The Baird Bears lost their season's opener to the Santa Anna Mountaineers Friday night with the final score being 28-6. The Mountaineers scored

heavily in the first quarter with Butch Makuta and Dickie Horne leading the way. Makuta scored from 18 yards out early in the quarter, with the try for extra point failing.

Horne later scored from the five, and again failing to make the extra point. They scored again when Ted Ford intercepted a pass and ran 44 yards for the TD. The two point conversion was made good by Makuta.

The Bears scored in the final quarter when Kenny Townsend threw to J. D. Faircloth for a 65-yard pass and run play. The try for extra point failed.

Santa Anna scored again as Horne ran from 22 yards out, but failed to make the extra point. Their final two points were marked up when the Santa Anna defense caught Baird quarterback Townsend behind his goal line for a safety.

Baird had 8 first downs; 52 yards rushing; 79 yards passing; 5 of 14 passes completed; had 1 pass intercepted; 6 punts for 30 yd. average and lost 2 fumbles.

### FFA Elects New Officers, Sweetheart

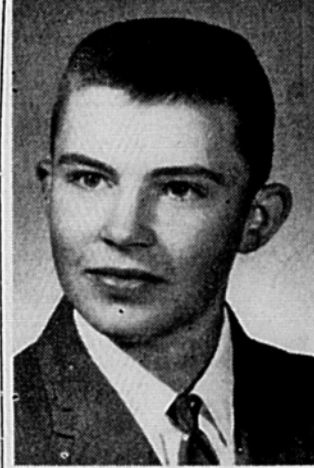

## Stickhorses Go To Viet Nam

Mr. Cavalry and Trooper, latest stickhorse creations from Putnam and destined to leave for Viet Nam some time in November, should arrive in time for their messages to be distributed to troops by Thanksgiving Day.

Last spring, Roger Reynolds, 8 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Reynolds of Putnam, sent these two stickhorses on the "trail." They visited several sections of the U. S., collecting letters, scrapbooks, and many notes to be forwarded to the armed forces.

Earlier models, labeled Gold Dust I through IV, were sent

during the past six years on tours across the U. S. and much of the world by Roger's older brother, Roddy, now 18.

They generated messages of goodwill everywhere they went. Two of the four stickhorses got as far as Moscow and Fairbanks, Alaska, where their trails disappeared. The other two found their way back to the Reynolds household, where they reside with hundreds of messages and souvenirs of their junkets.

Some persons whose day had been brightened by the Gold Dust horses, suggested that they be sent to cheer troops in Viet Nam.

Roddy, now a freshman at Abilene Christian College, turned the project over to Roger, a third grader. His father, school superintendent at Putnam, serves as advisor.

The goodwill horses will begin their journey Sept. 12 when the Reynolds family deliver Mr. Cavalry and Trooper to Automation Industries, Inc., in Abilene. From there they will go to Sargent Brothers in Tulsa, Okla., Hupp Aviation in Chicago and back to Fort Worth, where they will be circulated among Textron's Bell Helicopter Co. employees.

About November 1, they'll be loaded into one of the "Hueys", workhorses of the Army's helicopter force, and be flown to Sharpe Army Depot in Lathrop, Calif., where all Viet Nam-bound helicopters are given their final preparations.

While at Sharpe, they'll make their final collection of messages for the armed force, then across the Pacific to Viet Nam.

Army information officials in Washington have arranged for Mr. Cavalry and Trooper to be welcomed to Viet Nam by its representatives in Saigon, who will supervise the windup of the project.

