

Farm Bureau Sponsors Two For Texas Firemen's Training School

The Callahan County Farm Bureau is sponsoring the attendance of two volunteer firemen from this county to the annual Texas Firemen's Training School to be held July 17-22, on the campus of Texas A&M University at College Station, according to Hadden Payne of Cross Plains, president.

Volunteer firemen planning to attend are Charles Walker of Baird and Alvin J. McCuin of Cross Plains.

In addition to attending the regular courses at the school, volunteer firemen, sponsored by the Farm Bureau, will also attend two special seminars dealing with rural fire protection.

Farm Bureau pays \$52.50 of the \$57.50 tuition for sponsored members of the county volunteer fire department. This covers lodging and meals for the one week course.

Across the state, some 59 county Farm Bureaus are cooperating with the Texas Farm

Bureau Mutual Insurance Company of Waco, in helping defray expenses of 140 volunteer firemen in attending school.

Payne pointed out that the Farm Bureau carries on a year-round fire prevention and fire protection program. Joe Smetana, Waco, Texas Farm Bureau safety director, has a fire prevention demonstration he presents to schools and clubs over the state. The TFB Mutual Company also pays \$75 to local fire departments answering a call outside city limits to fight fires involving property of Farm Bureau insureds.

In a meeting of the Board of Directors of Callahan County Farm Bureau Tuesday, July 5, plans were made to sponsor a County Farm Bureau Queen Contest. This will be held at the Eula High School. A salad supper will precede the contest. The date for the affair will be announced later.

Putnam Man Promotes New Book, "The One-Eyed Man"

Larry King, Putnam native, was in Abilene Monday to promote his newly published novel, "The One-Eyed Man," and was scheduled to appear at an informal autographing session at Sanders Book Store in Westgate Shopping Center Monday morning.

The novel, (New American Library, \$5.95) will be offered in August by the Literary Guild Book Club. It has received great acclaim as an outstanding topical political novel and deals with the civil rights struggle of the past decade. It has been compared in sharpness of political portrayal with "All The King's Men."

King attended school in Putnam and Scranton before his family moved to New Mexico in 1942. He was working as a newspaper man in Odessa when he went to Washington in 1964 as an administrative assistant to ex-Cong. J. T. Rutherford. He later held a similar position with Cong. Jim Wright of Fort Worth. He left active politics two years ago to devote full time to free lance writing.

His work has appeared in Harpers, Sports Illustrated, Esquire, The Nation, True, Capitol Hill and The Texas Observer.

He is now working on a second novel to be published next year.

The Commissioners Court of Callahan County gave unanimous approval Monday at 10:30 a. m., to a resolution for construction of a Park Road in connection with the lake to be built South of Clyde.

Negotiations have practically been completed by the City of Clyde for the construction of a municipal water supply and recreation lake, which will impound 10,000 acre-feet of water.

The proposed Park Road will be constructed from Farm Road 18 for a distance of approximately three miles South, then looping through by the new lake for a distance of about 1.3 miles, then West to Farm Road 604 for a distance of about three miles, for a total of approximately 7.3 miles.

The resolution, approved and endorsed by the Baird Chamber of Commerce and the City of Baird, has been submitted to the City of Clyde for consideration of endorsement. The City Council will meet Thursday night and an endorsement is expected at that time.

After all endorsements have been made on the resolution, it will be presented to J. C. Roberts of Abilene, and to the Highway Commissioners, J. H. Kuitgen, Herbert C. Petty, Jr., and Hal Woodward.

Total cost of the proposed lake will be \$586,963, of which the federal government will pay \$347,172. The City of Clyde is in the process of seeking a \$35,000 loan from the Texas Water Development Board for a portion of the remaining construction costs.

AUSTIN — Texas -- with its what, why, where and who and because -- raised its unpopular head in the Texas capitol last week.

Texas Committee on state and Local Tax Policy presented a report to Gov. John Connally and the Texas Legislature.

