Garza County's New License Plates For 1946 Arrive Here

The new 1946, black and ivory Texas automobile license plates are now in the office of County Tax Collector Percy Printz, but will not go on sale until February 1.

Garza county's passenger car plates range from numbers CH-4200 to CH-5299. Commercial plates run from MJ-2850 to MJ-2499. Farm (truck license plates are numbers RE-4550 to RE-4749.

The passenger plates are black with ivory numerals. The new license can not be put on automobiles until March 1, and vehicle owners have until April 1 to get them on their automobiles.

Garza's Political Picture Brightened With 5 More Hats

The political picture in Garza County was drawn with more definite lines this week with the addition of five more hats in the pot, and an announcement from one office-holder stating that he would not be a candidate in 1946.

When Cross, who is serving his fourth term as commissioner of precinct 3, came through with the announcement that he would not be a candidate for re-election which according to Cross, clears up his position in the matter and leaves the field wide open to all comers.

Announcing for re-election this week is Percy Printz, who is seeking a second term as sheriff. Ray N. Smith, who asks to be returned to the county and district clerk office; W. T. Parchman, who asks re-election to a second term as commissioner of precinct 4, and H. D. Moreman, who seeks return to the office of county treasurer.

A new-comer to the field is Conner Parsons, a discharged War II veteran, who asks election to the office of commissioner of precinct 2, the office which is now held by his mother, Mrs. Alice Parsons. Mrs. Parsons was appointed by the Commissioner of the Court to fill the unexpired term of her late husband.

Rumors are current that various other candidates who are new-comers to the field of politics will announce for office, but interest apparently has not spurred to a very high pitch as yet. Lack of opponents for any of the office-seekers who have announced thus far probably accounts for the comparative quietness.

Flutt is a Garza county man and has been associated with two large ranching establishments in Garza county. He has been with the Double U company for the past 12 years and prior to that was with the Slaughter ranch. He moved to the S Lazy S ranch this week.

Eighty-One Houses And Unimproved City Property Purchased

An extensive expansion of Postex Mills properties, which will provide employment for many more people, and a housing project to afford better housing facilities for employees, is being planned by Leslie & Company of New York City, owners of the Post Mills, it was announced Wednesday by Claude Bailey, superintendent of the mills.

Along with the announcement came information that the Company had purchased eighty-one housing units in South Post from the Double U Company, and four unimproved residential blocks, which extend from the cotton yard, south of highway 380, to the south city-limits of the town-site.

It is now assured that title will be cleared up for purchase of 26.81 acres of land south of the mills, for expansion of mill properties, said Mr. Bailey, and that twenty acres of land, north of the mills, contracted from M. K. Bingham, will be purchased for an additional housing project.

While no definite plan for immediate expansion of the mills proper, has been announced, owners are hopeful that all departments of the mills will be running double-daily shifts within a short while and are looking forward to seeing a much larger plant here in the future. "Labor conditions have improved to such an extent the past few weeks that we are now back to normal operation of one shift, and have boosted our production up to eighty-five per cent efficiency," declared the superintendent. "We are also operating a part-time second shift in our carding and spinning departments, and hope to secure an additional thirty or forty middle-aged women and girls to work on a night-shift in the handkerchief department." The mills are now manufacturing eight thousand dozen handkerchiefs weekly and expect to boost the output up to twenty thousand dozen weekly within the next few weeks. Women and girls, eighteen years of age or over, who seek employment are invited to contact the mill office immediately to work in the handkerchief department.

In discussing the housing units recently acquired, Mr. Bailey made it plain to this reporter that the Company purchased the houses with the sole purpose of furnishing places for mill employees to live, and under no circumstances are these dwellings to be rented to other than mill employees. Most of the occupants who were living in the houses when the Company took possession of them January 8, who were not mill employees, have responded very nicely in vacating them when asked to do so, asserted Mr. Bailey.