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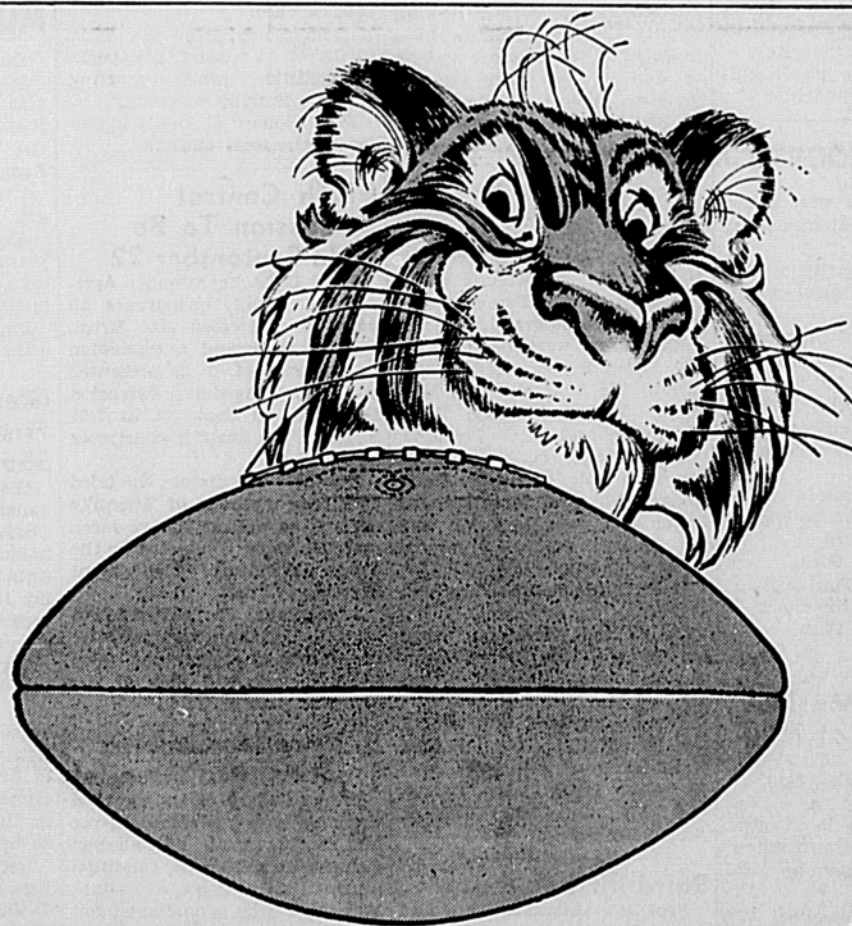
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# Mr., Mrs. Ralph Snow Celebrated 50th Anniversary August 27th

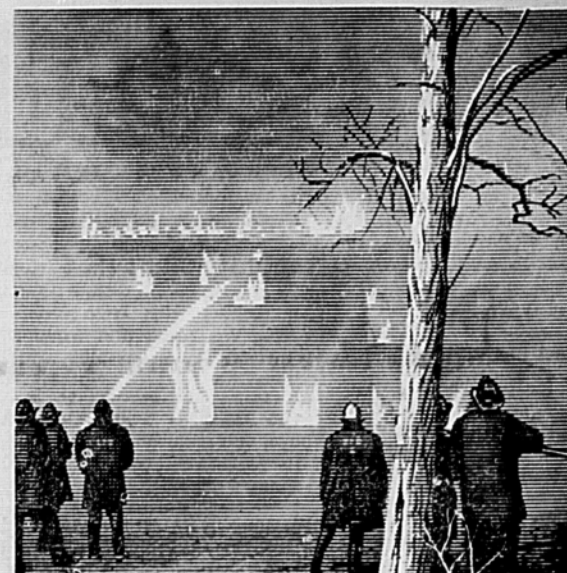

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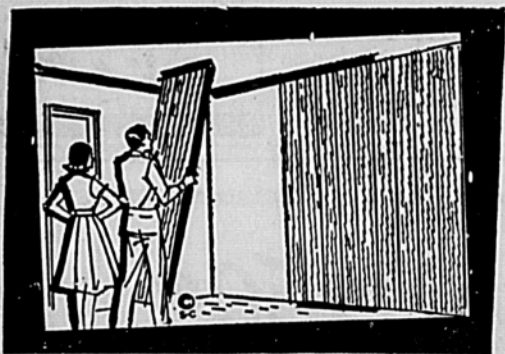
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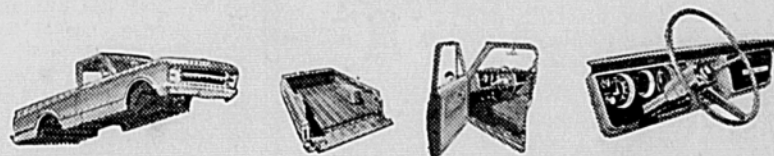

**STATE CAPITAL**  
*Highlights AND Sidelights*

**AUSTIN —** While most of the state welcomed the touch of cool rains last week, Texas Water Development Board lost all hopes of completing the Texas Water Plan by the time the Legislature opens January 10.

