Being Secured For New Post-Ralls Highway**

Right-of-way agreements have been secured from more than three fourths of the landowners outside Post city limits and efforts are being made at this time to complete signing up city property owners so that construction of the new Post-Ralls highway can get underway by the first of the year, reports County Judge J. Lee Bowen this morning.

Designation and approval for hard-surfacing the eight mile strip of State Highway 207 was made last June by the State Highway Department. The project calls for 140-foot right-of-way through northeast Post and 120-foot beyond the city limits to Yellow-house river. The new highway intersects Federal highway 380 one block east of the Santa Fe railway and runs parallel to the railway through the city and then bears north along the present Post-Ralls route.

Construction on the project is scheduled to begin January 1.

**Denver City Cops District 6-A Grid Championship Title**

Denver City Mustangs have been declared undisputed champions of District 6-A, which comprises the Post schools, and are shaping up to meet the Littlefield Wildcats in a bi-district game Friday, December 7.

The powerful Mustangs who went thru the season undefeated, and with only two touchdowns scored against them, clinched the title Thursday afternoon when they battled the Sandown Rough-necks on their home grid.

The Littlefield Wildcats, winners of District 5-A, who up until they tangled with Sudan last Thursday had won all their games and had only one touchdown scored against them, found the going tough and had to use the Inter-scholastic League penetration rule to out of the tie. The brilliant playing of the Sudan boys all but upset the apparent when they fought the Wildcats to a 20-20 tie.

The bi-district game promises to be a thriller and is expected to attract a large crowd of fans from the two districts.

**Victory Loan Lags, Only 10 Days To Go**

**CITIZENS MUST BUY DAILY AVERAGE OF \$15,000 BONDS TO MEET QUOTA BY DEC. 8**

With only ten more days left to complete Garza County's Victory War Loan campaign, local citizens will have to make daily bond purchases of \$15,000 if the County is to meet its \$225,000 quota.

The campaign has been underway since October 29, and apparently is all but forgotten except for those who are charged with the responsibility of conducting the drive. Up until Saturday bond sales totaled only \$20,000.00, including E bond purchases of \$16,400, reported T. R. Greenfield, County War Finance committee chairman. The County's E bond quota is \$75,000.

Observers do not see how Garza county citizens can sit back in ease and let thousands of our boys remain in the Pacific and European theater of operation. The government has repeatedly called for funds to bring service men home and has pointed out that the money must be raised by the Victory War Loan drive.

If you, as a citizen, have not yet purchased war bonds in this final drive, please do so at once, request those in charge of the campaign. "We must not fall short in meeting our quota," declared the chairman.

The campaign is to end December 8.

Twenty-four hours from now, it will be just a bit more difficult to purchase that Christmas gift than it was today. Everybody wants to get back into the swing of old-fashioned Christmas giving, but if you are expecting to wait until the night before Christmas to do your shopping, Post merchants say in unison—"It may be too late."

No magic, no sleight-of-hand or miracle will put many hard-to-get items back on store counters for Christmas shoppers this year and there is a limited supply of items that are now being displayed on store counters.

Many Garza folks have been putting off Christmas shopping thinking that at the last minute some form of miracle would put hard to get items back on store shelves but merchants of Post are displaying and telling the folks about the available merchandise via advertising columns of the Post Dispatch. Additional shipments of these same items will probably supplement present stocks but so far as mechanical and metal toys and the long-awaited electrical household appliances, etc. are concerned, the picture has changed but very little.

There will be a small trickle of such materials and Post merchants have been promised their share as soon as such items are available but if you are waiting to purchase the hard-to-get items, you probably will wait in vain. Some merchants and patrons are interested in the "gift certificate plan" and its a fine plan but such a plan can't be used for many gifts—so advice to Garza folks is "Buy Early."

**THE BLITZ BUGGY**

After the Civil War it was  
 "Forty acres and a mule." This  
 time, it's probably going to be  
 "Forty acres and a jeep" if all ex-  
 periments, now in progress turn  
 out as the Department of Agricul-  
 ture expects them to.

The jeep is being put through  
 the most rigid farm tests on ex-  
 perimental farms over the nation.  
 In one recent test the jeep plow-  
 ed an acre of cotton bottom land  
 with a 16-inch plow in a little  
 more than an hour using 2.32 gal-  
 lons of gasoline. It pulled 1300  
 pounds without wheel slippage.

