Duck Creek Soil— CONSERVATION DISTRICT OFFICE AT POST

H. V. Wheeler, Duck Creek Soil Conservation District cooperater in the conservation group east of Southland rested his largest pasture for two months after the first fall rains. This gave the grass a chance to regain its vigor, make seed, and stool out. As a result Wheeler got an abundant fall growth which will furnish some good late fall and winter grazing as well as improve his stand of grass.

Al Bird, cooperater in the Verbena conservation group, has planted some barley as a cover crop on some of his sandy land. It is doing better and will give more protective cover than wheat planted at the same time.

M. J. Malouf is having terraces built this week on both his farms, one of which is near Southland and the other near Close City. The terraces are level with closed ends, designed to hold water on the ground until it is absorbed by the soil.

J. H. Eubank reports that the alfalfa which he planted last September is doing very well. He expects to increase his alfalfa acreage next year.

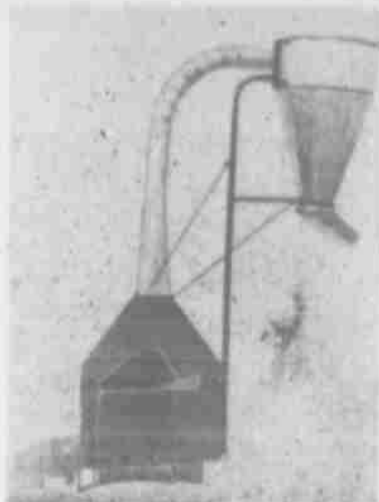

DECEMBER CROP ESTIMATE IS 5,000 BALES LOWER THAN REPORT IN NOVEMBER

The Agriculture department Monday predicted a 1946 cotton crop of 8,482,000 bales, a decrease of 5,000 bales from the department's estimate of November 1, which placed the crop at 8,487,000 bales.

This year's estimated yield compares with last year's crop of 9,015,000 bales and the 10-year 1935-44 average of 12,553,000 bales.

The department estimated that more than three per cent of the 18,179,000 acres of cotton under cultivation July 1 has had to be abandoned.

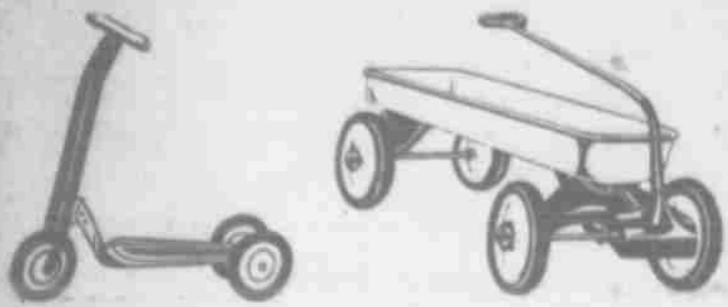

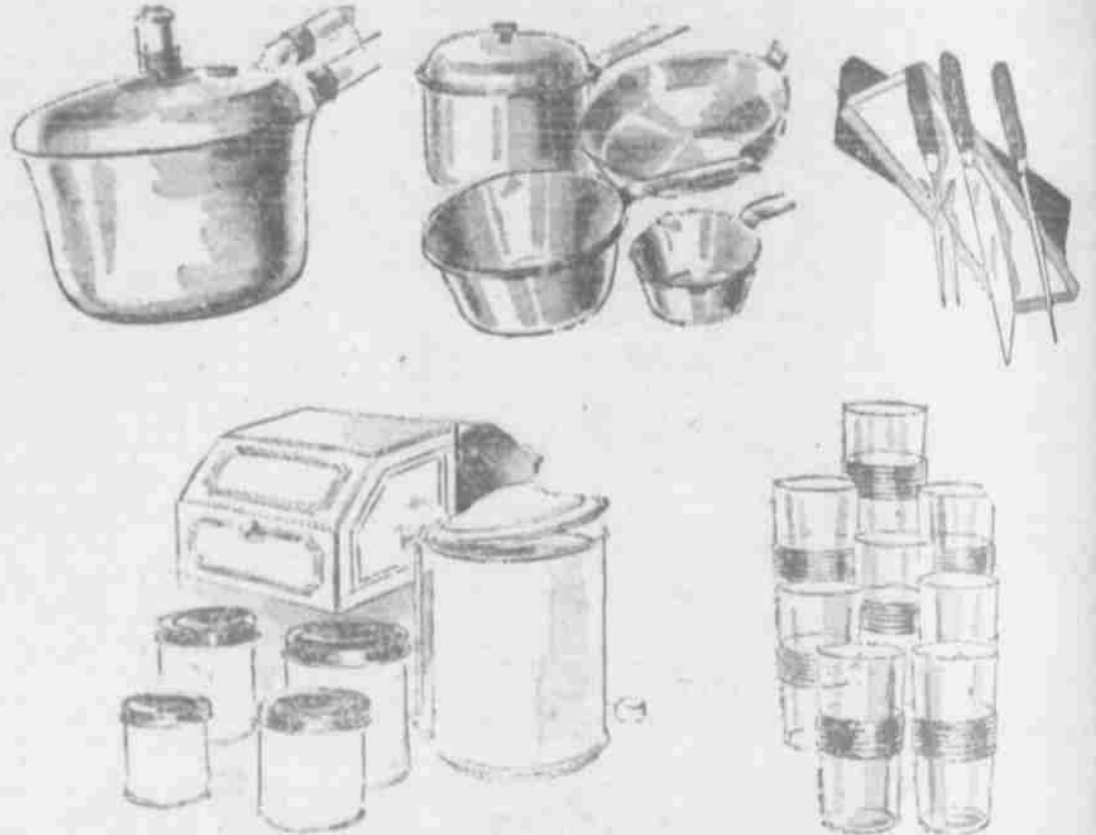

TEXAS BUSINESS NEWS BUSINESS SITUATION

Agriculture provided one of the brightest spots in the Texas business picture during October, according to the Texas Business Review published by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. General business activity declined 2 per cent from its September level, but farm cash income and shipments of livestock, poultry and eggs were up from 39 to 64 per cent.

Business activity of all types was 12 per cent higher this October than a year ago and 79 per cent above the prewar 1935-39 average. Farm cash income in the same comparisons was up 47 per cent and 214 per cent, respectively.

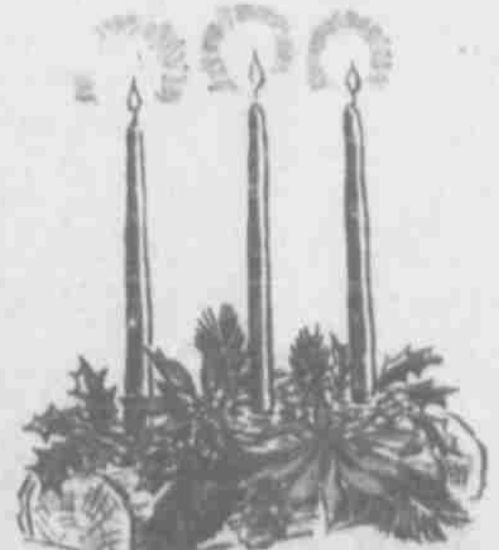
