That the four were deeply touched and pleased at the glowing tribute paid them by hundreds of friends was seen in the tears that filled their eyes, even as they smiled, and was noted in their brief, but sincere, responses to the many compliments paid them by the evening's guests.

## Stampede Rodeo Opens Wednesday

### Two-Mile Long Parade To Set Off Activities

A two-mile long parade, featuring at least a dozen floats and probably as many riding groups, will wind through Post's downtown section at 6 p. m. Wednesday to officially open the annual Post Stampede Rodeo.

Tom Power and Shelley Camp, chairman of the rodeo association's parade committee, said Wednesday that plans for the parade are nearing completion, but that float entries will be accepted right up to the deadline. "All that is asked of sponsors is to have their float at the parade assembly point in plenty of time to start," the chairman said.

Cash prizes totaling \$50 are being offered first, second and third place winners in the float division.

Sheriff's posses and other riding groups are expected from a number of West Texas towns. First, second and third place trophies will be awarded the three winners. The riders will include a mounted group representing the Post Junior Rodeo Association.

A new route has been chosen for this year's parade. It will assemble on the farm-to-market road at the football stadium, proceed east on the Tahoka Highway to the city warehouse, north to Main Street, east to the railroad and then back up Main Street to the courthouse, where it will be disbanded.

One of the groups in the open parade will include the three winners in the Western Regalia.

### Charge Filed Here For Cattle Theft

Billy Baber, 24, employee of the U. Lazy S Ranch near here, has been released under \$1,500 bond after being charged with the theft of four calves from the ranch.

Two other men, Hutt Corley, 49, of Knox City, and Gerald Harris, 35, of Rochester, also have been released under \$1,500 bond after being charged with receiving and concealing stolen property in connection with the case.

Baber was arrested Friday by Sheriff Carl Rains and Texas Rangers Waters and Renfro after he had been named by Corley and Harris as the man who had sold them calves. Sheriff Rains and Deputy Sheriff J. W. "Red" Floyd went to Guthrie after Corley and Harris Sunday and returned them to Post to face the charges.

County Attorney Pat N. Walker said Baber had admitted stealing four calves from the ranch May 11 and hauling them away in the back seat of his late model Mercury automobile.

## Trash Hauling To Conclude Clean-up

Teams of workers, predominated by members of the Post Junior Chamber of Commerce, will begin picking up and hauling away trash Friday morning as the city winds up its second annual clean-up drive.

All residents are requested to have trash accumulations piled on alleys where they may easily be picked up when the trucks come around. The trash will be hauled to the city dump grounds and burned.

Charles T. Meacham, chairman of the Jaycees' clean-up committee, reminds all workers to be at the city warehouse at 8 o'clock Friday morning. At that time, workers and trucks will be assigned to one of four sections into which the city has been divided for the clean-up drive.

Refreshments will be served the workers throughout the day, and at noon the City at Post will serve lunch at the park site on all those participating in the work.

Mayor T. L. Jones said city employees will cooperate with the Jaycees in the clean-up drive, and that alleys will be sprayed as a follow-up to the general clean-up program.

Sponsoring Jaycees request merchants and other business men to release at least one employee to help during the day, and to furnish a truck if one is available.

Entrances for the four sections of the city in tomorrow's clean-up are: A. R. Hays, Jr. southwest; Malcolm T. Bull, northwest; J. D. Burrow, northeast; and Bud Everett, southeast.

In accordance with a decision reached at a meeting here a few months ago, business places will remain closed Saturday, according to Mrs. Fritz Greenfield, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. She said that Memorial Day was one of the holidays designated for closing at the meeting.

The Rev. Roy Shaban, First Baptist Church pastor, will deliver the message at the memorial service. Invocation will be by the Rev. Joe E. Boyd, First Methodist Church pastor, and benediction by the Rev. Almon G. Martin, First Christian Church pastor.

A color guard and firing squad from the two service organizations and buglers will present military rites at the service, Richardson said.

Graves of war veterans will be decorated with flags and the names of all Garza County war dead will be read, according to the program plans. Everyone is urged to attend the service and to assist members of the Legion and VFW posts in locating unmarked graves of war veterans.

## Rainfall Of Weekend Stops At Meager .30

Friday and Saturday's rainfall in Post measured .30 of an inch, according to figures released from the Double U Company office following a check of the rain gauge there.

