is in print, the Post Stampede and Rodeo, none too modestly billed as "the fastest show in the West," will be in full swing and the fastfading spirit of the Old West will have suddenly come to life again for four nights of rootin', tootin' rodeo action.

Sharing the spotlight next weekend will be commencement exercises for Post High School and Junior High School graduates. marking the end of another school year. And, while on that subject, we wish to apologize to members of the graduating class of 1943 for having frequently described this year's class as "the largest in Post High School's history."

The graduating class of 10 years ago had 52 on its roster, which is one more than the number graduating this year. When we asked Principal Chant Lee a few weeks ago if this year's class was the largest, he admitted he didn't know, but that he thought it was. So did somebody else, and we went ahead and listed

In this issue of The Dispatch will be found "flash back" stories on graduating classes of the past several years, and it was while compiling these from the paper's files that we learned of the "king size" 1943 graduating class. Someone else has told us that the 1939 class was even larger. We haven't gone back that far, but plan to continue the resume in next week's issue-we'll all know then.

Any town or city is always glad to get a convention, and Post is fortunate in having been elected as the site of the annual District 7 meeting of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and Auxiliary. Local VFW officials expect a crowd of approximately 200 here for Saturday and Sunday's convention. The Dispatch joins local VFW and Auxiliary members and other townspeople in hanging out the welcome sign.

Therefore, I use every opportunity to appeal for the praying individual, whatever his race or color, whether rich or poor. Far too much attention is given by "educators" to "Ph. D's" and other degrees. In doing so, I believe they are retarding rather than advancing research.

Great changes are ahead. Whatever may happen during the next few years, I am a great optimist as to the future of our grandchildren. The atomic bomb is not going to destroy the world; it will free the world. It has already started a new line of thinking. We will enter a period when our newspapers will no longer feature "cold wars" or "hot wars", but will again feature new discoveries: Men like Caxton who pioneered the printing press(1475) which opened the minds of men, Eli Whitney who invented the cotton gin (1793) which developed a great export trade. James Watt (1769) and Isaac Merritt Singer (1851) who spurred the industrial development of the United States, Thomas Edison, Henry Ford and John D. Rockefeller who laid the basis for America's present prosperity. We also should remember Pasteur to whom we all owe much