Board will take four months to a year before it acts on adoption of the preliminary Texas Water Plan due to the scores of suggestions received from a series of river basin hearings.

All suggestions must be screened before the Board can refer the plan to Texas Water Rights Commissions for a public hearing on Water Rights involved.

A panel of five consultants, headed by Joe M. Kilgore, has gone over a list of proposed studies prepared by the Board's planning staff. The panel will present their suggestions to the Board at a meeting on September 19. Mainly, these will cover which studies can be made with in the money available to the agency during the fiscal year.

Another water study by the Development Board, to determine the occurrence and quality of underground water in Shackelford County will begin in mid-September. Executive Director Joe G. Moore announced.

Richard Preston, a water development board geologist, will conduct the study, which will begin with an inventory and sampling of all domestic, municipal, livestock, irrigation and industrial wells in the county. Study will then move on to the collection and compilation of data regarding depth, distribution and quality of underground water. Surface and shallow subsurface rock formations will also be examined as an aid in determining the depth and mode of occurrence of ground water requiring surface casing protection in oil and gas drilling operations.

Texas Water Rights Commission has approved an amendment to the permit held by the Trinity River Authority and the City of Houston which would nearly triple the storage capacity of the proposed Wallisville Reservoir. But another public hearing will be called to recon-

sider the application, if the federal government does not confirm its participation within a year.

**AG OPINIONS —** Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has held that when the county attorney in a county of 20,000 or more population wins a suit and collect delinquent personal property taxes, he may deduct a commission from the taxes. County attorney, however, must pay that commission into the county treasury for the officers' salary fund. Carr held in the opinion requested by Harris County Attorney Joe Resweber.

In another official opinion, Carr held that names of contributors and amounts of their donations to buy land for Lyndon B. Johnson State Park in Gillespie County do not have to be made public. Opinion affirmed the position of State Parks and Wildlife Commission

Chairman Will E. Odom who has declined to disclose sources of the park fund. Odom is fund trustee and receives donations for purchase of park land.

Attorney General concluded that park fund administration is not an operation of the PWC, and that it's up to private administrators to decide whether to announce names of various donors

**HEAD START SLOWED —** Approximately 60 Head Start programs are being held up in five Southwestern states because of Congressional delay in approving appropriations for the Office of Economic Opportunity, Regional OEO Director Bill Crook reports.

Delay, said Crook, is proving costly in both time and money to the agencies which had expected to correlate the preschool readiness programs with the regular school term. In some cases, he stated, administrators are serving without pay, rather than hurt the continuity of the program.

First priority on funds allocated to Southwest regional office is being given to those projects which are already in operation in the five states.

Crook's office is writing letters to local community action agencies and school districts, explaining that final action cannot be taken on their appli-

cations until Congress comes through.

**BUDGET MAKERS INSPECTING —** Before the State Legislature convenes, members of the House of Representatives' side of the Legislative Budget Board are personally inspecting state institutions, acquainting themselves with operations and needs throughout the state.

Group began surveys in the Dallas and Denton areas last week. Next they plan to go to Huntsville, Texas A&M University and Waco.

**DEAN'S OPINION —** Page Keeton, dean of the University of Texas School of Law, strongly urges a complete remodification of Texas' 110-year old penal code.

Keeton said the penal code had undergone "intermittent patching" through the years "without reference to the problem of maintaining a consistent system. . . . The plain fact," he continued, "is that we have been getting along with our present law. But I believe our administrators are doing a good job, not because of, but in spite of, our present system of substantive criminal law."

Keeton recommends complete revision of the laws, rather than "piecemeal" revision.

