### GARZA COUNTY Oil Development ACTIVITIES . . .

Oil development in Garza county the first week of the new year amounted to the addition of three new producers to the Garza central field and the filling of four more applications for drilling. The producers completed last week include:

**Grisham-Hunter Corporation's** No. 3-B Post estate, completed with a 24-hour pumping potential of 145 barrels of 35.4 gravity oil, from pay at 2,800-2,970 feet after recasing 6,000 gallons of acid. The test well is located 990 feet from east and south lines of lease in section 1229.

**Grisham-Hunter Corporation** completed a second test last week, when their No. 4-A Post estate made a daily pumping potential of 168 barrels of 36 gravity oil from pay at 2,804-56 feet. The well is located in section 5, block 5, K, Arcock survey.

The third producer for the week was M. A. and T. F. Grisham's No. 1 Post estate, 990 feet from west and 330 feet from south lines of lease in section 1229. The test after being treated with 6,000 gallons of acid made a 24-hour pumping potential of 147 barrels of 35 gravity oil, from pay at 2,821 feet.

An extension to the central field is being sought by Lynn Oil Company of New Orleans, with application filed to drill a test about two miles southeast of closest production in the pool. The test will be styled Connell No. 1 and will go to around 3,000 feet. Location is 330 feet from south and east lines of the southeast quarter of section 31, block 5, G&H&H survey. It is 600 feet north of a well drilled several years ago, which made a fair showing of oil, but which has not been producing regularly.

### Producers Reminded Of Vital Changes In 1946 Farm Program

Producers who expect assistance from the Triple-A in carrying out soil building practices during 1946 must get prior approval from the County Committee before any work is started, reminds James A. Boyd, ACA secretary. By prior approval it is meant that a definite allocation of money to each farm must be made before the work is started or the farm will be ineligible for any AAA payments.

During 1945 only a few special practices required prior approval, but this year all practices require it due to the limited amount of funds available for the county.

Garza County's AAA allocation amounts to \$86,106 for assistance to farmers and ranchers who desire such assistance in carrying out any of the thirteen approved practices set-up for this county. By contacting the local Triple A office or any County or Community Committeeman producers will be supplied information as to how this money may be earned.

Boyd requests that all farmers and ranchers contact some committeeman, or the local office early in 1946 so that the assistance available to producers will be most profitably utilized, and that no practices are carried out which can not be paid.

### 709 Garza Voters Purchase Poll Tax

With politics to the forefront in 1946, Garza countians remain slow in payment of poll taxes. A check-up at the county tax office Tuesday revealed that only 709 poll taxes have been purchased to that time, and only a few exemption certificates have been secured by twenty-one-year-olds.

### MAHON LEAVING DISTRICT TODAY FOR WASHINGTON

WHEREAS, the President of the United States has said that the need is imperative and justifies a second appeal to the American people, and

WHEREAS, the Victory Clothing Collection is an effort to meet the great emergency,

NOW, THEREFORE, I, J. A. Stallings, Mayor of Post urge all religious, educational, patriotic, civic, fraternal, business and labor groups to cooperate in this collection of clothing, shoes and bedding for overseas relief so that the national goal of 100,000,000 garments in addition to shoes and bedding may be reached. Also I urge contributors to attach good-will messages to their gifts of clothing.

### PLANS UNDERWAY FOR SUCCESSFUL POLIO FUND DRIVE

#### JUDGE LEE BOWEN SETTING UP MACHINERY FOR DRIVE

Plans are being completed this week by County Judge J. Lee Bowen for Garza county's part in the nation-wide "March of Dimes" campaign to carry on the work of the National Foundation of Infantile Paralysis.

The campaign is scheduled to get underway next Monday and continue through January 31. Last year Garza county raised \$540 towards Texas contribution of \$611,192 to the national fund.

Judge Bowen, chairman of the local drive, said this morning complete plans for the campaign would be announced next week and that entertainments were now being planned for the collection of dimes as Garza's participation in the movement.

Half of the contributions raised will remain in the county chapter for care and treatment of local patients.

### Postal Receipts Show Gain In 1945 Over '44

Postal receipts for the 12-month period of 1945 showed considerable gain over those of 1944, according to figures released Wednesday by Phil S. Boucher, postmaster.

Money-orders were upped \$10,837 over the previous year, totaling \$119,714.94 compared with \$108,877.87 for 1944.

Stamp sales for 1945 showed a \$1,300 gain over 1944, the figures being \$21,900 and \$20,700.

