16 Picked-Up For Vandelism

Five girls and eleven boys, ranging from age 15 to 21, were picked up Tuesday night, August 2, for vandalism of the A. R. Kelton ranch house, six miles southeast of Baird. Thirteen of the sixteen youths were fined \$43.80 each in Callahan County Court Wednesday morning. The remaining three, being under 18 years of age, were turned over to juvenile authorities.

L. Hazelwood of Palestine, and Mr. Leon Howard, Golf Course Architect and Agronomist of Austin.

The Recreation Center is being planned to provide the finest in facilities for outdoor sports and activities, as well as facilities for meetings, social gatherings and dining. The site for the project is termed as excellent for the golf course  $d\varepsilon$ -velopment and will provide ascenic area for the clubhouse, The Callahan County Singing pool, manager's quarters and other facilities. The fully irrigated golf course will feature a putting green and driving range in addition to the wide fairways Everyone is cordially invited and large well-shaped greens.

If FHA approval is granted for the loan, final planning will be carried out, the loan accepted and bids will then be opened for construction. Actual con-struction of the facility is expected to require from three to five months. The 40-year FHA loan and operation of the facility will be handled through dues payments by members, and other revenues from club ser-

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Section 62 of Article XVI a new subsection (c), of said Section 62; authorizing the Legislature to enact laws establishing, subject to the limitations stated, a State-wide System of Retirement, Disability and Death Compensarion benefits for the officers and employees of the counties and other political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of the state, and of the political subdivisions of the state, or any county.

Section 1. That Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas as be amended by adding thereto a subsection (c) which shall read as follows:


