ACTIVITIES BEGIN MONDAY—

Registration Dates Given For Various School Groups

Summer is over for many Post and Garza County boys and girls with the passing of this week. Although school doesn't officially open until September 2, pre-opening activities will get underway next week with the registration of football players Monday morning at Post High School, beginning at 9 o'clock.

Supt. G. R. Day has announced the following schedule of registrations and is urging all students to observe the dates and be at the school promptly at the appointed times:

Senior girl basketball players will register Monday afternoon, August 18, beginning at 1 o'clock.

Post High School Seniors will register from 9 until 12 o'clock Monday morning, August 25. Juniors will register from 1 until 4 o'clock that afternoon.

Sophomores will register from 9 until 12 o'clock Tuesday morning, August 26. Freshmen will register from 1 until 4 o'clock that afternoon.

Garza Schools Get Money For Transportation

Schools of Garza County have been approved for transportation in the amount of \$11,126 for the 1946-47 term, County Superintendent Dean Robinson said yesterday.

The first payment, totaling \$4,673, was made December 7 and the second payment, totaling \$6,456 was made Saturday when the Garza County Board of Education met in Robinson's office. The second payment was apportioned, as follows:

Close City, \$474; Graham, \$1,545; Verbena, \$315; Post \$1,760; 50, and Southland, \$2,645.

Payment was made on the basis of pupils transported and at the rate of \$3.50 per month per pupil residing at least 1-2 miles from school when at least 65 per cent of attendance in school was shown.

At the Saturday meeting, the board of education also considered protests in transfers and sustained those in districts where scholastics were needed to retain a certain number of teachers.

FHA Office Is Reopened Here

Garza County again has a Farmers Home Administration (former Farm Security) office in the court house with Perry Walker in charge. The office will be open every Wednesday from 9 a. m. until 2 p. m. for consultation with farmers concerning loans and other matters pertaining to the administration.

Walker is attached to the FHA home office which recently was shifted from Snyder to Tahoka. He held an office here until a month ago when the local office was combined with the Snyder set-up. After the home office was moved to Tahoka, the Garza County office was reopened.

The FHA is expecting a booming business here this fall, as prospects for a good cotton crop indicate that many loans will be paid off in full by January 1, Walker said.

GI TEACHERS FROM FOUR COUNTIES MEET IN POST

GI Vocational Agriculture teachers of Dawson, Lynn, Scurry and Garza Counties met at the court house here yesterday to thrash out new problems and exchange ideas and methods of teaching.

Zane G. Brewer of Lubbock, regional supervisor of the State Board of Education, met with the 15 teachers and coordinators attending from the four counties.

Engineer Asked To Survey Road Route In Area

Dawson County Judge Kilmer Corbin of Lamesa, president of the Broadway-To-The-Big Bend Highway Association, said recently that the State Highway Commission has ordered the state highway engineer to make a survey of the proposed route from the Red River, near Quanah, to Presidio, on the Mexican border.

The survey will ascertain how much of the road which is already built will be suitable for links in the proposed highway and would make an estimate of the total cost of filling in the gaps in the route.

Corbin said the commission also is requesting full details of the plans made by the Oklahoma Highway Commission for the construction of a connecting road across the Sooner State. The Oklahoma body has designated the route through that state and has appropriated funds for construction.

County Judge J. Lee Bowen and Post Chamber of Commerce Secretary Sherrill Boyd are preparing letters to the State Highway Commissioners urging an early designation of the route, which will diagonally cross Garza County. Judges and other officials in all the West Texas counties along the route are preparing similar letters.

"And I really believe we're going to get that highway," Judge Bowen believes.

THEY WEREN'T PLAYING PENNY ANTE AT FIELD'S

Six negroes, five men and a woman, were arrested early Monday morning at Jasper Field's Cafe and fined for gambling, Deputy Sheriff Fay Claborn said yesterday. Field, having previously been fined on two gambling charges, paid \$23.15 as his fine and costs. The others paid \$14.15 each.

"And they didn't leave the court house broke," Judge J. Lee Bowen observed. One of the men had \$131.10 on the gambling table when arrested, the judge explained. "They weren't playing penny ante," he said.