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Clothing Collection Dribbling In Slowly As Drive Nears End

Discarded clothing, liberally needed for relief of millions in war-torn countries, has been coming in much slower in Garza County's Victory Clothing drive this year than it came in during last year's drive, reports Walter Duchoweth, chairman of the American Legion's committee, sponsor of the campaign.

"We will fall far short of our goal of 10,000 garments, said the chairman last night. "Very few families have responded to our appeal and only a few hundred garments have been left at the five collection points."

The campaign is scheduled to end today, said Duchoweth, but families who have clothes set aside for the collection, and who have failed to bring them in, are urged to do so before the week ends.

Social Security Expansion Plan Urged for Veterans

Expansion of the Social Security program to provide veterans with insurance credits for time spent in uniform was recommended by the Federal Security agency today.

This plan was urged as a part of a broader "national system of social insurance outlined in the Social Security boards tenth annual report to Congress.

Other recommendations in addition to the old age and survivor's insurance credits for veterans for their time in service are:

Federal insurance against medical care costs, including payments to doctors and hospitals.

Establishment of a single national program to unemployable insurance to replace existing federal-state programs.

Extension of jobless benefit rights to all employees in industries currently covered, and to as many non-covered groups "as is administratively feasible."

Maximum weekly unemployment benefits to at least \$25.00 payable for up to 26 weeks.

Expansion of the old age and survivors insurance program to cover "all gainful workers," as well as those in business for themselves.

Liberalization of these benefits, particularly for low-paid workers.

Benefit payment and temporary disabilities.

Expansion of federal-state programs of general public assistance to cover "all needy persons—and so that payments may be more adequate."

Question And Answer Column

For The Benefit of Garza World War II Veterans

This space is devoted to questions and answers of interest to Garza County returning service men. It will be published for as long as a regular feature. For additional information contact Geo. Semums office, 703-5, Lubbock National bank building, Lubbock.

Q. Does a veteran apply for educational benefits under the G. I. Bill in the State in which he lives or in the State where he wants to go to school?

A. Application will be made to the Regional Office in the state where he resides.

Q. Does a veteran who receives a pension continue to receive it while in a Veterans Administration hospital?

A. If the veteran has dependents he continues to receive the full amount of his pension. If he has no dependents, \$20.00 per month will be payable while in the hospital if the disability was service incurred, or \$8.00 per month if the disability was not service incurred.

Q. Can a veteran secure a loan guaranty the proceeds of which will be used to paint, paper and generally remodel a home he already owns?

A. Repairs, improvements and alterations are included in the permitted purposes for which a loan guaranty will be granted.

Q. If a veteran has a service incurred disability and is permanently and totally disabled by reasons of non-service disability, will he receive pension for both disabilities?

A. The veteran will be rated for both and will receive the greater benefit but may not receive both.

Q. Is out-patient treatment furnished for veterans for non-service disabilities?

A. Out-patient treatment is furnished only for the treatment of service connected disabilities.

Q. Is it possible to go to school for a longer period while taking a course in Vocational Rehabilitation than while taking courses under the educational provisions of the G. I. Bill?

A. The permitted period of training is different in each case. Length of schooling or training under Public Law 16, which provides for Vocational Rehabilitation is determined by the length of time it takes to complete the training objective. Length of schooling or training under Public Law 346 which provides for education and retraining is determined by length of service. It is possible to go to school for four years under the provisions of either law but no longer.

Q. Is any provision made for a loan to a veteran to assist him in getting started on a course of education under the G. I. Bill?

A. No provision is made for such a loan to those who go to school under the provision of the G. I. Bill. An amount not to exceed \$100.00 will be loaned to those who are beginning a course in Vocational Rehabilitation.

Q. For what purpose may an agricultural Loan Guaranty be obtained?

A. Loans may be guaranteed for the purpose of purchasing any land, building, live stock, equipment, machinery or implements, or improving any building or equipment to be used in farming operations conducted by the applicant.

