#### NEW TRANSLATION OF BIBLE TO ENCOURAGE MORE READING

Display Advertising Deadline

5 Crelock Tuesday Afternoon

A new translation of the New Testament to be known as the Revised Standard Version, has been completed and is now being distributed to the public. This version was prepared by a committee of translators and Bible scholars named by the International Council of Religious Education.

Members of the committee have said that while the new version is cast in a simpler, more familiar style, none of the changes affects any major doctrine of the Christian faith.

Translators outlined the reasons for undertaking the laborious task of revision with these explanations: that the English Revised and American Standard versions lost much of their beauty and power because of a too literal, mechanical translation; that scholars are better equipped today than they were 60 years ago both to determine the original text of the Greek New Testament and to determine its language; and that the Bible is "not merely an historical document and a classic of English literature, but the Word of God.

The Rev. Dr. Luther A. Weigle, dean of the Yale University School, states in the introduction that "the Word must not be hidden in anclent phrases that have changed or lost their meaning; it must stand by the last shift in responsibility forth in language that is direct and clear and meaningful to the peo-

Whether or not you subscribe to a change in your Bible. It is reasonable that a change of language will benefit the children of today who are used to a far different speech,

Without predicting in any degree the popularity of such a version still the very fact of its completion and publication marks a notable accomplishment in the field of Biblical scholarship.

## Sidelights

FROM WASHINGTON, D. C. By Congressman Geo. Mahon

in this column last week I referred to our efforts in Congress to pass legislation providing an additional \$100,000,000 lean authorization for REA. This must be done by March 1st if a lag in REA construction is to be averted in Texas and 20 other states.

On February 14th the House approved an amendment to an appropriation bill making the funds available. It is hoped and believed that the Senate will take favorable action in the near future and send the measure to the President for his opproval.

REA loans are being repaid to the government; people in rural areas are getting the benefits of electricity; industry is being afforded a new market for electrical gadgets and equipment; and more work is provided for the laboring people in industrial areas. I joined with others in pointing out these facts during the House debate on the measure, the chairman having given me the privilege of closing the debate.

The conclusion seems inevitable that the job of disposing of surplus Government property has been badly bungled thus far. The top responsibility has been booted from one agency to another.

First the sales were under an agency of the Treasury Department; then the responsibility was shifted to the Commerce Department under Secretary Henry Wallace. From there the job was transferred to the RFC. Today the War Assets Corporation, an agency of the RFC, is in the driver's seat, but next month the War Assets Corporation becomes the War Assets Administration and will no lorger be associated with the RFC. 