**"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"**

**"On Washing Your Hands"**

Pilate could see that nothing was being gained, and a riot was starting; so he took water and washed his hands in full view of the people, saying, "My hands are clean of this man's blood; see to that yourselves." Matt. 27:24.

Is there ever a time when we should not wash our hands? In an era when simple hygiene demands careful and frequent washing it sounds silly to ask. But "washing the hands" has entered into the speech of most civilized nations. Ever since a Roman governor named Pontius Pilate tried to evade his responsibility for a just verdict in the trial of Jesus of Nazareth, it has had an ugly meaning. True, any person with any imagination and knowledge of the situation must have a certain amount of sympathy for the governor. He did not want to see Jesus executed. He was maneuvered into the situation he found himself in on what we now call Good Friday. But he refused to face the facts and to make an honest decision. By trying to sidestep the issue, he cast his vote for the judicial murder of Jesus. We may try to defer making a decision about Jesus, and with our minds we may succeed. We cannot succeed with our lives; our lives get made up one way or another. Jesus in His own teaching condemned neutrality of life's great issues. He showed that doing nothing is in itself a decision. Think of the priest and the Levite in His story of the Samaritan; of the man with one talent who hid it to avoid deciding about investing it. In His great parable of the judgment, He condemned the good people who did nothing for the hungry, the naked, the sick, the prisoners.

Rev. G. T. Bellhouse, author of the book "Bread from Heaven," believes that when we adopt the attitude of Pilate, we do the following:

We betray our past. Our churches would not be here unless someone had refused to wash his hands; unless a few valiant souls, selfless in sacrifice, accepted responsibility and became involved. Great causes survive today because of the valiant FEW. The labors of a passionate minority. Think of our democratic nation. Think of our churches which still hold sway and influence men for God.

When we act as did Pilate, we betray the future. When we refuse to become involved in today's Christian worship and witness and work, we weaken the heritage to be passed on to our successors. Where would we be had not long-gone predecessors bequeathed to us a noble home of faith and life? What are we doing for our children and youth today? What will we leave in the way of a more

peaceful, more brotherly nation and world? Jesus might have washed His hands of the whole dirty business of trying to save men from his sin and destructiveness. But He was Jesus Christ, and He could not. He "bare our sins in His own body on the tree, that we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes we are healed." 1st Peter 2:24. Are we engaged in washing our hands, engaged in evasive action? Or are we deliberately deciding to stand and march with Christ, whatever the cost?