Q. Is a veteran who has obtained a loan guaranty to buy a farm eligible for Readjustment allowance?

A. He may be; he should consult the nearest representative of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission.

As the Dispatch has followed them from civilian life through their war experiences, it will record their lives from the time they receive their discharge papers until they become rehabilitated and re-established in civilian life.

Bennie Porter, who arrived home from the European theater of operations several months ago, received his honorable discharge recently. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Hunter Porter and served with the Ninth Air Force.

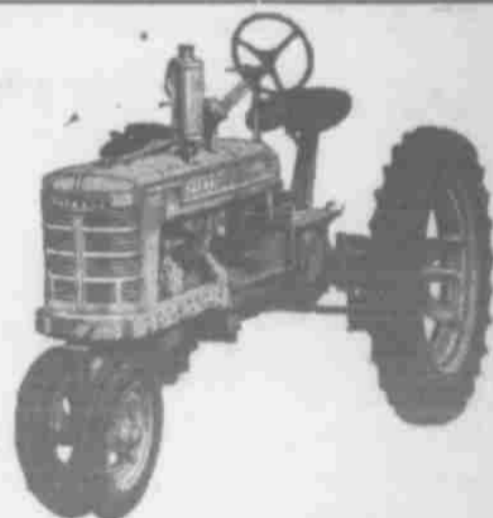

Silver Star Awarded Posthumously To Former Post Boy

By order of the President, the Silver Star has been awarded posthumously to Staff Sergeant Rex A. Davis, former Garza county boy, killed in action on December 12, 1944. Word of the award was received through a letter to Sgt. Davis' father, Adrian A. Davis of Granbury, Texas from Maj. Gen. Edward F. Witsell, of the Adjutant General's office in Washington. The citation reads as follows:

"For gallantry in action on 12 December, 1944. When signaled that four enemy were working toward his position, Sergeant Davis immediately moved his squad to attack. He was well in advance of his squad when he contacted the enemy. Since the terrain permitted only one man to fire effectively, he unhesitatingly opened fire, killing two of the enemy. When his rifle jammed he secured a submachine gun from a squad member and killed a third, when again his weapon jammed. The fourth enemy fired inflicting a mortal wound. Nevertheless, Sergeant Davis walked back several steps, secured another rifle, and killed the remaining enemy. The gallant and courageous action of Sergeant Davis, performed at cost of his life, prevented a possible enemy attack."

Mr. Davis was informed that an officer of the Eighth Service Command will be selected to make the presentation.

Sgt. Davis is the nephew of Charlie Everett of this city.

We understand conditions and do not wish to cause hardship to anyone, but we must get possession of these houses to meet our demand for places for our employees to live," said Mr. Bailey.

In further commenting on the housing project, Mr. Bailey said that one of the Company's engineers would be in Post within the next few days to go over the units and make recommendations for repairs and improvements to be made. "It is the Company's desire and hope that officials in charge of administering our city's affairs will cooperate with us in improving living conditions in South Post. When Company officials inspected the property they severely criticized the conditions of streets, drainage, sidewalks and alleyways, and expressed a desire that the city give more attention to this section of the town."

Annual Livestock Show Opening In El Paso March 16

El Paso—National cattle breeding organizations will participate in the 17th annual Southwestern Livestock show, which will open here March 26, it was announced today by E. 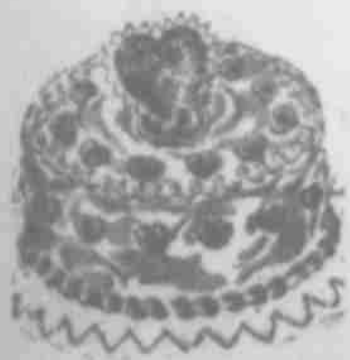