It hauled a three-horse drill  
 over a 20-acre field with ten gal-  
 lons of gasoline, a half gallon to  
 the acre. In previous years this  
 job had required a heavy tractor  
 and the gasoline consumption was  
 33 gallons to the acre.

During the day the jeep can  
 plow the fields, furnish power for  
 milking and, in general, take the  
 strain off the farmer's back. At  
 night the family can ride to town  
 to see a movie.

The jeep should be excellent on  
 ranches, where it can take out  
 across the pastures, go blithely  
 over rocks and brush and climb  
 hills almost anywhere a horse can  
 go.

Rural Free Delivery mail car-  
 riers have been trying to buy  
 jeeps. Garage owners want jeeps  
 for tow cars, and railroads seek  
 them for track-maintenance work-  
 ers. It doesn't take much imagina-  
 tion to see how this vehicle could  
 be utilized in fighting forest fires  
 in the great Northwest, or for in-  
 sect control in swamp and bog

**Sidelights . . .**

**FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.**  
 By Congressman Geo. Mahon

Hearings by the joint House and  
 Senate Committee on the Pearl  
 Harbor disaster are in full swing.  
 It is doubtful that the whole truth  
 of this tragedy will ever be  
 known. The effectiveness of the  
 hearing is being jeopardized by  
 the partisan wrangling of certain  
 members of the Committee.

The people are entitled to know  
 all the facts about Pearl Harbor,  
 but they will not have time and  
 opportunity to read the volumi-  
 nous testimony now being taken.  
 Yet, the press and radio are doing  
 their best to cover the hearings  
 and make pertinent information  
 available to the public.

I dropped in on the hearings to  
 listen briefly to some of the testi-  
 mony of Admiral Richardson.  
 There were one hundred newspap-  
 er and radio reporters in attend-  
 ance, and three motion picture  
 cameras were in operation.

The banner cotton crop year for  
 the twenty-five counties of the  
 19th Congressional District was  
 1937, when we produced more  
 than one million bales. As of Novem-  
 ber 1st of this year, our Dis-  
 trict had harvested 77,000 bales,  
 which is 10,000 bales less than was  
 harvested by the same date in  
 1937, an exceptionally poor crop  
 year in West Texas.

Texas has been unusually hon-  
 ored in the nomination by the  
 President of General Dwight D.  
 Eisenhower for the top position in  
 the Army and Admiral Chester  
 W. Nimitz for the top position in  
 the Navy. Both are Texas born.  
 General Eisenhower was born in  
 Denison, and Admiral Nimitz in  
 Fredericksburg.

General Eisenhower, the new  
 Chief of Staff of the Army, is per-  
 haps the most popular military  
 leader in the world. He has ac-  
 cepted his honors with modesty  
 and good taste. His experiences  
 as Supreme Commander of Al-  
 lied Forces in Europe should be  
 of great value to him as the chief  
 military officer of the War Depart-  
 ment.

The appointment of Admiral  
 Nimitz is also an excellent choice.  
 The Admiral is a warm-hearted,  
 friendly Texan, whose experience  
 in the Pacific has been of great  
 value to the Navy.

Six months after Pearl Harbor  
 the word jeep found its way into  
 the American dictionary, and we  
 bet it's there to stay!

**ELECTRICITY FOR OUT-  
 OF-WAY PLACES**

There is more than a 50-50  
 chance that isolated farms and  
 ranches, of which there are many  
 thousands especially in the West  
 and Southwest, will be given the  
 opportunity to secure the ad-  
 vantages of electric current as  
 farmers in more thickly settled  
 communities. To make rural elec-  
 trification self-liquidating, there  
 should be at least three good pay-  
 ing customers per mile. This places  
 thousands of farmers and  
 ranchmen at a disadvantage, and  
 there is no hope for improvement  
 for many years, if ever. In order  
 to overcome this disadvantage and  
 place these homes in a better po-  
 sition to have electric power, it is  
 proposed that an REA appropria-  
 tion be made for loans to isolated  
 farmers and ranchmen for the  
 purpose of equipping their homes  
 and barns with individual light  
 plants, either wind driven, or  
 from diesel or other power plants.

