Actually, "Uncle Nathan", as he is known affectionately by his friends, was born June 12, 1882, but the party here was held a few days later.

The celebration, which was held at the Pleasant Home Baptist Church, was organized by Pat Walker.

The event featured bris-ket, chicken, trimmings and cake as 41 friends joined Wilson in the celebration.

Following the dinner, Rev Arthur Kelly introduced Walker, who presented special recognition to Wilson and salutations from U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm, U.S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen and a special letter from President and Mrs Ronald Reagan.

Wilson was born in Greenvine, Tx in Washington County and is a veteran of World War 1.

He served in France during that war.

He moved to Garza County in 1935 and worked for Bryan Williams, Sr.

School Board Okays New Field House

The Post Independent School District board of trustees voted 4-3 at the regular meeting, June 18 to approve the bid of Tusha Builders on a low bid of \$198,158 for a new athletic field house.

Voting for the project were trustees Don Payne, Jerry Osborn, Jimmie Bartlett and Royce Hart. Opposed were Pru Basquez, Tom Middleton and Jack Kirkpatrick.

The field house is to be constructed on a site near the high school gymnasium and plans call for the junior high athletes to use the former high school dressing room at the north end of the stadium.

Osborn, general contractor for the school district, says he expects the new field house to be ready before the first home football game.

In other action, the board approved a motion by Basquez to join the asbestos litigation.

The board also approved the revised school calendar.

Will Burks was hired as band director, and his wife Davida Burks will serve as reading specialist.

Burks comes to Post from Texas Tech where he recently graduated. He was a member of the sweepstakes Littlefield High School band while in high school.

The board also hired Juanita Ammons as school nurse and Deborah Willis, special education elementary.

The resignation of Chuck Tipton was accepted.

The board approved the motion by Kirkpatrick to pay the coaches a bonus consisting of one half of last year's bonus.

The day starts off with a full-fledged airshow next Thursday as the Post Chamber of Commerce sponsored July Fourth activities open.

The airshow will be held at the Post-Garza County airport east of Post on U.S. Hwy 380 and gets underway at 10 a.m.

Acid Leak Discovered at Postex Plant

The Post Economic Development Corp. has requested the Texas Tech Environmental Health and Safety and the Texas Water Control Board to assist in evaluating the leakage of sulphuric acid from a tank on the grounds of the former Postex plant.

The acid, which was reported leaking earlier this

week, is a potential hazard if handled, but is not considered a major problem.

The material has been confined to an area around the tank and is being diluted.

The acid was used 20-25 years ago in the preparation of raw cotton, but Burlington discontinued

treatment of raw cotton here years ago and the material has been in the bottom of the tank.

"There is really no way of knowing what other stuffs may be around the area," PEDC chairman Jack King emphasizes.

He cautions residents to stay off the property.

Although the tank is enclosed in a fenced area, it has been common since the closing of the plant, for young people to be in the area.

"We don't want to alarm anyone needlessly," King adds, "but it sure would be better if people would take caution and stay off the plant ground in the area behind the fence, and especially keep children out of the area."

Commissioners Miffed at Overtime

The Garza County Commissioners' Court requested a joint meeting July 8th with the Post city council to clarify overtime payments in the sheriff's department.

The action came during Monday morning's regular commissioners' court meeting with Sheriff Jim Pippin or chief deputy Bill Timms.

Neither of the two appeared at the meeting, although according to Judge Giles Dalby, the sheriff was notified.

The issue concerns the recent \$352 overtime submitted by the Sheriff's Department for four deputies on 45 hours of overtime.

The overtime was reported during a vacation period for one of the other deputies.

Last month, when the commissioners and council

approved the addition of a deputy in order to eliminate overtime, the two government bodies were told by

the sheriff's department that the additional manpower would solve the overtime problem.

PUTTING TOGETHER A WINNING WARDROBE

If there has been a change in your lifestyle lately, you've probably come to realize your wardrobe no longer meets your needs.

A new job, new activities, retirement, or simply an image you want to achieve can make your wardrobe look like a "closet full of nothings" to wear.

With a little planning and resourcefulness, you can economically coordinate a wardrobe that will help achieve the "look" you want.

Although it may be hard to pinpoint the type of clothing most needed, one way to start is to list all the activities you recently participated in during a typical 2-4 week period or longer, and what you wore.

You will also want to consider the special activities on your calendar throughout the year.

The list can help determine the type of garments worn most often and where some changes are needed.

Any general inventory begins by assessing your present wardrobe.