Everybody's request for more money indicates that the spending program to be presented the 1967 Legislature will eat up the \$75,000,000 state surplus -- and require new money to finance. Higher education, pay raises

for teachers and state employees, water development, state park and recreation expenditures, Texas Highway Patrol -- all want in on the act.

The tax policy committee is headed by Rep. Ben Atwell of Dallas, who asked the Texas Research League to list possible sources for new taxes.

Proposed were:
Increase the state sales tax from its present two per cent to a two and a half or three per cent, raising \$72,400,000 to \$144,800,000 a year;

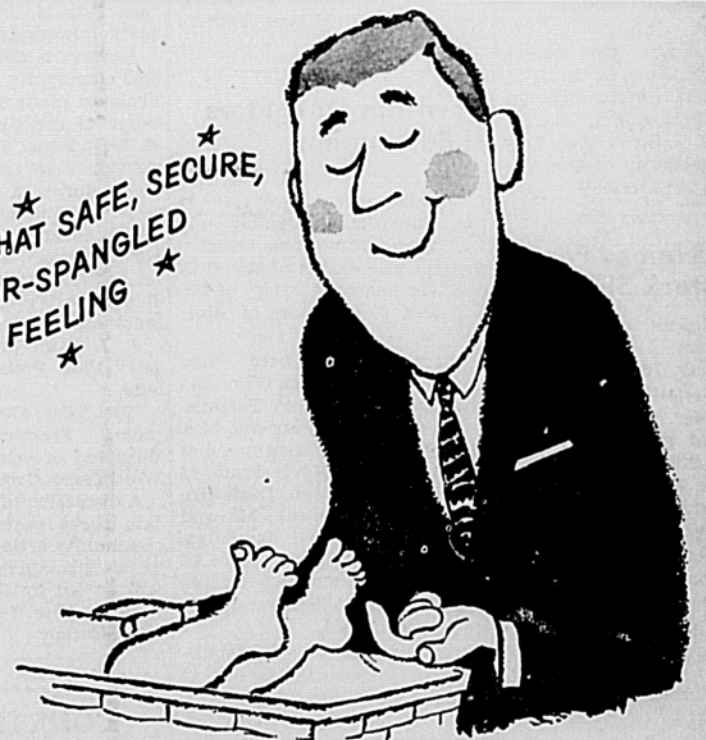

Three Steps of Salvation

In the second chapter of Acts, the first through the fourth verse, "And when the day of Pentecost was full come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Pentecost is the fullness of Gods plan of salvation for man. It is very easy for us to accept God, the Father; God, the Son; and leave out God, the Holy Ghost. But the Bible tells us in First John 5:7 For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, The Word, and the Holy Ghost; and these three are one.

There are people who will tell you that they have the Holy Spirit. They will tell you that they experienced it when they were saved. When a person repents and accepts Christ as his personal Saviour, he does not receive the Holy Spirit. Repentance is the first step of God's plan for man. Next is sanctification. This simply means separation from the world and the dedication to God. This is the delivering power of God. There are people who cannot quit filthy habits; they need to experience a deeper walk with God.

From my own experience, I quit smoking time and time again, but didn't have the will power to stay quit. But when I was sanctified, those left and the desire I had for them left also. You may say this is not necessary to do all of this, but let us look in the Word of God. In Hebrew 12:14: "Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which no man shall see the Lord." The word holiness and sanctification mean the same thing. Jesus is coming after a people without spot or wrinkle, in other word, a holy people, a sanctified people, peculiar people, zealous of good works. After this happens, a person is ready for the initial infilling of the Holy Ghost.

If you will notice, the disciples were saved and sanctified. Jesus told them and his followers to go and tarry in Jerusalem until you be endued with power from on high.

