Conservation Pays

Several district cooperators, including Fred Robinson at Post. says: "Last year cotton on unterraced and uncontoured land made a quarter bale and on land well terraced and farmed on the contour it made a third of a bale to the acre. When cotton is selling for \$160 per bale, an acre that yields 14 bale is worth \$40 and one-third is worth about \$33. Thirteen dollars difference.