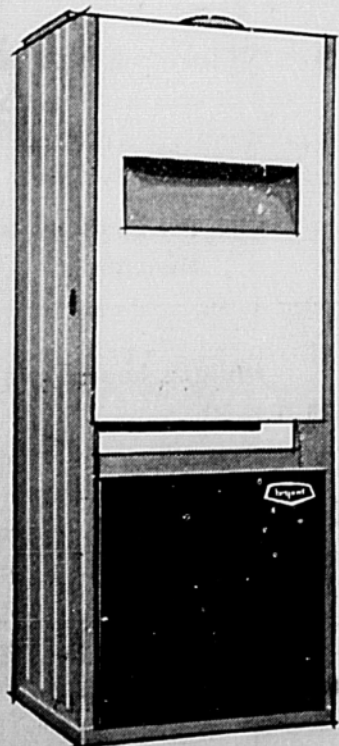

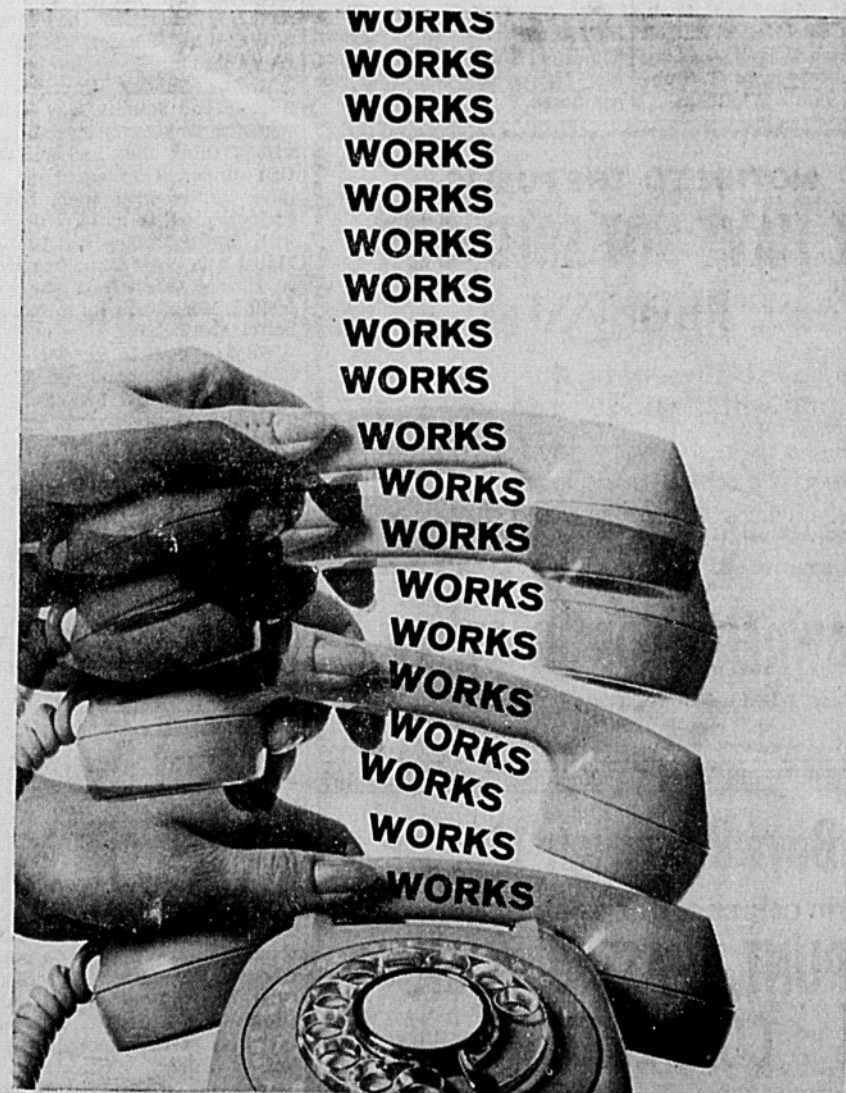

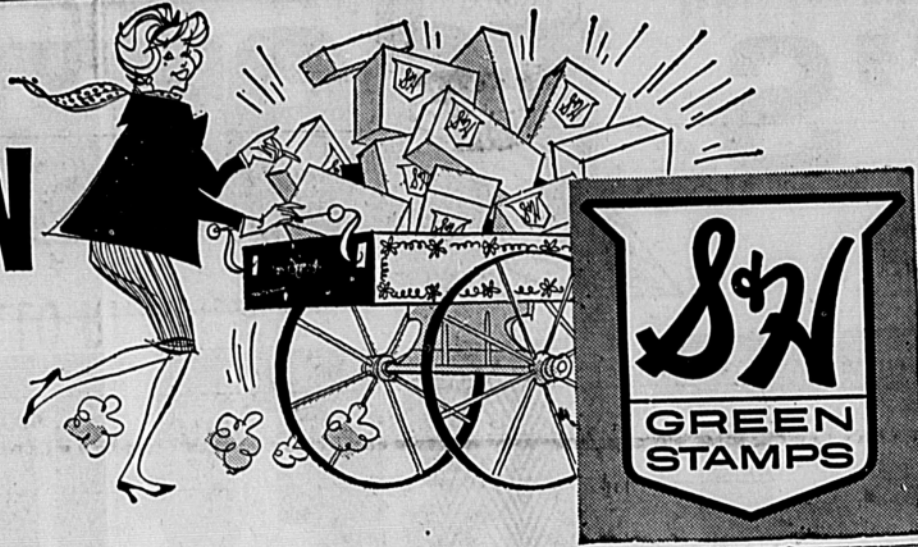
