#### DIVERSIFICATION SHOWN OVER TWO DECADES

The broad extent of diversification on Texas farms and ranches during two decades is evident in a recent publication of the U S. Department of Agriculture, entitled "Cash Receipts from Farming by States and Commodities

While the book is little more than a collection of statistics it dramatically records a change in production which has affected all people who live on the land, in the opinion of W. E. Morgan, economist for the Texas A and M College Extension Service.

Most noticeable change is the increase in each income from livestock and livestock products, contrusted with a decline in receipts from cotion lint and seed.

Cash receipts from Texas farm marketings of livestock and livestock products were about eighty million dollars in 1924 and increased (despite a slump during the depression years) to 561 miltion in 1944, last year included in the USDA study. Receipts from grain sorghums in 1942 were more than twenty-told what they were