### 3 Southland Boys Hurt In Car Mishap

Three Southland boys received only minor injuries when their car overturned on the Caprock, Friday night, January 4. The car crashed into a wire guard after the broken steering gear threw it out of control. The wire entanglement prevented the car from falling several hundred feet. Bobby Huffman received a hard bump and cut on the head. Lee Sinclair received a cut on the hand and J. A. Smith received slight bruises.

### Increased GI Loans To Become Effective Within Next 60 Days

Increased loans under the GI Bill of Rights, authorized by Congress last month, will become effective within the next 60 days, Scott Reed, Veterans Administration representative in Dallas announced Saturday.

Veterans applying for loans to construct homes or for other purposes now receive government guarantee of \$2,000, while under the new legislation ex-GIs can get backing for \$4,000. That means an increase to \$5,000 for the entire loan, half of which is guaranteed by the government.

### BUSTER WILLIS PLANS TO RESUME WORK HERE

Buster Willis, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Willis of Lubbock and formerly of Post, plans to go back into the sign-painting and paper-hanging business in Post, he informed the Dispatch this morning.

Willis, who served with the First Engineering Corps of the Army in both the European and Pacific theaters, was discharged from the service last Friday and arrived in Post Saturday. His wife and three children have made their home here during his absence.

Before entering the Army Buster was associated with his father in business here.

### LICENSE PLATES DUE IN FEBRUARY

The new 1946 automobile license plates will not go on sale until after the first of February, stated Percy Printz, sheriff-tax collector Tuesday morning. "We are already having calls for the new plates and wish to advise that we have not received them to date and that they will not be offered for sale until after February 1," said Printz.

The Sheriff did not know whether cars would be furnished with one or two plates this year, but he believes that half the cars plate will again be used. The design is expected to be entirely different from that used in 1945.

The new plates can not be used on vehicles until after March 1, and deadline on their purchase is midnight April 1.

### Final Figures Given On Victory Loan

Final tabulation of the Victory Loan drive revealed Garza county citizens purchased \$212,177.25 on the over-all quota of \$235,000, and \$55,593.75 in E-bonds, reported T. R. Greenfield, County War Finance chairman Monday.

"This last drive has been tough for everyone, but thanks to you and all organizations who sponsored the campaign," said the chairman.

Series E sales for the state were \$92,399,838.75 or 102% of the quota. Over-all sales were 221.7% of the state quota.

### Local Bank Deposits Over Three Million Despite Short Crops

Deposits at the First National Bank, although not at their highest peak when the year-end call came from the U. S. Comptroller of Currency and the State Banking Commissioner December 31, 1945, totaled \$3,022,585.86 despite the year's cotton crop failure and a short grain crop.

The total was slightly higher than the previous high-mark reached June 30 at which time the call came and deposits stood at \$2,930,649.15. The figure is also higher than the December 31, 1944 total of \$2,880,842.08 at which time deposits were swelled by a bumper crop.

The current statement reflects considerable gain in the county's wealth, due to oil and ranching activities and the better financial standing of farmers and businessmen, when compared to those of several years back. The December 31, 1944 statement, prepared by the bank as record-high, listed deposits of \$1,173,259.47.

### Texas Reached Top Of Victory Loan

State War Finance headquarters at Dallas announced Monday that Texas went over the top in all quotas on the Victory loan drive.

The State lagged on E-bond sales throughout the campaign, and it became necessary to extend the closing date from December 8 to December 31 to meet the goal. Percentage of 102% of the ninety-million goal was announced with the final figure of \$92,399,838 in E-bonds.

In E-bond sales, 188 counties exceeded their goals.

On the overall quota, 232 Texas counties went over the top.

### ANOTHER SERVICEMAN BACK AT OLD JOB

Back on the job in the same old stand is Hansford Hudman after recently being discharged from more than three years service in the U. S. Navy.

### VICTORY CLOTHING DRIVE UNDERWAY OVER COUNTY

Garza county's campaign to collect clothing for the suffering peoples of bombed-out countries get underway Monday with many calls being received by W. S. Duckworth, chairman of the drive, from women requesting information as to where they should deliver their clothing contributions.

At least five receiving stations have been set up in Post stores for the hundreds of garments expected to be supplied by Garza folks. Designation of clothing booths have been announced as Mason & Company, Greenfield Hardware Company, Bryant-Link Co., Hudson Furniture Co., and the Texas Co. Cloths may be taken to these depots and will be picked up several times each week and transferred to the James C. Cole American Legion hut, which has been set-up as the central station, and where the clothing will be boxed up for shipment to state headquarters.