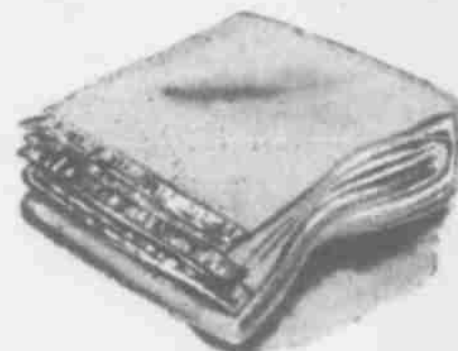

IT'S NOT INSURANCE

The Chicago Tribune observes that to call the President's proposed compulsory health program "insurance," is a misnomer. "The fundamental principle of insurance," says the Tribune, "is that the rate or premium is proportionate to the risk involved, and that all policyholders who offer the same risk pay the same rate."

"The so-called health insurance program embodies neither of these principles, common to all insurance. The man with a record of good health gets no rating advantage over the man who has a record of chronic ill health. Furthermore, payments are not fixed according to the probable cost of providing medical care to the individual, but according to his income. President Truman proposes that the tax, or a combined tax and a Federal subvention, equal to 4 per cent of all incomes up to \$3,600 a year, be used to finance the system. If the costs were placed solely on the beneficiaries, this income tax would cost a man earning \$300 a month \$144 a year. The man earning \$100 a month would get exactly the same protection for \$48 a year. That's not insurance.

"It may be a legitimate public purpose to tax the people in order to provide medical care for their less healthy, less prosperous, or less capable fellow citizens. That, in fact, is already done through tax-supported hospitals, and clinics. But such a project is not insurance. It's a new form of taxation and a very heavy one, and its proponents ought to acknowledge that fact in the beginning."

SO THIS IS PEACE

There is something frightening in let-down that has followed the war. It runs deeper than mere relaxation of weary people after years of strain.

Our military disintegration, the mass demonstrations of American troops in foreign lands, the lawlessness and strikes at home—they all add up to an abdication of individual responsibility that can mean the destruction of democratic government in the United States.

Referring to the present state of collapse in the Armed Forces, the New York Times says: "Peace apparently has brought a release from the feeling of individual responsibility that showed itself during the war, at home as well as on the battlefronts—the feeling that what each was doing, even if it was only playing a small role, was a part of the whole national and international effort. Now each apparently is willing to let the other do it. Each parent is willing to let some other parent's son stay overseas if only he can get his own son back. Every possible influence is brought, every possible string is pulled, to secure preferred treatment. A recent report from a European command said that two officers were kept busy doing nothing else but running down inquiries from just one senator as to the status of the sons of his constituents."

Part of the fault for our scuttling and run attitude lies with the policy of the government which sold millions of people to the idea that war was an investment rather than an expense. Were not war bonds sold on this basis? And now instead of settling into the harness to pay those expenses, we are getting back on our laurels waiting to collect on our "investment."

CANCER

Although cancer of the stomach is among the most often fatal of all forms of cancer, cures have been effected through surgery in 27 per cent of the cases reported by one clinic, which states that the patients were still alive five years after the operation. Records of the clinic show that all of 23 cases where the victims refused surgery all were dead within three years.

