NEW HAMPSHIRE CHICKS ARE WELL SUITED HERE

New Hampshire chickens, a relatively new dusl-purpose breed, are well suited to West Texas, in the opinion of Delbert L. Devin, assistant professo: of animal husbandry at Texas Technological College in Lubbock.

The breed had failen into disfavor when first introduced from New Hampshire because it proved susceptible to pullorum, a disease causing auxilliary white diarrhea, Devin explained. But pullorum resistant chicks are now being bred, overcoming this difficulty, he reported, adding that the chickens in addition to being heavy, approach White Leghorns in laying ability.

The college recently received a flock of 350 New Hampshire chicks as a gift from John Simpson of the Branch and Simpson breeding farm, Yorktown, Simpson has indicated that he will send 50 additional cockerels later for breeding purposes. The flock will be used for class instruction at the college.



good old-fashioned house cleaning in every city and community in Texas would do a great deal toward furthering good health in this state," Dr. George W. Cox, of Austin, state health officer, said this week in urging all communities and cities in the state to cooperate in Texas Clean-Up Week. April 4-11.

A general clean-up program of state-wide proportions with the Djective of Deffering health conditions for our citizenship should include surface cleaning, drainage, the graveling of streets and alleys, the cleaning of all parks and playgrounds and the clearing off of weeds and rubbish from vacarit lots. "The destruction of mosquito breeding places and rat harborage, the proper disposal of garbage and trash and the general cleaning up of all premises will be, said Dr. Cox, inestimable value in helping to keep down summer health hazards such as dysentery, typhoid and poliomyelitis. Good community housekeeping and ordinary sanitary measures require the prompt removal of all waste matter in and around yards and homes in order to abate the danger of such diseases, and insure good health protection throughout the state. Dr. Cox stressed the fact that many dangerous diseases are filth borne, and the only way possible to control them is to eliminate the unsanitary conditions responsible for their spread.





"The farmer must work hard, conserve moisture and cut all corners in order to help nature produce an average crop."


