

ATOM POWER FOR SHIPS

(The Atom Bomb picture as related by a writer from the Abilene Reporter.)

Ships will be driven by atomic power plants in the 1950s, and much later) airplanes will be moved by the same force, according to Vice Adm. W. H. P. Bandy, boss of the atomic bomb experiments at

The admiral's opinion is worth something. He has been in contact with men who know more about atomic energy than anybody else in the world, and doubtless based his opinion on facts presented by the

The question naturally arises, If atomic energy is licensed for use in ships, airplanes and industrial plants, how on earth can the nations of the world keep fissionable material out of the hands of some future aggressor? It is understood that the basic ingredients of the atomic bomb can be "denatured" and rendered useless for bomb purposes. but who is to do the denaturing, and is the stuff that will be used to produce power this side or the other side of the explosive material?

The U.S. plan for outlawing atomic warfare calls for destruction of existing bombs and a phohibition against their future manufacture, with an international commission to maintain constant vigilance to prevent violation by any nation. It agrees to enter whole-heartedly into this plan, but insists that it must keep all its atomic secrets until such an international control scheme is prefected,

Russia proposes that the U.S. destroy the bombs it has and turn its secrets over to the international control commission. Nothing doing says Uncle Sam; show me the perfected organization for control first, and then we'll give up our secrets and destroy our bombs.

Obviously, if it isn't possible to denature the fissionable material so it can be used for power but not for bombs, the control commission would have to maintain absolute authority over all atomics uses, in-

That is a tall order, but there would be no other way to keep some rresponsible nation from loosing an atomic war upon the world.

From what they know of atomic energy now, experts say it will never be possible to use the power in automobiles. Conceivably they may know enough about it in time to drive automobiles with it.





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