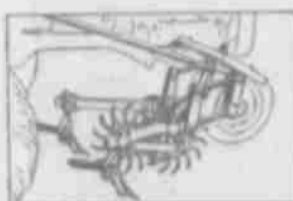

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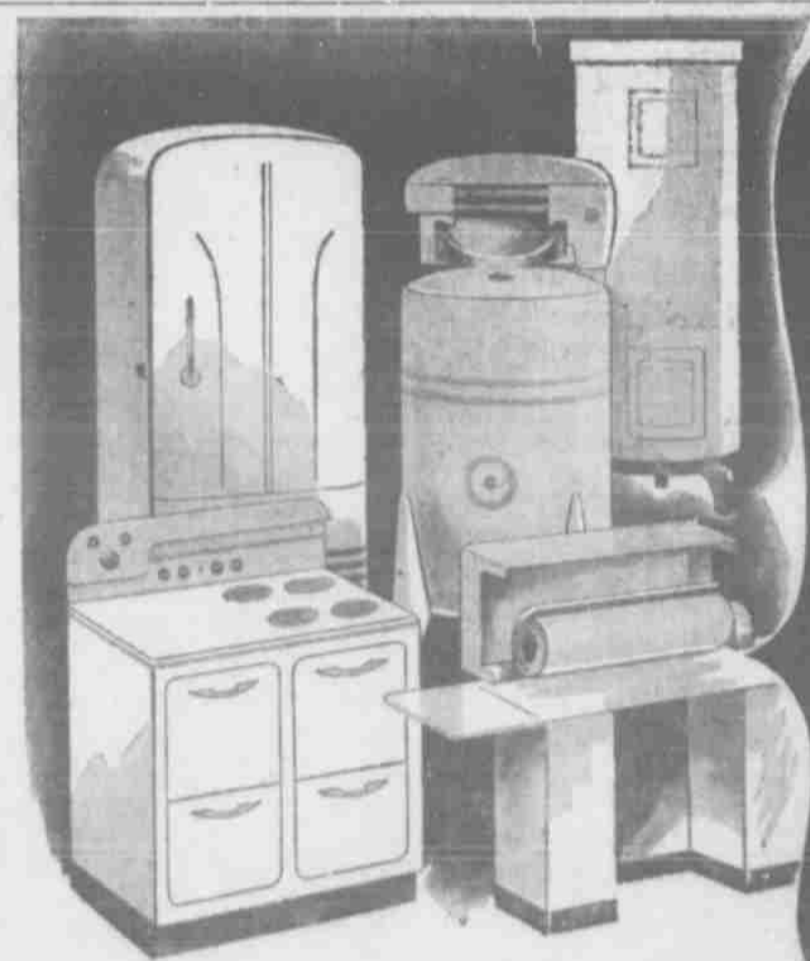
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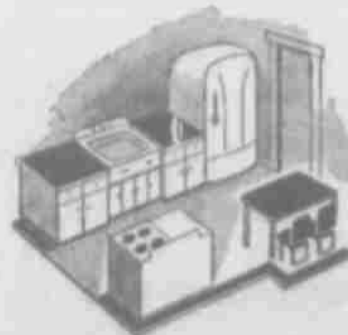

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Sidelights . . .
 FROM WASHINGTON, D. C.

I think the following note regarding the chances for heavy export of surplus American cotton will interest West Texans:

Last September, during a conversation with Lt. General Lucius Clay, U. S. Deputy Military Governor of Germany, I learned to my surprise that plans were being considered to permit a revival of the synthetic textile industry in Germany but that no definite plans were under way to permit a revival of the German cotton textile industry.

I urged upon General Clay that this plan be reversed and that the utilization of American cotton by Germany be encouraged and that the synthetic industry—capable of quick conversion to war—be discouraged. General Clay was not unfriendly to the idea.

Later in Washington I went to the White House and presented the matter to President Truman, and thereafter to Secretary of State Byrnes and Secretary of Agriculture Anderson. Other Members of Congress joined in the effort.

My point was that we should encourage the purchase and use of surplus American cotton not only by Germany but also by Japan, and in fact, all nations that might afford a market for American cotton.

The President and Secretary of Agriculture Anderson and their assistants have worked diligently on the idea and as this is being written the chances are that an early announcement of considerable success will be made.

If these plans for the disposition of surplus cotton abroad works out, and they have already worked out in part, it will mean millions of dollars to the cotton growing South, particularly to West Texas where shorter staples are grown and a large part of the surplus exists.

It is too bad that American textile mills are not doing a better job of providing badly needed cotton fabrics. But there is no danger of a shortage of raw cotton for American mills.