Duckworth, serving as chairman for the local American Legion post, sponsoring organization declared this morning that the collection last April was excellent, but explains that a great need still persists, and an effort on the part of Garza countians to better the situation is essential to an effort of lasting peace.

Citizens are being asked to donate all possible clothing they can spare, as well as pieces of a yard or more in such items as bed linen, blankets, and shoes.

Rural committees have been appointed to handle the drive in their respective communities, and service clubs of the city are assisting war veterans in promoting the city campaign.

### Dairy Production Payments Being Met

Dairy Production payments on sales of butterfat and whole milk during the months of October, November and December are being paid at the Triple A office at the rate of 15 per cent on whole milk and 20 per cent on whole milk with cream, said James A. Boyd, ACA secretary, Tuesday.

The same type of evidence of sale furnished on July, August and September period will be required and should be presented by producers at the time of filing their applications. The time for filing applications runs from now until February 28, 1946.

Others who are patients in the same hospital are Mrs. Charlie Voss, who underwent major surgery nine days ago, and Mrs. Elton Nance who was operated on Monday and Mrs. James Dietrich. She was taken to the hospital on Monday and may be able to return home today or tomorrow.

### EARL HODGES BUYS LOCAL DRAYAGE

Purchase of the local drayage line from Harold Cass was made the last of the week by Earl Hodges, who owns and operates the Hodges Tractor Company here.

With the addition of the beam-drawn dray line to his truck transportation system, Hodges is now equipped to do all kinds of local hauling and has also taken over the Santa Fe local hauling contract from Cass.

**YES WE HAVE A FINE WAR RECORD, TOO**

It gives your editor a good feeling to cancel certain subscriptions on the Dispatch's mailing list, and to meet these overseas subscribers face to face on the streets of Post, see discharge buttons shine in their lapels, and hear of their plans for returning to the old job, or going to college, or opening their own businesses here in our town.

The Post Dispatch has done quite a bit of traveling these past few years. It has been mailed to the four corners of the world. It has covered the Pacific and traveled into the Far East into China, it has followed the boys to Australia, Japan and Guadalcanal. It has flown to Africa, England, France, Italy, and to some of the far parts of Russia. It has even made the "milk run" along with crewmen over Berlin. It has been along with the boys in many of the "toughest battles" of the war.

Not a bad war record has the Post Dispatch hung up for a small town paper, especially when you consider that it's been kept so busy on the home front, too. Your paper, like thousands of others over the nation, has spearheaded the war bond drives in which America purchased 40 billion dollars worth of bonds. The Dispatch contributed hundreds of lines of "free advertising" to these movements. It has helped, and steadily done its bit in making the dashes for scrap metal, fat and clothing. It has backed all war relief drives. It's shared in all the homefront campaigns.

Now that the war is over your newspaper may discard some of its military fervor and not do so much traveling around. Like our returning veterans, your paper has learned many lessons it will never forget.

Like our veterans, your newspaper returns to peacetime living with the knowledge that while our town is a small place in terms of the world-wide community of nations, the democratic way of life that it represents is one of the most precious and most encouraging things in our world today.

**Question And Answer Column**

For The Benefit of Garza World War II Veterans

Q. May a five year level premium term policy be converted to another type of policy while waiver of premiums is in effect?

A. Yes, no restriction may operate to bar the right to convert a National Service Life Insurance Policy, in case the provisions of the law have been otherwise met.

Q. If the veteran is basically eligible for a loan under the GI Bill must all active service have been after September 16, 1940?

A. No, in computing the active service of applicant, the entire period of his active service is reckoned to his credit, provided it extends to a date subsequent to September 16, 1940.

Q. May a veteran continue gratuitous insurance issued him while a prisoner of war?

A. Yes, such gratuitous insurance will remain in force and premiums waived during all the period he is a prisoner and for six months thereafter. The policy will be continued beyond that period by tender of premium thereafter becoming due.

Q. Is it necessary for a veteran to have a physical examination in connection with an application to reinstate National Service Life Insurance?

A. If the insured made application for reinstatement within six months from date of discharge or within three months from the date of the first premium in default it will not become necessary to have a physical examination. A statement satisfactory to the Administrator that he is in as good health as he was on the due date of the first premium in default will be all that is necessary.