All 1946 Cotton Crop Insurance Indemnities have been received by Garza County producers, Mike C. Custer, secretary, Garza County ACA, said yesterday.

The total amount of indemnity received by farm operators in this county after premiums, interest and warehouse fees were deducted was \$3371,034.14.

Hopkins will be joined by his wife and her son here as soon as living quarters can be found. Since his discharge from the Army in April this year, Hopkins has been associated with the theatres at Olney and Spur.

He is succeeding B. J. Edwards who was transferred several weeks ago to Los Alamos, N. M., by Theater Enterprises. Mrs. Edwards, who stayed here as acting manager of the Garza Theatre, will remain here the rest of this month to assist Hopkins.

Alvin Davis Takes Honors In 4-H Rifle Competition

Alvin Davis, with a score of 219, made the highest score of all the 228 4-H boys from 18 counties attending a district 4-H encampment Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday on the Panhandle-South Plains Fair Grounds in Lubbock.

He and two other high scoring Garza County boys, E. P. Wicker, Jr., and J. E. Thomas, will compete with winners of other districts in rifle contests for boys above the age of 14 years at the State 4-H Club Round-Up at Texas A. and M. College, September 3-6. Gene Carpenter earned the place as alternate for the state competition.

The Garza record probably would have been even better had Carter Gene White, who won second high in rifle contests at the state round-up last year, been able to compete. White was injured last Saturday when a horse which he was riding near his home in the Garnolia Community stumbled and fell on him, spraining his ankle. He was unable to attend the encampment.

In the rifle contests for boys under 14 years of age, Bobby Cowdrey, Tommy Bird and Allen Maddox were the highest scoring Garza County boys.

Farmers Paid Conservation Earnings Here

All conservation checks earned by Garza County farm and ranch operators in 1946 were paid to the operators by June 24, 1947, stated Mike C. Custer, secretary, Garza County ACA, this week.

A total of \$62,678.22 was earned under the Agricultural Conservation Program by 512 operators, and \$23,545.24 was earned under the Purchase Order Plan for permanent practices carried out, making a total of \$86,223.46 earned by the Garza County farm and ranch operators during the 1946 program year, Custer said.

New Laws Go Into Effect In September

Vehicle And Motor Transfers Involved

T. H. Tipton, deputy tax collector for Garza County, is calling attention to two new motor vehicle laws passed by the 50th Legislature which will go into effect next month.

The first is House Bill No. 254 authorizing the Texas Highway Department to charge a fee of \$1 for each serial number assigned to a house trailer and for each motor number assigned to a motor vehicle when the owner has installed a new or rebuilt motor and when such motor does not carry a number.

The law becomes effective September 5. Application for assignment of a serial number must be made on Form 65 and sent to the State Highway Department with proper evidence of ownership. After September 5, a fee of \$1 in cash must accompany each application. The evidence and assigned number will be returned to the applicant, Tipton said.

The Texas Highway Department is now issuing titles on exempt vehicles and in the event one of these titles is lost and an application for a certified copy of the original title is presented, no fee will be charged.

The other law provides for the reinstatement of the registration transfer and also provides that application for transfer of registration and title shall be filed within 10 days of the date of such transfer. A fee of 50 cents is required for transfer of registration and a penalty of \$5 is imposed for failure to apply within the required number of days.

The county retains one half of the registration transfer fees collected and one half of the penalties collected for delinquent filing of applications. The other half of the fees and penalties go to the Texas Highway Department.

Controversy Is Flourishing On College Issue

Texas voters will go to the polls on August 23 to vote on a proposed amendment to the state constitution creating a special building fund for colleges.

The amendment, over which a widespread controversy has developed, would assign to the building funds a five-cent portion of the presently constitutionally authorized seven-cent per \$100 valuation property tax for Confederate pension purposes and would reduce the maximum property tax for the state general fund from 35 cents to 30 cents.

According to proponents of the bill, this action would have no actual effect on the Confederate fund, since only two cents per \$100 valuation has been levied for several years and the fund now has a surplus.

The amendment is endorsed by Governor Beauford Jester and a number of statewide organizations, including the public relations department of Texas Technological College.

