1945 AAA Program Graduation exercises for the Brings \$60,488 To Garza Farmers

Garza county farm oprators who took advantage of the AAA program in carrying out soil building practices on their farms in ser average, and will deliver 1945 are receiving benefits daily. reports Robert H. Gibson, secretary of the Garza county ACA. To date receipts from the program amount to \$31,385.80, covering 386 farms which represent slightly over fifty percent of the farms in

In a preliminary check of the soil building practices carried out in 1945 it was revealed that \$2,-788.98 was carned in constructing 185,932 feet of terraces; \$18,9992.-80 earned in constructing earthen dams with 191,592 cubic yards of dirt being moved; \$2,786.00 for drilling water wells; \$60.00 earned on contour strip-eropping; \$90.32 for non-contour strip-cropping; \$489.60 earned on deep plowing of sand cropland; \$530.05 earned in carrying out summer fallow practice; \$1,703.40 on contour listing; \$30,648.76 carned on contour farming; \$1,323.28, stalk protection; \$335.43, establishing and maintuining fireguards; \$489.75 green manure and cover crops and \$249.-90 for small grain crops,

This is a total of \$60,468.18 that will be paid out to Garza county furmers under the AAA program for soil building practices carried out in 1945.

DDT-SULPHUR MIXTURE WILL BE USED IN CONTROL OF COTTON FLEA HOPPERS

Recent experiments with a DDT-sulphur mixture at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at A&M College proved effective against adult cotton flex hoppers, reports J. C. Gaines, entomologist. Sulphur alone has proven highly successful, but is not quite as effective as the DDT

The DDT has proven toxic to adult hoppers as well as immature forms, and it also reduces the poplation of beneficial insects, thus causing aphids to become damaging, it was said. Caution should be exercised in applying DDT early in the season.

When both hoppers and weevils are causing injury to cotton at the same time, DDT should not be used, but a calcium arsenate-sulphur mixture is effective against both these pests, explains Gaines.

The first application of sulphur should be applied when from 15 to 25 hoppers are found on 100 cotton terminals, but if the infestation increases rapidly, n ? per cent DDT-sulphur mixture should be used to stop the damage as quickly as possible, Games