The need for this appropriation  
 of \$550,000,000 is apparent when  
 it is known that in seventeen  
 states west of the Mississippi river  
 there are more than 1,000,000  
 farms and ranches that average  
 only 1.1 homes per mile, of which  
 300,000 average less than 0.6  
 homes per mile. Individual sys-  
 tems, which it is proposed to fin-  
 ance, are capable of producing  
 more electric energy per month  
 than farmers and ranchers will  
 use.

Now that large appropriations  
 for rural electric lines are avai-  
 lable and restrictions on con-  
 struction removed, a rapid expan-  
 sion of electric service in rural  
 districts is expected. Texas has  
 been allotted \$4,000,000 as a start-  
 er, and new lines already planned  
 will give service to 10,000 farms  
 and rural homes. Up to July 1,  
 1943 Texas has been allotted \$48,-  
 000,000 for rural lines with which  
 41,000 miles of line have been  
 constructed, serving 100,000 farm  
 families.—Farm and Ranch Mag-  
 azine

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**Question And Answer Column**  
 For The Benefit of Garza World War II Veterans

This space is devoted to questions and answers of interest to Garza County returning service men. It will be published for as long as a regular feature. For additional information contact Geo. Sessums office, 703-5, Lubbock National bank building, Lubbock.

**Q.** Can the designated beneficiary of National Service Life Insurance policy be changed and if so how may this be effected?

**A.** Such a change of beneficiary may be accomplished by application signed by the insured in proper form. The Veterans Administration Form 336 is designed for this purpose. It is not necessary that the prior beneficiary be notified.

**Q.** Who is eligible for out-patient treatment?

**A.** Any veteran who is not dishonorably discharged from his last period of War Service if in need of such service for a service connected disability, or any veteran honorably discharged in line of duty or in receipt of pension for a service connected disability is entitled to out-patient treatment provided that the disability for which treatment is desired has been adjudicated as service connected or the official records show that such disability was the cause of discharge from active service.

**Q.** Does the Government pay all the interest for a veteran on a loan guaranteed by the Veterans Administration?

**A.** No, however, the Veterans Administration will pay the interest for the first year on that part of the loan guaranteed.

**Q.** What types of vocational training are furnished by the Veterans Administration in carrying out the provisions of the law?

**A.** The Veterans Administration provides institutional training, that is, training while enrolled in school and training on the job.

**Q.** Are veterans having disabilities due to misconduct entitled to hospital treatment or domiciliary care for such disabilities?

**A.** Hospitalization or domiciliary care is not necessarily denied because of misconduct origin of the disability.

**Q.** May a veteran name a friend as beneficiary for his National Service Life Insurance?

**A.** No, a friend does not come within the permitted class of beneficiaries. The insured may designate (1) wife (husband); (2) child (including adopted child, step child, illegitimate child); (3) parent; (4) persons who have stood in loco parentis (in place of a parent); (5) brother or sister including those of the half blood.

**Q.** Are there disability benefits provided in National Service Life Insurance policies?

**A.** No disability benefits are provided in National Service Life Policies except waiver of premiums for total disability continuing for a period of six months or longer.