Q. May a veteran make application for a loan guaranty at any time in the future?

A. The veteran must make application for the guaranty provisions within two years of his discharge or within two years of the termination of war whichever is later. And in no event more than five years after termination of the war.

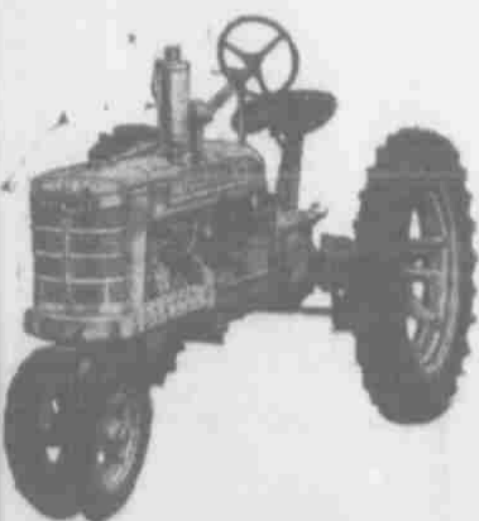

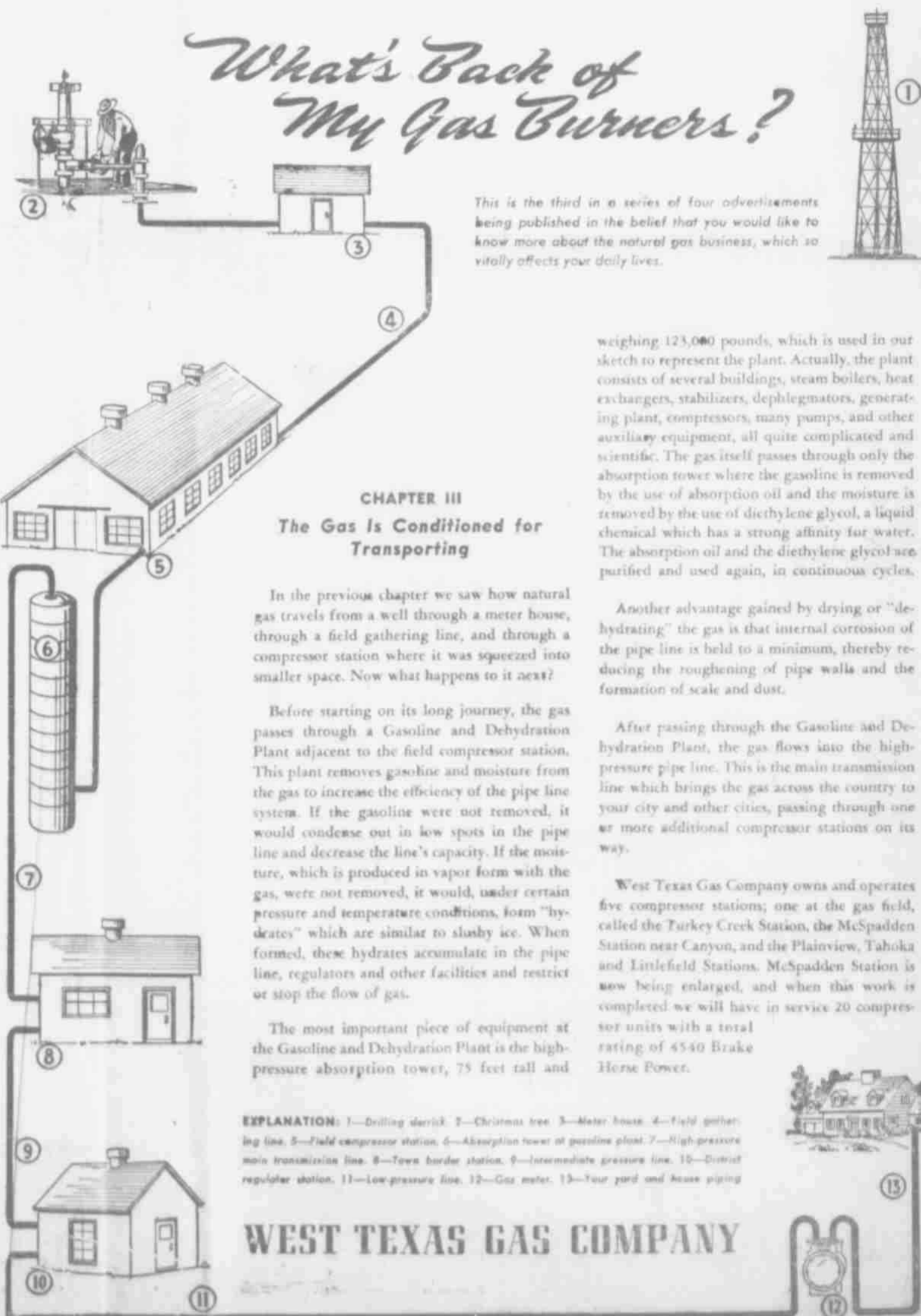

*What's Back of My Gas Burners?*



This is the third in a series of four advertisements being published in the belief that you would like to know more about the natural gas business, which so vitally affects your daily lives.

**CHAPTER III The Gas Is Conditioned for Transporting**

In the previous chapter we saw how natural gas travels from a well through a meter house, through a field gathering line, and through a compressor station where it was squeezed into smaller space. Now what happens to it next?

Before starting on its long journey, the gas passes through a Gasoline and Dehydration Plant adjacent to the field compressor station. This plant removes gasoline and moisture from the gas to increase the efficiency of the pipe line system. If the gasoline were not removed, it would condense out in low spots in the pipe line and decrease the line's capacity. If the moisture, which is produced in vapor form with the gas, were not removed, it would, under certain pressure and temperature conditions, form "hydrates" which are similar to slushy ice. When formed, these hydrates accumulate in the pipe line, regulators and other facilities and restrict or stop the flow of gas.

The most important piece of equipment at the Gasoline and Dehydration Plant is the high-pressure absorption tower, 75 feet tall and

weighing 123,000 pounds, which is used in our sketch to represent the plant. Actually, the plant consists of several buildings, steam boilers, heat exchangers, stabilizers, dephlegmators, generating plant, compressors, many pumps, and other auxiliary equipment, all quite complicated and scientific. The gas itself passes through only the absorption tower where the gasoline is removed by the use of absorption oil and the moisture is removed by the use of diethylene glycol, a liquid chemical which has a strong affinity for water. The absorption oil and the diethylene glycol are purified and used again, in continuous cycles.

Another advantage gained by drying or "dehydrating" the gas is that internal corrosion of the pipe line is held to a minimum, thereby reducing the roughening of pipe walls and the formation of scale and dust.

