





In addition to making more wheat available for export, this amendment to War Food Order 144 is designed to bring about more equitable distribution of wheat among millers.

2. 4. The USDA is offering a bonus of 30 cents a bushel on wheat delivered under the certificate plan by May 25. To be eligible for this bonus a producer must select a date for payment between the date of delivery and June 15,

5. The USDA will buy 30 miltion bushels of corn from produc- Dallas Wednesday, ers for which they will be paid a bonus of 30 cents a bushel above = the market price on the date of delivery for corn sold to the CCC.

6. The USDA is offering to buy an unlimited amount of oatmeal from millers in the U.S. to make available additional food for relief purposes.

PENSION ROLLS CLIMB AS PAY DECLINES

Texas pension rolls are going up and the amount of assistance to individual pensioners is going down, the Department of Public Welfare reports from Austin

The department announced that 182,035 persons are eligible to receive checks for May as compared with 179,758 in April. Each check for May will be \$1 less than the authorized grant, and as the rolls increase the average payment will continue to decline. Average payment for May is \$24.31 as compared with \$24.61 in April.

It was expected that applications would continue at a high rate for some months.

Aid to needy blind rolls inreased 69 to 4,865, Average payment for blay will be \$26.48 as compared with \$26.20 in April.

Aid to dependent children payments increased to 8,950, representing 21,986 children.



Homer Thompson Writes from Korea

A letter received last week by the editor from Captain Homer E. Thompson, former Garza county agricultural agent, will be of interest to Dispatch readers. Captain Thompson is stationed in Korea and is in agriculture and military work. His duty, as outlined in his letter, is the distribution of food.

Excerpts from the letter follow: "How are all the folks back home. I keep pretty well up with hem and the way things are going by reading the Post Dispatch. The paper is like a big newsy leter from home each week

"I was eligible for discharge January 1, but for some reason the War Department put me into "scarce" category, so now I have until July 1 before I can get my discharge. When that time arrives I hope to board a big fast ship and be on my way home. I do not like this country, but military government comes first and me second. I am in agriculture work and my duty is to rob Peter and give it to Paul. Some Koreans have plenty rice, while others are starving ..., we have to divide the crop, sometimes at gun-point. The people are quite difficult to understand and do not like us a little bit, which is okay by me. Rice is as precious as gold over here, as it is the main source of livelihood. Our outfit arrived here

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

POST'S PARKING SITUATION

Parking in Post, like in most other little West Texas city where some form of controlled parking regulations is not in effect, has developed into a problem of no little importance to Post merchants and individuals. Even during the emergency when there were not as many vehicles in use it was difficult to find a place to park in some sections of the city, but now that more cars are back in use it's worse.

The purking situation took top place on the list of "what Post needs" suggestions presented at a recent civic club's program. The suggestions came from a ct sp-section or inion of Post people and were read to the club by the party in charge of the program who had contacted fifty or more persons for suggestions on city needs,

Some merchants are complaining about the "squatters" . . . guys who park their cars in a spot and leave them all day, who force wouldbe shoppers off, or cause them to drive blocks away and walk back.

The big squawk is being heard from persons who have found it difficult to drive down Main with cars parked two-deep in front of stores and the same way in the center of the street, with only enough room left to squeeze through without dragging off a fender. Too, the center of Main usually catches all the big trucks, and these vehicles are often parked for hours occupying enough space for three to four passenger

There have been several suspections as to now the parking situation could be corrected, two of which would belp greatly ... stop double parsing in center of street, and store owners could relieve the situation considerably if they wouldn't park their cars in and around them places of business, or in trust of their competitors business, and park behind their stores.

Post is a pretty small town ... but it is hig enough to have a parking problem about which something ought to be done, and quick,

MAY I IS CHILD HEALTH DAY

May I is annually observed as Child Health Day in America and this year is no exception. The health and welfare of the millions of children who hold the future in their hands is of prime importance.

President Truman, in his proclamation, called upon the people of each community to pledge themselves to review their community health and medical care services.

In considering health conditions it seems Post is particularly fortunate. It just seems that there are fewer underprivileged persons in the smaller communities because of a personal interest of friends and medical authorities in the welfare of all.

While each one of us is vitally concerned over the physical wellbeing of youngsters it should be remembered that a wholesome mental condition should be carefully nurtured by instilling the ideals of constructive living into each child.

The national picture of child health is painted in somber colors by a report from Katerine Lenroot, chief of the Children's Burea who says that at least three-fourths of all school children need dental care and four million have sight detects. Some twenty thousand orthapedically crippled children are receiving no care, according to her report. and thousands of others suffer from malignant disease.

So it is well to take atock along these lines and do what we can to improve our future health condition.

TEXAS PRISON PARCLE SYSTEM OUTMODED?

Delegates to the Police Association in Galveston last week heard ten recommended changes in the present pardon and parole system employed by the Texas Prison System.

Several chiefs declared the present set up to be inadequate, basing their findings on the number of convicts now being released who save previous commitment records.

As an example, more than half of the criminals released on clemency during the first seven months of last year were law-breakers with previous convictions ranging from a suspended sentence to eight penitentiary terms.

The police chiefs said that they were not against rehabilitation but that they were in favor of granting no clemency to any habitual criminal who shows no intention of reforming or becoming rehabilitated.