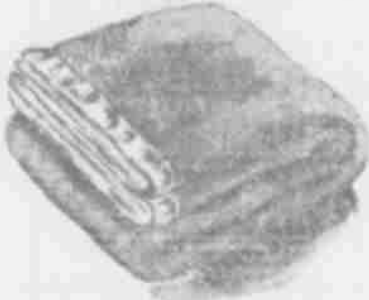

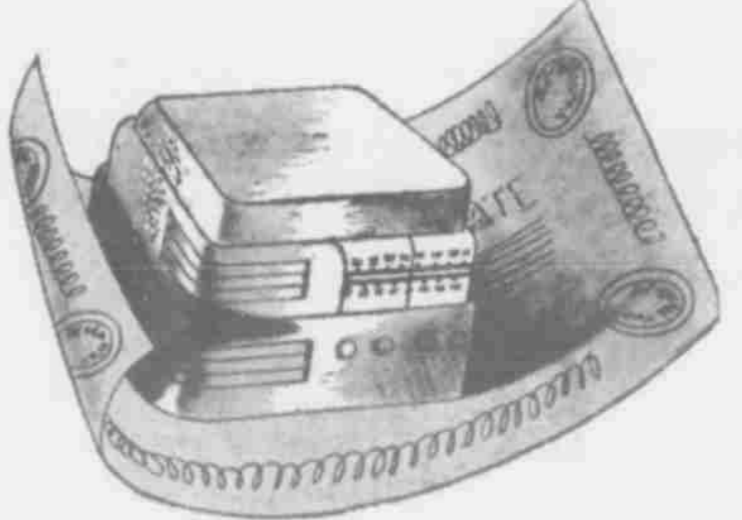

**End Of Meat Rationing Brings Relief To Butchers... Women No Longer Will Have To Expose Contents Of Purses**

The loudest "sighs of relief" over the end of meat rationing came Saturday not from housewives but from the local butchers. They are jubilant over stoppage of the bothersome "point system" which entailed more time than serving their customers.

"It is certainly a relief not to have to dig through two or three dilapidated ration books to find the right stamps every time you sell a lady a couple of steaks or a roast" said one butcher. "I do not know why it always happened that most women had to have the butcher go through the contents of her purse, dumped on the counter, to find just that right stamp... it slows up things. You can wait on twice as many customers when you don't have to fool with ration stamps."

Probably just as pleased but less vocal about it, the women are demonstrating their feelings by buying bigger steaks and roasts than they were able to afford when they had to conserve on their points.

Butchers and housewives have been busy since the announcement of the end of meat, butter and fats rationing, forgetting about the whole thing.

**Southland Sailor Helps To Set Up Traffic System**

Carroll D. Tanner, seaman, second class, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Tanner, Southland, helped an ingenious group of Navy men set up a transportation system between Tokyo, Yokohama and Yokosuka Naval Base.

The group had come to locate all available Japanese vehicles, put them in running order, and set up the highway traffic system. Time was short and the need urgent, but—

It didn't take the Navy men long to discover that the Jap. Vehicles really had taken a beating. There wasn't one that had less than five years of service on it—and there were no spare Jap spare parts.

The Americans had to take the motor and parts out of one of the wrecks, a chassis from another, and the body from a third, to get anything like a vehicle that would respond to gasoline.

Now, four weeks later, Yokosuka naval base is connected with Tokyo, Yokohama and other points by an intricate network of Japanese roads. Personnel and supplies roll daily over the narrow, rough concrete lanes. Seven Jap heavy-duty trucks, two large buses, a growing number of cars, and five Jap motorcycles are in operation over the route, in addition to five American "carry-all" type station wagons and 25 jeeps.