Tex Easley of the Associated Press asked me the other day what I thought of the proposal of OPA for a ceiling price on the 1946 cotton crop. I branded the proposal as an unwarranted and unjust attack on the cotton grower and told him of my efforts in opposition to the plan.

There is no possible justification for ceiling prices on commodities of which we have vast surpluses, such as in the case of raw cotton. We may have as of August 1st a carry over of American cotton of as much as 9 million bales. We need to bend every effort toward holding up the price of cotton, not beating the price down by OPA threats. Fortunately, we have provided by law for a floor or support price on cotton of 82½ per cent of parity for the next two years. But the support price is not adequate because in determining parity the tremendous increase in farm labor costs are not fully considered.

The OPA threat of a ceiling of 24 cents per pound is misleading because the 24 cents is for 15/16 middling at the mill. The ceiling on some of the shorter staples and lower grades at points remote from the mills would be little more than one-half the top ceiling price announced.

Some of us in Congress who are interested in this vital matter have met with Administrator Bowles of OPA and the Secretary of Agriculture and requested that they issue a public statement to the effect that no ceiling prices would be fixed on the 1946 cotton crop. To date our request has not been granted. The mere threat of ceiling prices on raw cotton is damaging to the cotton grower.

Those who have had no opportunity to investigate the proposed plan for ceiling prices on raw cotton, perhaps, do not realize the extent of the injury that would be done the cotton grower should

Swing of Southwest Farm Markets

Southwest farm markets the fourth week of January felt the impact of unsettled labor conditions and shortage of railroad cars at a time when demand for most products was at peak levels from both domestic and export buyers. This resulted in a generally strong price trend except on eggs and vegetables, which are seasonally plentiful, according to USDA's Production and Marketing Administration.

The egg market was very weak under increased supplies and only a fair demand until near the close of the period when a better tone became apparent at some of the larger price-setting terminals. This improvement followed announcement of proposed government buying of dried whole eggs and indications of more interest from storage operators. No change was evident in the Southwest, however, where prices closed at the lowest level of the season.

Poultry was steady to firm with offerings moderate to heavy and demand improved as a result of the meat packers' strike.

Most spectacular strength of the week was on cotton, which advanced about \$2.50 a bale before turning slightly lower at the close. The average price of Middling 15-16 inch in the ten designated markets went above 25 cents a pound for the first time since the mid-20's. Spot market activity increased with sales up 190,600 bales against 109,300 in the preceding week and only 79,100 a year ago. Offerings consisted mainly of the lower grades in medium staple lengths.

Grains continue very strong with quotations nominally at the ceiling under an excellent demand and very light offerings. The feed supply situation is very acute with a considerable volume of barley and exchange trading of wheat and other grains for millfeeds reported. Scarcity of protein feeds has resulted in some mill shut-downs in the Southwest. Peanut offerings are also far below trade needs at ceiling levels, with mills generally working to fill back orders and practically no farmers' stock available.

Livestock markets were crippled by the packing house workers' strike. Light to moderate receipts generally met a good demand from the slaughterers who were still operating and prices the early part of the week were very strong. Toward the close some cattle sold lower, but hogs kept a ceiling trend, and sheep and lamb sales remained too scattered to accurately establish prices.

Such a plan actually go into effect. Moreover, the red tape and confusion involved in trying to put such a program into operation would be intolerable. We are determined to defeat the proposal.

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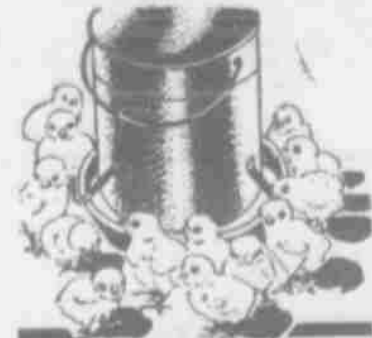

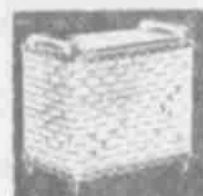