In the second chapter of Acts we see what happens when the Holy Ghost fell. They spoke with and magnified God. In Acts 2:12, the honest hearted asked this: "What meaneth this?" Others mocking said in Acts 2:13-17, "These men are full of new wine." But Peter, standing up with the eleven, lifted up his voice, and said unto

them, "Ye men of Judea, and all ye that dwell at Jerusalem, be this known unto you, and hearken to my words: For these are not drunken, as ye suppose, seeing it is but the third hour of the day. But this is that which was spoken by the prophet Joel; And it shall come to pass in the last days, saith God, I will pour out of my Spirit upon all flesh; and your sons and your daughters shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams."

We are living in the last days and God is pouring out his Spirit on all denominations. You may say it is not for me, but let us go to Acts 2:39: "For the promise is unto you, and to your children, and to all that are afar off, even as many as the Lord our God shall call."

So if God has called you, the Holy Ghost is for you.

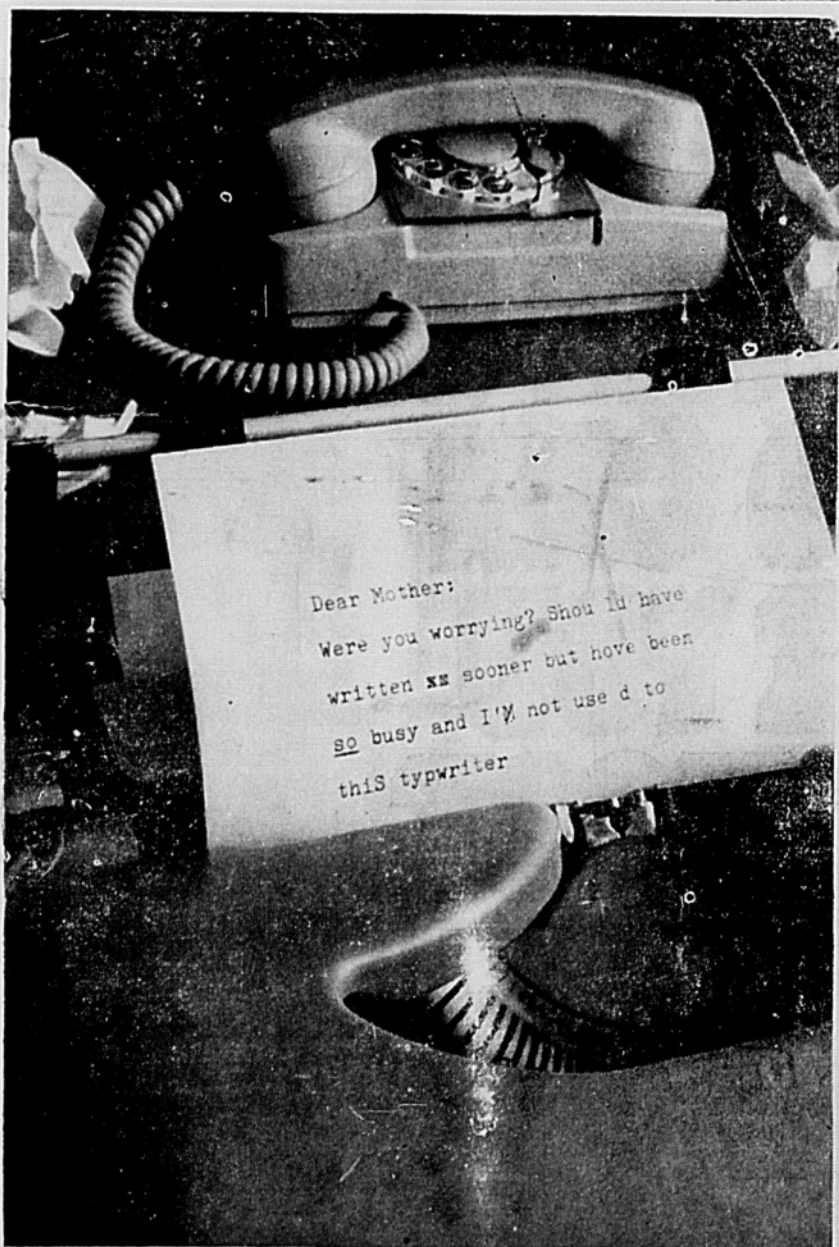

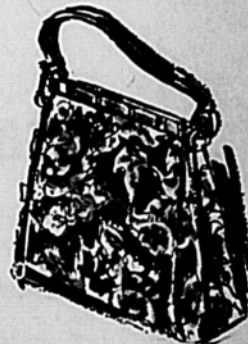

Immigration Patrol Inspectors Needed

A new examination for Immigration Patrol Inspector has been announced by the U. S. Civil Service Commission, for filling positions paying \$6,269 a year with the Immigration and Naturalization Service of the U. S. Department of Justice.

These positions offer young men interested in immigration law enforcement an opportunity to begin a career in such work with on-the-job training for positions of greater responsibility. No experience is required for these positions. To qualify, applicant must pass a written test of verbal abilities, judgment, and aptitude for learning a foreign language; those who pass the test will be interviewed to determine if they have the personal qualities needed for the work. Since the duties are arduous, applicants must be in sound physical condition.