After passing through the Gasoline and Dehydration Plant, the gas flows into the high-pressure pipe line. This is the main transmission line which brings the gas across the country to your city and other cities, passing through one or more additional compressor stations on its way.

West Texas Gas Company owns and operates five compressor stations; one at the gas field, called the Turkey Creek Station, the McSpadden Station near Canyon, and the Plainview, Tahoka and Littlefield Stations. McSpadden Station is now being enlarged, and when this work is completed we will have in service 20 compressor units with a total rating of 4540 Brake Horse Power.

OR

**"A Finger in the Pie"?**

**Which is the UAW-CIO really after? Is it seeking facts—or new economic power? Does it want to know things—or run things?**

**These questions concern you as well as General Motors.**

**3. Basis of Collective Bargaining is Defined**

The Wagner Act lays down the rules for collective bargaining. These cover such areas as rates of pay, hours of work, working conditions.

No mention is made of earnings, prices, sales volume, taxes and the like. These are recognized as the problems of management.

**4. Something New has been Added**

The obvious fact is that the UAW-CIO has gone beyond its rights under the law—and is reaching not for information but for new power—not for a look at past figures, but for the power to sit in on forecasting and planning the future.

A "look at the books" is a clever catch phrase intended as an opening wedge whereby Unions hope to pry their way into the whole field of management.

It leads surely to the day when Union bosses, under threat of strike, will demand the right to tell what we can make, when we can make it, where we can make it, and how much we must charge you—all with an eye on what labor can take out of the business, rather than on the value that goes into the product.

**5. This Threatens All Business**

If the Union can do this in the case of General Motors, it can do it to every business in this land of ours.

Is this just imagination? Union spokesmen have said, "The Union has stated time after time that this issue is bigger than just an ordinary wage argument, that it is bigger than the Corporation and bigger than the Union."

For Labor Unions to use the monopolistic power of their vast membership to extend the scope of wage negotiations to include more than wages, hours and working conditions is the first step toward handing the management of business over to the Union bosses.

We therefore reject the idea of a "look at the books" not because we have anything to hide but because the idea itself hides a threat to GM, to all business, and to you, the public.
