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

EVERY MAN TO HIS GAME

In defease of his English, the one-lime great baseball pitcher, Dizzy Dean, now a sportscaster at St. Louis with a tremendous following of delighted listeners, makes the point that he and his brother, Paul, missed out up a formal education, but managed to do all right in their chosen profession, which was baseball.

"Me and Paul," wrote Dizzy in a United Press contribution, "didn't have to worry about that sort of stuff when we were winning games ... Paul, he'd win one, and I'd win the next. Didn't nobody come around after the game and ask whether we'd throwed or threwn the ball in there to make a play."

Dizzy's present job is not to instruct children in the correct use of English, but to describe baseball with professional skill. This he does with creditable success. With Dizzy, a player did not slide into third; he stud. When corrected by the critics, he said, "what do you want me to say-slidded?"

The idea that his brand of English could corrupt the speech of school children is ridiculous-when one compares it with the comics read eagerly for generations by millions of kids. His good old brand of "cotton-patch" talk constitutes a colorful contribution to the gaiety of the nation and certainly isn't any more harmful to the young hopefuls than the jabber of the Katzjammer Kids of the funnies.

PUT YOUR NICKEL IN THE JUKE BOX

(Editor's Note:-A teenager in one of the current magazines put one wise words into being with the following editorial

The idea could well be taken into personal consideration by adults as well as adolescents.)

"Huddled around every juke box in the land, you will find drips who want to listen to the music on someone clse's nickel. These are the characters to avoid and to avoid being. Wherever you go, whatever you're doing, you've got to add your little nicket. If it's a racket (party, that is), do all you can to help the revelry-get into any game that's going. At home, too, make your presence pleasantly felt, by being an active member of the house. Never let it be said that you're traveling along on someone else's dough, talent, or personality. But to garble an old saying. "Give, and the world gives with you; keep, and you keep alone."

THE ROAD TO WAR

According to a recent nation-wide survey, 62 per cent of the Amercan people now believe that we will have another world war within 25 years. Only 24 per cent believe that we will have lasting peace. By comparison, three years ago, when the last war was at its height, 47 per cent of the people felt that a lasting peace was probable, and 43 per cent were convinced of the inevitability of another war,

The diminishing faith of the American people in man's ability to prevent wholesale murder and destruction on an incredible scale is in itself a terrible commentary on the state of the world. Its origins are obvious enough. We have watched the failure of the United Nations Security Council to arrive at workable agreements. We have seen the trend back to the old balance of power policies which did so much to forment World Wars I and II. We have seen the rights of small nations destroyed and the voices of dissenters violently stilled. We have seen authorities pessimistically forecast that the world may break down into two great opposed spheres of influence, led by the Soviet Union on one side and the United States on the other.

The challenge this offers to all nations of the world is the greates' they have ever faced. For, should war come again, it could very well end only in the death of civilization as we know it. The atomic bomb is in its infancy, and the "improved" hombs of the future, compared to those of today, will be like a 1947 car beside primitive vehicles that appeared forty-odd years ago. Other weapons, of unimaginable scope and destructive power, are in the experimental stage. It is perfectly possible that this kind of scientific progress, once unleashed for war, may mean the ruin of all mankind.

What nation wants this? What government, no matter how greatly t distrusts its neghbors, will assume the awful responsibility for another war? What differences are so important that they cannot be reconciled in the interest of lasting peace. The very existence of every being, whether he be Russian or American, Pole or Greek, Indian or Briton, depends upon the answers given to these tremendous questions.

Literally "malaria" means "bad air"; the ancient Greeks attributed it to the humid air of the marshes. Alexander the Great was one of its most celebrated victims; he died of this "mysterious" fever in the year 323 B. C.

People tried all monners of strange remedies. One Arabian Physician prescribed pills coated with gold and silver dyes. Another "sure-cure" reads as follows: "Cut the ear of a cut, let three drops of the blood fall in some brandy, add a little pepper thereto, and give it to the patient to drink," Bloodletting, witchcraft, astrology were all tried, to no avail,

Then, in the 17th century, a Spanish monk found that the Indians of Peru had a miraculous cure in the bark of the "fever tree." The tree was later named "Cinchona," and from its bark quinine was made. During World War II the U. S. made 8,000 separate tests to discover a substitute. Several of the drugs that resulted will replace both quinine itself and its well-known substitute, atabrine.
