

After lunch, the busses will take the passengers to Butler Field and remain there to bring them home after the game. A stop will be made for an evening meal.

As the game will be the only football tilt in the Panhandle area, it is expected that at least 10,000 fans will be on hand for the regional playoff.

Holly, a Garza rural mail carrier, discuss the need for hard-surfaced roads on all the mail and school bus routes in the county and participated in a roundtable discussion of the subject.

Judge J. Lee Bowen, chairman of the committee to organize a Garza County Rural Roads Association, issued to the county commissioners and others attending the meeting books from which they can sell memberships in the Texas Rural Roads Association, whose purpose it is to have a million members throughout the state. The assoclation's aim is to get hard-surfaced roads for every mail and school route in the state. To accomplish this, it is working through the county organiza tions such as the one formed here Monday night.


His death was believed to have been the result of second degree burns which he received about two weeks ago when his bed caught fire. He lost consciousness soon afterward and never regained it before passing away.

Post Antelopes Eke Out 7-6 Victory In Lockney Bi-District Championship Game

The Post Antelopes battled the over-sized Lockney "Bulldozers' to a heroic 7-6 victory to win the championship of Districts 4-A and 3-A last Thursday afternoon in Jones Stadium at Texas Technelogical College, before an audience of 8,000 to 10,000 spectators.

Jack Kirkpatrick's "educated toe" was the deciding factor in the game, as without the extra point a tie might have resulted in the loss of the bi-district champ-

ionship. The Longhorns opened the coring in the first quarter, driving 33 yards on seven plays to send their hard hitting Jerry McCullough over center into paydirt. McCullough's plunge for extra point was stopped an inch or two short of the goal that might have given the Steers a

victory Although the Antelopes drove to the Lockney 15-yard line just before the half ended, they did not score until the third quarter. A 71-yard Antelope surge in the opening moments of the third period was halted on the oneinch line. The drive, however, gave the Antelopes their biggest scoring chance and the second time they made good. They cov ered 38 yards on five plays with a 15-yard unnecessary roughness penalty against Lockney helping them. Junior Malouf car ned the ball every time except once, when Charles McGuire took it to send the drive into the end zone, where Malouf took over for the touchdown.

The Lubbock Avalanche, in describing the game at this point, said "Kirkpatrick stepped back, surveyed the goalposts and calmly flipped the bail over the bar to hand the Antelopes the win.

With four and a half minutes remaining in the third quarter, Lockney made another try. Calvin Pyle returned the kick off to the 26 and a drive of 37 yards started with Jack Cole passing once to Pyle for a good gain and McCullough lugging consistent ly. On the second down, Lockney went for the distance, pulling Pyle out on an end around.

The handoff was bad. Pyle fumbled and Roy Teaff recover-ed for Post. When Lockney next got the ball, in the fourth quarter, it was on their own 18-yard line. The Longhorns started a drive, ploughing through to the Post 36-yard marker. There the Antelopes held, forcing Lockney to punt. Malouf at this point sent a kick 71 yards to the Long horn 16.

With less than three minutes remaining. Lockney disregarded the air and stayed on the ground, where the Steers were exceedingly poweriul Lockney "buildozed" to the Antelopes 47, where Cole fumbled and Kay Kirkpatrick recovered.



Good Grass Makes | BITS OF NEWS **Neighbors Want Soil Conservation**

Ranchers and farmers who don't want good grass ought to

stay away from good pastures. because the fever is catching. Last week when the GI Vocational Agriculture class was on the Giles McCrary's pasture some of the boys said "This is the best grass I've seen for a long time." Bruce Montgomery lives just beside the Paddle Ranch's Bull Pasture. The Post Dispatch carried a picture some time ago of grass knee deep in this pasture. Montgomery started deferred ro-

tation grazing on his pasture this fall. This week he showed soil technicians the improvement in his pasture and pointed out the high forage grasses. Crop residue, incidentally, is

preventing Montgomery's land from blowing. Montgomery whose farm is near Clairemont is carrying out a conservation plan with the Duck Creek Soil Conservation District. Recently he said "Last year my lanl just about got away from me a couple of windy days. Now I've got it where it won't blow. Had I started this practice in my cropping

system several years ago the soil

would be better now." Last spring, on deep sandy land. Montgomery made a thick planting of red top cane in rows. It got six to seven feet tall. After frost this fall a combine was used to harvest the seed. A stubble three feet high was left standing and the rest of the stalks were scattered over the land. On the deeper sandy soil. Montgomery plans next spring, to plant African weeping lovegrass in this stubble mulch. Montgomery has several thousand pounds of cane seed, so that district cooperators, who will need it next spring can buy it at a saving.

The one conservation practice Davis needs is to prevent soil and water losses from his pastures. He deferred grazing on one of his pastures during most of the growing season in 1947 and 1948. Buffalo grass, blue grama, hairy grama, side oats grama, black grama, and tobosa have begun to thicken up. Some grass litter has begun to accumulate and in another season or two Davis will have completed his original conservation plan agreed on seven years ago. onservation technicians believe. Davis liked the benefits of a over crop of rye and vetch. He said the benefits of winter and early spring pasture, its value from seed harvest, and its soil presection and soil improvement would fit in his farm program. He plans to amend his conservation plan to include a planting of rye and vetch next September.

Warning Issued **Against Deaths** By Asphyxiation

With the advent of cold weat her each year in this state, several deaths are usually reported. resulting from asphyxiation by gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes or sleeping quarters.

Dr. George W. Cox of Austin. state health efficer, has issued a warning in this respect, emphasizing that it is never safe to sleep in a tightly closed room with a gas fire burning. Even if there are no gas leaks, the air soon becomes vitiated and unfit to breathe.

"When occupying a room in which gas is burning, be sure always to have at least one window or door open, to admit fresh air," Dr. Cox said. "If the weather is too cold to permit leaving an open window in the room occupied, then play safe by opening a door into an adjoining room, where a window can be opened."

Dr. Cox said he was prompted to issue this warning early in the season because of the fact that thousands of new residents in the state have come from districts where they have been used to burning coal, wood ee oil, and they do not know the dangers of gas fumes in improperly ventilated homes.

Occupying a room heated by an open gas flame, and at the same time keeping the room tightly closed, may prove disasterous the very first time it is tried," Dr. Cox said. "It is better not to risk it even one time. Always be sure that your room has plenty of fresh air, but make doubly sure when you have a gas fire burning."