Full information is given in Announcement No. 398 B. Applicants who file by July 15, will be scheduled for the first test on August 20. Three additional tests have been scheduled. The final date for applying is February 15, 1967. Applications should be sent to the Board of Examiners, Immigration and Naturalization Service, Washington, D. C. 20536.

Announcements and appropriate application forms may be obtained from many post offices throughout the country, from the Board of Examiners above, or from the U. S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C. 20415.

Three Steps of Salvation

In the second chapter of Acts, the first through the fourth verse, "And when the day of Pentecost was full come, they were all with one accord in one place. And suddenly there came a sound from heaven as of a rushing mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared unto them cloven tongues like as of fire, and it sat upon each of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Ghost, and began to speak with their tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance."

Pentecost is the fullness of Gods plan of salvation for man. It is very easy for us to accept God, the Father; God, the Son; and leave out God, the Holy Ghost. But the Bible tells us in First John 5:7 "For there are three that bear record in heaven, the Father, The Word, and the Holy Ghost; and these three are one."

There are people who will tell you that they have the Holy Spirit. They will tell you that they experienced it when they were saved. 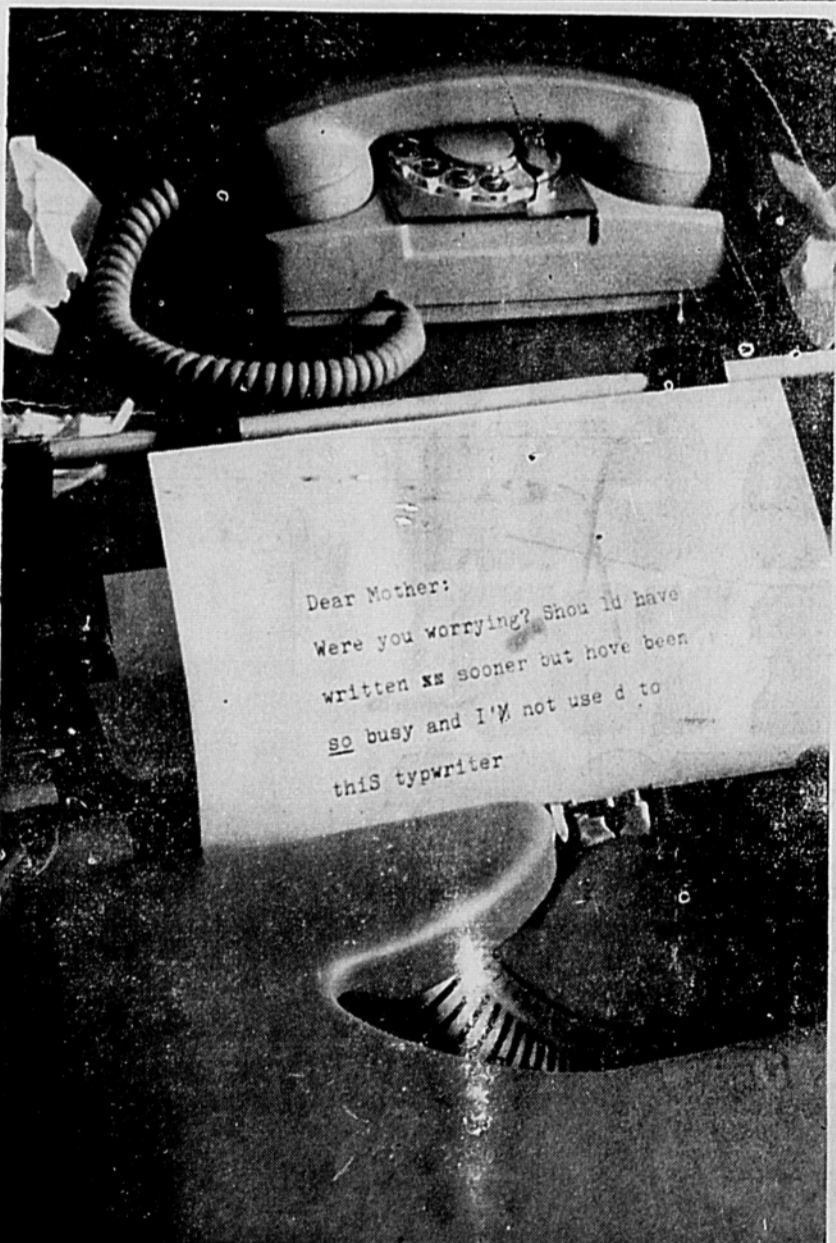

