High Wind And Sand Local Storm Effect

Although National Weather Service had predicted the first severe weather for the Muleshoe area sometime Friday evening, the weather which did move into the Morton area failed to materialize here. Muleshoe's only effect of the thunderstorm was high wind and sand which hit the area around 9:30 p.m.

As brilliant lightning flashed across the sky to the south, this area's only rain fell west of Muleshoe in the Farwell and Bovina area. Shortly after 10 p.m., National Weather Service issued a severe thunderstorm watch for Cochran, Hockley and Lamb Counties as wind and hail

was reported to have inundated the Morton area, and was moving to the northeast.

THP Trooper Jim Bishop reported light rain in the Farwell area just before midnight and reported lightning to the west and south of Farwell, and a Bovina City officer reported rain in that city around 12:30 a.m.

The high wind moved sand into the area again for the second straight day, and wind was predicted to be back in the weather picture for both Saturday and Sunday, along with possible showers.

After March went by without major winds which usually are noted during the month, April has come in with a bang, and dust has been kicked up by high winds for most of the first week of the month.

NWS said there was a 30 percent chance of rain for Saturday and 20 percent for Saturday night, but it was not expected to be enough to lay dust which is plaguing the area.

Afternoon temperatures for the weekend were expected to go into the high 80s followed by middle 40s at night.

The NWS spokesman said a cooling trend expected to accompany the showers would possibly keep the temperature on Sunday in the 70s, but by midweek, temperature would be moving back into the 80s, with nighttime temperature in the 40s and 50s.

With tornado season here, the first severe weather watch is a sure harbinger of spring.

Visitors at the Thursday Rotary Club meeting included Rev. Gene Prevost, Paul Poyner and Jessie Bass. No special program was conducted.

