New 98 Barrel Well Finished Last Week

Completed in the A. C. Scott Field 10 miles northwest of Cross Plains was Callihan Rotary Co. and Woodson Producing Co. No. 8 John W. Harris, John Pickens Survey 221.

Daily potential was 93 barrels of 42 gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64-inch choke with 300 pounds on casing and 60 on tubing. Flow was from 72 perforations at 1,838-46 feet. Casing was set at 1,847 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 450-1.

Finish 2 New Wells In South Part Of Callahan County

Morty Freedman of Dallas completed No. 2 J. L. Baum-Freedman as a new producer four and a half miles west of Cross Plains in the McGraw Field. It is in A. Montgomery Survey 853.

Daily potential was 79 barrels of 40 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64-inch choke with packer on casing and 60 pounds on tubing. Flow was from 32 perforations at 1,634-62 feet. Total depth was 1,660 feet, with casing set on bottom. Gas-oil ration was 400-1.

In the same field, N. M. Dillard et al, of Cross Plains, finalized No. 3 N. S. Johnson as an oiler in Wyatt Hickman Survey 6.

Daily potential was 124 barrels of 40.3 gravity oil, flowing through a 18-64-inch choke with packer on casing and 135 pounds on tubing. Flow was from 66 perforations at 1,661-1672 feet. Total depth was 1,699 feet, with casing set at 1,698. Gas-oil ratio was 450-1.

Gregory Fortune Pool Getting New Oil Test

In the Gregory-Fortune Field five miles west of Cross Plains, Fletcher Oil and Gas Drilling Corp., of Dallas, staked No. 1-A Lula Haile as an 1,850-foot rotary project.

Site is 2,710 feet from the north and 1,140 feet from the west lines of G. M. Vial Survey 798.

Whereas this court has been petitioned to call said election; THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS' COURT OF CALLAHAN COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held in said county on the 10th day of December, 1955, which date is sufficient to give notice of this election in the manner as hereinafter provided, and at said election there shall be submitted to the qualified property taxpaying voters of said county the question of adding an assessor-collector of taxes to the list of authorized county officials of said County.

The ballots of said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

"FOR ADDING AN ASSESSOR-COLLECTOR OF TAXES TO THE LIST OF AUTHORIZED COUNTY OFFICIALS."

"AGAINST ADDING AN ASSESSOR - COLLECTOR OF TAXES TO THE LIST OF AUTHORIZED COUNTY OFFICIALS."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed, as near as may be, by the General Election Laws of the State of Texas, and none but qualified property taxpaying voters of said County shall be allowed to vote at said election.

The County Clerk shall forthwith issue a notice of said election stating in substance the contents of this election order and the time and place of said election, and said notice shall be posted in each election precinct in this county and at the county courthouse at least twenty days prior to the date of said election by the Sheriff, who shall return his affidavit of posting to the County Clerk.

Notice of said election shall also be given by the publication of a copy of this order in a newspaper of general circulation published in this county on the same day in each of two successive weeks, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election.

Further orders are reserved until the returns of said election are made by the duly authorized election officials and received by this court.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Court voted AYE: Scott Bryant, Clyde T. Floyd, I. G. Mobley, Claude Foster; and the following voted NO: None.

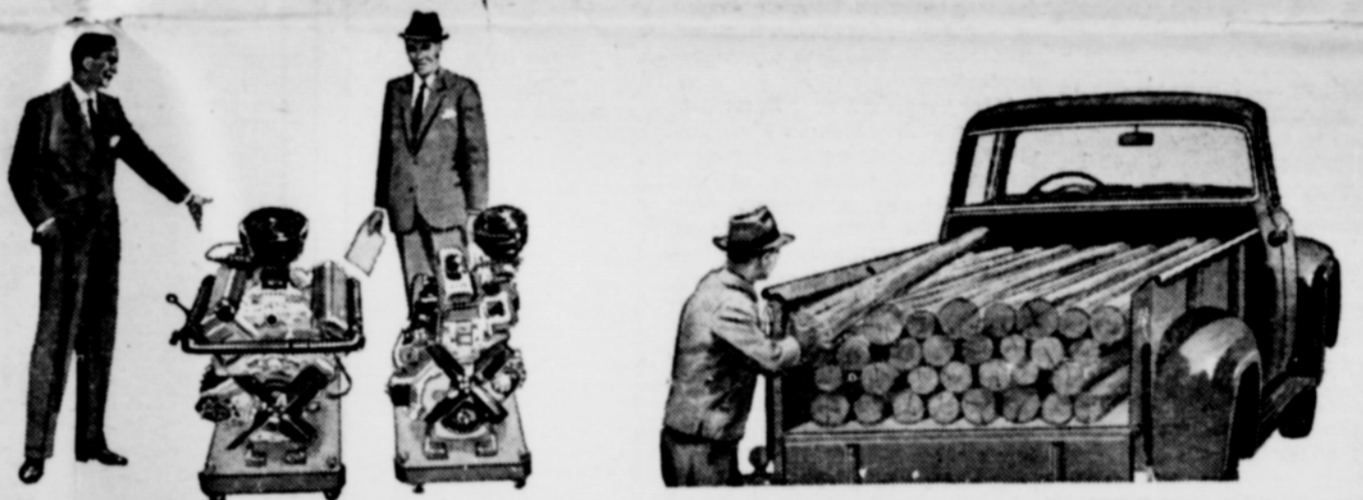

125 Barrel Well Is Finished In North Part Of Callahan

Confirming what a number of Callahan County oil men have predicted for a long time, is the new oil production being developed along the northern border of this county, seven miles north and slightly west of Clyde. Finished in this sector the past week was a 125 parrel well by Hovagard & Fitzgerald as the No. 4 R. D. Damewood. It is in Section 90, Buock 13, T&P Survey. Daily potential was 125.12 barrels of 41.6 gravity oil, flowing through a 16-64-inch choke with 190 pounds of casing pressure and 100 on tubing. Flow was from 100 perforations at 3,250 feet, with hole plugged back from 3,250 to 3,209 feet. Gas-oil ration was 350-1. Potential was based on an actual 6-hour test of 31.28 barrels of oil.

Same operators staked No. 6 Damewood as a 3,500-foot rotary project spotting 330 feet from the south and 990 feet from the east lines of Section 90, Block 13, T&P Survey.

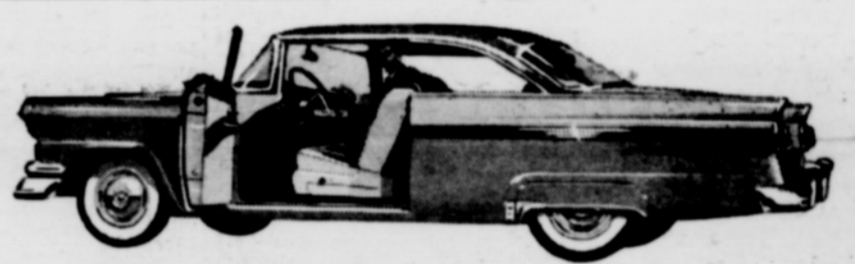

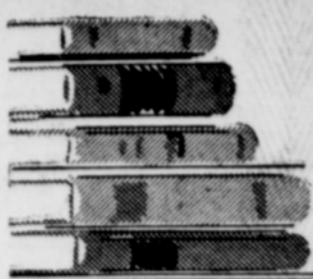