It is opposed by a number of West Texans on the ground that the University of Texas and Texas A. & M. College will benefit in the main from the amendment and that funds diverted by it to the other 14 state colleges will be insufficient for their building needs.

Among the opponents are the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, a committee of ex-Tech students called the Tech Legislative Committee, the Veterans of Foreign Wars of Texas, and Rep. Harley Sadler of Sweetwater.

The opponents claim that "the University's and A. & M.'s part \$15,000,000, will come at once while the other 14 schools will have to issue 10-year bonds and get only one-third of the amounts listed. In the meantime, the University and A. & M. will continue to get the annual income from the permanent university fund which is increasing at the rate of more than \$10,000,000 yearly."

Many of the proponents support the amendment on the theory that a little bit of money, over a long period of time, is better than no money at all. The newspapers will be full of advertisement from both sides between now and August 23.

Duck Hunting Season To Be 24 Days Long

Texas will have a shorter duck hunting season this year, and a split one, besides.

There will be two periods of 12 days each, November 4-17 and December 18-29, for hunting ducks.

Strict limits have been placed on the number of fowl which may be taken by hunters. This year's daily limit on ducks has been set at four.

Any person may possess not more than eight ducks, or two days kill, at one time, nor more than the above-mentioned bag limits of geese or brant. The limit per day on brant is four, including either one Canadian goose or one white-fronted goose.

Shooting hours generally fall within the period of sunrise to sunset, with some specific exceptions, for certain types of fowl.

Ducks may be hunted this fall in Garza County, but the season is still closed on doves and quail, local hunting authorities say.

The dove season in all open-season counties, except where white wing doves are hunted, is Sept. 1 to October 15. White wing hunting, in Car. eron, Hidaigo, Starr, Zapata, Webb, Maverick, Dimmitt, LaSalle, Jim Hogg, Brooks, Kennedy and Willacy Counties, may be done September 12, 14 and 16, from 4 p. m. until sunset, and October 20 to November 30, from one-half hour before sunrise until sunset.

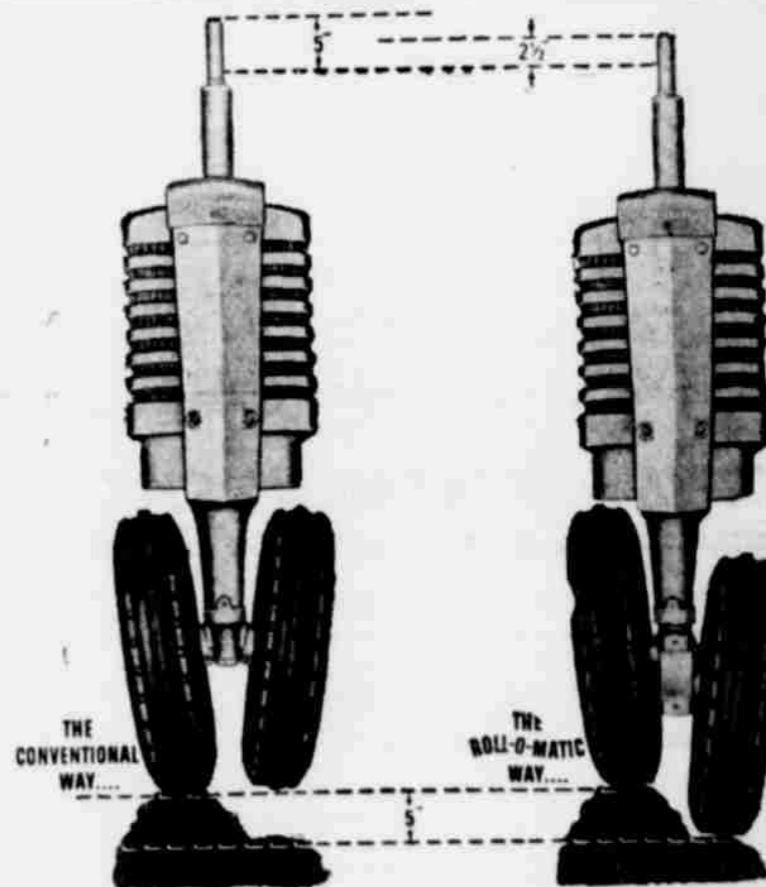
