

Farmers Asked To Sell Scrap Iron At Good Price

Farmers who hope to get new gricultural equipment during 1947 will do themselves a good turn by elling their old scrap iron, thereby helping to increase production if industrial steel, asserts Bob Gib-

on, ACA secretary, "That's the appeal of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, coperating with the Office of Temsorary Controls (CPA) and the iteel industry in trying to round up the Nation's unused scrap iron and steel and turn it to a good ourpose. Now farm machinery hould be fabricated of its much a half remelted scrap metal if it's to be turned out rapidly, efficiently, and economically," said Gibson.

This is the second request for novement of old scrap iron in reent months. Steel production is it an abnormally high level, in trying to catch with post-war ivilian needs. But steel mills genwally are getting only enough scrap stockpiled to last several norths. CPA states that steel production faces a slow-down beween now and spring unless scrap iron continues to show up in large quantity.

This is a profitable time to sell carp, CPA advises. With price tecontrol, dealers advanced their offers to the highest figures in means and they are eager to reeive scrap from farms. All grades of cast scrap are especially needed now, and farmers are urged wherever weather permits, to collect and sell every piece of erap that they can spare.




I told him: "Lem was in on Saturday, Said you shouldn't be allowed to keep those chickens so close to his house-and in a residential zone, at that."





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

FROM WASHINGTON, D. C. By Congressman Geo. Malson

A number of cattlemen from the outhwest have recently come to Washington to ask the Government to protect their herds from the foot and mouth disease that has broken out in Mexico. The disease is the most dreaded affecting livestock. Mexico, over our protest, imported some Brahma bulls from Brazil last fall, and from these imported cattle the disease got its start in Mexico. The foot and mouth disease spreads easily and attacks cattle, hogs, sheep and

Southwest would cost livestock tie Dabbs. producers millions of dollars and upset the economy of the whole area. Officials in the Department of Agriculture have convinced me that the threat is a real one, and I have joined with others here in the campaign to get appropriate action as soon as possible.

The threat of the spread of this disease into Texas and other Border States is so serious that the problem was considered last week at the President's Cabinet Meeting. Cooperation between Mexico and the United States is urgently required, and it is hoped that the good-will flight of President Truman to Mexico early in March will expedite plans for combating the disease.

Already experts of the Bureau of Animal Industry are cooperating with Mexico in an eradication campaign, and it now appears that considerable U. S. money may have to be spent to arrest the spread of the disease and protect Texas livestock, I have promised cattlemen to support an emergency appropriation when the request comes before the House Committee on Appropriations. Money well pent to stop the disease south of the Border would be wisely spent, despite the urgent necessity for economy in Government. ...

I asked the Bureau of the Budget last week to approve a request by the Geological Survey for additional funds for a more intensive study of underground water in West Texas. The program also embraces water studies in other areas and states. The chances are good that the Budget Bureau will approve the request and send it to the House Appropriations Committee for consideration. I hope the Congress will act favorably.

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

BOY SCOUT WEEK

MORE POWER

Records of 1946 reveal many interesting facts about electrical service.

First it was a period of phenominal growth in the number of customers served, with nearly 2,000,000 new customers added.

Another high record established in 1946 was the increase of 100 kilowatt hours in average residential consumption of electricity to set an all time high average of 1,330 kilowatt hours used per customer.

Most of the new customers connected in 1946 were in the rural areas, with less than 400,000 of the new residential customers within city limits. In excess of 500,000 farms were connected during the year bringing the total number of electrified farms as defined by the bureau of the census to more than 3,400,000.

Electric companies expect to serve another 690,000 farms during the next two years, and electric cooperatives and other public agencies are expected to add an equal number in the same period.

TAXATION AND MONOPOLY

When Congress finally gets down to cases on what is to be done about government expenditures, the national debt, and taxation, it should look squarely at this grim fact the small and medium-sized enterprise is taking the worst beating under the present tax policy.

The big business, with reserves of capital built up over many years, is better able to look out for itself. But the small business, with its current tax burdens, cannot obtain and keep the wherewithal necessary to rapid expansion. Money that, in past times, would have gone for new plants, new developments, new employment, now goes to the tax collector.

The tax structure must be revised to permit all enterprise to grow, to compete, and to become big if it has the capabilities. That is the way this nation was built. That is the way we became the world's greatest and richest power in a century and a half. A tax system which mays, in effect, "Small business must remain small," will prove ruinous to all

WHAT OUR CONTEMPORARIES ARE SAYING:

PUZZLED OVER SUGAR RATIONING— There is something queer in my estimation about the sugar rationing, it seems that some of the hig manufacturers and behavior can get all the sugar they want while the smaller concerns in towns like Slaton have a terribly hard time getting any at all. The general public is still getting along on a very little sugar and the candy manufacturers and other users of commercial sugar are expanding in every direction, Could it be that the big shots are insisting on the rationing of sugar so that the sweet hungry public will have to buy their high priced products? —The Slaton Slatonite.

JESTER AND TAXES— We do not know how strongly Governor Beauford Jerier will hald out his opposition to the levying of any additional taxes during the next two years but we have an idea that farmers all over Texas are going to demand the building of farm-to-market roads. The legislature should do its duty in the premises regardless of any promise that Candidate Jester may have made. —The Lynn County News.