Friday's precipitation measured .16 of an inch, and Saturday's .14. A meager .06 of an inch was recorded on Wednesday, May 13, to make the week's total .36.

Total recorded for the year on the land company's gauge is 1.97 inches, according to J. R. Durrett.

Elsewhere in Garza County, slightly more rainfall has been measured than in Post—but still not near enough. In some areas of the county, the total is well past the two-inch mark.

Meanwhile, another "duster" was blowing in Wednesday afternoon and rain prospects were gloomy—even more so than usual, considering that moisture is needed so badly.

## 4 Night Shows Scheduled For Annual Event

Final plans for the annual Post Stampede Rodeo to be held next Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights at the arena north of town were made Monday night at a meeting of officers and directors of the rodeo association.

Meanwhile, decorations went up over town and store windows were painted with rodeo scenes as townspeople began getting "into the mood" for the annual event, billed as "the fastest show in the west."

Homer McCrary, secretary of the association, reported Tuesday that entries are "pouring in" from cowboy and cowgirl contestants who will compete for the more than \$3,500 being offered as cash prizes in six events—bareback bronc riding, calf roping, cowgirl ribbon roping and wild steer riding.

"There are 621 producing oil wells in Garza County, Texas and that during the year 1952, the reported oil production for the county was 3,800,051 barrels. The accumulated reported production to January 1, 1953 for this county was 19,979,540 barrels."

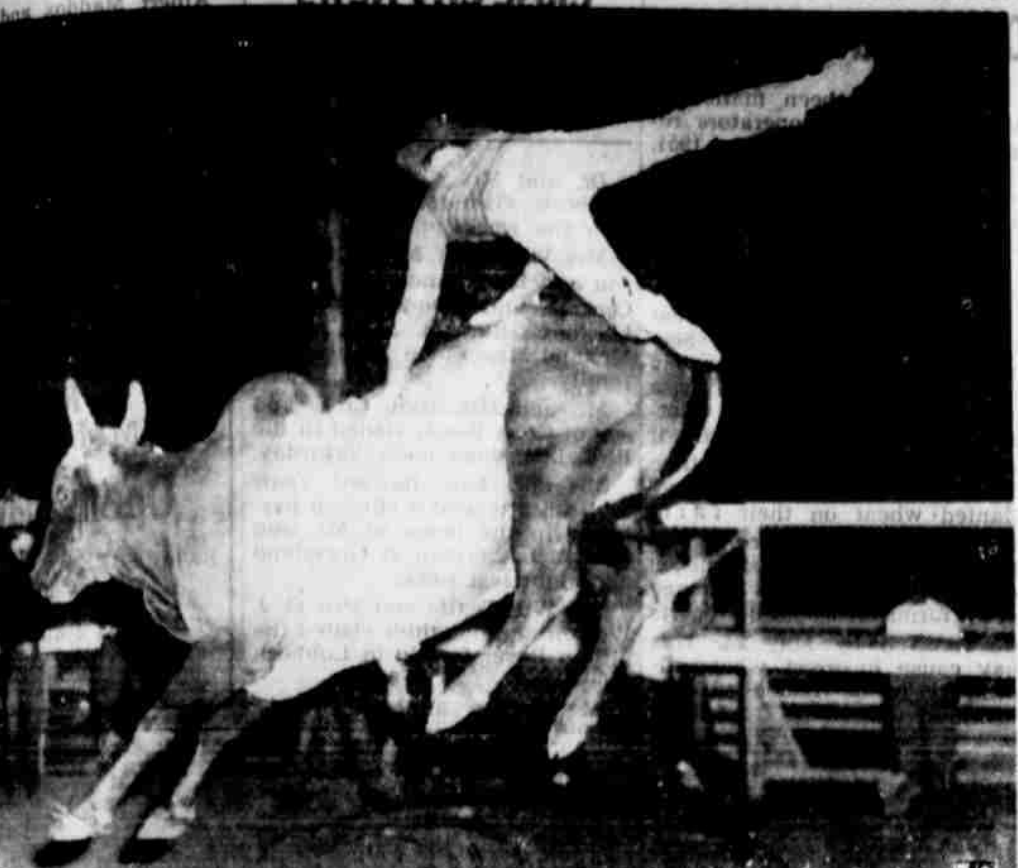