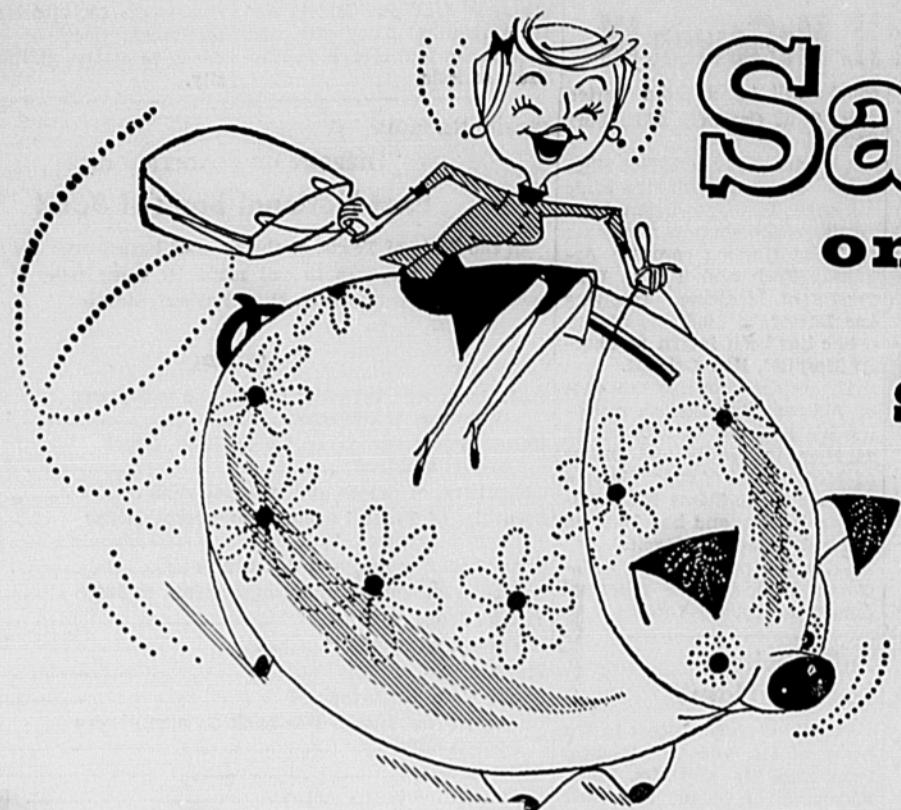