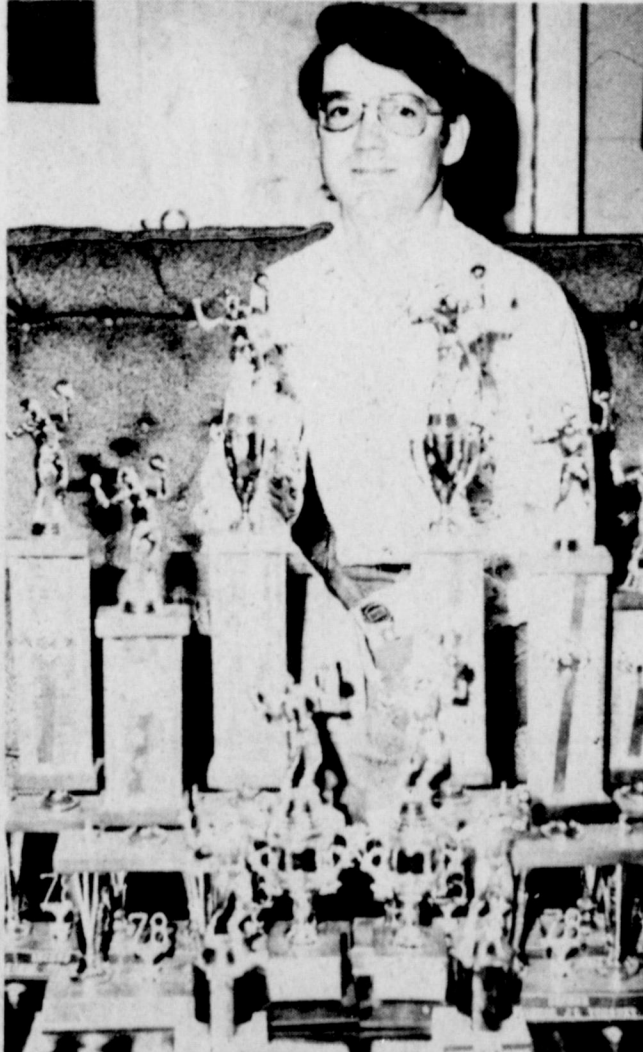

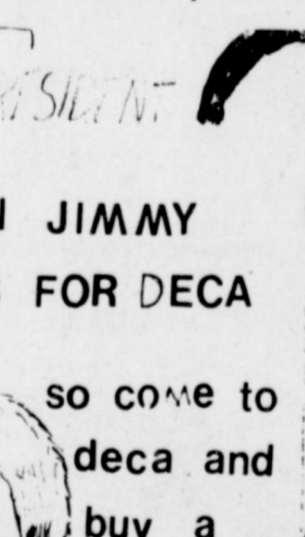
Beversdorf took fourth in the discus with his personal best of 126'5". Brent Maddox took a fifth place in the pole vault with 11'.

HECE.. A Student Learning Experience

The Home Economics Cooperative Education program at Muleshoe High School prepares junior and senior students for gainful employment. Mrs. Wanda Gramling has been the teacher coordinator for the past 7 years. Students enrolled in HECE attend class one hour each day and work a minimum of 15 hours each week. Jobs are approved by the Texas Education Agency and are related to home economics.

Home Economics Cooperative Education is currently in its seventh year in Muleshoe. According to the Texas Education Agency, HECE is designed to provide related classroom instruction and on-the-job training for high school students who are preparing to enter employment in occupation requiring knowledge and skills in one or more home economics subject areas. The program is also designed to help students combine the role of wage earner and homemaker.

Mrs. Gramling, supervisor of vocational home economics for Muleshoe, states HECE is offered to juniors and seniors to help build on the skills they may have had prior to enrolling in HECE. The program is designed to help the students develop their skills, talents, and abilities.

Mrs. Gramling, who began teaching HECE when it was started in Muleshoe, says to qualify for HECE, the students are screened. To qualify, the student must be a junior or senior, and be 16 years of age. The student must also be honest, responsible, and dependable.

While in the classroom, the students learn from a variety of sources. Guest speakers enlighten their knowledge in different fields. The speakers have given tips for interviews, filling out applications, tips on filing income tax returns, and the citizen's responsibility in the community. Other topics for discussion are job success, attitudes, personal qualities, and business etiquette. Students also study resource Management, budgeting, and decision-making. Each week, the class files a record of his or her income and expenditures. Each individual sets up their own values and goals and tries to accomplish them through good management and self-discipline. "Through this class, the students gain more maturity and learn to accept responsibility," explains Mrs. Gramling.

The teacher coordinator is responsible for finding employers who will cooperate with

the program, and sending the right student for the right job interview. "The hardest job I have is getting the student placed on the right job," states

Mrs. Gramling. "There is a place for everyone—it is just a matter of finding it." Mrs. Gramling is proud to say that the businesses in Muleshoe

have done a fantastic job in supporting the Hece program. Some of the occupational areas in which students are now working include Dietetic Aide, Food Service Employee, Consumer Aide, Housekeeping Management Assistant, Floral Designer, Home Furnishings Aide, Child Care Aide, and Companion to the Elderly. The services the students perform are related to the skills taught in class.

"During the afternoons, I visit with the employers and observe students on the job. The employers are very understanding and want to help the students. I'm amazed at their patience and concern," says Mrs. Gramling.

Each employer must fill out an evaluation sheet for the type of job the student is performing. It rates the student on attitude, cooperation, ability, and dependability. The teacher, employer, and student must have very good communication. This is the key to the program's success, she added.

"The Home Economics Cooperative Education program is designed to meet the immediate and changing needs of the students. Each year, the HECE program encounters different situations, but with the support

of the surrounding community, the program will continue to be successful," concurred Mrs. Gramling.

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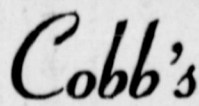
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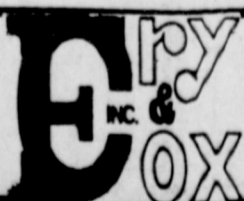
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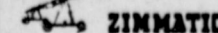
