

have signed up 305 farms for participation in the wheat sta-bilization program, and 233 under the feed grain program. Acreage signed up for diversion under the programs included 5-240 acres from wheat produc-tion, 5,136 acres from corn-grain sorghum production, and 2 acres from barley production. 221