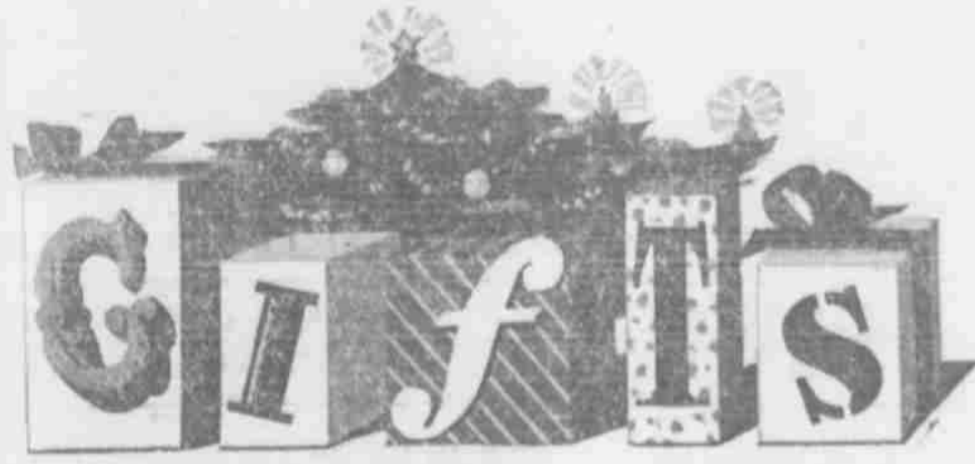

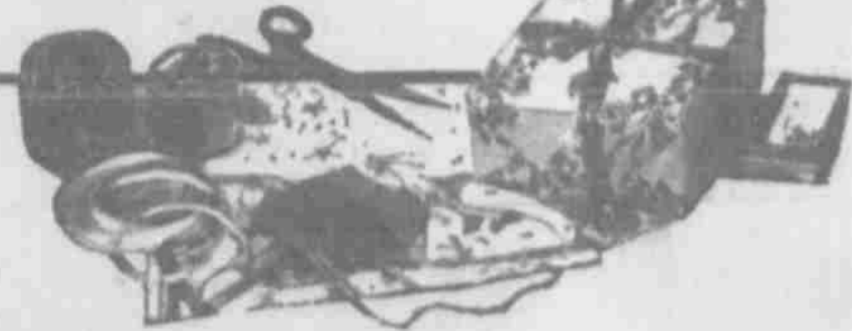

## Former Garza Man Proves To Be Busy Chaplain In Europe

Long time residents of the county, especially the Close City community, will be interested in the following clipping from the Wayland College paper:

Captain Chaplain Earl E. Ray and his assistant have received a total of five decorations as a result of heroic activity on the battlefield since D-Day in Africa.

Working with the 39th Infantry Regiment, the two men were machine-gunned while bringing back bodies of Yank casualties in Africa. Both men were awarded the Silver Star.

In Sicily the chaplain was wounded while recovering bodies from a minefield. A British soldier stepped on a mine, and as a result of the explosion, the Chaplain still carries a tiny piece of metal in his forearm.

In France, Chaplain Ray and his assistant risked their lives when they pulled a doughboy from a fiercely burning jeep and they each received a Bronze Star.

Services have been held by Chaplain Ray in barns and stables, and he has preached to GIs who waded through waist-deep snow to attend his services. In Africa, he marched 100 miles from Mogenia to Oran in order to be with his doughfeet. He is a "Soldier's Chaplain."

Chaplain Ray is a Wayland college graduate and after leaving there he finished Auburn college. He entered the Army in 1941 at Fort Bragg. He landed at Morocco and went through Algeria, Bizerte, Tunisia, Sicily, Italy, England, France, Belgium, and Germany. When the war was over he was with the Ninth Infantry Division.

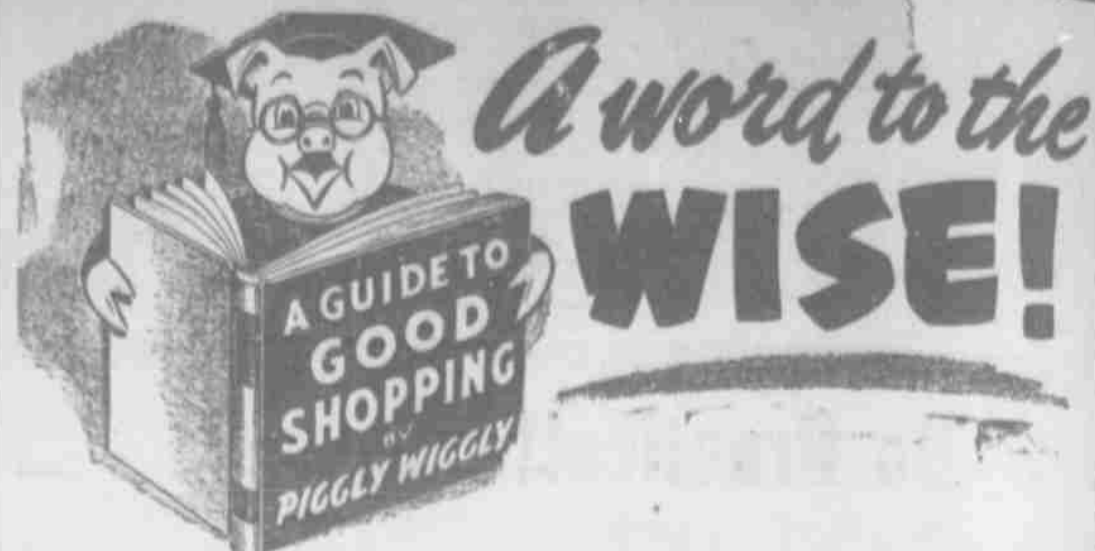
